Defense Secretary Leon E. Panetta led a Pentagon celebration for wounded warriors who competed in Paralympic sports during the 2012 Warrior Games Monday. "It is, for me, a real pleasure to have the opportunity to be with you today, and to especially be with our warrior athletes and their families," Panetta said, "It's an honor for me to be able to celebrate the remarkable achievements that all of you have done, [and] your resilience." Panetta was joined by Gen. Ray Odierno, Army chief of staff and Charlie Huebner. chief of Paralympics for the U.S. Olympic Committee. "It's an important day for all of us," Odierno said. "We recognize incredibly inspirational and motivated young men and women." The Army chief noted that 50 world-class athletes representing the Army, Air Force, Navy and Marine Corps, as well as U.S. Special Operations Command and the Coast Guard, were on hand for the ceremony to represent the 220 participants in the Warrior Games, held in Colorado Springs, Colo., April 30 - May 5. The Marines, Odierno said, won the coveted Chairman's Cup with a total of 89 medals.

Prevention experts battle against whispers, taboos

"Do vou need this card?" she asked in a barely audible voice.

"It should be normal," Lisa Velez said, when discussing the oft-perceived taboo topic of suicide and the Army's Ask, Care, Escort card. "Let's step away from whispering and have a genuine conversation.'

Velez, the U.S. Army Garrison Kaiserslautern suicide prevention program manager, noted that the time for a "genuine conversation" about suicide is now - at the outset of the summer months, which are notoriously the peak season for suicide attempts.

"We want to be proactive, and not reactive," she said. "We want to look at what those risk factors are and address those."

To keep an active conversation afloat, Soldiers with the U.S. Army Garrison Kaiserslautern Better Opportunities for Single Soldiers program handed out crisis-hotline cards at entrance gates on garrison installations June 22.

"It's about promoting those things that are going to help you take care of yourself," Velez said of the push for suicide prevention awareness and the cards, which contained the overseas military crisis hotline, at civ. 00800-1273-8255.

She calls it a mission of one.

Saber Strike exercise wraps up

ESTONIA, Tapa - After two weeks of intense training, about 2000 troops from eight nations began to pack up and head home from five locations spread across Estonia and Latvia as exercise Saber Strike 2012 came to an official close following ceremonies in Tapa, Estonia, and Adazi, Latvia.

Many troops will leave after making new friends, learning new techniques and developing the confidence that they will be able to better operate together in upcoming deployments to Afghanistan.

"Saber strike 2012 has been a tremendous success strategically, operationally and tactically," said Brig. Gen. Mark Hendrix, deputy commanding general of the US Army's 21st Theater Sustainment Command, and acting exercise codirector, during closing comments at Adazi, Latvia. "We have improved our interoperability, refined our tactics techniques and procedures, and

most of all, prepared those of you who will soon go into harm's way." Saber Strike 2012 is a multina-

tional, tactical field training exercise that involves personnel from the U.S. Army's 2nd Cavalry Regiment, Pennsylvania National Guard, 21st Theater Sustainment Command, the 4th U.S. Marine Division, the 127th Wing of the Michigan Air National Guard, Estonian, Latvian, and Lithuanian armed forces, with contingents from Canada, Finland, France and the United Kingdom.

The exercise, led by U.S. Army Europe, is designed to enhance joint and combined interoperability between the U.S. Army and partner nations, and will help prepare participants to operate successfully in a joint, multinational, interagency, integrated environment.

The exercise began with STX lanes in Adazi that included six tasks commonly performed by units serving in Afghanistan; convoy operations, urban patrolling, base defense, cordon search, Counter-Improvised and

Transportation Soldiers reflect on role in annual exercise

Team continues to tackle real-world logistical mission as Saber Strike concludes

RIGA, Latvia - The 39th Transportation Battalion, 16th Sustainment Brigade, took the lead controlling movements in northern Europe for the joint multinational training exercise Saber Strike 2012 June 11-22.

The battalion sent the 635th Movement Control Team to facilitate the sequential movements of personnel and equipment from various locations in Europe and the U.S. to exercise locations in Latvia and Estonia. The U.S. Army Europe-led exercise, intended to enhance joint and combined interoperability between the U.S. Army and partner nations, required extensive logistical planning, since the movements consisted of a range of multi-modal travel including rail, air, surface and sea.

