Mr. CRENSHAW, from the Committee on Appropriations, reported the following bill; which was committed to the Committee of the Whole House on the State of the Union and ordered to be printed

A BILL

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2013, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any
4 money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the
5 Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September
6 30, 2013, and for other purposes, namely:

7 TITLE I—LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

8 HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

9 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

10 For salaries and expenses of the House of Represent-
11 atives, \$1,225,680,000, as follows:

12 HOUSE LEADERSHIP OFFICES

13 For salaries and expenses, as authorized by law,
14 \$23,275,773, including: Office of the Speaker,
15 \$6,942,770, including \$25,000 for official expenses of the
16 Speaker; Office of the Majority Floor Leader, \$2,277,595,
17 including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Majority
18 Leader; Office of the Minority Floor Leader, \$7,432,812,
19 including \$10,000 for official expenses of the Minority
20 Leader; Office of the Majority Whip, including the Chief
21 Deputy Majority Whip, \$1,971,050, including \$5,000 for
22 official expenses of the Majority Whip; Office of the Mi-
23 nority Whip, including the Chief Deputy Minority Whip,
24 \$1,524,951, including \$5,000 for official expenses of the
25 Minority Whip; Republican Conference, \$1,572,788;

1 Democratic Caucus, \$1,553,807. *Provided*, That such
2 amount for salaries and expenses shall remain available
3 from January 3, 2013 until January 3, 2014.

4 MEMBERS' REPRESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES
5 INCLUDING MEMBERS' CLERK HIRE, OFFICIAL
6 EXPENSES OF MEMBERS, AND OFFICIAL MAIL

7 For Members' representational allowances, including
8 Members' clerk hire, official expenses, and official mail,
9 \$573,939,282.

10 COMMITTEE EMPLOYEES

11 STANDING COMMITTEES, SPECIAL AND SELECT

12 For salaries and expenses of standing committees,
13 special and select, authorized by House resolutions,
14 \$125,964,870: *Provided*, That such amount shall remain
15 available for such salaries and expenses until December
16 31, 2014.

17 COMMITTEE ON APPROPRIATIONS

18 For salaries and expenses of the Committee on Ap-
19 propriations, \$26,665,785, including studies and examina-
20 tions of executive agencies and temporary personal serv-
21 ices for such committee, to be expended in accordance with
22 section 202(b) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
23 1946 and to be available for reimbursement to agencies
24 for services performed: *Provided*, That such amount shall

1 remain available for such salaries and expenses until De-
2 cember 31, 2014.

3 SALARIES, OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

4 For compensation and expenses of officers and em-
5 ployees, as authorized by law, \$173,669,084, including:
6 for salaries and expenses of the Office of the Clerk, includ-
7 ing not more than \$23,000, of which not more than
8 \$20,000 is for the Family Room, for official representa-
9 tion and reception expenses, \$22,370,252; for salaries and
10 expenses of the Office of the Sergeant at Arms, including
11 the position of Superintendent of Garages and the Office
12 of Emergency Management, and including not more than
13 \$3,000 for official representation and reception expenses,
14 \$12,585,000, of which \$5,463,251 shall remain available
15 until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of
16 the Chief Administrative Officer including not more than
17 \$3,000 for official representation and reception expenses,
18 \$116,782,000, of which \$3,937,000 shall remain available
19 until expended; for salaries and expenses of the Office of
20 the Inspector General, \$4,692,000; for salaries and ex-
21 penses of the Office of General Counsel, \$1,415,000; for
22 the Office of the Chaplain, \$179,000; for salaries and ex-
23 penses of the Office of the Parliamentarian, including the
24 Parliamentarian, \$2,000 for preparing the Digest of
25 Rules, and not more than \$1,000 for official representa-

1 tion and reception expenses, \$2,060,000; for salaries and
2 expenses of the Office of the Law Revision Counsel of the
3 House, \$3,258,000; for salaries and expenses of the Office
4 of the Legislative Counsel of the House, \$8,814,000; for
5 salaries and expenses of the Office of Interparliamentary
6 Affairs, \$859,000; for other authorized employees,
7 \$484,832; and for salaries and expenses of the Historian,
8 \$170,000.

