More money for utility bills coming June 16

Eligible servicemembers will soon see more money in their bank accounts, thanks to the 2011 Overseas Housing Allowance Utility and Recurring Maintenance survey.

The increase, which raised the monthly utility allowance by €32 to a total of €656, was based on data gathered through the OHA Utility and Recurring Maintenance survey taken by members who receive OHA in Germany.

The increase will take effect June 16.

"Thank you to all who took the survey," said Marlena Walker, U.S. Army Europe chief of financial management policy. "The increase is a tangible result of the time

and effort put into taking the survey."

The defense military advisory panel members approved the increase May 31. The next OHA utilities survey for Germany is scheduled for March 2012.

PRINCIPAL, MARK TWAIN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

This is for the many students and teachers who have walked the hallways of Mark Twain Elementary School over the years that it has served the children of military and civilian personnel stationed overseas in service to our country.

These students and teachers were a part of a select group fortunate enough to have lived in one of the most beautiful towns in Europe. Memories of trips to the Heidelberg Castle, the Christmas Market on a cold winter day, springtime walks in the Schwetzingen gardens and sitting under a shady tree in Luisenpark on a warm day in June are all indelibly written across their hearts. Their years spent in Heidelberg are sure to be a highlight of conversations throughout their lives.

Our students have been our pride. They have always reflected the high academic values instilled by their parents. They understood the importance of getting a quality education that would prepare them for a world that is getting increasingly smaller and is ever changing.

In living the transient life that is endemic to the military, our students have demonstrated the flexibility it takes to put down roots quickly, as well as the ability to adjust to new cultures and to make new friends. They have experienced the sadness of saying goodbye to a deploying parent, as well as the great joy of greeting them upon their

return. We can rest assured that when it is their turn to take the reins and make the decisions that they will do it well.

Parents have been the bedrock of Mark Twain Elementary School since it opened. Even when family unity was disrupted when parents were called to serve in hostile areas our families stayed strong.

As the first teachers to your children, parents were the ones who molded their character for life and prepared them for school. It is to you that we say thank you for sending us your best all these years. Thank you for continually rolling up your sleeves and demonstrating that can-do attitude that served as a model for your children.

You always gave the school your support and, by doing so, you validated us and let us know that you trusted us to do our best in keeping your children safe and providing the quality education to which they were entitled.

To be a teacher is one of the highest callings in life. In what other profession does one have the opportunity to teach someone to read and to write down their thoughts so that the minds of others could be transformed and taken places they never knew existed?

There is magic in being a teacher and that magic happened daily in classrooms in small ways, whether it was the sudden understanding of fractions, the ability to write in cursive or discovering that getting up in front of class and giving a report was not that scary after all.

Throughout the years our teachers have served their students well because

they recognized that what they did was not a job, it was a calling.

Mark Twain himself would have been proud of this little school which is located a breath away from USAREUR Headquarters. He would have wanted his name linked to a place such as this where children could learn, not only about things of the world, but about themselves as they related to others.

He would have liked that children, similar to the likes of Tom Sawyer and Becky Thatcher had the opportunity to learn in such a historic setting. The time he spent in Heidelberg provided material for much of his writing. His leisure boat trips up the Neckar River, gliding past the castle to Hirschorn, were memorable and when he returned to America he always referred to the experience.

Now we are in a similar situation. It is our time to say our goodbyes and to move on to new adventures taking with us, in our hearts and in our memories, times spent here with our friends, our teachers, and our parents.

How could we ever forget living abroad and attending Mark Twain Elementary School? The experience has become "us" and we are ready to take it with us wherever in the world that might be.

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

Mark Twain elementary students sing with heart as they mark school's closing after 59 years in Heidelberg

Students stole the show when they performed during the closing day ceremony for Mark Twain Elementary School in Heidelberg Friday.

"Goodbye, Mark Twain. Goodbye, Mark Twain. We'll always remember you," sang the 79 kindergarten through fifth grade students that make up the last classes of the school that opened in 1952.

The school may close but the name "Mark Twain" will remain, according to Heidelberg Mayor for Integration, Equal Opportunities and Citizen Services Wolfang Erichson. "We're losing many friends and people," he said following the ceremony. "We have an opportunity to develop all the land here … and we have decided to keep the names of the streets and villages."

