End of an era MC-130W program ceremony to celebrate success, completion

Robins will celebrate the completion of the final MC-130W Combat Spear in a ceremony Tuesday.

The aircraft is one of 12 C-130H2s modified to perform missions such as battlefield support, resupply of special operations forces and helicopter air refueling.

The \$380 million program involved the 572nd Aircraft Sustainment Squadron program office, the 402nd Maintenance Wing and L3-TCS, a contractor. The 402nd performed the modifications while

L3-TCS did the engineering.

The MC-130W program was the first public-private partnership integrated by the program office and earned the Warner Robins Air Logistics Center Acquisition Excellence Award.

The modifications included the addition of an in-flight refueling receptacle and strengthening of the tail to allow the aircraft to make high speed/low-signature airdrops. Work on the first aircraft began in 2004.

The aircraft are used by Air Force Special Operations Command. The final aircraft is going to a unit at Cannon Air Force Base, N.M.

New 402nd facility to officially open

A ribbon-cutting ceremony Thursday will celebrate the opening of the new Aircraft Component Repair Facility in Bldg. 189.

The 61,000-square foot building cost nearly \$15 million and is already in use. It consolidates work which was done in Bldgs. 146, 603 and 605 by the 402nd Commodities Maintenance Group.

The project is part of an ongoing \$150 million construction plan at Robins to replace aging and outdated buildings. The new building allows the demolition of Bldgs. 603 and 605, which were each over 50 years old, energy inefficient and in need of con-

tinuous repairs.

Kevin Shanahan, lead engineer for facilities in the 402nd Maintenance Support Group, said the new building is designed specifically for the work being done there.

Service station closure

The gas pumps at the base service station will be closed April 5-20 as work continues on upgrades to the facility, including the installation of three new underground tanks.

The station will be shut down those dates for changeover to the tanks and other new equipment, said Becky McCoy, 778th Civil Engineer Squadron director.

The entire project is expected to be finished by mid-July.

Drivers needing gas when the base service station is closed can find a number of commercial stations to the north and south of Robins on Ga. Hwy. 247, and west on Russell Parkway, Martin Luther King Jr. Drive, Watson Boulevard and Green Street.



FATIGUE TEST

An F-15C left Robins March 15 on the back of a flatbed truck headed for a Boeing facility in St. Louis, Mo.

It will never fly again, but it has an important mission to fill.

The aircraft will be used in a fatigue test aimed at determining the maintenance activities required to achieve the F-15C fleet's projected service date of 2025.

Randy Jansen, the F-15 chief engineer at Robins, called the test "a massive undertaking" and said it is expected to take five years. Boeing is still designing some of the elements of the assessment, he said.

The aircraft underwent partial programmed depot maintenance at Robins so it would structurally be the

same as any F-15C which is still flying. The PDM elements left out were those not related to the structure, such as avionics, said Jansen.

The last F-15C fatigue test in 1991 validated the plane for 9,000 hours of flight, and that data is currently being used to determine when certain parts must be inspected or serviced. Now that some F-15Cs are approaching those hours, the new test will determine future maintenance needs.

The test will apply the same stress on the structure in a couple of years it would ordinarily experience in many years of flying.

The F-15E, which has a projected service date of 2035, will also require a fatigue test, said Jansen. The plan is to begin testing the F-15E immediately following completion of the F-15C test, he said.

Plans and Programs Directorate first staff agency to earn VPP gold

The office which evaluates Warner Robins Air Logistics Center units for the Commander's Safe Site Challenge has now been evaluated itself and struck gold.

The Plans and Programs Directorate, also known as XP, is made up of 75 people who have a variety of tasks, including management of the Voluntary Protection Program and the Commander's Safe Site

Challenge.

On March 1 the directorate became the first Center staff agency to win gold in the Safe Site Challenge. The evaluation was done by a team of people from outside the directorate.

Winning gold means the unit meets the criteria to be named a Star Site in the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's VPP program. Star Site is OSHA's highest level of safety recognition.

A total of 60 units on

base have earned gold.

"I am very proud of my folks," said Kim Lynn, XP director. "We thought it was especially important for us to do this since VPP does reside in XP."

Lynn said a number of safety improvements have come about as a result of the office's move to earn gold. These include an ergonomic assessment of all work areas, a safety check on power cords to make sure there are no "daisy chains" and monthly safety updates.