9 ALLOWANCES AND EXPENSES

10 For allowances and expenses as authorized by House
11 resolution or law, \$302,165,206, including: supplies, mate-
12 rials, administrative costs and Federal tort claims,
13 \$3,696,118; official mail for committees, leadership of-
14 fices, and administrative offices of the House, \$201,000;
15 Government contributions for health, retirement, Social
16 Security, and other applicable employee benefits,
17 \$272,548,016; Business Continuity and Disaster Recov-
18 ery, \$17,112,072, of which \$5,000,000 shall remain avail-
19 able until expended; transition activities for new members
20 and staff, \$4,125,000; Wounded Warrior Program
21 \$2,175,000, to remain available until expended; Office of
22 Congressional Ethics, \$1,548,000; and miscellaneous
23 items including purchase, exchange, maintenance, repair
24 and operation of House motor vehicles, interparliamentary

1 receptions, and gratuities to heirs of deceased employees
2 of the House, \$760,000.

3 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

4 SEC. 101. (a) REQUIRING AMOUNTS REMAINING IN
5 MEMBERS' REPRESENTATIONAL ALLOWANCES TO BE
6 USED FOR DEFICIT REDUCTION OR TO REDUCE THE
7 FEDERAL DEBT.—Notwithstanding any other provision of
8 law, any amounts appropriated under this Act for
9 “HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES—Salaries and Ex-
10 penses—Members' Representational Allowances” shall be
11 available only for fiscal year 2013. Any amount remaining
12 after all payments are made under such allowances for fis-
13 cal year 2013 shall be deposited in the Treasury and used
14 for deficit reduction (or, if there is no Federal budget def-
15 icit after all such payments have been made, for reducing
16 the Federal debt, in such manner as the Secretary of the
17 Treasury considers appropriate).

18 (b) REGULATIONS.—The Committee on House Ad-
19 ministration of the House of Representatives shall have
20 authority to prescribe regulations to carry out this section.

21 (c) DEFINITION.—As used in this section, the term
22 “Member of the House of Representatives” means a Rep-
23 resentative in, or a Delegate or Resident Commissioner
24 to, the Congress.

1 SEC. 102. (a) Section 109(a) of the Legislative
2 Branch Appropriations Act, 1998 (2 U.S.C. 95d(a)) is
3 amended by striking the period at the end and inserting
4 the following: “, and for reimbursing the Secretary of
5 Labor for any amounts paid with respect to unemployment
6 compensation payments for former employees of the
7 House.”.

8 (b) The amendment made by subsection (a) shall
9 apply with respect to fiscal year 2013 and each succeeding
10 fiscal year.

11 SEC. 103. (a) Section 101(c)(2) of the Legislative
12 Branch Appropriations Act, 1993 (2 U.S.C. 95b(c)(2)) is
13 amended by striking “and ‘Allowances and Expenses’”
14 and inserting the following: “‘Allowances and Expenses’,
15 the heading for any joint committee under the heading
16 ‘Joint Items’ (to the extent that amounts appropriated for
17 the joint committee are disbursed by the Chief Adminis-
18 trative Officer of the House of Representatives), and ‘Of-
19 fice of the Attending Physician’”.

20 (b) The amendment made by subsection (a) shall
21 apply with respect to fiscal year 2013 and each succeeding
22 fiscal year.

23 JOINT ITEMS

24 For Joint Committees, as follows:

1 JOINT ECONOMIC COMMITTEE

2 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Economic
3 Committee, \$4,203,000, to be disbursed by the Secretary
4 of the Senate.

5 JOINT COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

6 For salaries and expenses of the Joint Committee on
7 Taxation, \$10,004,000, to be disbursed by the Chief Ad-
8 ministrative Officer of the House of Representatives.

9 For other joint items, as follows:

10 OFFICE OF THE ATTENDING PHYSICIAN

11 For medical supplies, equipment, and contingent ex-
12 penses of the emergency rooms, and for the Attending
13 Physician and his assistants, including: (1) an allowance
14 of \$2,175 per month to the Attending Physician; (2) an
15 allowance of \$1,300 per month to the Senior Medical Offi-
16 cer; (3) an allowance of \$725 per month each to three
17 medical officers while on duty in the Office of the Attend-
18 ing Physician; (4) an allowance of \$725 per month to 2
19 assistants and \$580 per month each not to exceed 11 as-
20 sistants on the basis heretofore provided for such assist-
21 ants; and (5) \$2,603,000 for reimbursement to the De-
22 partment of the Navy for expenses incurred for staff and
23 equipment assigned to the Office of the Attending Physi-
24 cian, which shall be advanced and credited to the applica-
25 ble appropriation or appropriations from which such sala-

1 ries, allowances, and other expenses are payable and shall
2 be available for all the purposes thereof, \$3,467,000, to
3 be disbursed by the Chief Administrative Officer of the
4 House of Representatives.

