Stopping Devastating Defense Budget Cuts

Dear Friend,

We have a deep obligation to pass on to future generations of Americans the blessings of liberty and freedom. That is why a strong defense and a sound national security strategy are so critical – perhaps now more than ever before.

Unfortunately, our military and national security

are at risk because of massive, looming defense cuts that will affect each and every American unless

Congress and



the President can agree on a plan to stop them.

The cuts, known in Washington as 'sequestration,' would hollow our armed forces, devastate our ability to defend our country, and dismantle the greatest military force the world has ever known.

And right here in Virginia, our local economy would suffer tremendously—a recent study by George Mason University found that up to 207,000 Virginian jobs would disappear.

There is still sufficient time for us to come together and do what is right: find the common ground to counter these defense cuts with other federal

What I am Doing to Stop the Defense Cuts

- Voted for the Sequester Replacement Reconciliation Act of 2012, which passed the House in May.
- Voted for the Sequestration Transparency Act, which would require the President to give Congress a detailed plan of how the cuts would affect our military. This bill passed the House in July.
- Asked the President to call Congress into a Joint Session to address these cuts, and asked House leadership to keep us in session unless and until the budget cuts are addressed.
- Introduced an amendment to the National Defense Authorization Act that will stop sequestration for the coming fiscal year if Congress passes a reconciliation bill or other legislation that offsets the cuts over five years. This amendment passed the House earlier this summer.
- Fully support the proposal put forth by the Chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, Rep. Buck McKeon, to pay for one year of cuts.

What the Defense Cuts Mean for America


A "Hollow Force" and a Weakened Industrial Base:

- A Naval Fleet of 230 ships, the smallest level since 1915
- The smallest ground force since 1940
- Smallest tactical fighter force in Air Force history
- 100,000 soldiers, sailors, Marines, and airmen separated from service
- Loss of more than 1 million private sector jobs
- Loss of more than 350,000 active-duty and DOD civilian jobs
