## **Coleman Clinic to transition June 1**

The Coleman Troop Medical Clinic in Mannheim will cease full patient care services June 1 and transition to sick call support beginning June 4.

The reduction in services for Soldiers supporting Coleman Barracks is part of the Army's overall transformation process in Europe and began with the closure of the dental clinic May 1.

Beginning in June, Soldiers assigned to the Coleman TMC will be automatically enrolled at the Heidelberg Health Center.

Pharmacy services will also transition to the health center, although officials are looking to keep a small supply of non-prescription, overthe-counter medications such as Motrin and cold packs available to dispense at Coleman as necessary. The sick call sign-in hours at Coleman TMC beginning June 4 will be 8 – 9:30 a.m. The sick call service will be reassessed on a monthly basis to determine continuation based on use.

#### **HELPING MILITARY VETS**

Americans must remember the sacrifices made on their behalf and reinforce those memories with action, Defense Department leaders said at the Memorial Day observance in Washington, D.C., Monday. ## Understanding the Uniformed Services Former Spouses' Protection Act: addressing common misconceptions

Congress passed the Uniformed Services Former Spouses' Protection Act in 1982, which allowed state courts to treat military retired pay as marital property in divorce cases if the state chose to do so.

Another provision of the USFSPA established procedures by which a former spouse could receive all of or a portion of the court ordered retired pay division as a direct payment from the military's Defense Finance and Accounting Services.

Despite being in existence for about 30 years, there are still many misconceptions in the military and retired communities about the act. The USFSPA does not direct state courts to divide military retired pay; it merely permits them to do so.

Thus, state law must always be considered when a divorce potentially involves a retired military pay division issue. The way an Alabama court treats the division of the military pension may differ from the way the same case would be handled in California. Federal law also stipulates that only "disposable" military retirement pay may be divided.

Disposable military retired pay is gross monthly retired pay minus cer-

tain authorized deductions.

These deductions include forfeitures and other debts owed to the government and disability pay, but not federal or state income tax withholding amounts.

Moreover, understanding the distinction in the USFSPA between the provision that authorizes a state court to divide military retired pay and the provision that allows direct payment of divided retired pay to a former spouse is essential.

Two common misconceptions about the USFSPA are that the parties must have been married at least 10 years for the former spouse to become eligible for any division of the retired pay or that upon 10 years of marriage, which overlaps with 10 years of military service, the spouse is entitled to 50 percent of the retired pay. Both of these misconceptions are incorrect. Only the state of Alabama requires a marriage of 10 year's duration before dividing military retired pay under the USFSPA.

And while there are several different formulas states use to divide military retired pay, a 10-year marriage would likely result in the former spouse being awarded around 25 percent of the retired pay in most circumstances.

The USFSPA does have a 10-year

marriage rule, but this relates to the ability of the former spouse to receive direct payment of his or her portion of the military retired pay from DFAS.

To qualify for direct payment from DFAS, the state court order must be in a format recognized by DFAS, and the former spouse must have been married to the service member during at least 10 years of the member's service creditable for retired pay.

Generally it is in a former spouse's interest to provide the necessary court orders to DFAS to receive direct payment. That way the spouse is sure of the monthly payment and need not keep track of the retiree or wait for the retiree to send the monthly payment.

The USFSPA also stipulates that DFAS may not send more than 50 percent of the service member's disposable retired pay as a direct payment, unless there are additional garnishments for alimony or child support due to the former spouse. Then up to 65 percent of the service member's disposable pay may be sent to the former spouse as a direct payment. These percentage provisions of the USFSPA do not mean the former spouse is limited to these percentages in all cases.

Since state courts use state law to determine the amount of retired pay

to which a former spouse may be entitled, a state court could order a service member's entire military retired pay go to a former spouse.

In that situation, DFAS would send the previously provided percentages, and the former spouse would have to make other arrangements, such as direct payment from the retired service member for the remaining portion of the retired pay.

When more than one spouse has been awarded division of the retired pay, payments are handled on a firstcome, first-served basis by DFAS.

Also, remarriage of the former spouse does not affect the former spouse's right to the court-ordered division of the retired pay or direct payment from DFAS.

