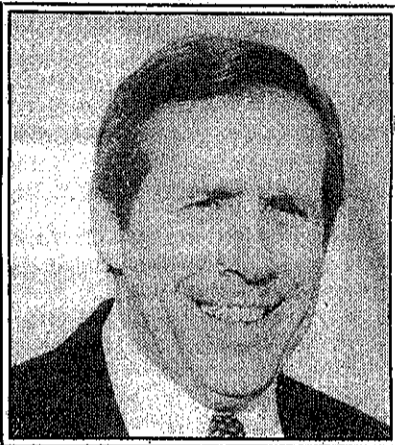

session at which my attendance record was 98.8 percent.

## Congressman Wolf's Voting Record

First Session, 98th Congress — January 3 - November 18, 1983

This voting record for the first session of the 98th Congress which convened in the House of Representatives on January 3 and adjourned November 18, 1983, is arranged by general subject areas as follows: Each vote begins with the roll call number, followed by the number of the bill or resolution and a description of the question on which the vote was taken, including amendments, motions and passage. That is followed by my own vote on the measure indicated by "yes" or "no" and next is the vote of the entire House of Representatives, indicated by passed or failed followed by the yes-no vote total. The

date on which the vote occurred is listed at the end. There were a total of 533 roll calls for the first session. That total includes 86 procedural votes such as approving the speaker's journal, resolving into the Committee of the Whole House to consider legislation, quorum calls and motions to adjourn. Those procedural votes are not listed. Votes indicated under the procedure of suspension of the rules require two-thirds majority of those present and voting for passage. In addition, there is limited debate and no amendments are allowed under the suspension procedure.