Originating from two separate ferries in Germany, the training exercise equipment was loaded onto two trains and sent to Latvia. Once there, the 635th MCT ensured it was downloaded swiftly and carefully.

"Given the high cost of flying containers and vehicles, a large majority of the exercise equipment came by train. Coordinating the rail operations was certainly interesting. We worked alongside local national contractors, German customs officers, the Latvian Army movement control team, and Soldiers from the units sending equipment. Overall it has been a great experience," said Capt. Stuart Coleman, the 635th MCT commander.

Even though most of the equipment arrived via rail, a small fleet of Stryker armored combat vehicles from the Pennsylvania National Guard were transported by plane to the Riga International Airport. The Stryker's arrival attracted a mass of civilian spectators who rarely get to see a C-5 land at the airport. The perimeter of the airport fence was lined with civilians and vehicles, some even standing on their vehicle to videotape the download of equipment.

"The gathering was almost like a show. I've never seen so much excitement over a flight that was not coming back from a deployment," said Staff Sgt. Angela Palmer, a squad leader with the 635th MCT.

Saber Strike is a training exercise for most units on the ground, but for the 635th MCT it is a real-world mission. "This isn't practice for us. There is no room for error, and we are expected to execute the movements without deficiencies," said Spc. Arron Gilbert, a 635th MCT movement specialist. By the time the last movement has arrived, most units breathe a sigh of relief, but for the MCT, this is just the beginning.

"No one sleeps until every person, container and vehicle arrives at its home station," Gilbert said.

Landstuhl eye specialists help troops maintain vision

People who do not require vision correction rarely experience the inconvenience of diminished sight, except, perhaps, when having their eyes dilated during an examination.

The immediate and disorienting effect of diminished vision makes us recognize the importance of our eyesight.

According to the Center for Disease Control, vision loss is common in adults and prevalence increases with advancing age. Approximately 13 percent of individuals 65 or older and 28 percent of those over 85 report some degree of visual impairment.

In children, refractive errors are the most common vision disorders, occurring in 20 percent by age 16. More than 90 percent of older people require the use of corrective lenses at some time. Visual disorders in older adults frequently lead to trauma from falls, automobile crashes and other types of unintentional injuries. Many adults are unaware of decreases in their visual acuity, and up to 25 percent may have incorrect corrective lens prescriptions.

While the difference between ophthalmology and optometry is blurred for most of us, Col. (Dr.) Richard H. Birdsong, Chief of Ophthalmology Service at Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, brings it into focus.

Ophthalmologists are physicians who, after college, complete medical

or osteopathic school, then a medical internship and residency training in ophthalmology, explained Birdsong. Optometrists are eye care professionals who, after college, complete optometry school with some optional one-year residencies. Optometrists' primary roles are eye health and refractive care. Ophthalmologists perform all types of surgeries in addition to eye health and refractive care.

LRMC Ophthalmology's role is two-fold: First, to provide comprehensive ophthalmic care to service members, their families and other eligible beneficiaries. Secondly, under the Warfighter Refractive Eye Surgery program, to provide laser refractive surgery to active duty members in order to make them less reliant on glasses for sharp distant vision.

"When Soldiers elect to wear contact lenses downrange (which is a punishable, article 15 offense), the eye can become very infected and vision loss can result," said Maj. James Hartley, assistant director for WREP at LRMC. "Downrange is not a good, clean environment to be wearing contact lenses. Sometimes people don't take them out and clean them like they should because they cannot wash their hands.

This can result in having to be evacuated to LRMC for treatment.

"We are doing the refractive surgery here to make a better warfighter," Hartley said. "Refractive surgery helps our warfighters by improving their overall vision, allowing them to see well without wearing cumbersome glasses that can slide down their noses or fog up - or if lost or broken can render a warfighter visually impaired.

Refractive surgery eliminates the chance of a warfighter choosing to wear contact lenses against regulation, thereby eliminating all of the eye health problems associated with the wear of contact lenses downrange," Hartley said.

Members of the ophthalmology and optometry department have treated more than 66,000 wounded warriors medically evacuated from Afghanistan and Iraq in the past 10 years.