Finally, DFAS only recognizes U.S. state court orders. All foreign court orders, including those from German courts, would have to be recognized by a U.S. court or issued as a U.S. state court order to be honored by DFAS.

In many divorces involving service members and their spouses, military retired pay may be the most important property that could be divided between the parties.

Understanding the USFSPA is critical to both service members and spouses.

### Welcome to the viper pit: Bundeswehr, German police learn CLS

WIESBADEN - U.S. Army Europe Soldiers from the 421st Multifunctional Medical Battalion, 30th Medical Command, hosted a combat life saver course for Bundeswehr service members, NATO, Reserve units and German Polizei May 12. The CLS course was held at the "Viper Pit," a medical training facility in Wiesbaden.

The course teaches the basics of first aid and how it can be the difference between someone living or dying on the battlefield. The Viper Pit teaches combat life saver skills, allowing trainees to employ those skills in a room that simulates the most stressful conditions possible.

'[The Viper Pit] is a stress inoculation training center," said creator Staff Sgt. John Lacroix, a support operations staff and medical plans noncommissioned officer with the 421st MMB.

"Stress inoculation is basically [personnel] injecting threat stress scenarios into our training and then recreating them over and over again, making them increasingly more stressful."

In the Viper Pit, dummies with simulated wounds are situated across the floor of the dim, fog-laden room.

Trainees must crawl across the floor of the garage-sized room, with the sounds of gunfire, wailing sirens and instructors yelling commands through a megaphone; find their simulated patients, treat their wounds and bring them to safety.

Bundeswehr Reserve Oberleutnant (1st Lt.) Oliver Oswald worked with Lacroix to get the Bundeswehr involved with the training.

"It's incredible. It gives very good scenarios shown in a very small room under physiological pressure," Oswald said.

"It's not routine; you've got smoke, yelling, explosions and gunfire. It's not something you usually have in a normal CLS course or in a classroom."

Through the Viper Pit, the 421st MMB personnel take an unconventional approach to teaching combat life saving techniques.

"It's not a realistic scenario; it's just as many stressors as we can give them," Lacroix said. "We start off very

basic and then progress to increasingly more stressful scenarios.'

Lacroix added that following each scenario, trainees recap how they did and how to make it better next time.

Lacroix approached his battalion with the idea more than a year ago, and construction was completed in May 2011. Since November, Lacroix has trained more than 1,000 service members from eight major commands and three different countries.

"Our ultimate goal is to provide as much of a stressful environment as possible so they can mitigate that stress when they encounter the reallife stress of their fellow service members being injured," Lacroix said.

The \$22,000 facility is equipped

with several 180-pound dummies, fog machines, an infrared camera system and medical supplies, some of which were donated by service members and medical professionals.

'Since the Bundeswehr is part of NATO and also an allied partner of the United States, we have common missions together," Oswald said.

"It should be mandatory for us to have a common language on the mission, and that is what we found here. We can exchange positive and negative ideas every time we do training like

Even though Lacroix lead the training, Bundeswehr Leutnant (2nd Lt.) Lars Hönig, a medical student at the University Medical Center in Mainz, assisted and conducted a German basic emergency medical technician training on the last day.

"In places like Afghanistan, it's much harder than this," Hönig said.

"I think it's important to learn these techniques, to know what to do when someone is hurt, the medical procedures, to get used to the material.'

Training alongside allied nations ensures good relations for future missions and a mutual understanding, both on and off the battlefield.

"It's absolutely amazing training with the Bundeswehr. I learn something new from them every time," Lacroix said. "It's long training, but it's a good partnership, and I think that's right in line with [Lt.] Gen. [Mark] Hertling's intent for USAREUR part-

### 7th CSC supports international shooting competition

WACKERNHEIM - In partnership with the Reservistenkameradschaft (Association of Reservist of the German Armed Forces - RK Geisel), U.S. Army Reserve Soldiers from the 7th Civil Support Command in Kaiserslautern supported the 29th Annual Monte Kali Pokal shooting competition May 10-12.

The event was open to military units throughout NATO and other Partnership for Peace nations in the European community.

"The only other way would be in a wartime environment, and that may not be enough time to really learn how each weapon works," Kern added.

