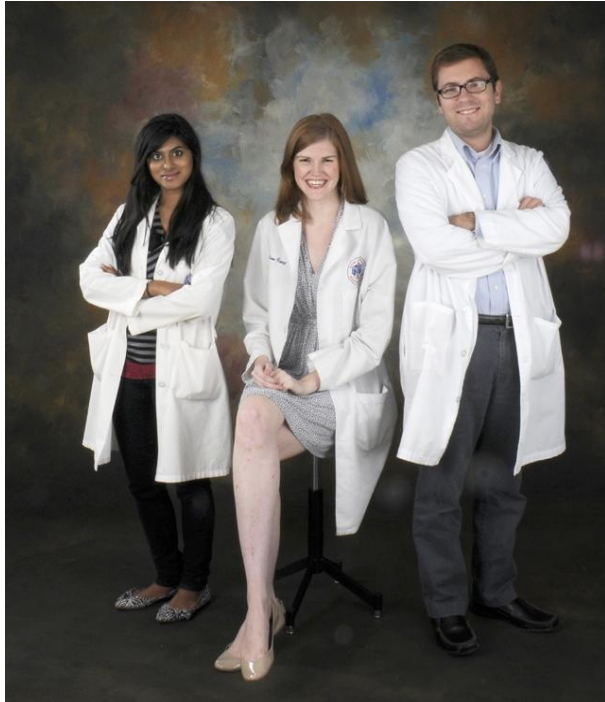
Applicant Requirements:

- U.S. Citizenship. Naturalized citizens must provide proof of naturalization.
- Doctor of Pharmacy degree from an accredited School of Pharmacy
- Completed the pharmacy board exam prior to starting (though may be awaiting results)

Application Process:

- Complete application packet and submit via Pharmacy Online Residency Centralized Application Service (PhORCAS) by **December 31, 2012**. (Recommend requesting transcripts sooner.)
 - o Letter of Intent
 - o Letters of Recommendation from 3 Clinical Preceptors or Employers
 - o Curriculum Vitae
 - o Transcripts from all schools of pharmacy attended
 - o Application for Associated Health Occupations (VA form 10-2850C)
 - o Application for Health Professions Trainees (Form 10-2850D)
- An onsite interview with a 10-15 minute presentation will be required. The Residency Director will contact selected candidates in January to schedule interviews. Once all interviews are completed, we will submit our rank order list of candidates to the National Matching Service.

Clinical Pharmacy Supervisors

Sumita Biswas received a B.S. in Biology from Emory University in 1993 and went on to receive her Pharm.D. from Mercer University Southern School of Pharmacy in 1997. After graduation, she completed two ASHP-accredited residencies from Grady Health System in Atlanta- Pharmacy Practice ('97-'98) and Primary Care ('98-'99). Upon completion of the residencies, Dr. Biswas joined the Atlanta VAMC as a Clinical Pharmacy Specialist in Primary Care. She serves as a preceptor to the Primary Care residents in addition to Mercer and UGA pharmacy students. She has given many presentations and in-services in topics related to primary care. Her areas of interest include diabetes, cardiovascular diseases, hyperlipidemia, and asthma. Dr. Biswas worked as a Clinical Pharmacy Specialist with the Red Team for approximately 2 years and transferred to Purple Team in 2001 until February 2007. Currently she is the Clinical Pharmacy Supervisor. Dr. Biswas helps coordinate the journal club schedule for the pharmacy residents. She currently works one day a week at the Decatur Clinic following primary care patients. For disease state management. She has served as President of the Atlanta Academy of Institutional Pharmacists and Chairman of the Board She regularly attends AAIP and GSHP meetings.

Kathy Davari received her Pharm.D. degree from Mercer University in 1996. Dr. Davari completed a primary care pharmacy residency at the Atlanta VAMC in 1999. Upon completion of the residency, she joined the Atlanta VAMC as a primary care clinical pharmacist specialist. She established clinical pharmacy services for Platinum clinic (primary care clinic for mental health patients) and continues to work with Platinum primary care team. She is also involved in assigning and working up plans for pharmacy cost saving measures. In March 2012 she accepted a position as the clinical supervisor for specialty and inpatient clinical pharmacists. She serves as a preceptor to primary care pharmacy residents and fourth year pharmacy students. Her areas of interest are cardiovascular diseases, diabetes, hyperlipidemia, CHF, psychiatric disorders, and pharmacoconomics.