5 OFFICE OF CONGRESSIONAL ACCESSIBILITY SERVICES
6 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

7 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Congres-
8 sional Accessibility Services, \$1,363,000, to be disbursed
9 by the Secretary of the Senate.

10 CAPITOL POLICE

11 SALARIES

12 For salaries of employees of the Capitol Police, in-
13 cluding overtime, hazardous duty pay, and Government
14 contributions for health, retirement, social security, pro-
15 fessional liability insurance, and other applicable employee
16 benefits, \$297,133,000, to be disbursed by the Chief of
17 the Capitol Police or his designee.

18 GENERAL EXPENSES

19 For necessary expenses of the Capitol Police, includ-
20 ing motor vehicles, communications and other equipment,
21 security equipment and installation, uniforms, weapons,
22 supplies, materials, training, medical services, forensic
23 services, stenographic services, personal and professional
24 services, the employee assistance program, the awards pro-
25 gram, postage, communication services, travel advances,

1 relocation of instructor and liaison personnel for the Fed-
2 eral Law Enforcement Training Center, and not more
3 than \$5,000 to be expended on the certification of the
4 Chief of the Capitol Police in connection with official rep-
5 resentation and reception expenses, \$63,004,000, of which
6 \$2,700,000 shall remain available until September 30,
7 2015 to be disbursed by the Chief of the Capitol Police
8 or his designee: *Provided*, That, notwithstanding any other
9 provision of law, the cost of basic training for the Capitol
10 Police at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center
11 for fiscal year 2013 shall be paid by the Secretary of
12 Homeland Security from funds available to the Depart-
13 ment of Homeland Security.

14 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS

15 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

16 AUTHORITY TO TRANSFER AMOUNTS BETWEEN SALARIES

17 AND GENERAL EXPENSES

18 SEC. 1001. During fiscal year 2013 and any suc-
19 ceeding fiscal year, the Capitol Police may transfer
20 amounts appropriated for the fiscal year between the cat-
21 egory for salaries and the category for general expenses,
22 upon the approval of the Committees on Appropriations
23 of the House of Representatives and Senate.

1 FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR WORKERS COMPENSATION

2 PAYMENTS

3 SEC. 1002. (a) IN GENERAL.—Available balances of
4 expired United States Capitol Police appropriations shall
5 be available to the Capitol Police to make the deposit to
6 the credit of the Employees' Compensation Fund required
7 by section 8147(b) of title 5, United States Code.

8 (b) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—Section 1018 of the
9 Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 2003 (2 U.S.C.
10 1907) is amended by striking subsection (f).

11 (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with
12 respect to appropriations for fiscal year 2013 and each
13 fiscal year thereafter.

14 OFFICE OF COMPLIANCE

15 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

16 For salaries and expenses of the Office of Compli-
17 ance, as authorized by section 305 of the Congressional
18 Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1385), \$3,817,000,
19 of which \$527,500 shall remain available until September
20 30, 2014: *Provided*, That not more than \$500 may be ex-
21 pended on the certification of the Executive Director of
22 the Office of Compliance in connection with official rep-
23 resentation and reception expenses.

1 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

2 SEC. 1101. (a) The second sentence of section 415(a)
3 of the Congressional Accountability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C.
4 1415(a)) is amended to read as follows: “There are appro-
5 priated for such account such sums as may be necessary
6 to pay such awards and settlements.”.

7 (b) The amendment made by subsection (a) shall
8 apply with respect to fiscal year 2013 and each succeeding
9 fiscal year.

10 CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE

11 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

12 For salaries and expenses necessary for operation of
13 the Congressional Budget Office, including not more than
14 \$6,000 to be expended on the certification of the Director
15 of the Congressional Budget Office in connection with offi-
16 cial representation and reception expenses, \$44,280,000.

17 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

18 ACCEPTANCE OF VOLUNTARY STUDENT SERVICES

19 SEC. 1201. (a) Section 3111(e) of title 5, United
20 States Code, is amended—

21 (1) by striking “(e)” and inserting “(e)(1)”;

22 and

23 (2) by adding at the end the following new
24 paragraph:

1 “(2) In this section, the term ‘agency’ includes the
2 Congressional Budget Office, except that in the case of
3 the Congressional Budget Office—

4 “(A) any student who provides voluntary service
5 in accordance with this section shall be considered
6 an employee of the Congressional Budget Office for
7 purposes of section 203 of the Congressional Budget
8 Act of 1974 (relating to the level of confidentiality
9 of budget data); and

10 “(B) the authority granted to the Office of Per-
11 sonnel Management under this section shall be exer-
12 cised by the Director of the Congressional Budget
13 Office.”.