"We have invited Army members from all over Europe to participate in this yearly event," Kern said. "We are proud to have the 7th Civil Support Command assisting us for the first time this year."

The 7th CSC provided the range and the medical and range safety personnel.

We brought a small group of top caliber Soldiers with us to help out here," said Master Sgt. Greg Doles, the noncommissioned officer in charge of brigade operations for the 361st CA Bde. "We hope to bring calm to this friendly competition by offering our knowledge and experience of range safety."

Several tents were set up to display various weapons from several different countries, along with a military disc jockey playing music next to the simulated grenade range.

"This is a great event, and we are enjoying our day out here," Staff Sgt. David Barracks, a rifleman with the 177th Field Artillery Battalion in Schweinfurt, said on the first day of the event.

Barracks, along with three other members of his unit, participated in the Monte Kali competition.

"Although there are some really long lines to fire some of these weapons here, it is going very smoothly," Barracks said.

'We hope that we can place within the top five firing the Glock 17 from the Netherlands. But we will have to wait and see what happens."

Some military members used the opportunity to famil-

"I remember that I was deployed with the Spanish Army as well as the Americans, and I did not know anything about their weapons at the time ... now I do.

#### "With Clinic services closing, we have been told that we can get reimbursed for travel to doctor appointments that are very frequent in Landstuhl. Is that true? And if so, who do we contact about that?"

The Medical Travel Reimbursement Process is applicable to active duty service members and their dependents through a Competent Medical Authority statement. The CMA is a memorandum provided to an active duty service member or their dependent, which authorizes the reimbursement of funds for travel to a medical treatment facility outside of their permanent duty station. This is defined as a greater than 45-minute commute to a medical treatment facility to which a nationt has been referred for continuity of care. Actual cost of transportation use includes public transportation cost, or, if using a privately owned vehicle, gasoline, parking fees and other incurred expenses associated with travel for medical treatment. After completing the appointment at the MTF or civilian facility to which they were referred, patients can report to the Patient Administration in Bldg. 3613, Room 1047 with their paperwork and identification. Dependents of active duty Army or Air Force, enrolled in TRICARE Prime, will have their CMAs further processed here in the budget office of Heidelberg Medical Activity. Dependents of Marines or Sailors enrolled in TRICARE Prime, can proceed to the sponsor's unit for reimbursement. For more questions regarding Competent Medical Authority statements, call the Patient Affairs Office at DSN 371-3095, civ. 06221-17-3095.

## Where there's coffee, there's community

Inside the new Java Café at Kleber Kaserne, earthy smells of ground espresso brewing and sweet-smelling desserts entice customers as sounds of hot steaming frothy milk compliment blenders crushing ice and juice into smoothies. But the Java Cafés at U.S. Army Garrison Kaiserslautern are more than just places

for Soldiers, civilians and family members to sip coffee drinks and eat snacks. In the Kaiserslautern Military Community – the largest overseas U.S. military area – Java Cafés offer a place for the community to bond, said Kassi Piggee, spouse of the Kaiserslautern Military Community's senior Army leader.

"This is a way to bring us all together, into one place, to be able to socialize in fellowship and get to know each other, so we don't lose those bonds that we normally have at home," Piggee said. "We develop [our] own Army family here in the Kaiserslautern community."

Kleber's Java Café opened May 14 inside the recently renovated KMC Onstage – Kaiserslautern's award winning community theater program – which opened its production of "Dirty Rotten Scoundrels" with a free coffee drink of the same name.

Behind the counter on opening day, barista Dominique Coleman, 26, prepared frozen coffee lattes, finishing them with drizzled caramel over whipped cream. Already, customers expressed gladness over having a coffee shop at Kleber Kaserne, she said.

"They like the new renovations, they like that we have good coffee, they are impressed and amazed," Coleman said. "They are happy to not have to go very far for coffee."

Piggee, whose husband, Maj. Gen. Aundre Piggee, commands the 21st Theater Sustainment Command headquartered at Panzer Kaserne, said family members hoped to have such a place on the east side of Kaiserslautern. "I think this a good addition for the Kleber and Panzer community," Piggee said.

