 - Training sites in 2 host nations





Increasing Women in the ANSF

- Total Positions Police: 136,440; Army/Air Force: 169,076
- Female Positions Police: 2783 (from 867); Army/Air Force: 16 (from 0)*
- Females Assigned Police: 1204; Army/Air Force: 320
 - *Command Plan Review in progress to identify additional Tashkil positions.


Way Ahead