14 (b) The amendment made by subsection (a) shall
15 apply with respect to fiscal year 2013 and each succeeding
16 fiscal year.

17 ARCHITECT OF THE CAPITOL

18 GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

19 For salaries for the Architect of the Capitol, and
20 other personal services, at rates of pay provided by law;
21 for surveys and studies in connection with activities under
22 the care of the Architect of the Capitol; for all necessary
23 expenses for the general and administrative support of the
24 operations under the Architect of the Capitol including the
25 Botanic Garden; electrical substations of the Capitol, Sen-

1 ate and House office buildings, and other facilities under
2 the jurisdiction of the Architect of the Capitol; including
3 furnishings and office equipment; including not more than
4 \$5,000 for official reception and representation expenses,
5 to be expended as the Architect of the Capitol may ap-
6 prove; for purchase or exchange, maintenance, and oper-
7 ation of a passenger motor vehicle, \$90,755,000, of which
8 \$999,000 shall remain available until September 30, 2017.

9
10 CAPITOL BUILDING

10 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
11 and operation of the Capitol, \$28,591,000, of which
12 \$3,500,000 shall remain available until September 30,
13 2017.

14
15 CAPITOL GROUNDS

15 For all necessary expenses for care and improvement
16 of grounds surrounding the Capitol, the Senate and House
17 office buildings, and the Capitol Power Plant,
18 \$17,152,000, of which \$7,300,000 shall remain available
19 until September 30, 2017.

20
21 HOUSE OFFICE BUILDINGS

21 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
22 and operation of the House office buildings, \$83,964,000,
23 of which \$19,362,000 shall remain available until Sep-
24 tember 30, 2017.

1 In addition, for a payment to the House Historic
2 Buildings Revitalization Trust Fund, \$30,000,000, shall
3 remain available until expended.

4 CAPITOL POWER PLANT

5 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
6 and operation of the Capitol Power Plant; lighting, heat-
7 ing, power (including the purchase of electrical energy)
8 and water and sewer services for the Capitol, Senate and
9 House office buildings, Library of Congress buildings, and
10 the grounds about the same, Botanic Garden, Senate ga-
11 rage, and air conditioning refrigeration not supplied from
12 plants in any of such buildings; heating the Government
13 Printing Office and Washington City Post Office, and
14 heating and chilled water for air conditioning for the Su-
15 preme Court Building, the Union Station complex, the
16 Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Building and the
17 Folger Shakespeare Library, expenses for which shall be
18 advanced or reimbursed upon request of the Architect of
19 the Capitol and amounts so received shall be deposited
20 into the Treasury to the credit of this appropriation,
21 \$108,616,000, of which \$23,404,000 shall remain avail-
22 able until September 30, 2017: *Provided*, That not more
23 than \$9,400,000 of the funds credited or to be reimbursed
24 to this appropriation as herein provided shall be available
25 for obligation during fiscal year 2013.

1 LIBRARY BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

2 For all necessary expenses for the mechanical and
3 structural maintenance, care and operation of the Library
4 buildings and grounds, \$30,660,000, of which \$4,900,000
5 shall remain available until September 30, 2017.

6 CAPITOL POLICE BUILDINGS, GROUNDS, AND SECURITY

7 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
8 and operation of buildings, grounds and security enhance-
9 ments of the United States Capitol Police, wherever lo-
10 cated, the Alternate Computer Facility, and AOC security
11 operations, \$20,867,000, of which \$2,840,000 shall re-
12 main available until September 30, 2017.

13 BOTANIC GARDEN

14 For all necessary expenses for the maintenance, care
15 and operation of the Botanic Garden and the nurseries,
16 buildings, grounds, and collections; and purchase and ex-
17 change, maintenance, repair, and operation of a passenger
18 motor vehicle; all under the direction of the Joint Com-
19 mittee on the Library, \$12,000,000: *Provided*, That of the
20 amount made available under this heading, the Architect
21 of the Capitol may obligate and expend such sums as may
22 be necessary for the maintenance, care and operation of
23 the National Garden established under section 307E of
24 the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act, 1989 (2

1 U.S.C. 2146), upon vouchers approved by the Architect
2 of the Capitol or a duly authorized designee.

3 CAPITOL VISITOR CENTER

4 For all necessary expenses for the operation of the
5 Capitol Visitor Center, \$21,276,000.

6 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

7 FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR WORKERS COMPENSATION

8 PAYMENTS

9 SEC. 1301. (a) IN GENERAL.—Available balances of
10 expired Architect of the Capitol appropriations shall be
11 available to the Architect of the Capitol to make the de-
12 posit to the credit of the Employees' Compensation Fund
13 required by section 8147(b) of title 5, United States Code.