USAG Kaiserslautern is committed to improving the lives of service members and their families in the KMC, to include access to great coffee, said Lt. Col. Lars Zetterstrom, the garrison commander.

The garrison's Directorate of Family, Morale, Welfare and Recreation already established Java Cafés at Landstuhl Regional Medical Center and Rhine Ordnance Barracks. In the near future, wireless Internet will be available, he said.

"Now we have one in Kaiserslautern East, as part of the multi-purpose theater that we have here," Zetterstrom said. "It's a great place to relax and enjoy a delicious cup of coffee and something to eat while socializing with some of your comrades."

Also, in the fall, a Java Café will open at Sembach Kaserne, said Steve Pelletier, the garrison's Family and-MWR director. Last year, at the Army Family Action Plan conference, community members raised the issue of limited on-post eateries at Army posts in the east end of Kaiserslautern. The new Java Café helps respond to that community need, Pelletier said.

Java Cafés sport a theme and setting not unfamiliar to Americans who frequent popular coffee chains like Starbucks, Pelletier said. Java Café staff members go through specialized customer service training. On the job, baristas then learn to know customers by name and can start their orders without asking.



#### **Couple's House Blown Away**

A retired Bremerhaven couple who went to Berlin for the weekend returned to find their house gone. As their 68-year-old neighbor opened the door Sunday morning to check on the house and water the plants, the house exploded, burying him in rubble. Emergency services dug him out after hearing his calls for help, but he was seriously injured and was flown to Hamburg for treatment. Two children playing outside nearby were slightly hurt by flying debris but did not need hospital treatment. Authorities have launched an investigation, but it is thought a gas leak led to the enormous explosion sparked by the neighbor as he turned on a light. Several houses in the same row were also damaged by the explosion. The Bild newspaper reported Tuesday that the couple were staying in a nearby hotel and have been offered psychological counseling.

#### **Nazi War Criminal Dies At Large**

A Nazi war criminal who escaped from a Dutch jail in 1952 died Thursday at the age of 90 in Ingolstadt in Bavaria, it was confirmed Sunday. Klaas Carel Faber, a former member of the Nazi SS unit known as Silver Fir, had been originally sentenced to death by a Dutch court in 1947 and was second on the Simon Wiesenthal Center's list of Nazi criminals still at large. In 1957, a German court threw out all charges for lack of evidence, and Bavarian authorities said the Netherlands must produce new evidence before Faber could be arrested again, which they did in November 2010. Faber worked at Westerbork transit camp from 1943 to 1944, where Dutch schoolgirl Anne Frank, whose diary became world-famous, was held before being sent to her death at Bergen-Belsen concentration camp.

#### **Stair Climbing Champ Prevails**

Thomas Dold, a 27-year-old German man, beat 280 contestants from 15 countries Sunday in a stair climbing contest. Participants climbed 39 floors of Berlin's Hotel Park Inn. Dold, from the Black Forest, climbed 770 stairs in 3:39 minutes. He also climbed New York's Empire State Building's 1,050 stairs in 10:28 minutes. That was the 35th Annual "Empire State Building Run-Up," where Dold beat more than 700 competitors.

#### Dear Ms. Vicki,

I have a very important situation I would like to discuss with you, but I don't want my letter to appear in the paper. If I write you, can I remain anonymous, or will other people read the letter? Anonymous

#### Dear Anonymous,

I regularly get letters from people who wish to remain anonymous. It's your choice. However, the letters from those who want to remain anonymous are often more serious in nature, and the writer really needs help. I try to help as much as I can with advice and referrals to other resources, and I highly encourage you to seek other professional help, depending on the nature of your disclosure. I look forward to hearing from you soon.

#### Dear Ms. Vicki,

My husband is in trouble, and I hope you can tell me who we can go to for help before they put him out of the Army. If this happens, I just don't know what we will do. We would be destitute if this happens.

My husband hit his first sergeant about a month ago. This happened after more than a year of abuse by this first sergeant, who thinks he is God. The commanding officer lets him get away with it, too. I've asked the first sergeant to stop mistreating and harassing my husband, but he wouldn't. My husband has been denied leave and more, for no reason at all. This guy just doesn't like him. My husband finally hit his breaking point when they got into a shouting match, and my husband hit him.

