Several Mannheim facilities to close June 15

As the Mannheim military community continues to draw down, several major facilities on Benjamin Franklin Village-South are scheduled to close next Friday as part of the Army's ongoing transformation efforts.

The final day of operations for the main Exchange store, Popeyes chicken restaurant, Taco Bell, laundromat, concessionaires (to include phone, Internet and cable provider TKS) and The Exchange gas station will be June 15.

Additionally, the entry and exit gate leading to BFV-South will also be permanently closed to the public after June 15

Residents and community members are asked to remove all property from the area to include motor homes, vehicles, bicycles, motorcycles and any other personal items as soon as possible. Any items remaining after June 15 will be impounded by the military police.

Other facilities scheduled for closure this month are Mannheim Elementary School (Friday) and the community center located in Bldg. 2011 on Grant Circle (June 29).

Access to BFV-South (after June 15) must be arranged by contacting the Provost Marshal Office at DSN 388-2222, civ. 06221-338-2222.

The Heidelberg Community and Spouses Club Thrift Shop is scheduled to open in its new location 2 p.m. June 7 in Bldg. 4455 on Patrick Henry Village in Heidelberg.

The new thrift shop will comprise of six uninhabited stairwell apartments that are in the final stages of renovation. The walls will be kept intact, and the old rooms will house various items, including a media room with DVDs and books, a section for consigners to sort their items, clothing departments and more.

The reemergence of the thrift store has been well-received by the U.S. Army Garrison Baden-Württemberg community, said bookkeeper Matt Hunt.

"The only reason

we're here is because of the feedback from the community saying they wanted the thrift store to stay," Hunt said.

"I was one of the people who wanted it to stay open if it was possible. It was a huge topic in the whole community. Some were torn; some didn't want to go through the move, but it all came together in the end." Hunt added.

VIETNAM VISIT

The past, present and future came together Monday during a meeting between Defense Secretary Leon E. Panetta and Vietnamese Defense Minister Gen. Phuong Quang Thanh in Vietnam. The men used the shared history of the United States and Vietnam to assess the status of military-to-military relations between the nations and chart the future of the partnership. The past was represented by the two men exchanging artifacts of the Vietnam War - the diary of a Vietnamese soldier and letters written by American service members. The present was represented by Panetta's historic visit vesterday to an American ship being repaired by Vietnamese workers in Cam Ranh Bay. The future was represented by plans made to broaden and deepen defense cooperation between the two nations. Panetta said the relationship between the two nations is based on mutual trust and understanding.

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To screen or not to screen:

What men should know about screening for prostate cancer

Did you know that the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force does not recommend prostate cancer screening for all men?

If you don't know the latest information about prostate cancer screening, you are not alone. Many men don't.

This article will help you understand more about the latest information on prostate cancer screening and help you discuss this issue with your health care provider.

What are the latest recommendations for prostate cancer screening?

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, there is currently no scientific agreement on the best way to prevent prostate cancer, and there is not enough supporting evidence to recommend screening in all men.

The USPSTF has concluded that the current medical evidence is insufficient to compare the benefits and harms of prostate cancer screening in men younger than age 75.

The USPSTF also recommends against screening

for prostate cancer in men age 75 or older.

What is prostate cancer?

Prostate cancer is made up of cells that do not grow normally. The cells divide and create new cells that the body does not need, forming a mass of tissue called a tumor. These abnormal cells can sometimes spread to other parts of the body, multiply and cause death.

What causes prostate cancer?

As with many types of cancer, medical experts do not know what causes prostate cancer. They are studying several possible causes.

Who is at increased risk for prostate cancer?

While all men are at risk for prostate cancer, some factors increase risk:

- •Family history. Men with a father or brother who has had prostate cancer are at greater risk for developing it themselves.
- •Race. Prostate cancer is more common in some racial and ethnic groups than in others, but medical experts do not know why. Prostate cancer is more common in African-American men than in white men. And, African-American men with prostate cancer are more likely to die from the disease than white men. It is less common in Hispanic, Asian, Pacific Islander and Native American men than in white men.
- •Age. The prevalence of prostate cancer increases rapidly after age 40.