14 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with
15 respect to appropriations for fiscal year 2013 and each
16 fiscal year thereafter.

17 LIBRARY OF CONGRESS

18 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

19 For necessary expenses of the Library of Congress
20 not otherwise provided for, including development and
21 maintenance of the Library's catalogs; custody and custo-
22 dial care of the Library buildings; special clothing; clean-
23 ing, laundering and repair of uniforms; preservation of
24 motion pictures in the custody of the Library; operation
25 and maintenance of the American Folklife Center in the

1 Library; activities under the Civil Rights History Project
2 Act of 2009; preparation and distribution of catalog
3 records and other publications of the Library; hire or pur-
4 chase of one passenger motor vehicle; and expenses of the
5 Library of Congress Trust Fund Board not properly
6 chargeable to the income of any trust fund held by the
7 Board, \$422,024,000, of which not more than \$6,000,000
8 shall be derived from collections credited to this appropria-
9 tion during fiscal year 2013, and shall remain available
10 until expended, under the Act of June 28, 1902 (chapter
11 1301; 32 Stat. 480; 2 U.S.C. 150) and not more than
12 \$350,000 shall be derived from collections during fiscal
13 year 2013 and shall remain available until expended for
14 the development and maintenance of an international legal
15 information database and activities related thereto: *Pro-*
16 *vided*, That the Library of Congress may not obligate or
17 expend any funds derived from collections under the Act
18 of June 28, 1902, in excess of the amount authorized for
19 obligation or expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided*
20 *further*, That the total amount available for obligation
21 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are
22 less than \$6,350,000: *Provided further*, That of the total
23 amount appropriated, not more than \$12,000 may be ex-
24 pended, on the certification of the Librarian of Congress,
25 in connection with official representation and reception ex-

1 penses for the Overseas Field Offices: *Provided further*,
2 That of the total amount appropriated, \$7,068,000 shall
3 remain available until expended for the digital collections
4 and educational curricula program.

5 COPYRIGHT OFFICE

6 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

7 For all necessary expenses of the Copyright Office,
8 \$52,136,000, of which not more than \$28,029,000, to re-
9 main available until expended, shall be derived from collec-
10 tions credited to this appropriation during fiscal year 2013
11 under section 708(d) of title 17, United States Code: *Pro-*
12 *vided*, That the Copyright Office may not obligate or ex-
13 pend any funds derived from collections under such sec-
14 tion, in excess of the amount authorized for obligation or
15 expenditure in appropriations Acts: *Provided further*, That
16 not more than \$5,582,000 shall be derived from collections
17 during fiscal year 2013 under sections 111(d)(2),
18 119(b)(2), 803(e), 1005, and 1316 of such title: *Provided*
19 *further*, That the total amount available for obligation
20 shall be reduced by the amount by which collections are
21 less than \$33,611,000: *Provided further*, That not more
22 than \$100,000 of the amount appropriated is available for
23 the maintenance of an “International Copyright Institute”
24 in the Copyright Office of the Library of Congress for the
25 purpose of training nationals of developing countries in

1 intellectual property laws and policies: *Provided further,*
2 That not more than \$4,250 may be expended, on the cer-
3 tification of the Librarian of Congress, in connection with
4 official representation and reception expenses for activities
5 of the International Copyright Institute and for copyright
6 delegations, visitors, and seminars: *Provided further,* That
7 notwithstanding any provision of chapter 8 of title 17,
8 United States Code, any amounts made available under
9 this heading which are attributable to royalty fees and
10 payments received by the Copyright Office pursuant to
11 sections 111, 119, and chapter 10 of such title may be
12 used for the costs incurred in the administration of the
13 Copyright Royalty Judges program, with the exception of
14 the costs of salaries and benefits for the Copyright Royalty
15 Judges and staff under section 802(e).

16 CONGRESSIONAL RESEARCH SERVICE

17 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

18 For necessary expenses to carry out the provisions
19 of section 203 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of
20 1946 (2 U.S.C. 166) and to revise and extend the Anno-
21 tated Constitution of the United States of America,
22 \$107,668,000: *Provided,* That no part of such amount
23 may be used to pay any salary or expense in connection
24 with any publication, or preparation of material therefor
25 (except the Digest of Public General Bills), to be issued

1 by the Library of Congress unless such publication has
2 obtained prior approval of either the Committee on House
3 Administration of the House of Representatives or the
4 Committee on Rules and Administration of the Senate.

