Adopt-a-School program pairs Soldiers, students

entoring makes a difference, a difference that for a child in school can boost grades, improve discipline and enable the ability to interact socially.

Twenty soldiers from the Special Troops Battalion, V Corps, have chosen to join the mentoring program for Patrick Henry Elementary School students called Adopt-a-School. Many of the Soldiers, like Maj. Demetrius Green, mentor more than one student so that a total of 50 students meet with STB Soldiers either in the classroom or on the playground.

"A teacher made a difference in how I turned out," said Maj. Demetrius Green, a combat engineer currently assigned as the STB operations officer. "I know how important it is." He said he knows the teachers can use the help.

Patrick Henry Elementary School Principal Allison Peltz knew the program was needed when she met a student who was upset because he'd just learned his father wouldn't be home for Christmas.

"His deployment had been extended," Peltz said. "I have parents who are deployed and who have deployed multiple times. These are the things that impact our children day to day."

U.S. Army Garrison Baden-Wüttemberg Commander Col. Bill Butcher met with Peltz and others and discussed Adopt-a-School. The once-active program had been dormant in the community for five years. Now, all three Heidelberg schools have been adopted by USAG BW units.

"We looked at the needs of the individual child and the teachers identified children," Peltz said. Teachers work with the Soldiers to establish meeting times and discuss commitment. "We want (them) to be consistent so the child can build a relationship," Pelz said.

Holiday scams begin, e-mail frauds lurk

The holidays are upon us and in the Internet world there are those interested in supplementing their holiday shopping funds with some hard-earned cash straight out of

If they can't persuade you to give them the money directly, they will simply resort to gathering enough personally identifiable information to masquerade as you and then charge your VISA, MasterCard or even apply for a credit card in your name.

I've seen several reports of e-mail scams recently. Fortunately, our EUR users, their friends and family seem well educated about e-mail scams and petty phishing schemes.

I encourage those of you who are familiar with fraud (scams and phishing) on the Internet to share your knowledge with your family, friends and co-workers and send your information assurance manager, or IAM, a note when something suspicious

For those of you who are not as Internet savvy, keep this in mind: No one is trying to give you "free" money. No wealthy patriarch or matriarch has died in a foreign land and left you their inheritance.

If someone had, don't you think their estate could afford a phone call or a direct flight so the lawyer could visit you personally with some papers to sign?

It might still be a scam but at least there would be some investment of time, money and creativity put into the scammer's attempt to steal your money.

Don't let the cheap, lazy, digital, Internet scammers so easily off the hook – make them work for your cash. Take a moment to look at the message, laugh, and then delete

Don't worry; you'll get plenty more.

As mentioned, I've received several reports of e-mail scams in the past few weeks. If you receive something on your personal e-mail, EUR e-mail or AKO e-mail that is obviously bad or suspicious, the best course of action is to delete it.

If you think it is tricky enough to convince someone to give up their information, then can send it to your information assurance manager.

If you suspect it may be linked to malicious code then definitely contact your IAM soonest. As a rule, if you are really not sure if it's a scam, make a phone call to the legitimate company or business to confirm.

Or you can look up the message on Google or another search engine you prefer. Try typing "scam - title of the e-mail" and you'll most likely get a dozen or so articles

Unless, of course, it's not a scam and you really are entitled to large sums of money. In which case I would ask, "Could I get a

loan?' Every unit has an information assurance manager that can be contacted about suspicious e-mail traffic.

Dial 119 to reach the Enterprise Service Desk to find out the name of your information assurance manager.

Cooking show 'Guten Appetit' debuts on AFN

New program is on the hunt for good grub

Lance Milsted is what you might call a foodie. His palate has a passion for all types of cuisine whether it's Italian, Tex-Mex, German or Norwegian. The Wisconsin native is also pretty comfortable behind the stove, whipping up his own dishes that include everything from lasagna to lutefisk, a Norwegian fish.

Milsted is the operations manager for American Forces Network Heidelberg and he, along with Sgt. 1st Class Adam Shaw, AFN Heidelberg's station commander, have channeled that passion into prime time programming.

"I've been in this job for seven months and I watched a lot of Food Network programming back in the states. They were things that were interesting to me and entertaining since I really enjoy cooking," Milsted said.

After coming to Germany he became interested in finding places that were fun to go to eat when he noticed a void for that type of information. Milsted wanted to do something about it.