The current plan is to keep the CIF facility on Spinelli Barracks in Mannheim open as long as possible to ensure continued support to the community and it is scheduled to remain open at least through June of 2013. The limiting factor will be employee availability. No CIFs will be closed without coordination and approval from U.S. Army Europe and the 21st Theater Sustainment Command.

There are individuals who are not receiving Living Quarters Allowance currently. If they move to Wiesbaden, will they be eligible for LQA, based on the management-directed reassignment?

Management directed reassignments have certain components associated with them. Regarding Living Quarters Allowance, no determination has been made, but it is being considered as plans to inactivate move forward. Once more is known about LQA for managementdirected moves, we will get the information out in the Herald Post and on our Facebook (http://www.facebook.com/bwnow) and BWnow websites (http://mybwnow.ning.com).

"Is the Wiesbaden Health Clinic going to have all the comprehensive services that the Heidelberg Clinic has or had at one point? For example, CT Scans, ultrasound services, emergency room, etc. If not, are families going to be expected to travel to the Kaiserslautern area?"

Panetta outlines suicide prevention strategy

WASHINGTON - Defense Secretary Leon E. Panetta described a four-part strategy against what he termed "perhaps the most frustrating challenge I've come across," as head of the nation's military forces: service member and veteran suicide. The secretary said his long-term goal is for the Defense Department to be a game-changing innovator in the field of suicide prevention.

"Just as we helped foster the jet age, the space race and the Internet, I want us to break new ground in understanding the human mind and human emotion," he said.

The secretary said key efforts involve leadership, improving quality of and access to behavioral health care, elevating mental fitness and increasing research in suicide prevention.

Speaking on the concluding day of the DOD and Department of Veterans Affairs Annual Suicide Prevention Conference here, Panetta told the audience there are clearly no easy answers, and "that is no damn reason for not finding the answers to the problem of suicide."

"We can do more. We must do more. And together, we will do more to prevent suicides," the secretary vowed.

The military and veteran communities will face the threat of suicide long after combat in Afghanistan ends, he added.

"More than half of those who have committed suicide in the military have no history of deployment," the secretary pointed out." So we're dealing with broader societal issues. Substance abuse, financial distress and relationship problems - the risk factors for suicide - also reflect problems ... that will endure beyond war"

An effective suicide prevention strategy requires vigilance, Panetta said. He called on leaders, particularly the noncommissioned officers and junior officers who lead troops day-to-day, to be sensitive, aware and open to signs of stress in the ranks.

"And they need to be aggressive... in encouraging those under them to seek help if needed," the secretary emphasized. "They also must set an example by seeking help themselves if necessary."

The second pillar of the strategy is improving behavioral health care and making it more available, the secretary said.

There are more than 9,000 psychiatrists, psychologists,

social workers, mental health nurses and counselors working in military hospitals and clinics, he noted.

Due to geographic circumstances, he acknowledged, National Guard and reserve members, family members and some active-duty troops may still face difficulties in accessing needed care.

However, officials said, online and telephone-accessed mental health consultation and information services also are helping to assist service members and families in need.

The third strategic element is to elevate mental fitness, he said. Panetta credited Army Gen. Martin E. Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Marine Corps Sgt. Maj. Bryan Battaglia, senior enlisted advisor to the chairman, with leading all of the services to approach mental fitness with the same level of importance DOD has always placed on physical fitness.

Advancing mental fitness involves training and equipping service members with coping skills so they can mitigate or bounce back from stress, he said.

Additionally, he said, a whole-of-government effort led by President Barack Obama and first lady Michelle Obama is working to combat veteran unemployment and boost military spouse hiring. Those initiatives are "helping to reduce the financial stress faced by military families and veterans," the secretary added.

The fourth part of DOD's suicide prevention strategy involves increasing understanding of suicide and related mental health issues through improved scientific research, he said.

