UNTHSC monitors the swine flu

UNT Health Science Center is making preparations to minimize the potential impact of the H1N1 or "swine" flu on our campus and is taking steps to protect the health, welfare and safety of our students, faculty, staff and patients. The threat of a pandemic flu is a rapidly evolving situation, and in this case one that is unprecedented. We will continue to provide periodic updates about our response, as well as more information on the issue as it becomes available.

What UNTHSC is Doing

We have activated our campus Emergency Preparedness Plan to deal with the many dimensions of a pandemic flu threat. Over the past week, Safety Officer James Sims, PhD, has coordinated planning with our Emergency Operations Center commanders, clinical managers, safety coordinators, UNT Denton, the City of Fort Worth, Fort Worth Emergency Management, State of Texas Division of Disaster Management and the CDC.

Due to the number of confirmed cases now in Texas and locally, we have moved to the Alert Phase of our Plan related to a pandemic flu situation. Also as you may know, the Fort Worth ISD and a few other schools closed today and are expected to be closed for at least one week to reduce potential transmission.

We ask that all areas of our organization review and update all emergency preparedness plans. We also encourage you to take precautions to protect yourself, your family, students, co-workers and patients.

Who is in Charge

Kathleen Forbes, MD, executive vice president of Clinical Affairs and Business Development and president of UNT Health, has been appointed as the UNTHSC Emergency Preparedness Commander, working closely with Dr. Sims and 11 other senior incident commanders as outlined in our Emergency Plan. Given the risk of having multiple people impacted in a pandemic, we also have a list of back-ups for these people. Click here for the list of incident commanders and their back-ups.

Classes and Events

At this time, all classes, clinics and research activities are continuing as scheduled. We have not made any decisions on cancelling banquets, commencement or other activities other than our High School Art Show reception planned for Saturday, May 2. We will continue to monitor the situation and act appropriately.

Symptoms of Swine Flu

The symptoms of swine flu are similar to those of regular seasonal flu and may include fever, chills, cough, sore throat, body ache, headache, and fatigue. Some people also are reporting vomiting and diarrhea with the flu. A real signal is a fever of 100 degrees or more.

You can be contagious one day before you experience symptoms, and remain contagious for 5-7 days. Duration of the flu can be up to 14 days.

Staying Healthy

- Cover your nose and mouth with your arm or a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after use.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth. Germs spread that way.
- Get plenty of sleep, be physically active, manage stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food
- Try to avoid close contact with sick people
- Try to avoid highly-trafficked, enclosed spaces

If You Feel Sick

Stay away from work, contact your supervisor and see your healthcare professional if you have an influenza-like illness, fever over 100 degrees, and a cough and/or sore throat. This is especially true for anyone who has recently traveled to Mexico (within 7 days) or had contact with a person who has been diagnosed with the flu. If you become ill at work, contact your supervisor, go home, and contact your healthcare professional

Monitoring the UNTHSC Family

We are taking steps to coordinate the counting of all employees (staff and faculty) and students who are absent for any reason as well as confirmed cases of swine flu in order to plan continuation of academic, research, clinical and other services on campus. These tracking systems will be supported by Rand Horsman, vice president of Human Resource Services, Thomas Moorman, EdD, vice president of Student Affairs, and Dr. Kathleen Forbes in UNT Health. Also, we are tracking any suspicious and/or confirmed cases of this flu identified throughout UNT Health. Confirmed cases of swine flu will be monitored daily and then communicated to all appropriate campus leaders as well as Fort Worth Emergency Management.

US News & World Report ranks TCOM 29th, PA Studies 34th, Family Medicine 17th

The Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine (TCOM) jumped to 29th in rankings for primary care medical schools this year, according to *U.S. News & World Report's* ranking for 2010. This is the college's eighth consecutive appearance in the top 50. The Physician Assistant program ranked 34th, and the Department of Family Medicine ranked 17th. We were also listed as 3rd in percentage of graduates entering primary care residency.

"This is an exciting time to be a part of TCOM," said Alan Podawiltz, DO, acting dean of the Texas College of Osteopathic Medicine. "Not only do our students continue to outscore all other osteopathic medical students on the COMLEX exam, our class size continues to grow. We are now educating more osteopathic physicians than ever before, and more of our graduates enter primary care than any other Texas medical school."