Infrastructure initiative grows beyond decreasing energy costs

The Warner Robins Air Logistics Center initiative of improving infrastructure to help it deliver airpower is starting to gain serious momentum throughout the base.

Initially, the initiative focused solely on decreasing energy consumption. The installation put up electric meters to allow facility managers and unit leaders to track their organizations' energy consumption on a real-time basis. But, base personnel are now vigilantly looking for other projects to make better use of resources.

The Air Force's Advanced Power Technology Office recently installed a solar panel behind Bldg. 359 which produces up to 25 kilowatts of electricity.

The power it generates goes directly to the base power grid and offsets power used by a newly installed hydrogen fuel production/refueling station.

The 78th Civil Engineer Group is also busy developing a number of other environmentally sound projects aimed at protecting both existing and future infrastructure, like Low Impact Development, or LID.

As parking lots, buildings and homes are constructed on the base, green spaces are slowly disappearing on Robins.

The aim of LID projects is to reduce the impact this causes by decreasing the volume of stormwater runoff. LID projects also improve water quality.

"With the increase in

impervious surfaces comes an increase in runoff generated from rainfall, as open green spaces are not available to absorb the runoff," said Russell Adams, water quality program manager at Robins. "If the quantity of runoff exceeds the capacity of the available stormwater infrastructure, roads, parking lots, and potentially buildings and homes may be flooded."

One of the first and most visible LID projects is a new 22-vehicle parking lot at Bldg. 359 which is all grass, with a stone and gravel drainage system constructed underneath to ensure cars can park there in rainy weather without getting stuck, or even muddy.

The infrastructure initiative is part of P3I, which has four focus areas – People, Process, Performance and Infrastructure.

Drug Abuse: 'Not as simple as you think'

If you're like many people, the term "drug abuser" conjures up thoughts of needles, disheveled individuals, and reruns of the popular TV show "Intervention." However, in the military, a drug abuser is defined much differently.

Many Airmen aren't aware that by giving even one pill to a fellow Airman, or anyone else, they could potentially be discharged from the military for being a drug abuser or worse, court-martialed.

AFI 36-3208, *Administrative Separation of Airmen* defines "drug abuse" as the illegal, wrongful, or improper use, possession, sale, transfer or introduction onto a military installation of any drug. This includes the improper use of prescription medications. The AFI governs even the trading of something as simple as the prescription drug Claritin.

The AFI states drug abuse is incompatible with military serv-

ice, and Airmen who abuse drugs one or more times are subject to discharge for misconduct.

Improper use of prescription medications includes not only abusing a drug by taking it for an improper purpose, but also distributing a drug to anyone who was not lawfully prescribed the medication.

Furthermore, the AFI states a member found to have abused drugs will be discharged unless the member meets all seven retention criteria.

One of the retention criteria the member must satisfy is the drug abuse did not involve distribution.

"Drug distribution" is defined as the delivery to the possession of another. Most people probably think of someone distributing drugs as a drug dealer selling drugs for money. Air Force policy, as well as the UCMJ, defines distribution much broader than this limited interpretation.

Finally, drug abusers are not



eligible for probation and rehabilitation according to the AFI, therefore, must be discharged from the Air Force – typically with a General Service characterization.

Bottom Line: Don't take someone else's medications and don't give anyone else your medications. If you have lawful prescriptions, take your medications in the manner and for the purpose

your doctor prescribed. Properly dispose of unused medications so there is less opportunity for something to happen which can end your career.

If you need information concerning your prescription medications, speak with your doctor or pharmacist.

Don't let good friends override good judgment

Spring is rapidly approaching and is a time when many will roll out two-wheeled freedom machines and experience the thrill of the open road without a cage of steel, glass and plastic. It is also a time when many will crash and burn these two-wheeled freedom machines and produce what we refer to as the 'Spring Spike' – a significant uptick in the number of motorcycle mishaps.

Contemplating the potential mishaps for the upcoming Spring Spike and the role each of us plays as Wingmen brings to mind a loss Air Force Materiel Command experienced at the close of last summer - a needless fatality which could have been prevented had there been adherence to published directives, compliance with policy, a modicum of risk management, and a better approach to the Wingman concept.

The directives are pretty clear – military members are not to ride without documented training.

