





- 2. Training is ongoing/institutionalized
- 3. Long-term initiatives for youth
- 4. Strategic planning
- 5. Management effectiveness, particularly in the face of climate change impacts

PIMPAC will NOT develop natural resource goals as it focuses on capacity building.

Lessons Learned

Keys to Success

- Coordination is key!
- Long-term/ on-going/ immediate assistance in necessary to create institutional change
- Collaboration by major resource agencies/ organizations/ networks
- Fill a niche/ gap
- Peer to peer learning is key
- Relationships!
- On-going funding support thus far

Challenges

- Geographic scope political rather than eco-regional
- Remote locations, challenge with communications
- Internal politics no jurisdiction in islands
- Lack of incorporation of terrestrial component
- Limited / time-bound sources of funding
- Things take time!
- Partnering with academic institutions

Moving Forward

- Incorporating <u>more</u> Land Based Managers into PIMPAC
- Two new topic training areas
- Improve academic institution networking
- Broadening geographic scope in South Pacific
