1902	Born on December 5 in Edgefield, S.C.
1923	Received B.S. degree from Clemson University.
1929-1933	Superintendent of Education, Edgefield County, S.C.
1930	Admitted to South Carolina Bar, after studying law under his father, Judge J. William Thurmond.
1933-1938	State senator, representing Edgefield County, S.C.
1938-1946	Circuit Judge of South Carolina (with a four-year leave of absence during World War II).
1942-1946	With First U.S. Army in World War II. Landed in Normandy on D-Day with 82nd Airborne Division. Awarded five battle stars and earned eighteen decorations, medals, and awards.
1947-1951	Governor of South Carolina.
1947	Married Jean Crouch of Elko, S.C. (deceased, 1960).
1948	Ran for President of the U.S. as States Rights Democratic candidate, carrying four states and receiving thirty-nine electoral votes.
1951-1955	Attorney-at-law, Aiken, S.C.
1954	Elected to the Senate as write-in candidate, November 2, the first person ever elected to major office in the U.S. by this method.
1956	Resigned from Senate on April 4, in order to place the office in a primary pursuant to a promise made during the 1954 campaign. Reelected to the Senate and resumed duties, November 7.

	Reelected in 1960, 1966, 1972, 1978, 1984, 1990, and 1996.
1959	Major General, U.S. Army Reserve.
1964	Switched from Democratic to Republican party on September 16.
1968	Married Nancy Moore of Aiken, S.C.
1981-1987	Chairman of Judiciary Committee; Senate President pro tempore.
1983	Appointed to President's Commission on Organized Crime on November 28.
1985	Commission on the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution.
1995	Chairman of Armed Services Committee through the 105th Congress; Senate President Pro Tempore to present.
1997	Longest-serving member in Senate history (May 25). Has endowed 52 scholarships at 45 colleges and universities. Has received countless awards, including the Presidential Medal of Freedom from President George Bush in 1992. Many facilities in South Carolina are named for him, including educational institutions, highways, a lake, and a mall.