Risk management and being a good Wingman come into play when a good friend suggests something like "Hey, let me

check out your really awesome ride!" Risk management principles should dictate asking the question "What's the worst that could happen?" followed by "What do I need to put into play to ensure it does not happen?"

The Wingman concept carries

that further by asking the more difficult questions such as "I haven't seen you at any of the riding/mentorship club meetings?" "I didn't know you ride – what training and experience have you had?" and "May I see your MSF (Motorcycle Safety Foundation) card?"

We continually see mishaps where there were opportunities for Wingmen to step in and interject a pause, a question, or a bit of advice and possibly prevent them from happening.

Don't allow a mishap to occur because you didn't want to say "No," "Stop," "Pull over," "Slow down," "Buckle up," "Put your helmet on," "Give me your keys," "Are you trained to do that?" or "That's not in the T.O." to your wingman, your friend, your co-worker, or your supervisor.

Groundwater facility named Plant of Year

The Robins Groundwater Treatment Plant has been named 2009 Plant of the Year by the Georgia Association of Water Professionals. This is the seventh time in 11 years the plant has received the honor.

The facility, which opened in 1997, received a perfect score from GAWP representatives who spent six hours inspecting its grounds, operating systems, records, manuals and safety equipment.

The high-tech plant employs a system which uses ultraviolet lights, chemical feed pumps and granular-activated carbon filters. It operates around the clock, processing 650 gallons of water per minute.

The award was officially presented during a luncheon March 17 at the 2010 GAWP Industrial Conference and Expo at Callaway Gardens.

points are accumulated, a six-month suspension of on-base driving privileges occurs.

Following are a few common violations and their points:

►10 mph over but not more than 15 mph above the posted speed limit: 4.

►Failure to stop for a school bus or school crossing signals: 4.

►Failure to obey traffic signal/traffic instructions of an enforcement officer: 4.

►Failure to wear approved helmet/eyewear while on a motorcycle: 3.

►Talking on a cell phone without a hands-free device: 2.

Parking violations can also result in the suspension of on-base driving

privileges.

While no points are assessed for parking citations, if three parking citations are received in a 12-month period, a 30-day suspension of on-base driving privileges occurs. If four parking citations are received in a 12-month period, a 60-day suspension occurs.

Additionally, unauthorized parking in a handi-

capped spot carries a stiff penalty.

First-time handicap parking offenses result in an immediate one-year suspension of on-base driving privileges.

“There is not a male on this base who doesn’t have a female important to him,” she said.

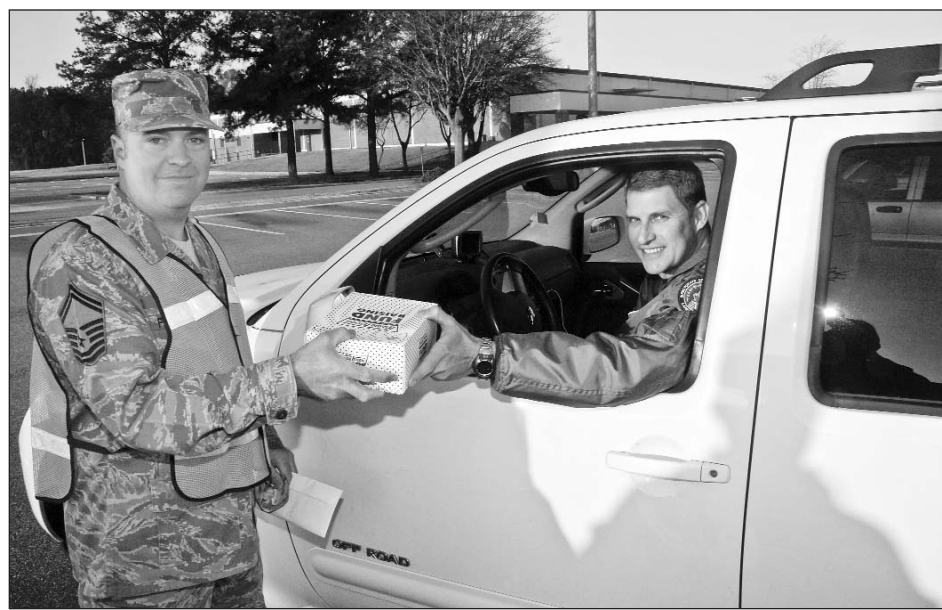
