PROJECTS

The resident will be expected to complete at least one significant project within the residency year. Projects may include clinical research, outcomes projects, pharmacoeconomic evaluations, etc. Guidance from the program director and/or designated preceptor is provided throughout the process.

TEACHING OPPORTUNITIES

In-services, staff development, patient class presentations, grand rounds, and potential for precepting students on clinical rotations provide a broad scope of teaching opportunities.

STIPEND/BENEFITS

The annual stipend as of July 2010 was \$41,000 (plus staffing pay salary). Ten working days of vacation will be allowed each year, with additional time during federal holidays.