Can prostate cancer be prevented?

Medical experts do not know how to prevent prostate cancer. But they are studying many factors. They do know that not smoking, maintaining a healthy diet, staying physically active and seeing your doctor regularly contribute to overall good health.

What does "screening" mean?

Screening means looking for signs of disease in people who have no symptoms. So screening for prostate cancer is looking for early-stage disease.

The main screening tools for prostate cancer are the digital rectal examination and the prostate specific antigen blood test.

However, the DRE and PSA test cannot tell if you have cancer; they can only suggest the need for further tests.

Many factors like age, race, certain medical procedures, an enlarged prostate or a prostate infection can affect PSA levels.

Because of the uncertainty about prostate cancer screening, the CDC recommends that men discuss prostate screening with their health care provider.

Every man needs balanced information on the pros and cons of prostate cancer to help him make an informed decision about screening.

"Mihaela, we received the following information from the BW Safety Office: In accordance with German Traffic Law, a child must be 5 feet tall and over 48 lbs. to sit in the front. All children regardless of age and weight if under 5 feet must sit in the rear. If all the rear seats are occupied with a child, then a child may sit in the front seat in the appropriate child safety seat or booster seat (approved by manufacturer for front seat installation). If it is an infant (less than 20 lbs.), then the seat must be rear-facing. In all

cases, the airbag must be turned off. The safety office recommend that the largest child be placed in the front seat, and only when all other rear seats are occupied with smaller children. For further information, you may contact the USAG BW Safety Office at DSN 373-5277, civ. 06221-17-5277."

U.S. Army in Europe members, allies gather across five nations to salute sacrifices of fallen service members

More than 200 Soldiers from units across the U.S. Army in Europe joined with U.S. Air Forces in Europe elements and members of allied forces in honoring America's past and present commitments to its European allies and partners at a dozen Memorial Day events in five nations.

USAREUR supported ceremonies in Belgium, France, Italy, Luxembourg and the Netherlands with senior leaders, chaplains, color guards, buglers and the USAREUR Band, while USAFE and allied pilots and air crews conducted flyovers in A-10, F-15 and C-130 aircraft at each event.

USAREUR Commander Lt. Gen. Mark Hertling and his wife, Sue, participated in the first event, at the Luxembourg American Cemetery in Hamm, Luxembourg, May 26.

The Hertlings were joined by Luc Frieden, Minister for Finances of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg; Robert A. Mandell, U.S. Ambassador to the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg; Darrel Dorgan, commissioner to the American Battle Monuments Commission and an audience of about 3,000 participants.

The general gave the keynote address for the ceremony, which also included the laying of 20 memorial wreaths and Luxembourg citizens adorning each of the cemetery's 5,061 graves with a U.S. and Luxembourg flag and a single red rose.

The following day, the Hertlings traveled to the Netherlands American Cemetery at Margraten, where the general gave the keynote address at a ceremony at which more than 10,000 people gathered to honor American and allied Soldiers who died in World War II

The USAREUR Band provided 30 musicians, who joined 35 Soldiers from U.S. Army Garrison Benelux in taking part in the event. While members of the

armed forces of numerous countries were represented in the audience, alongside ambassadors from five countries, representatives of royal families and government leaders, the vast majority of attendees were Dutch citizens from the towns surrounding the cemetery.

There is a special bond between local residents and the American Soldiers who died fighting there. Since the cemetery was created in November 1944, citizens have adopted and cared for each of its 8,301 graves. There is a waiting list to adopt graves, and a book by local author Peter Schrijvers published in March called, "The Margraten Boys: How a European Village Kept America's Liberators Alive," describes the relationship between the people of the region and American Soldiers and their families.

Some 400 miles away, Maj. Gen. Aundre Piggee, commander of USAREUR's 21st Theater Sustainment Command, joined some of the 21st's Soldiers and two D-Day veterans to lower the flags at the Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial overlooking Omaha Beach. Piggee gave the keynote speech and took part in laying memorial wreaths. The USAREUR Band provided an element for the ceremony, which also included a gun salute and the playing of taps. A reception attended by more than 1,000 followed the event, and USAREUR Soldiers had the opportunity to tour the famed D-Day sites at Sainte-Mere-Eglise and Carentan.