The high school auditorium was full of parents, teachers, students and administrators, past and present, who gathered to witness the final school day. Students populated the stage wearing white T-shirts with Mark Twain's image and the famous Heidelberg bridge.

They sang five songs, written by German host nation teacher Jenny Thouw, that sent personal messages to history telling of "the school with heart" bidding those gathered "Adieu."

Interspersed among the speeches and songs were historical tidbits presented by the students onstage that began with "Did you know?" and chronicled the story of the school.

Most touching were the recollections of former students. Zach Harrington, now a high school senior, recounted how he had been too shy to give his second-grade teacher a valentine. Better late than never, he said, "Ms. Williams, will you be my valentine?" Linda Williams, still a teacher, understood better than any in the audience why that evoked "aaahs" from the crowd.

Teachers were honored when Principal Dolly Crooks said, "A school is only as good as the person who stands in front of your classroom." She also recognized the dozen former teachers who traveled there and introduced themselves and their best memories.

One retired teacher, Caroline Haberer, knew most all the people recognized at the front of the auditorium. She taught at Mannheim schools but the community of Department of Defense Dependents Schools teachers is small and she had formed friendships with many of those who had also traveled to the school Friday.

"The schools offer support because when the parents deploy, the schools are there," Haberer said. "They provide

continuity, stability, a warm and safe haven."

Wife of U.S. Army Europe commander Sue Hertling was the keynote speaker who remarked upon the "rock solid" education students received at the school. Students also heard from garrison commander Col. Bill Butcher and Command Sgt. Major Annette Weber via video whose message to students was, "You rock." Other speak-

ers were DODDS Europe Director Dr. Nancy Bresell and Heidelberg School District Superintendent Frank Roehl.

It was Roehl whom Crooks credited when she recognized military families.

"I was never in a meeting with him that he didn't say to us, 'Never forget who you're serving, the men and women who serve our country," she said. "Nothing is more noble than putting on that uniform every day."

Soldiers get advanced cardiac life support training

The Heidelberg Medical Department Activity recently provided Advanced Cardiac Life Support training for physicians, physician assistants and medics from the 172nd Infantry Brigade, 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat teams and HMEDDAC staff.

Soldiers traveled from Bamberg, Schweinfurt and Grafenwöhr for the training. The 173rd Soldiers recently returned from deployment and needed re-certification and training. Soldiers from the 172nd and Heidelberg Health Center prepared for

upcoming deployments.

The course trains healthcare providers in the management of cardiac arrest and cardiovascular emergencies like acute myocardial infarction (MI, heart attack), acute coronary syndrome (chest pain), irregular heart rhythms and stroke, said Joan Lancaster, chief of HMEDDAC clinical education.

"The class ... uses a combination of case studies, didactic instruction, simulated events and hands-on practice," she said.

Students are able to perform basic and advanced life support procedures, recognize and manage conditions that may lead to cardiac arrest if not recognized and treated early, recognize and manage respiratory arrest, recognize and manage cardiac arrest; and recognize and initiate early treatment of chest pain, acute MI and stroke, Lancast-



U.S. Army Europe turns 69

U.S. Army Europe marked its birthday yesterday, June 8.

USAREUR came to Europe 69 years ago to become part of a multi-national coalition to win World War II and stayed in Europe to help European allies maintain their freedom during the Cold War.

Since 1989, USAREUR has transformed from a heavy force postured to win a land war on the plains of Europe to an agile, modern, rapidly deployable force, tailored in Europe to train, to deploy and to support multiple combatant

commanders.

"Today, the Army in Europe is America's strategic forward enabler," said Lt. Gen. Mark P. Hertling, USAREUR's commanding general.

"Our Soldiers prevent war by training with multi-national allies. We build trust with our allies of America's resolve and commitment to dignity, and we prepare our own forces for any eventuality along the conflict spectrum. We build strong Soldiers and strong teams," he said.

The command traces its roots back to January 1942 when American Soldiers opened a command post in Belfast, Northern Ireland, in anticipation of combat in World War II. Those first arrivals were the advance party of Headquarters, V Corps, the centerpiece of USAREUR combat forces.

The formal date that USA-REUR celebrates its anniversary today goes back to the War Department establishment of the European Theater of Operations, U.S. Army, on June 8, 1942.