5 BOOKS FOR THE BLIND AND PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED
6 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

7 For salaries and expenses to carry out the Act of
8 March 3, 1931 (chapter 400; 46 Stat. 1487; 2 U.S.C.
9 135a), \$50,775,000: *Provided*, That of the total amount
10 appropriated, \$650,000 shall be available to contract to
11 provide newspapers to blind and physically handicapped
12 residents at no cost to the individual.

13 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

14 REIMBURSABLE AND REVOLVING FUND ACTIVITIES

15 SEC. 1401. (a) IN GENERAL.—For fiscal year 2013,
16 the obligational authority of the Library of Congress for
17 the activities described in subsection (b) may not exceed
18 \$178,958,000.

19 (b) ACTIVITIES.—The activities referred to in sub-
20 section (a) are reimbursable and revolving fund activities
21 that are funded from sources other than appropriations
22 to the Library in appropriations Acts for the legislative
23 branch.

1 AUTHORITY TO TRANSFER AMOUNTS BETWEEN
2 CATEGORIES OF APPROPRIATIONS

3 SEC. 1402. (a) IN GENERAL.—During fiscal year
4 2013 and any succeeding fiscal year, the Librarian of Con-
5 gress may transfer amounts appropriated for the fiscal
6 year between the categories of appropriations provided
7 under law for the Library of Congress for the fiscal year,
8 upon the approval of the Committees on Appropriations
9 of the House of Representatives and Senate.

10 (b) LIMITATION.—Not more than 10 percent of the
11 total amount of funds appropriated to the account under
12 any category of appropriations for the Library of Congress
13 for a fiscal year may be transferred from that account by
14 all transfers made under subsection (a).

15 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE
16 CONGRESSIONAL PRINTING AND BINDING
17 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

18 For authorized printing and binding for the Congress
19 and the distribution of Congressional information in any
20 format; expenses necessary for preparing the semimonthly
21 and session index to the Congressional Record, as author-
22 ized by law (section 902 of title 44, United States Code);
23 printing and binding of Government publications author-
24 ized by law to be distributed to Members of Congress; and
25 printing, binding, and distribution of Government publica-

1 tions authorized by law to be distributed without charge
2 to the recipient, \$83,632,000: *Provided*, That this appro-
3 priation shall not be available for paper copies of the per-
4 manent edition of the Congressional Record for individual
5 Representatives, Resident Commissioners or Delegates au-
6 thorized under section 906 of title 44, United States Code:
7 *Provided further*, That this appropriation shall be available
8 for the payment of obligations incurred under the appro-
9 priations for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years:
10 *Provided further*, That notwithstanding the 2-year limita-
11 tion under section 718 of title 44, United States Code,
12 none of the funds appropriated or made available under
13 this Act or any other Act for printing and binding and
14 related services provided to Congress under chapter 7 of
15 title 44, United States Code, may be expended to print
16 a document, report, or publication after the 27-month pe-
17 riod beginning on the date that such document, report,
18 or publication is authorized by Congress to be printed, un-
19 less Congress reauthorizes such printing in accordance
20 with section 718 of title 44, United States Code: *Provided*
21 *further*, That any unobligated or unexpended balances in
22 this account or accounts for similar purposes for preceding
23 fiscal years may be transferred to the Government Print-
24 ing Office revolving fund for carrying out the purposes of
25 this heading, subject to the approval of the Committees

1 on Appropriations of the House of Representatives and
2 Senate: *Provided further*, That notwithstanding sections
3 901, 902, and 906 of title 44, United States Code, this
4 appropriation may be used to prepare indexes to the Con-
5 gressional Record on only a monthly and session basis.

6 OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF DOCUMENTS

7 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

8 (INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

9 For expenses of the Office of Superintendent of Doc-
10 uments necessary to provide for the cataloging and index-
11 ing of Government publications and their distribution to
12 the public, Members of Congress, other Government agen-
13 cies, and designated depository and international exchange
14 libraries as authorized by law, \$34,728,000: *Provided*,
15 That amounts of not more than \$2,000,000 from current
16 year appropriations are authorized for producing and dis-
17 seminating Congressional serial sets and other related
18 publications for fiscal years 2011 and 2012 to depository
19 and other designated libraries: *Provided further*, That any
20 unobligated or unexpended balances in this account or ac-
21 counts for similar purposes for preceding fiscal years may
22 be transferred to the Government Printing Office revolv-
23 ing fund for carrying out the purposes of this heading,
24 subject to the approval of the Committees on Appropria-
25 tions of the House of Representatives and Senate.