My husband might face a courtmartial, and I don't think it's fair. I think his first sergeant is an outof-control maniac, but I don't want my husband to get out of the Army. It's all we have right now to support our family. I don't work, and I don't have an income of my own. I'm scared and can't believe this is happening. Both of our parents have problems of their own and can't help us. I hope you give me some advice on what to do.

### This Is Just Too Much Dear Too Much,

I truly regret this happened. From your report, the first sergeant continuously harassed your husband and finally pushed his last button. I've worked for some bullies before myself, and it's no picnic. However, the first sergeant has the law on his side right now, and it's your husband who is accused of violence.

Hopefully, your husband won't

be court-martialed, but he should be made aware of the legal action he is facing, and he should seek legal counsel. This will provide an opportunity for him to speak about his work environment.

Secondly, it sounds like you and your husband are experiencing a lot of financial and family stress right now. Anger management classes could help your husband, and stress management classes may help you both. I'm not blaming you, but we should embrace every opportunity for personal growth.

All the stress has built up, and the first sergeant's actions has helped exacerbate the problem. This is not totally placing the blame on your husband, but these classes should address assertiveness and communication skill building.

I also teach anger management classes. One lesson I give is, "We can only control ourselves, not the other person." Your husband has to take some responsibility.

I commend you for supporting him, and for your willingness to defend him, but it's not your responsibility to talk to the first sergeant. I hear you, but it's not your role.

Most first sergeants I know are very professional and place their Soldiers first. Also, most commanders I know have an open door policy for Soldiers to talk to them at any time. I regret this was not your husband's experience.

### Increased heart attack, stroke risk for diabetics

Heart disease and strokes are the number one causes of death and disability among people with Type 2 diabetes.

In fact, at least 65 percent of people with diabetes die from some form of heart disease or stroke, and adults with diabetes are two to four times more likely to have heart disease or a stroke than adults without diabetes.

The American Heart Association considers diabetes as one of six major controllable risk factors for cardiovascular disease. Diabetes is treatable, but even when glucose levels are under control, it greatly increases the risk of heart disease and stroke.

That's because people with diabetes, particularly Type 2, often have the following conditions that contribute to their risk for developing cardiovas-

cular disease:

•Hypertension, or high blood pressure, has long been recognized as a major risk factor for cardiovascular disease. Studies report a positive association between hypertension and insulin resistance. When patients have both hypertension and diabetes, which is common, their risk for cardiovascular disease doubles.

•Abnormal Cholesterol and high triglycerides. Patients with diabetes often have unhealthy cholesterol levels including high LDL ("bad") cholesterol, low HDL ("good") cholesterol and high triglycerides.

This triad of poor lipid counts often occurs in patients with premature coronary heart disease. It is also characteristic of a lipid disorder associated with insulin resistance called atherogenic dyslipidemia, or diabetic dyslipidemia in those patients with diabetes.

•Obesity is a major risk factor for cardiovascular disease and has been strongly associated with insulin resistance.

Weight loss can improve cardiovascular risk, decrease insulin concentration and increase insulin sensitivity. Obesity and insulin resistance also have been associated with other risk factors, including high blood pressure.

•Lack of physical activity is another modifiable major risk factor for insulin resistance and cardiovascular disease. Exercising and losing weight can prevent or delay the onset of Type 2 diabetes, reduce blood pressure and help reduce the risk for heart attack or stroke.

\*Poorly controlled blood sugars (too high) or out of normal range. Diabetes can cause blood sugar to rise to dangerous levels. Medications may be needed to manage blood sugar. •Smoking puts individuals, whether or not they have diabetes, at high risk for heart disease and stroke.

Individuals with insulin resistance or diabetes in combination with one or more risk factors are more likely to fall victim to heart disease or stroke. However, by controlling these risk factors, diabetes patients may avoid or delay the development of heart and blood vessel disease

Your Primary Care Manager will do periodic testing to assess whether you have developed any of these risk factors associated with cardiovascular disease.

Lastly, make annual appointments and more often if needed with your PCM. The Heidelberg Health Center appointments line is DSN 371-2622, civ. 06221-16-2622.