ETOUSA's mission was to plan for the retaking of Europe and exercise operational control over U.S. forces.

Remembering the fallen on Memorial Day

Across the world, hearts and minds were joined in remembrance on Memorial Day weekend. Whether through personal mourning for individual servicemembers or in mass gatherings at the many ceremonies around the globe, millions paused to honor the sacrifices made in the name of freedom.

In Heidelberg, the Memorial Park on Patton Barracks was rededicated at the Village Pavilion on Patrick Henry Village May 31 as part of an Eagle Scout project for Kyle Rueschhoff, a Life Scout with Troop 26. Family and Morale Welfare and Recreation sponsored the project, while the Department of Public Works provided technical guidance and the necessary materials to construct the new Memorial Park.

American Legion Post GR03 held the ceremony, as it does every year for both Memorial Day and Veteran's Day since 1972, for an assembled crowd of military, scouts and family. It also donated the wreath that Rueschhoff and U.S. Army Garrison Baden Württemberg Commander Col. Bill Butcher placed on the memorial plaque.

The 18th Military Police Brigade dispatched a rifle squad and a color guard May 29 to the communes of St. Avold and Villers-Stoncourt in France to honor the servicemembers who gave their lives in defense of the Lorraine region during World War II.

"This memorial symbol of sacrifice for the combatants committed to the liberation of our land in 1944 reminds us that we have a duty to remember," said Jacqueline Magard, Lord Mayor of Villers-Stoncourt.

Also in France, nearly 50 Soldiers from the 21st Theater Sustainment Command's Special Troops Battalion participated in the Memorial Day ceremony at the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery and Memorial in Romagnesous-Montfaucon May 29.

The cemetery spans 130.5 acres and is the resting place of 14,246 fallen Soldiers, the largest number of American military in Europe. Most lost their lives during the Meuse-Argonne Offensive of World War I.

"I never thought a cemetery could be so beautiful, so breathtaking and perfect in its serenity. This is an event that I will never forget. I was a

little nervous beforehand, but never realized how much of an honor it actually is to have been selected to lay a wreath here," said Pfc. Angel Hunter, a paralegal specialist at the 21st TSC's Office of the Staff Judge Advocate.

In Bony, France, about 200 miles north of Paris, Soldiers

from the Europe Regional Medical Command, including the command headquarters in Heidelberg and the Heidelberg Medical Department Activity and Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, stood alongside Marines from France's 1st Marine Artillery Regiment at the 14-acre Somme American Cemetery and Memorial to honor the fallen Soldiers laid to rest at the historical site. European NCOs build lifelong relationships at conference

U.S. Army Europe took the American Soldier's "train as you fight" concept to the international level during the fifth annual Conference of European Armies for Noncommissioned Officers in Szekesfehervar, Hungary, May 24-27.

This year's conference, co-hosted by the Hungarian Joint Forces and USAREUR, focused on the challenge of lifelong learning, a conundrum facing NCOs from every country.

"The purpose of the con-

ference is to encourage professional development among the European land forces and to establish relationships and networks among the senior noncommissioned officers from those countries," explained Command Sgt. Maj. Thomas Capel, USAREUR's senior enlisted advisor.

NCOs from 38 European countries, the United States and Canada attended the conference. All participants are senior enlisted leaders in their nations' armed forces. Most are their nations' highest-ranking enlisted leaders, equivalent in rank to the sergeant major of the Army. Many are graduates of the U.S. Army Sergeants Major Academy. The conference is designed to strengthen partnerships and facilitate security cooperation, Capel said.

This year participants gathered at the Hungarian Joint

Forces headquarters in Szekesfehervar, about 40 miles from Budapest. The conference focused on topics near and dear to every NCO's heart - training and education - as well as more diverse subjects, from an overview of NATO's Afghanistan training mission to a briefing on the mission of the U.S. Army Joint Improvised Explosive Device Defeat Organization.

The conference gave everyone a chance to learn and to teach, said Command Sgt. Maj. Lazlo Toth of the Hungarian Joint Forces Command sergeant major. "The issue of lifelong learning is a big challenge for the future of all armies," Toth said.