1 GOVERNMENT PRINTING OFFICE REVOLVING FUND

2 For payment to the Government Printing Office Re-
3 volving Fund, \$4,236,000, to remain available until ex-
4 pended, for information technology development and facili-
5 ties repair: *Provided*, That the Government Printing Of-
6 fice is hereby authorized to make such expenditures, with-
7 in the limits of funds available and in accordance with law,
8 and to make such contracts and commitments without re-
9 gard to fiscal year limitations as provided by section 9104
10 of title 31, United States Code, as may be necessary in
11 carrying out the programs and purposes set forth in the
12 budget for the current fiscal year for the Government
13 Printing Office revolving fund: *Provided further*, That not
14 more than \$7,500 may be expended on the certification
15 of the Public Printer in connection with official represen-
16 tation and reception expenses: *Provided further*, That the
17 revolving fund shall be available for the hire or purchase
18 of not more than 12 passenger motor vehicles: *Provided*
19 *further*, That expenditures in connection with travel ex-
20 penses of the advisory councils to the Public Printer shall
21 be deemed necessary to carry out the provisions of title
22 44, United States Code: *Provided further*, That the revol-
23 ving fund shall be available for temporary or intermittent
24 services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United States
25 Code, but at rates for individuals not more than the daily

1 equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay for level V of
2 the Executive Schedule under section 5316 of such title:
3 *Provided further*, That activities financed through the re-
4 volving fund may provide information in any format: *Pro-*
5 *vided further*, That the revolving fund and the funds pro-
6 vided under the headings “Office of Superintendent of
7 Documents” and “Salaries and Expenses” may not be
8 used for contracted security services at GPO’s passport
9 facility in the District of Columbia.

10 GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY OFFICE

11 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

12 For necessary expenses of the Government Account-
13 ability Office, including not more than \$12,500 to be ex-
14 pended on the certification of the Comptroller General of
15 the United States in connection with official representa-
16 tion and reception expenses; temporary or intermittent
17 services under section 3109(b) of title 5, United States
18 Code, but at rates for individuals not more than the daily
19 equivalent of the annual rate of basic pay for level IV of
20 the Executive Schedule under section 5315 of such title;
21 hire of one passenger motor vehicle; advance payments in
22 foreign countries in accordance with section 3324 of title
23 31, United States Code; benefits comparable to those pay-
24 able under sections 901(5), (6), and (8) of the Foreign
25 Service Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C. 4081(5), (6), and (8));

1 and under regulations prescribed by the Comptroller Gen-
2 eral of the United States, rental of living quarters in for-
3 eign countries, \$519,802,000: *Provided*, That, in addition,
4 \$24,318,000 of payments received under sections 782,
5 3521, and 9105 of title 31, United States Code, shall be
6 available without fiscal year limitation: *Provided further*,
7 That this appropriation and appropriations for adminis-
8 trative expenses of any other department or agency which
9 is a member of the National Intergovernmental Audit
10 Forum or a Regional Intergovernmental Audit Forum
11 shall be available to finance an appropriate share of either
12 Forum's costs as determined by the respective Forum, in-
13 cluding necessary travel expenses of non-Federal partici-
14 pants: *Provided further*, That payments hereunder to the
15 Forum may be credited as reimbursements to any appro-
16 priation from which costs involved are initially financed.

17 ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISION

18 FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR WORKERS COMPENSATION

19 PAYMENTS

20 SEC. 1501. (a) IN GENERAL.—Available balances of
21 expired Government Accountability Office appropriations
22 shall be available to the Government Accountability Office
23 to make the deposit to the credit of the Employees' Com-
24 pensation Fund required by section 8147(b) of title 5,
25 United States Code.

1 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—This section shall apply with
2 respect to appropriations for fiscal year 2013 and each
3 fiscal year thereafter.

4 OPEN WORLD LEADERSHIP CENTER TRUST
5 FUND

6 For a payment to the Open World Leadership Center
7 Trust Fund for financing activities of the Open World
8 Leadership Center under section 313 of the Legislative
9 Branch Appropriations Act, 2001 (2 U.S.C. 1151),
10 \$1,000,000.