# Army wrestler's one goal: gold medal from London

IOWA CITY, Iowa – U.S. Army World Class Athlete Program Greco-Roman wrestler Spc. Justin Lester has just one goal remaining on the mat.

"One goal and one goal only," Lester said. "An Olympic medal. Not even an Olympic medal; I need gold."

Lester, a five-time U.S. national champion and five-time U.S. world team member, will make his Olympic debut Aug. 7 in London. He will accept nothing less than getting his hand raised and hearing "The Star-Spangled Banner" played at the end of the day.

Lester, 28, a native of Akron, Ohio, who is stationed at Fort Carson, Colo., heads to England as USA Wrestling's reigning Greco-Roman Wrestler of the Year. That honor was bestowed upon Lester on the eve of his victory in the 66-kilogram or 145.5-pound finals of the 2012 U.S. Olympic Team Trials at Carver-Hawkeye Arena on the University of Iowa campus.

A two-time bronze medalist at the World Championships, Lester has more than ample motivation to succeed at the Olympics.

"I've had two bronze medals, and they're all right, but I need an Olympic gold medal," he said. "That's eating at me more than anything, that I don't have that gold medal."

Lester dedicated this mission to family members lost along his long journey.


In January 2007, Lester lost his grandmother, Savannah, and niece, ShawRica, within a 24-hour span. ShawRica, 18, was leaving a nightclub in Akron when she got caught in the crossfire of rival gangs.

"She was basically like my sister, because all of my siblings are much older," said Lester, the youngest of six children. "She was closer to being my sister than my actual sisters, so that was real hard. I was always close with [ShawRica and Savannah] growing up. We grew up in the same household. So I would like to accomplish this for both of them."

Lester still has plenty of family support. "My dad and my sister are at every tournament," he said. "They jump in the car and drive to wherever. If I have a tournament in California and they can't get a flight in time, they'll jump in the car. I can tell them two days before, and they'll drive straight out."

As if that is not incentive enough, Lester has still another reason to triumph in London.

"The only thing I can think about, honestly, since I've had my daughter, is taking a picture with my gold medal around her neck," Lester said of Zuriana, his 2-year-old daughter. "When it comes down to it, I know my daughter is everything to me.

"I think of giving everybody handshakes and hugs, and I'm sure there's going to be tons of crying, but the only thing I can picture out of everything is putting it around her and holding her up and walking her around. That's it."

Lester came close to competing in the 2008 Beijing Games, but he lost at the U.S. Olympic Team Trials to 18-year-old Jake Deitchler, the first high school wrestler to make the U.S. Olympic wrestling team in 32 years.

Deitchler has since retired from wrestling.

Lester, on the other hand, has been wrestling 21 years. He realizes that winning at the World Championships is considered more difficult than winning at the Olympics, where the fields are smaller but the pressure is immense.

"I've never been to an Olympics," Lester said. "I've heard the World Championships, competitionwise, is a harder tournament, but at the Olympics, you've got way more pressure on you. Obviously, the Olympics are more important to me. If they weren't, I wouldn't still be going. That's how I look at it."

The events were designed to celebrate the hard work the teachers do at CYSS, said Ellen Harris, CYS Services coordinator

"Our teachers are very talented, that undergo strict training and truly love working with kids," Harris said.

Each facility created journals for each teacher that parents could write notes in to thank their children's teacher

"Parents are recognizing teachers by writing notes thanking them for what they have done and what they mean to the children and parents," Harris said. "One parent even asked for extra sheets to write notes for teachers that have already moved away because they made such a difference in their life."

In addition to the journals, staff members were given certificates to leave work 59 minutes early and another signed by the garrison commander thanking them for their service to child care.

Each facility also hosted a luncheon for their staff, Broccoli said.

With more than 400 children in regular full-time child care and several thousand more that are in part-time, hourly or sports programs spread from Miesau to Sembach Kaserne, the CYSS staff spends a lot of hours with the Kaiserslautern Military Community children, Harris said.

"The time, effort and care our staff put into their jobs is awe-inspiring," Harris said. "They do make a difference in their lives."