Pharmacy Residency Director

Demetria C. Gaines received a B.S. in Chemistry (2000) and Pharm.D. (2004) from Auburn University. After graduation, she completed an ASHP-accredited primary care pharmacy practice residency at the Atlanta VA Medical Center (2005). Following the completion of her residency, Dr. Gaines worked at Grady Health System in primary care and also gained additional experience at Omnicare and Southern Regional Health System as an agency staff pharmacist. Dr. Gaines later returned to the Atlanta VA Medical Center as a Clinical Pharmacy Specialist in the Anticoagulation Clinic where she practiced for over a year prior to transferring to her current position as primary care clinical pharmacy specialist at Lawrenceville Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC). In addition to establishing pharmacotherapy services and managing an anticoagulation clinic at the Lawrenceville CBOC, Dr. Gaines is also involved in the education of veterans through the Diabetes Resource Program and the MOVE program for Weight Loss Management. Additionally, she received BCPS certification in 2008 and is a member of ASHP. Dr. Gaines became the Residency Program Director since December 2010.

Clinical Pharmacy Preceptors

Jacinda Byrd-Smith received her Pharm.D. from Xavier University of Louisiana in 1997. After graduation, she worked at CVS pharmacy for 3 years (1997-2000). She then went on to work at Kaiser Permanente where she worked in their clinical department. As a clinical pharmacist, she assisted new members as they transitioned into Kaiser Permanente and reviewed physician requests for non-formulary and Criteria Restricted Medications for prescription drug benefit coverage. She has also served as an adjunct professor at Georgia Perimeter College lecturing on various topics in the Pharmacy Technician Certification program from 2004-2005. Dr. Byrd-Smith has completed certificate programs in dyslipidemia, asthma and anticoagulation. She then went on to join the Atlanta VA Medical Center in 2006 as a clinical pharmacist. Her current area of practice is the management of anticoagulation therapy.

Sybelle Blakey Scott received a BS in Zoology (1991) and a PharmD (1995) from the University of Florida. She completed an ASHP-accredited pharmacy practice residency at Mercer University/Piedmont Hospital and became a

Board Certified Pharmacotherapy Specialist in 1997. From 1996 – 1997 she served as a Patient Care Pharmacist and Critical Care Pharmacist at Southern Regional Health System where she established clinical pharmacy services in the medical intensive care unit. Dr. Blakey served as a Clinical Assistant Professor specializing in adult internal medicine at Mercer University and the VA Medical Center Atlanta from 1996–2000. She joined the VA Medical Center Atlanta full-time in 2000 where she serves as a Clinical Pharmacy Specialist in the Hem/Onc and GI clinics. Dr. Blakey is involved in teaching Emory University medical residents and Hem/Onc fellows as well as pharmacy residents and nursing staff. She is also involved with research in the Hem/Onc department.

Heidi Cantrell received a BS in Biology from North Georgia College in 1996 and a Pharm.D. from Mercer University Southern School of Pharmacy in 2002. She completed an ASHP-accredited primary care pharmacy practice residency at the Atlanta VAMC (2003). After completion of her residency, Dr. Cantrell joined the Atlanta VAMC as a clinical pharmacy specialist. Her current areas of practice include pulmonary medicine, rheumatology, and physical medicine and rehabilitation (PM&R). She completed BCPS certification in 2004.

Alyse Chandler received a B.S. in Biology from East Tennessee State University in 2005 and then completed her Pharm.D. from the University of Tennessee Health Science Center in 2010. Upon completing a primary care specialty residency from Holston Medical Group (affiliated with the University of Tennessee), she joined the Atlanta VA Medical Center as the clinical pharmacist in primary care at the Blairsville Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC). Her primary areas of disease management include diabetes, hypertension, hyperlipidemia, and anticoagulation. She became a Board Certified Pharmacotherapy Specialist (BCPS) in 2011.

Gara Coffey received her Pharm.D. from the University of Kentucky in 2001. She completed an ASHP-accredited pharmacy practice residency at Emory University Hospital in 2002. She then went on to complete a psychiatric pharmacy residency at the University of Kentucky in 2003. Upon completion of this, she worked at Grady Health System in Atlanta, GA as a Clinical Pharmacy Specialist in Psychiatry. She joined the VA medical center in 2004. She has held previous appointments with inpatient pharmacy and Anticoagulation Clinic. She became a Certified Geriatric Pharmacist (CGP) in 2010. She currently practices as Eagle's Nest CLC Clinical Pharmacist.