Each year, *U.S. News & World Report* ranks professional school programs in business, education, engineering, law and medicine. The rankings are based on expert opinion about program performance and statistical indicators that measure the quality of the school's faculty, research and students. To gather the opinion data, *U.S. News & World Report* surveyed deans, program directors and senior faculty to judge the academic quality of programs in their field on a scale of 1, which was marginal, to 5, which was outstanding. Professionals who hire new graduates were also surveyed for the rankings. The print version of *U.S. News & World Report* went on sale April 28.

ITS takes new name

To streamline services, the five departments that used to be called Information Technology Services (ITS), have joined Biomedical Communications, the Library and Academic Information Services under a new division—Information Resources and Technology (IRT). IRT is headed by Renee Drabier, PhD, vice president for Information Resources and chief information officer, who joined the Health Science Center in November. Though some of the groups' names have changed, they still offer the same services with some new features and organizational adjustments to improve support—including a new Web site, a new online service-request system, and a universal phone number for IRT support.

- In addition to providing desktop computer support, **Helpdesk and Client Services** will take and rout support calls for all IRT groups at ext. 2192 or by e-mail (helpdesk@hsc.unt.edu). However, you can still contact any IRT group or its members directly.
- Classroom Education and Technology Services (CETS) has joined Helpdesk and Client Services to streamline support. CETS will provide the same services and will move to the Helpdesk area on the second floor of the library.
- The group known as central computing and networking under ITS is now called **Infrastructure** and Security.
- Information Systems Services is now called **Web and Programming Services.** The group is relocating to the fourth floor of the library.
- To improve computer support, IRT soon will adopt Bridgetrak, a new software system that tracks computer issues so they can be addressed as soon as possible. Customers can check the status of their requests via the Internet, Helpdesk or e-mail.

Human Resource Services and UNT Health administrative staff are at work on the transition's key issues to lessen any impact on the UNT Health/UMA employees. Supervisors will meet with their respective staffs to discuss more specifics, and employee orientation sessions will start next week and be offered through July. HRS expands employee training

Human Resource Services (HRS) is rolling out a new Management Development Program that will provide new opportunities for Health Science Center employees' to enhance their leadership skills.

The six-month program will offer monthly courses and computer-based training on a variety of management topics, as well as important Health Science Center initiatives such as Southern Association of Colleges (SACS) accreditation and process improvement efforts. HRS will offer the program twice a year. The first session starts in June.

The program will cover:

1. The UNTHSC Strategy Map and the Denison organizational culture survey

- 2. SACS accreditation and our Quality Enhancement Plan
- 3. Process Improvement and the Plan-Do-Check-Act model
- 4. Human Resource Services
- 5. Management and Leadership Skills (performance management, organizational change, problem solving and critical thinking, the five dysfunctions of teams, building trust, motivating and leading others, team building)
- 6. Community Engagement and Marketing and Communication

In addition to developing leadership skills, the program gives participants a chance to guide the direction of the Health Science Center by sharing ideas and input on our programs and initiatives.

The program is open to current UNTHSC directors, managers, supervisors, faculty and physicians who supervise others, but space in the classes is limited. To take part in the Management Development Program you must be nominated by your supervisor. You can also nominate yourself, however self-nominations must be approved by your supervisor. Presentations were made by Diaa Osman, TCOM Class of 2012; Harold Sheedlo, PhD, assistant professor of cell biology and genetics;

Roy Martin, DMIN, assistant professor of clinical ethics; and family members of some of those who had donated their bodies. As a result of the program, a new little gem magnolia tree was planted between the Gibson D. Lewis Health Science Library and the Patient Care Center, next to the circle drive. An oak plaque explaining why the tree was planted will be replaced in the coming weeks with a permanent, marble marker. The TCOM Class of 2012 hopes future classes of TCOM students will continue the tradition.

Michael Forster, PhD, professor of pharmacology and neuroscience, commented on the benefits of calorie restriction in an April 26 *Fort Worth Star-Telegram* story. While Dr. Forester did say calorie constriction is beneficial for several human ills, such as high blood pressure and elevated cholesterol, it has not been proven to increase human mortality.

DNA lab continues identification work across the country

An <u>Associated Press</u> story, run in the *Arkansas Democrat Gazette*, named the DNA lab as the identifying agency in the case of a body found in a shallow grave in Arkansas. The man was identified as Jon Fincher, who was a suspect in his mother's murder. Additional stories about the case were included in the <u>Hope (Ark.) A presentation given by Bruce Budowle, PhD, executive director of the UNT Center for Human Identification, in Dubai, UAE, was the focus of an article in the *Khaleej Times*.