His observation along with feedback from viewers and even some of the AFN Soldiers helped to create the concept for "Guten Appetit," AFN Heidelberg's new traveling cooking show premiering Monday. The show visits local restaurants to sample and savor some of the area's best dishes.

"We had two focus groups of about 20 people and they said, 'We're tired of seeing the commander talking to us and telling us what we can and can't do. We see all these sexual assault spots,'" Shaw said.

"But what they really wanted was to see more things out in the community. They wanted to know what was out there to do. Where were the places to eat? And that was

a big driving force to know that a show like this could be successful," Shaw said.

"Guten Appetit" is slightly modeled after Food Network favorites such as "Roker on the road," Rachel Ray's Tasty Travels" and "Road tasted with the Neelys" but with an AFN spin.

The AFN film crew will call ahead to the selected restaurant and set up a date and time to film the kitchen staff preparing their signature dishes from start to finish. Afterwards everyone digs in for a sample.

"That's my favorite part of the show," Shaw said. "We've been lucky to have eaten some really good food so far."

Producers admit they are still experimenting with the show's formula to get the most out of each episode.

One technique viewers may

notice is the use of hand-held camera techniques designed to capture each detail in the kitchen up close and personal.

So far the crew has shot about three episodes including one at the Skyline Restaurant in Mannheim, and they're on the hunt for more restaurant suggestions, especially from AFN viewers.

"They can definitely make suggestions to us because that's what we want. We want our viewers to take ownership in this and help us get the word out about great places to eat," Milsted said.

"The more participation the better," Shaw added. We've only eaten at so many places ourselves so I know there are a lot of people who have favorite restaurants that not a lot of other people know about and we want

to share that ... and we also want to make sure we're not going to the same places that Americans are already going to. A lot of places that are right outside of the gate are where you get taken to your first day in the country. We're trying to avoid places like that. We want people to venture out to a little bit more to enjoy something unique."

AFN Heidelberg also hopes to eventually expand the program to other areas outside of the Baden-Württemberg footprint to allow some of their AFN sister stations to share their top picks for good grub. The show will repeat each evening for two weeks whereupon a fresh show will be aired.

The campaign, the only authorized solicitation of federal employees in their workplaces, raises millions of dollars annually and features over 2,300 charities.


According to a CFC-Overseas news release, the five combatant commands raised \$15.6 million in 2009.

"I think that these vests will make a big difference. They are super reflective, and very brightly colored. I think that the kids will enjoy wearing them," said Patrick Henry Elementary School

Principal Allison Peltz. Ruehmling recommends

parents consider reflectivity and bright colors when choosing coats and other clothing items for their children especially during the dark winter months when they arrive at school almost at dawn and return home after school at dusk.

'The kids were able to tell me why it is so important that they be seen by drivers. Clearly, parents are already talking to their children about winter safety," Ruehmling said.

The new "ruftaxi," pronounced roof taxi, is available 10 times a day Monday through Saturday and six times a day on Sundays. When called, the taxi picks up either at the new sheltered location just inside the commissary gate or at the main Heidelberg-Kirchheim stop.

To reserve a ride, call civ. 06221-302030 at least 30 minutes prior to pickup time. The size of the vehicle – a car, van or bus – depends on the number of passengers. A new pedestrian entrance in the fence near the commissary provides convenient access for those who park at the commissary and walk

Clear away snow, ice after storms

Baden-Württemberg's first snow storm of the season brings with it reminders of how snow and ice are removed in Army family housing areas.

In Heidelberg, residents in stairwells, single family houses and duplexes are responsible for removing snow within 50 feet of the building, according to U.S. Army Garrison Baden-Württemberg Directorate of Public Works officials.

Removal includes basement stairs.

The garrison contracts with the city to remove snow and ice on primary roads, primary parking areas and some pave-

Crews start work at 4 a.m. and ensure main roads are usable by 7 a.m. They stop at 10

Occupants of office buildings are also responsible for shoveling, sweeping or spreading salt and grit to make the areas around their buildings safe for those who need to enter and exit.

Building coordinators can pick up supplies at the Self Help Store, Bldg. 3962 on the Directorate of Public Works compound across the street from the Shopping Center.

Supplies include salt, gravel, sand and de-icing liquid, scrapers, shovels, brooms.

In Mannheim, a contractor clears walkways. Residents are responsible for clearing areas from their doors to sidewalks as well as their driveways, if they have them.