At the American cemeteries and memorials in Oise-Aisne, Lorraine and Brittany, France, USA-REUR Deputy Commander Mai, Gen, James Boozer Sr., USAREUR Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations (G3) Brig. Gen. Michael Bills and Brig. Gen. Mark Hendrix, commander of the 7th Civil Support Command, provided keynote addresses in ceremonies supported by USAREUR Soldiers from 21st TSC, 170th Infantry Brigade Combat Team and 2nd Cavalry Regiment.

Federal representatives from throughout France and prominent Americans, including the greatgrandson of former U.S. President Teddy Roosevelt, supported these events as well. Boozer and Bills called the ceremonies "highlights of their careers' and said they were incredibly humbled by the outpouring of support from French Soldiers and veterans and the empathy of French citizens.

Additionally, Brig. Gen. (P) James F. Pasquarette, director of the Army Comprehensive Soldier Fitness program at Fort Hood, Texas, took part in the ceremony at the largest American military cemetery in Europe, the Meuse-Argonne American Cemetery and Memorial in Romagne-Gesnes, France.

Obama announces military-to-civilian skills certification program

WASHINGTON - President Barack Obama announced Friday a new presidential initiative aimed at preparing service members for civilian employ-

Obama provided details about the military-to-civilian certification program during his visit to a Honeywell International Inc. plant in Golden Val-

"Let me tell you something: if you can save a life on the battlefield, you can save a life in an ambulance. If you can oversee a convoy or millions of dollars of assets in Iraq, you can help manage a supply chain or balance its books here at home," Obama said at the plant.

"If you can maintain the most advanced weapons in the world, if you're an electrician on a Navy ship, well, you can manufacture the next generation of advanced technology in our factories, like this one. If you're working on complex machinery, you should be able to take those skills and find a manufacturing job right here - right here at home.'

But unfortunately, Obama said, many returning veterans with such advanced skills "don't get hired simply because they don't have the civilian licenses or certifications that a lot of companies require."

At the same time, the president noted, business leaders often say they can't find enough workers with the skills necessary to fill open positions.

"Eighty percent of manufacturers say this, according to one survey," Óbama said. "So think about it we['ve] got all these openings and all these skilled veterans looking for work, and somehow they're missing

That doesn't make any sense, the president said, noting it's time to fix it.

The initiative will enable up to 126,000 service members to obtain civilian credentials and certifications in a number of high-demand industries, officials said.

"I applaud President Obama's initiative to help thousands of service members obtain industry-recognized certifications for the trade skills they have learned and worked hard to master while in uniform," Defense Secretary Leon E. Panetta said in a state-

The Defense Department has created a military credentialing and licensing task force as part of the initiative, officials said. It developed partnerships with major manufacturing credentialing agencies to expand certifications to active duty military personnel in the fields of engineering, logistics, maintenance and welding.

'Supported by the efforts of the Defense Department's military credentialing and licensing task force, these certifications will give our returning troops a leg up in a competitive job market, and they will make it easier for veterans to transition to civilian life," Panetta said.

Service members can earn these credentials free of charge.

The services will also explore how credentialing opportunities can be integrated into existing military training programs and expanded to include everyone with relevant skills and training, the officials said.

The initiative was developed in response to a report on veterans' employment by the President's Council of Economic Advisers and the National Economic Council.

The report, Military Skills for America's Future: Leveraging Military Service and Experience to Put Veterans and Military Spouses Back to Work, describes the difficulties faced by veterans and military spouses in transitioning their military experience to civilian employment.

Three such partnerships will begin this summer, the officials said.

"Going forward, the president and I will remain committed to addressing the full range of challenges our troops and their families face as they leave the service, and to making sure that these men and women have the support they so richly deserve," Panetta said in his statement.

"They are a national asset, and they stand ready to continue making our country great in their civilian careers."

Saber Strike demonstrates international cooperation

Saber Strike is a U.S. Army Europe-led, multi-national exercise scheduled for June 10-22 at multiple training areas in Estonia and Latvia.

