The Problem Statement

Overview

In BCL, a Problem Statement is the output of analysis conducted after a perceived business problem, capability gap, and / or opportunity (hereafter referred as a "business need") is identified. A "business need" can be identified by anyone in an organization, and may in fact be cross-organizational or even enterprise-wide. The Problem Statement, and the analysis supporting it, is perhaps the single most important informational product developed during BCL off of which all future analyses are based. The fundamental decision is whether the Department should take further action to solve the problem. A Problem Statement culminates from analysis and must include:

Key Points

- Occurs during the Business Capability Definition (BCD) Phase of BCL
- Led by a Functional Sponsor, who will represent the end-user's needs throughout BCL and has the authority to advocate for and seek funding for a solution
- Is not time constrained (whereas other BCL phases or processes are)
- Must be reviewed by an Investment Review Board (IRB) and approved by an IRB Chair