Berlin Baby Born In Police Car

A Berlin woman gave birth in the back of a police car June 23, after her husband was stuck behind a gay pride parade and could not take her to the hospital. He approached police officers working at the Christopher Street Day parade in a panic. "My wife is having a baby but I can't get through the street blockades," the 33-year-old said. The two policemen ushered the pair into the car and called an ambulance to take them to nearby Urban hospital, the Tagesspiegel newspaper reported. Before the ambulance could arrive, the woman's water broke and delivery began almost immediately. "I could tell that the birth was going to happen soon," said officer Mario Stöcklein, 47. Luckily, his first aid training included basic skills of how to deliver a baby and although "it was a quarter of a century ago ... somehow I knew what I had to do. "The two officers successfully delivered baby Yaren Yakut, but had to convince the woman to let them help her. Stöcklein said she was ashamed and it took some cajoling before she would allow the pair to take off her trousers. The new family was taken to the hospital, where doctors declared both mother and baby healthy.

Finding New Facebook Names

Some German cities must find new names for their Facebook pages after the social network decided it would not allow anyone to have control over the name of a place. Munich city council members figured this out earlier in the year when its Facebook site - with 400,000 fans - was suddenly inaccessible to city administrators. Managers of the big German city pages - generally tourism offices or city councils - met with Facebook representatives earlier this month. Berlin has 1.3 million fans on its site. "For us, that is an insanely important channel," said Katharina Dreger from the city's marketing firm. City officials said they are desperate not to lose their social networking presence, and are now trying to think of new names. A Facebook spokesman said the rules were clear on its page where it states, "No-one can represent a geographic place." Each site must be clearly associated with its administrator - such as "New York - Office of the Mayor" or "Lok Sabha: Parliament of India." Munich figured out a compromise, initially renaming its page Stadtportal München - city portal Munich - before opting for München.de as a Facebook name.

Dear Ms. Vicki,

I miss my dad. He wants to see me and my brother, but my mother won't allow it since he doesn't pay child support. He has been trying to find a job, but he doesn't have one yet. I'm only 15 and I don't have a job, so I know it must be hard for a grown-up to find one, too.

My mother keeps saying, "He won't take care of you and your brother, but he is helping another woman raise her children." I don't know anything about another woman or her children. All I want is to see my dad. It's not fair that he doesn't get to come to my games, my PTA meetings or other activities. We don't get to visit my dad, our grandmother, uncles, cousins or anyone. I don't think this is fair.

Maybe my mother is jealous of the

other woman or something; I don't know. Can you talk to my mom? I'm tired of sneaking emails and text messages to him behind her back. Dear Ms. Vicki,

My son recently sent you a letter requesting advice because he wants to have visitation with his father and he feels I am standing in the way. I want to offer an explanation and defend my point of view.

I know your columns are very popular and I'm not blaming you, because my son sent you a letter. I'm only saying that you have a narrow view of what's really going on.

I am active duty, and like many Soldiers, I've had my share of deployments. I have children ages 12 and 15. I was married to their father, but we are now divorced. Sadly, it was a bitter divorce, and I was awarded custody of the children.

To get back at me, my ex-husband started sleeping around seemingly minutes after the divorce was final. He could have been already sleeping with other women for all I know. I don't care who he's been with; I just don't want my children to be a part of that foolishness, that's all.

My ex-husband hasn't seen our sons in three years. He doesn't pay child support, so I don't think he should see them. How can you expect to have visitation rights when you don't even pay child support? Now he says I won't let him see our children, but that's not so. He is the one who doesn't want to see our sons. I'm not keeping him from doing anything. His sons need food, clothes and money for activities and college in the future.

Dear Mother,

I'm definitely not blaming you for all of this. It's obvious you have done a great job as a mother, and as a career woman serving your country. You have also raised some great sons. That's commendable.

It hasn't been easy financially supporting your sons alone. However, your son's letter really pulled at my heartstrings. Their father should provide financial support. It's the right thing to do. It sounds like he wasn't such a good husband and one who doesn't obey child support orders, either.

I've never walked in your shoes, but I think your ex-husband can still have a strong support in his sons' lives. Single mothers are awesome. They step up when many men won't. New financial guidance may help troops as they move

WASHINGTON – New guidance to mortgage servicers may help tens of thousands of military homeowners moving to new duty stations, Consumer Financial Protection Bureau officials said.

The bureau, along with mortgage service industry regulators, is issuing joint supervisory guidance to address mortgage service practices that pose risks to military homeowners, Richard Cordray, the bureau's director, said at a news conference.

"We want to make sure that mortgage servicers comply with the laws that prohibit unfair or abusive practices" when service members have orders to move, he said.