The exercise promotes regional stability and security, strengthens international military partnering and fosters trust while improving interoperability between participating nations.

"This is a great way for us to train together before we deploy and operate together," said Col. Bill Williams, director of Training and Exercises for USAREUR.

Williams emphasized the Latvian, Estonian and Lithuanian militaries have all contributed greatly to the International Security Assistance Force, Kosovo Force missions and other international operations.

Saber Strike 2012 involves about 2,000 personnel from eight countries. This, the second year of the Saber Strike exercise program, is part of an ongoing cooperative training effort primarily focused on the three nations of the Baltic States: Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia.

This exercise prepares partici-

pants to operate successfully in a joint, multinational, integrated environment with host-nation support from civil and governmental agencies.

Saber Strike 2012 will consist of situational training exercises and a field training exercise at the Adazi training area, Latvia.

A command post exercise will be conducted at various sites in Estonia, including one near Tapa. Other participants include Canada, Finland, France and the United Kingdom.

Units from USAREUR include the 21st Theater Sustainment Command, the 2nd Cavalry Regiment and the Pennsylvania Army National Guard, which will fly a company of Strykers into Latvia.

The Michigan Air National Guard is participating with KC-135 and A-10 aircraft providing close air support. An infantry company of the 4th Marine Division will also be there, and a Joint Terminal Air Controller team from the Washington Air National Guard.

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the state partnership program between the Michigan Air National Guard and Latvia.

Renowned foreign composers, including Roger Boutry and Derek Bourgois, have had their works by the Royal Chapel Music Van de Gidsen played and recorded to CD.

The real appeal of the band, however, is the Belgian music which was composed specifically for this kind of orchestra.

In the autumn of 1832, Jean-Valentin Bender was an accomplished clarinetist and conductor with the

music corps of the 1st Belgian line regiment.

Belgian King Leopold I personally commissioned a military band, which would accompany the changing of the guard at the royal guard battalion musical.

As the music corps of 1 Gidsen Regiment often accompanied the royal family in their travels abroad, it was awarded the honorary title of 'barge Muziekkapel of de Koning," or "special band of the king."

Since its inception, the band has enjoyed increasing popularity. In 1985, Norbert Nozy, himself an internationally renowned saxophonist, became conductor of the orchestra.

Through his many concerts at home and abroad, as well as television appearances, he has boosted the prestige of the orchestra.

In March 2008 Lieutenant Yves Segers became conductor of the orchestra harmony.

Belgian soldiers in Heidelberg

- ◆1952: Central Army Group Europe was formed. In the beginning, CENTAG was intended as a planning staff that worked with U.S. Army Europe at Campbell Barracks in Heidelberg.
- ◆1959: CENTAG became an official NATO headquarters and was operational Oct. 1, 1960.
- ◆1960: The first Belgian soldiers came to Heidelberg to serve with the ACE Mobile Force Land. The AMF-L was a multinational brigade that worked in association with land and air forces and served during the Cold War as a rapid intervention force. Participating nations were the United States, Great Britain, Canada, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands, Luxembourg and Germany. In the event of an attack by the Warsaw Pact countries, this group would immediately organize a counter-attack, which would demonstrate the solidarity of the nations involved in the alliance.
- ◆1993: Allied Land Forces Central Europe was launched. Seven countries (Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Germany, the Netherlands, the United Kingdom and the United States) participated and provided the staffing. Belgium was represented by 23 officers and 76 NCOs and soldiers.
- ◆2002: The Association dissolved and some of the Belgian soldiers were integrated into the Central Joint Headquarters.
- ◆2012: There are currently 380 soldiers from 23 nations serving with Allied Force Command Heidelberg. The headquarters is able to perform land force operations across the spectrum of NATO. American Lt. Gen. John W. Morgan III has served as commander since May 5, 2010.
- ◆2013: Allied Force Command will close in Heidelberg as part of structural reform of NATO.



Dear Ms. Vicki,

I'm writing because I am so disgusted with my 18-year-old son and his recent decision to join the Army instead of going to college like we have always planned for him. College was his plan too; it's not like we were forcing him to go. This is disgusting, because my son has said he wanted to go to college since he was 6 or 7. It's disheartening because we saved money for him to go to college. How did I go to college? Well, I needed student loans, grants and a few scholarships, too. When I graduated with my Master of Business, I was loaded with student loan debt.