Kimberly B. Crowson received her Pharm. D. from the University of Florida in 2008. She remained in Florida and completed an ASHP-accredited PGY1 Primary Care pharmacy residency at the Fort Myers VA Outpatient Clinic (2009). Upon completing her residency, Dr. Piro continued to work with the VA in Fort Myers in the areas of diabetes, lipids, hypertension, weight management, and hepatitis C. Dr. Piro joined the Atlanta VAMC team in October 2009 as a clinical pharmacy specialist and practices in the area of anticoagulation management. She received her board certification as a certified anticoagulation care provider (CACP) in March of 2011. She teaches the pharmacy component of the MOVE program, precepts 4th year pharmacy students, and acts as one of the pharmacy department's Student APPE Coordinators working closely with Mercer University. Dr. Piro is planning on sitting for the Board Certified Ambulatory Care Specialist Exam in the near future.

Kathryn DeSilva received her Pharm.D. from the University of Michigan in 1987. Upon completion of an ASHP-accredited clinical pharmacy residency from the Memphis VAMC in 1988, she became a clinical pharmacy specialist in infectious diseases at the James A. Haley Veterans Hospital in Tampa. Since 1993 she has been the clinical pharmacy specialist in infectious diseases at the Atlanta VAMC. She has published papers and has given numerous presentations, lectures, and in-services on various topics in the treatment of infectious diseases. Dr. DeSilva currently practices primarily in the HIV Clinic. Research opportunities exist in the clinical management of this patient population.

Allison Fox received a B.S. in Pharmacy (1995) and Pharm.D. (summa cum laude, 1997) from Auburn University. She completed an ASHP-accredited primary care pharmacy specialty residency at the William S. Middleton Veterans Hospital in Madison, Wisconsin, during which time she was also a clinical instructor for the University of Wisconsin School of Pharmacy. From 1998-1999, she served as an assistant professor of pharmacy practice at the St. Louis College of Pharmacy with a practice site in the adult medicine clinics of the St. Louis County Department of Health.

In 1999, she joined Midwestern University Chicago College of Pharmacy as an assistant professor of pharmacy and practiced in the Cardiovascular Risk Reduction Center at Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge, IL. Dr. Fox came to the Atlanta VAMC in 2001 and served as a primary care clinical pharmacy specialist on the Red Team for 5 years and at the East Point CBOC for 3 years. She has been a primary care clinical pharmacy specialist at the Newnan CBOC since December 2009. She served as Primary Care Pharmacy Residency Director at the Atlanta VA from 2002-2007. She became a Certified Diabetes Educator (CDE) in 2005 and recertified in 2010. Dr. Fox's teaching background includes lecturing experience in cardiovascular disorders, diabetic complications, and physical assessment, workshop facilitation, and precepting experience of both pharmacy students and residents.

Cathy Gable received a B.B.A in International Business (1994) and a Pharm.D. (2000) from the University of Georgia. She completed an ASHP-accredited primary care pharmacy practice residency at the Atlanta VAMC (2001). Upon completion of her residency, Dr. Gable joined the Atlanta VAMC to establish an adult internal medicine clinical service and ultimately a critical care clinical pharmacy service. Her current areas of practice include the MICU, CCU and SICU with a MICU emphasis. She assists in training Emory ICU residents and fellows along with pharmacy residents and students. Through her involvement with the Emory program, she has developed multiple ICU protocols and order sets used at the VA. Her areas of interest include critical care, infectious disease, cardiology, diabetes, hyperlipidemia and hypertension.

Clifford (Alman) Garrett received a BS degree in biology and chemistry from Berry College in 1976 and an MBA from Berry College in 1981. After spending 10 years in the chemical manufacturing industry he received a Pharm.D. degree from Mercer University. Dr. Garrett began his career at Redmond Regional Medical Center where he established internal medicine, critical care, and nutritional support clinical pharmacy services. At Redmond he was clinical coordinator and associate director for clinical services. Dr. Garrett also served as clinical consultant for Harbin Clinic's Ambulatory/Home Infusion service. While at RRM, Dr. Garrett was adjunct professor of Pharmacy Practice for University of Georgia and Mercer University and precepted students for both schools. Dr. Garrett retired from RRM in 2007 and returned to the work force when the VA opened the CBOC in Rome, Ga. His interests include internal medicine, anticoagulation, and cardiology.