Roughly a third of active duty personnel move each year. Of these, about 185,000 are homeowners who have to sell their houses and move. Many find themselves owing far more on their homes than they're worth in the current market. Service members cannot sit on a property and wait for the market to recover: they must go to their new base, Cordray noted. "They have to move, even if that means taking a big financial hit or leaving their families behind to pay their bills," he said.

"I have heard over and over from military homeowners whose houses are underwater and they don't know what to do," said Holly Petraeus, director of the bureau's Office of Service Member Affairs. "They are terrified that a foreclosure will ruin their finances as well as putting their security clearances at risk, and they are looking for answers."

But in too many cases, she said, mortgage service providers have not given that help. In her travels to military bases, Petraeus said, service members have told her of mortgage service providers giving them inaccurate information and stringing them along.

"We've heard from service members that they were told they had to be delinquent to qualify for help, and advised to skip a couple of payments," she said. "They've been asked to sign waivers of their rights under the Service Members Civil Relief Act just to have their cases evaluated. They've been stalled by repeated demands for their loan documents and given a new loan official with each call ... and they have even been listed as not responding to requests for documents during deployment despite the fact that spouses had powers of attorney."

Edward J. DiMarco, director of the Federal Hous-

ing Finance Agency, spoke of the changes to policies to help military homeowners.

"These changes will make it easier for members of the armed forces with mortgages owned or guaranteed by Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac to honor their financial commitments when they are issued a permanent change of station order," he said. The agency classifies the order as a hardship, he noted.

Homeowners with transfer orders will be immediately eligible for a short sale, even if they are current in their mortgages, DiMarco said. They also will be "exempt from deficiency judgments from Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac when receiving permission for a short sale and relieved of any request or requirement for cash, contribution or promissory note so long as the property was purchased on or before June 30, 2012."

Robert L. Gordon III, assistant secretary of defense for military community and family policy, said the Defense Department welcomes the bureau's leadership. "The military lifestyle poses unique challenges to our troops and their families," he said. "Throughout frequent moves, deployments and transitions they must remain resilient and strong in order to be mission ready."

"If it's just one person that utilizes that number [on the card] – just one person that was in some version of a crisis – and reduces the likelihood that they're going to attempt suicide, that's a success," she said.

Chris Lavin, a counselor with the U.S. Army Garrison Kaiserslautern Army Substance Abuse Program, cited one "particular command was there for [a] Soldier," who had attempted suicide.

"They de-stigmatized it by saying, 'If you get into trouble, we're there for you,'" Lavin said.

"They were aware that this goes on, they were aware that we have to have immediate resources put into play to protect the rest of the Soldiers that are affected by this behavior," he said.

Explosives Device operations and medical evacuation.

While the STX lanes were conducted in Adazi, sites in Estonia were conducting academic training in military decision making and operations at the multinational brigade and higher levels.

After a short break, in which participating troops held sports events and visited local cities as part of a 'cultural day,' the exercise moved into its second week, when operations ramped up the pace a bit.

In Adazi, a battalion headquarters, with companies from the five nations participating in the event, conducted 24-hour operations that included all of the major tasks trained during the STX lanes.

This gave the participating troops the opportunity to put all of these tasks together into one major field operation.

Meanwhile, troops at the training sites in Estonia, began to put into action military decision making processes, and other headquarters operations many of them will have to rely on during future deployments to multinational headquarters organizations in Afghanistan.

"This is absolutely great training," said Sgt. Christopher Whims, with the 4th Marine Division. "We worked, the day before, with the Estonians and learned quite a bit about how they run their convoy operations. Then today we worked with the Lithuanians. It was just absolutely a great experience."

While the tasks and operations the troops trained in were very much the same tasks many of them will employ in Afghanistan, the real training value was in the ability for all of the nations to train together with the very nations with whom they will stand shoulder-to-shoulder in harm's way, according to Latvian Army Lt. Col. Gunars Kaulins, commander of the field training Exercise at Camp Adazi, Latvia.

"When we have Estonian, Latvian, Lithuanian and all the other troops here, it is a fantastic opportunity to learn from one another," he said.

The Saber Strike series of training exercises is scheduled to continue next year in Lithuania.