We didn't want our children to have to face the hardship of going to college like we did. His father and I have worked hard to make life easier for our children. His father (my husband) was in the Army four years and went to Iraq during Operation Desert Storm. One enlistment was enough. It wasn't the life we wanted for our family. Even during the '90s, we knew the Army was full of warmongers. Just look at where we are today. We have wars going on in Iraq and Afghanistan, even though we supposedly have no ground troops in Iraq anymore. It's still a war there to me.

I just don't want my son involved in anything like this. He can do much better than the Army. He doesn't need the Army to pay for college, to give him leadership skills or experience or to make a man out of him. His father has been the perfect role model for him.

I just can't support this decision, and it's driving some distance between me and my son. I can't talk to him without crying, and the crying turns into arguments. I'm even arguing with my husband, because I think we should have moved far away from this military town, where these parents talk their sons and daughters into joining the Army. They think that life has nothing better to offer than enlisting in the Army. The military life is not the life I wanted for my son. I don't want him deploying and fighting for our country.

To be honest, I don't even believe in the wars we are fighting. Everything was based on an out-right lie, so why should I support my son doing something I don't believe in? My son is not deployed, he hasn't gone to boot camp and he hasn't even finished the enlistment process. However, when I look globally, I know it's just a matter of time until my son will be deployed, too.

We have spoken to our pastor, and it didn't do any good. My son will not relent from his position. He has his final Military Entrance Processing appointment in two weeks. He will have a swearing in ceremony and leave

for boot camp the same day. I need some advice on how to stop my son from joining the Army before it's too late.

Reservations about Enlistment **Dear Enlistment**,

The only thing I can say is that I understand your concerns for your son. Your husband served our country for a short time, but I think it's different when it's your child who is leaving for boot camp. Well, it sounds like your son has already made up his mind about joining the Army. I'm saddened because his enlistment has caused some distance and frequent arguments. While I understand your concerns, I think your son needs your support now. From your report, you have raised a good young man who has many options on the course of life he wants to take. The Army appears to be the most viable option to him, and he will join with or without your blessing. Because of this, I think you should ask your son his reasons for wanting to join. It will be good for you to hear what his goals are.

I know as parents, we sometimes plan our children's lives and set goals for them. However, he is 18, and it's normal and natural for him to have goals and dreams of his own.

I also wanted to respectfully say that your tone appears to be condescending of service members. It's like you are saying they aren't good enough or smart enough to do anything else with their lives, so they joined the Army. This is false. I only know smart, bright, intelligent service members of all ranks, from private to general. They are well-educated and most have higher education; they are well-trained and have many skills, too. Besides, you have to understand that you are writing your letter to a proud

Army spouse.

Let me refer you to a resource that may help and give you some insight. Blue Star Moms (www.bluestarmoms. org) are mothers who share pride, devotion and worries for our sons and daughters currently serving in the Armed Forces of the United States, and for the sons and daughters who are now veterans. They have chapters across the country, and their support would be very beneficial to you. There are many other websites as well.

I wish you and your family all the best, and especially your son with his future Army endeavors. Feel free to keep in touch.

MRSA may be transmitted in workplace

Methicillin-Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus is a potentially dangerous type of staph bacteria that is resistant to certain antibiotics.

It typically causes skin infection but can also affect the bloodstream, lungs, heart, bones and joints.

MRSA is transmitted most frequently by direct skin-to-skin contact or contact with shared items or surfaces that have come into contact with someone else's infection (for example, towels, used bandages and equipment).

Q: Am I at risk of getting MRSA from someone at

A. Some workplace settings have risk factors that make it easier to transmit MRSA. These factors, referred to as the five Cs, are as follows:

- Crowding
- ◆Frequent skin-to-skin contact
- *Compromised skin (like cuts or abrasions)
- Contaminated items and surfaces
- Lack of cleanliness

Q. How can I prevent MRSA infections? A. Practice good hygiene:

*Wash your hands thoroughly with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer. Shower immediately after working out on gym equipment.