The sergeant major said he

knew the Hungarian armed forces were in for a major change when, in 1990, U.S. and Soviet aircraft both landed at the air base where he was stationed. Since then, building the Hungarian army NCO Corps has been the biggest challenge facing his armed services. Toth explained that Hungary has followed the examples other armies to construct a unique Hungarian

"Twenty-five years ago, the army reflected the Soviet style. Everything was in the officers' hands." Now, Toth said, the army is radically different. "NCOs have power as leaders. That means they have to accept the responsibility that comes with that power."

Other conference participants echoed those sentiments.

For example, Command Sgt. Maj. Darius Masiulis, a member of the National Defense Voluntary Forces of the Armed Forces of Lithuania, said his forces used the U.S. Army's enlisted promotion system as their model.

Masiulis, a graduate of the U.S. Army Sergeants Major Course, also noted that his own professional development has been enhanced through partnership and interaction with his international colleagues.

"I brought back a lot of ideas and suggestions [from the USASMA] that were implemented," he said. Masiulis said that nine-month school also enabled him to build a multinational network of European and U.S. sergeants maior.

Likewise, the conference offered something of a reunion for many participants - an opportunity to reacquaint with coalition partners from deployments, previous conferences and academy classes - in addition to its professional development opportu-

Slovenian Armed Forces Sgt. Maj. of the Army Janez Smid has attended all five of the annual NCO conferences. They are opportunities to learn while seeing old friends and making new ones, he said.

Because it is a small nation, Slovenia must be clever in its approaches to change and innovation, he explained, and so it also adopts good ideas from other armies. "Training and development are the areas that are changing most in the Slovenian military right now," Smid said.

To help them focus on those areas, Slovenian forces have trained with the U.S. Army quite a bit, particularly USAREUR.

To illustrate that partnership, he pointed to the fact that Slovenian troops who deploy to Afghanistan or Kosovo train with American Soldiers at USAREUR's Joint Multinational Readiness Center, which he called "an amazing facility.'

Smid, a graduate of the U.S. Army First Sergeants Course and Sergeants Major Course, said his network of professional NCO colleagues has been invaluable. "You meet these guys again - all over the world, in places like Iraq. They make your job that much easier," he said.

Capel said it has taken just a few years for European forces to embrace the conference, and member countries' senior NCOs are already looking forward to next year.

This whole concept may have started slowly, but it's really picked up speed. We used to emphasize joint training, but now, it's all about the international training. Most of these countries are our coalition partners in Afghanistan, so this conference is an excellent example of training as we fight," he said.

- ◆1 tablespoon baking powder
- ◆1/4 cup corn starch
- ◆1/2 to 3/4 cups strawberry jelly
- ◆2 packs Sahnesteif or Whip-It (to stabilize the whipping cream)
- ◆10 gelatin sheets
- ◆2/3 cup milk
- ◆1 vanilla bean
- ◆1 3/4 cups plain yogurt
- ◆2 cups heavy whipping cream
- ◆2 1/4 cusp fresh strawberries

Preparation

Cake

Preheat oven to 400 degrees Fahrenheit. Combine eggs, 1/3 cup sugar and vanilla sugar in a bowl, and mix on medium until creamy. Sift flour, baking powder and cornstarch into batter and carefully blend on low. Pour batter into a 10 inch round spring form pan and bake for 20 minutes. Let the cake cool and remove from spring form pan. Slice cake horizontally into two even layers using a serrated knife, or slice with unflavored dental floss.

Filling

Beat whipping cream with Whip-It and set aside. Soak 8 sheets of gelatin in water. In a saucepan, heat milk, vanilla bean and 1/4 cup sugar on low. Squeeze water from gelatin and add sheets to the milk, vanilla and sugar mixture. Once mixture thickens, remove from heat and fold in yogurt and whipping cream. Allow filling to cool and thicken, then spread on each cake layer, on top of the strawberry jelly. Cool cake in the refrigerator for two hours.

Tonning

Soak the last two sheets of gelatin in water. Cut 1 cup of strawberries into small cubes. Add 1/4 cup sugar to strawberries. Using a blender or food processor, puree strawberries and sugar. Heat the mixture in a small saucepan on low. Squeeze excess water from the gelatin sheets and add to the strawberry-sugar mixture. Stir until thickened, then remove from heat. Stack the cake layers and generously spread topping on the top layer. Cool cake for one hour in the refrigerator. Once cooled, decorate the top with remaining strawberries.
