A staff office of the Office of the Air Force Historian, the Air Force History Office-Anacostia conducts research and writing to preserve the history of the United States Air Force. It provides historical information, analysis, and perspective to key leaders and their staffs throughout the Air Force and especially at Headquarters United States Air Force (USAF) in support of planning, policy development, decision making, and professional military education. The publications program supports this mission. Air Force history books, monographs, and special studies are disseminated throughout the Air Force and other government agencies and are available to the general public through the Government Printing Office. Also, many products are distributed to veterans and the public via a proactive outreach program.

For those who are researching an historical USAF issue as well as those who merely seek professional reading sources, the first question is usually "Where do I start?" This pamphlet is the answer. Start here. The works listed and briefly described represent decades of meticulous research and thorough analysis by many of the Air Force's premier historians. Other titles, such as *The Command of the Air*, by Giulio Douhet, are classics republished by the Air Force History Program to make them available to airmen everywhere. Interspersed as well throughout this pamphlet are memoirs and transcripts of interviews conducted with a wide variety of Air Force leaders, such as LeMay, Tunner, Kenney, Stratemeyer, Doolittle, and Schriever.

Although many of the works are out of print, most military base libraries received and shelved them during the initial distribution. Note also that the vast majority are also available online in PDF format.

So whether you seek a "good read" or information on how the Air Force became an independent service, this is a good starting point. Good hunting!


Aerial Interdiction:

Eduard Mark. 1994

Aerial interdiction—the concept of attacking the unengaged potential of enemy armies—is examined in eleven representative case studies, with descriptions of how interdiction was used in World War II, the Korean conflict, and the war in Southeast Asia to save lives and shorten hostilities by bombing enemy rail lines, bridges, and road networks.




Over the Hump

Lieutenant General William H. Tunner, USAF. 1964 (Duell, Sloan, & Pearce), 1985, 1998

The memoirs of General Tunner, a key leader in the development of military airlift from World War II through 1960. The author recounts major challenges of his career: organizing the aircraft ferrying effort of World War II, flying the "Hump" route of supply from India to China, managing the Berlin Airlift in 1948 and 1949, and commanding the Combat Cargo Command of Far East Air Forces in the crucial early months of the Korean War.

The two documents included are products of the historical program of the American Expeditionary Forces, under the leadership of Assistant Chief of Staff Col. Edward S. Gorrell. The "Final Report" describes the progress and achievements of the Air Service, supplemented by a collection of statistics, data, and charts. The "Tactical History" summarizes observation, pursuit, aviation, day bombardment, and balloon operations on the various fronts.

The squadron produced two of the finest air warriors of the era, Raoul Lufbery and Edward V. "Eddie" Rickenbacker, the eventual American ace-of-aces.
