

Voting Participation History

These tables show the number of roll call votes in each chamber and in Congress as a whole since 1954, as well as the frequency with which lawmakers on average cast “yea” or “nay” votes. Participation in floor votes has ranged around 95 percent over the past two decades.

Perfect Records Of Attendance

As is typical in an election year, voting participation dropped in both chambers. Despite this, the count of those with perfect attendance on roll call votes increased: Fifteen House members and 13 senators cast a “yea” or a “nay” on every recorded vote.
