Arrival of Ambassador Janice L. Jacobs

Ambassador Janice L. Jacobs, the new United States Ambassador to Senegal and Guinea-Bissau, arrived in Dakar on April 6, 2006. Ambassador Jacobs presented her credentials to His Excellency President Abdoulaye Wade in Dakar on April 14, 2006.

Ambassador Jacobs, who was confirmed by the U.S. Senate on February 16, 2006, is a Senior Foreign Service Officer with 26 years of experience in Africa, Latin America and Europe. Prior to her current appointment, she served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Visa Services. From 2000-2002, she served as Deputy Chief of Mission at the U.S. Embassy in Santo Domingo. Her career also includes assignments to Mexico, France, Ethiopia, and Nigeria as well as Washington, D.C., in the State Department's Visa Office, Operations Center, and Office of Cuban Affairs.

A native of Virginia, Ambassador Jacobs received a B.A. in French and Education from Southern Illinois University in 1968 and a Master's in National Security Strategy from the National War College in 1995.

We plan to have an American Town Hall meeting in June so American citizens can meet the new Ambassador. Stay tuned for details.

Q. Can my fiancé get married in the U.S. on a tourist visa?

A. Yes. If you and your future spouse plan to return to Senegal after your wedding, your spouse should apply for a tourist visa (B1/B2). If your spouse is eligible for a B1/B2 visa, s/he could then use that visa to apply for entry to the U.S. for the purpose of getting married. Voting Update

We are heading into the primary season of this election year. The 2006 elections officially began with the primaries in Texas on March 7 and in Illinois on March 21. Primary elections play an important role in the electoral process because the names that appear on the general election ballot on November 7th are the candidates that were chosen during the primary election process. Voters in state primaries select their party's candidates for state and federal offices such as Governor, U.S. Senator, and member of the U.S. House of Representatives. Voter participation is crucial in any election and primaries are no different. Because dates for state primaries are spread throughout the year, be sure to consult the 2006 Election Calendar for election dates in your state.
