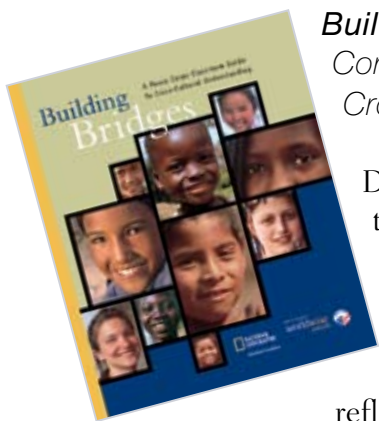
Speakers Match

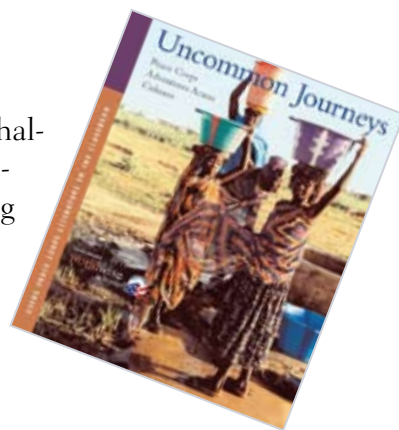

Essays by Peace Corps Volunteers are accompanied by standards-based lesson plans that enhance students' understanding of other cultures. (6–12)

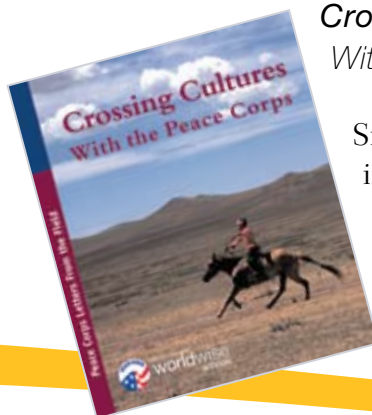
Uncommon Journeys: Peace Corps Adventures Across Cultures