- •Cover your wound. Keep cuts and scrapes clean and covered with a bandage until healed.
- •Do not touch. Avoid contact with other people's wounds or bandages.
- •Do not share personal items. Avoid sharing personal items that touch bare skin, like towels, razors, uniforms and personal protective equipment.
- Q. What should I do if I think I have a MRSA infection?
- A. See your health care provider and follow your health care provider's advice about returning to work.
 - Q. I have MRSA. Can I go to work?
- A. Unless directed by a health care provider, employees with MRSA infections should not be routinely excluded from going to work. Exclusion from work should be reserved for those with wound drainage ("pus") that cannot be covered

and contained with a clean, dry bandage and for those who cannot maintain good hygiene practices. Employees with active infections should be excluded from activities where skin-to-skin contact with the affected skin area is likely to occur, until their infections are healed.

Q. What should I do if I suspect that my uniform, clothing, personal protective equipment or workstation has become contaminated with MRSA?

A. Wash uniforms, clothing, sheets and towels that become soiled in a washing machine set to the hottest water setting (with added bleach, if possible). Dry the washed items in a hot dryer, rather than air-drying.

Cleaning contaminated equipment and surfaces with detergent-based cleaners or Environmental Protection Agency-registered disinfectants is effective at removing MRSA from the environment. The EPA provides a list of EPA-registered products effective against MRSA.

Manager Marion Fry said recently, her phone has rung throughout the day with volunteers and workers wanting to know if they could help, something that didn't surprise her.

"Everyone was calling looking for projects, asking, 'What can I do?' Really now, we're just working on the final touches," Fry said.

First Sgt. Tony A. Hockensmith, USAG Baden-Württemberg Headquarters and Headquarters Company, and a crew of some half-dozen Soldiers helped pack and move three truckloads of thrift stop merchandise, equipment and materials, Hunt said.

Hockensmith said he was glad to help.

"The Thrift Store is truly one of those 'value added' services that go to better the quality of life here in Heidelberg," Hockensmith said.

"The Spouse's Club has

harnessed the back-home feeling in their store. They go out of their way to welcome you into the store and talk with you, letting you know that [they] have that item you were looking for on your last visit.

"Their commitment to the community made it easy for us to say yes, when they asked for some help," Hockensmith added.

The thrift shop will start accepting donations and consignments again until 6 p.m. June 7, with the shop closing 7 p.m. that day.

The shop's grand reopening is 10:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m. June 9, and customers are welcome to enjoy barbecue provided by HCSC, Fry said.

The old location, adjacent to the PHV Theater, closed May 19. It will be renovated into a consolidated postal service office, which is scheduled to open Oct. 1, said Ivor Watson, director of human resources during a USAG Baden-Württemberg town hall

meeting in the Village Pavilion Community Center on PHV May 3.

The new thrift shop will be across from the Recycling Center.

The thrift shop's mission is to provide a place where personal goods may be sold for the mutual benefit of seller and buyer. The activities of the thrift shop are governed by applicable HCSC bylaws and the thrift shop's standard operating procedures.

The thrift shop takes 30 percent of the selling price of consigned items that sell within 90 days. The profits go back into the community through the HCSC Welfare Account, much of which go toward scholarships.

The remaining profit goes toward operating costs and salaries for the eight paid staffers, Fry said. There are currently 10 regular volunteers.

Items that do not sell or are not collected by the consigner become thrift shop property.

Clients may consign up to four items per category, or a maximum of 16 items per day, minus anything on the weekly exclusion list of merchandise the thrift store has an abundance of. The exclusion list may be found on the thrift shop's website at www.hcsc-heidelberg.com/thriftshop.html.

Those on Permanent Change of Station orders may turn in up to 32 items and do not have to follow the exclusion list.

Donations are also welcome, Fry added.

The thrift shop is open 10:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m. Tuesday, Wednesday, 2-7 p.m. Thursday and 10:30 a.m.-2:30 p.m. first and third Saturdays, with consignments accepted until an hour prior to closing.

The thrift shop is closed during Department of Defense Dependents School breaks and on HCSC luncheon days.