The Mannheim DPW clears streets and parking lots. If personally owned vehicles are snowed in, residents must shovel them out themselves.

Contractors start clearing the roads and sidewalks no later than 6:30 a.m. and 8 a.m. on weekends and holidays. During the day, contractors begin when snow has reached two

A priority for clearing roads is followed in Mannheim beginning with the Coleman Barracks airfield. Once at Benjamin Franklin Village, priority is for main roads, Sullivan Barracks driveways and other heavily-used areas.

Main access roads to government installations are cleared by the German government.



Army in Europe retention rate above average

The reenlistment window is open for Soldiers with an expiration of term of service on or before Sept. 30, 2012.

"As long as you're qualified, no one is being denied reenlistment," said Sgt. 1st Class James Hatfield, the U.S. Army Europe senior retention operations noncommissioned officer.

When Soldiers have a choice, current station stabilization, which is choosing to reenlist for a current duty station, is the number one reenlistment option that USAREUR Soldiers choose, said Sgt. Maj. David Best, the USAREUR senior career counselor.

The USAREUR stabilization rate is usually about 5 percent above the average Army stabili-

zation rate, Hatfield said.

The five standard reenlistment options are:

- ◆Regular Army
- Current station stabilization
- Army training
- ◆Overseas assignment
- •Station-of-choice in the continental United States

Bonuses range from \$1,300 to \$40,000 depending on a Soldier's rank, military occupational specialty and length of service extension, according to the USAREUR retention team.

The Army also has renewed the Bonus Extension and Retraining Program that allows Soldiers to retrain, reclassify and receive a bonus for their new military occupational specialties, the team said.

support. "The teachers gave us a list of areas they'd like for us to help, everything from social interaction to help with special subjects to recess. It runs the gamut."

He works with five students – three in a multi-age third/ fourth grade class and two in fifth grade – helping them in reading, math and with socialization.

"The teachers and the kids love it," Green said. "The teachers (said) there's a noticeable difference in how the kids act in class."

Green said many of the battalion's Soldiers have children in the Heidelberg schools. "But ironically, about half of the Soldiers who are volunteering with school don't even have bide" he said

For the Soldiers, the outcome is different, perhaps.

"I just came off deployment," Green said. "This is my time to take a breather."

Adopt-a-School programs are also active at Heidelberg Middle School, which partners with the 18th Military Police Brigade and Heidelberg High School, whose partner is the 43rd Signal Battalion.

the burning car near the Viernheim exit and took charge by securing the scene with red warning triangles to alert and slow passing traffic.

"Most importantly, we got the car owners away from their burning vehicle," said Spc. Ron Sampson, a unit supply specialist and Army Reservist from California.

Spc. Derrick Chapman, an Army Reserve food service specialist who works as an emergency medical technician in Berlin, used his German language and emergency medical skills to reassure the civilians and provide first aid.

Meanwhile, Spc. Marc Stelter, an Army Reserve finance specialist also fluent in German and a native of Heidelberg, Germany, immediately called the German fire department and police. Stelter owns a construction equipment business in Mannheim.

The Soldiers credited Army values and effective unit safety and first aid training for their actions.

"We learn how to call the German fire department during emergencies, as well as how to use fire extinguishers," said Rosa-Bozar.

"We are trained in the Army to always help your battle buddy. The person you help today just might be the one to help you out in the future," she said.

The 30th MEDCOM (Dental Service) is made up of active duty and reserve Soldiers with headquarters in Heidelberg.

Jet Fuel Java

Three planes belonging to the airline Germanwings reportedly took off this past weekend with jet fuel in their drinking water tanks which nearly made it into passengers' coffee cups. According to the daily "Bild," a 21-year-old service company employee who thought he was filling the planes at Berlin's Schönefeld airport with water, not realizing the 3,000-litre tank was contaminated with fuel. The mistake was not discovered until after the planes to Zweibrücken, Cologne and Munich took off, Germanwings spokesman Joachim Schöttes said Sunday. The crews all reported noticing a strange smell while preparing beverages for passengers, at which point they decided to serve juice and soft drinks instead, "Bild" reported. The plane tanks have since been cleaned and the airline is investigating the mistake. Passengers did not come in contact with the fuel, but crew members were examined by medical experts. They are now back on duty, the paper said.