11 TITLE II—GENERAL PROVISIONS

12 MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF PRIVATE VEHICLES

13 SEC. 201. No part of the funds appropriated in this
14 Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private
15 vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as
16 may be provided under regulations relating to parking fa-
17 cilities for the House of Representatives issued by the
18 Committee on House Administration and for the Senate
19 issued by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

20 FISCAL YEAR LIMITATION

21 SEC. 202. No part of the funds appropriated in this
22 Act shall remain available for obligation beyond fiscal year
23 2013 unless expressly so provided in this Act.

1 RATES OF COMPENSATION AND DESIGNATION

2 SEC. 203. Whenever in this Act any office or position
3 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of
4 1929 (46 Stat. 32 et seq.) is appropriated for or the rate
5 of compensation or designation of any office or position
6 appropriated for is different from that specifically estab-
7 lished by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-
8 ignation in this Act shall be the permanent law with re-
9 spect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act
10 for the various items of official expenses of Members, offi-
11 cers, and committees of the Senate and House of Rep-
12 resentatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of
13 the House of Representatives shall be the permanent law
14 with respect thereto.

15 CONSULTING SERVICES

16 SEC. 204. The expenditure of any appropriation
17 under this Act for any consulting service through procure-
18 ment contract, under section 3109 of title 5, United States
19 Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such ex-
20 penditures are a matter of public record and available for
21 public inspection, except where otherwise provided under
22 existing law, or under existing Executive order issued
23 under existing law.

1 COSTS OF LBFMC

2 SEC. 205. Amounts available for administrative ex-
3 penses of any legislative branch entity which participates
4 in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council
5 (LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall
6 be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC
7 costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total
8 LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legisla-
9 tive branch entities (in such allocations among the entities
10 as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$2,000.

11 LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE

12 SEC. 206. The Architect of the Capitol, in consulta-
13 tion with the District of Columbia, is authorized to main-
14 tain and improve the landscape features, excluding streets,
15 in the irregular shaped grassy areas bounded by Wash-
16 ington Avenue, SW on the northeast, Second Street, SW,
17 on the west, Square 582 on the south, and the beginning
18 of the I-395 tunnel on the southeast.

19 LIMITATION ON TRANSFERS

20 SEC. 207. None of the funds made available in this
21 Act may be transferred to any department, agency, or in-
22 strumentality of the United States Government, except
23 pursuant to a transfer made by, or transfer authority pro-
24 vided in, this Act or any other appropriation Act.

1 GUIDED TOURS OF THE CAPITOL

2 SEC. 208. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b),
3 none of the funds made available to the Architect of the
4 Capitol in this Act may be used to eliminate or restrict
5 guided tours of the United States Capitol which are led
6 by employees and interns of offices of Members of Con-
7 gress and other offices of the House of Representatives
8 and Senate.

9 (b) At the direction of the Capitol Police Board, or
10 at the direction of the Architect of the Capitol with the
11 approval of the Capitol Police Board, guided tours of the
12 United States Capitol which are led by employees and in-
13 terns described in subsection (a) may be suspended tempo-
14 rarily or otherwise subject to restriction for security or re-
15 lated reasons to the same extent as guided tours of the
16 United States Capitol which are led by the Architect of
17 the Capitol.

18 DELIVERY OF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

19 SEC. 209. None of the funds made available in this
20 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of a bill, joint
21 resolution, or resolution to the office of a Member of the
22 House of Representatives (including a Delegate or Resi-
23 dent Commissioner to the Congress) unless the Member
24 requests a copy.

1 DELIVERY OF CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

2 SEC. 210. None of the funds made available by this
3 Act may be used to deliver a printed copy of any version
4 of the Congressional Record to the office of a Member of
5 the House of Representatives (including a Delegate or
6 Resident Commissioner to the Congress).

7 LIMITATION ON AMOUNT AVAILABLE TO LEASE VEHICLES

8 SEC. 211. None of the funds made available in this
9 Act may be used by the Chief Administrative Officer of
10 the House of Representatives to make any payments from
11 any Members' Representational Allowance for the leasing
12 of a vehicle, excluding mobile district offices, in an aggre-
13 gate amount that exceeds \$1,000 for the vehicle in any
14 month.

15 SPENDING REDUCTION ACCOUNT

16 SEC. 212. The amount by which the applicable alloca-
17 tion of new budget authority made by the Committee on
18 Appropriations of the House of Representatives under sec-
19 tion 302(b) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, ex-
20 cluding Senate items, exceeds the amount of proposed new
21 budget authority is \$0.

22 This Act may be cited as the "Legislative Branch Ap-
23 propriations Act, 2013".