Rosalind McBeth Glover received her Pharm.D. from Florida A&M University in 2005. After graduation, she completed an ASHP-accredited Primary Care Pharmacy Practice residency at the James A Haley VA Hospital in Tampa, FL and continued their post-residency as a primary care clinical pharmacist. During this time, she also served as an adjunct/associate professor for Florida A&M University. She joined the Atlanta VAMC as a clinical pharmacy specialist with the Anticoagulation Clinic in 2008, then moved back to primary care the following year at the East Point CBOC. Since joining the East Point team, Dr. Glover has been an active participant in the institution of PACT and serves on the VISN 7 SMA Planning Committee. She also established both point-of-care and Telecare anticoagulation services for the clinic. Currently Dr. Glover provides patient education and medication therapy management in the areas of hypertension, hyperlipidemia, diabetes, and anticoagulation. She also serves a preceptor for Mercer students and is a member of the AVAMC residency advisory board for 2012-2013.

Benjamin D. Goodrich received a B.S. in Health Sciences (2009) and Pharm.D. (2009) from Creighton University. After graduation, he completed an ASHP-accredited primary care pharmacy practice residency at the Atlanta VA Medical Center (2010). Following the completion of his residency, Dr. Goodrich joined the Atlanta VA Medical Center Stockbridge Community Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) as a clinical pharmacist managing veterans in the areas of anticoagulation, diabetes, hyperlipidemia, and hypertension. Dr. Goodrich is also actively involved in education programs for veterans through the Diabetes Education and MOVE program classes. He also serves as a preceptor for 4th year Pharm.D. candidates from Mercer University.

Deshondra Clark Green received her PharmD from Florida A&M University in 2003. After graduation, Dr. Green completed an ASHP-accredited pharmacy practice residency at Howard University Hospital in Washington, DC(2004). Upon completion of her residency, Dr. Green accepted a position as an internal medicine clinical pharmacist at Howard University Hospital from 2004-2007. During her tenure, Dr. Green served as an internal

medicine preceptor for both students and residents, gave lectures to pharmacy students at Howard University as well as served on several committees. In 2007, Dr. Green joined the VA system as a Primary Care Clinical Pharmacy Specialist at the Washington DC VA Medical Center where she worked with the Orange and Yellow Team as well as the HIV Clinic. She then transferred to the Atlanta VA Medical Center in 2008 as an Internal Medicine Clinical Pharmacy Specialist.

Auna Harsini received her Pharm.D. (1995) from Mercer University Southern School of Pharmacy and completed a primary care pharmacy practice residency at VAMC-Atlanta in 1996. After completion of her residency, Dr. Harsini joined the VAMC-Atlanta as a Clinical Pharmacy Specialist in Primary Care working with the Purple Team for 8 years. Dr. Harsini established clinical pharmacy services for the Smyrna CBOC and worked with that team for about 2.5 years. Her special interests include diabetes, lipid, hypertension, and CHF management. She became a Certified Diabetes Educator (CDE) in 1999. She precepts 4th year pharmacy students as an adjunct faculty member for Mercer University. She served as the Residency Program Director at Atlanta-VAMC from 2007-2010.

David Hankin received B.A. in chemistry and theater (1998) from Wabash College and a Pharm.D. (2002) from Mercer University Southern School of Pharmacy. He completed an ASHP-accredited psychiatric pharmacy practice residency at the Louis Stokes Cleveland VA Medical Center. Dr. Hankin joined the Atlanta VAMC in July 2003, where he practices as a psychiatric clinical pharmacy specialist and precept future residents on mental health rotations.

Andrea Jackson received a B.S. in Biology from Georgia Southern University in 1993 and a B.S. in Pharmacy from Medical University of South Carolina in 1996. After graduation she worked at Hilton Head Medical Center and Clinics as a Staff Pharmacist(1996-1998). In 1998, she joined Ralph H. Johnson Veterans Medical Center as inpatient/outpatient pharmacist. Later in September 1998, she transferred to the Savannah Primary Care Clinic which is an outpatient veteran affairs clinic associated with Charleston VAMC. In Savannah she was an outpatient pharmacist and in 2000 she transitioned into a primary care clinical pharmacist position. She joined the Atlanta VAMC in 2004 as clinical pharmacy specialist in Anticoagulation Clinic.

Becky Johnson received her Pharm.D. (1996) from Mercer University and completed a pharmacy practice residency (1997) at Duke University Medical Center in Durham, NC. She has been a clinical pharmacy specialist at the Atlanta VAMC since 1997, maintaining an active practice in the subspecialty outpatient clinics (cardiology, diabetes, hyperlipidemia, and hypertension).