Wikileaks Revelations

American ambassador to Germany Philip Murphy told "Bild am Sonntag" that he regretted the imminent leak of confidential diplomatic dossiers through the Internet platform Wikileaks, which he slammed as an irresponsible endangerment of global security. Murphy told the newspaper: "It will be uncomfortable at the very least — for my government, for those who are mentioned in the reports, and for me personally as the American ambassador to Germany." The newspaper reported that German foreign minister Guido Westerwelle gets a particularly poor appraisal in international diplomatic circles.

Glühwein Crackdown

Germany's drug commissioner Mechthild Dyckmans called on cities and communities to stick to youth protection laws during the Christmas market season and stop young people from drinking glühwein. Though they may be full of good cheer, Christmas market organizers and their communities must not bend the rules for youthful holiday revellers, the Free Democrat said. "Even ahead of Christmas, alcohol still doesn't belong in the hands of children and youths," she said. According to Dyckmaans, one frequently sees children and teens drinking too much glühwein, or mulled wine, along with other alcoholic beverages at the markets. Under German law, vendors cannot serve or sell alcohol to children younger than 16. At 16, Germans are allowed to buy beer but can't have spirits until they turn 18.

Dear Ms Vicki,

My husband is in Afghanistan and I know he is cheating. He's admitted to it. I have more than enough evidence. And the female he's committing adultery with is also in the Army and she's with him in Afghanistan. We have a 13-monthold boy and her son is the same age and looks a lot like my son. We have been together for over two years.

I have asked for help from his superiors and even the chaplain assigned to his shop. Everyone tells me they can't help, that there's nothing they can do for me, that adultery isn't a crime. I know for a fact in the Marine Corps that wouldn't fly. But the Army is different.

I also know that they will cover up for him regardless because he's doing it for others that are doing the same to their wives. I have been through a *lot with this man – the violence, the* verbal abuse, the neglect, the neglect to his son and family, his coming home intoxicated, you name it.

I have gone to his captain several times asking for help and I even had to call the cops twice – once for him almost hitting me and ended

up hitting the door while there were witnesses present, and the other for him being abusive to my son when he was only 4 months old.

He doesn't pay nor help me with the bills. He's simply collecting all the money and transferring it to his other female's account and I know this because I have printed his bank statements with the evidence on it.

I don't believe people like him should be getting any credit whatsoever just because according to the Army, "They are defending our country." This is his first deployment out of seven years he's been in the service. He did five with the Marine Corps and he's going on two with the Army. I am begging for your help. How can I go about seeking a solution to this problem?

Dear Seeking,

Your husband's behavior should not be tolerated. Service members cannot leave their families bereft of money and other resources. It sounds like his unit does not want to get involved for whatever reason, but it's wrong.

Here are my suggestions. Continue to reach out to his commanders. It will probably be the rear detachment commanders since your husband is deployed, and document your efforts.

You can also do an Inspector General complaint. The IG will have to investigate and give a report of its findings. Seek help from the legal assistance office on base.

Army Regulation (AR) 608-99 requires Soldiers to manage their personal affairs in a manner that does not bring discredit upon themselves or the U.S. Army, to include financial support of family members.

The Army has designated a portion of a Soldier's basic allowance for housing entitlement to care for family members if the Soldier and spouse are living separately. Typically family members are

authorized a portion of BAH type II depending upon the number of dependants.

The amount is required to be paid to family members whether or not the Soldier is receiving BAH entitlements. Commanders have a duty, by this regulation, to take certain actions whenever a nonsupport complaint is brought to their attention.

The commander will gather facts by reviewing official documentation, speaking to the Soldier, spouse, lawyer, or whomever else has pertinent knowledge of the issue. The commander then determines whether family support is owed, how much, and then formally counsels the Soldier on the findings, ordering him to make payments if required.

The Soldier can then decide how to make payment – cash, check, money order, or voluntary allotment. The commander must respond in writing to the spouse in 14 days detailing the findings and what actions the Soldier was ordered to do.

Of note, the Soldier is authorized to directly pay for rent, mortgage, etc. to fulfill the support obligation. However, if that cost is less than the BAH-II rate, the Soldier must pay dependants the difference. In extreme cases, the commander can order support for the family beyond BAH-II if the family's basic needs are not being met. Any subsequent requests for non-support of family members will go to the higher level commander for resolution.

Lastly, I'm very concerned about the abuse. While I don't want you destitute, I don't want you in an abusive situation either. I highly recommend you speak to a Victim's Advocate at your base. Let the advocate know everything you are currently experiencing and about the abuse too. They will help you.
