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
EDUCATION EXPENSES

The Defense Department is again working with the federal Consumer Financial Protection Bureau to help service members with their highereducation expenses. Defense Secretary Leon E. Panetta and Holly Petraeus, the bureau's assistant director for service members' concerns, announced they are starting a training program for judge advocate general personnel, personal financial managers and education service officers. The training is to spread information about the benefits and consumer protections service members are afforded under the Service Members Civil Relief Act, including interest rate reductions, loan deferral programs, principal reduction options on certain loans for service in hostile areas and loan forgiveness on certain federal loans for public service. The announcement came as the bureau released a report outlining the unique obstacles service members report in trying to pay off student loan debt, such as not being able to get the information they need and hitting roadblocks when pursuing benefits. Last spring, President Barack Obama signed an executive order cracking down on colleges and universities that prey on service members, their families and veterans www.defense.gov

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Landstuhl medics aid injured woman

As part of U.S. Army Garrison Baden-Württemberg's ongoing transformation efforts, the Self Service Supply Center in Bldg. 1536 on Spinelli Barracks in Mannheim permanently closed its doors Oct. 12.

"Other stores in Europe are closing as part of a USAREUR [U.S. Army Europe]- directed initiative to provide SSSC items as an online ordering service with free delivery to the customers," said Tony Cross, the SSSC redesign project lead.

SSSC are stores where Government Purchase Card holders can purchase office supplies, cleaning materials, computer accessories and other items needed on a day-to-day basis and during pre-and-post deployment operations, Cross said.

Current SSSC closures throughout the Army will help save taxpayers about \$3 to \$4 million annually in operating costs, with about \$1.5 million of that in U.S. Army Europe alone, Cross said.

An estimated 1200 GPC customers (both Air Force and Army) across Europe can now purchase directly from The Exchange's [also known as the Army and Air Force Exchange Service] Warehouse Ordering Web System, which is the preferred method, Cross said.

The Kaiserslautern SSSC, the largest within Europe, is expected to remain open through 2013, and will be

Soldiers assist victim after early-morning car accident

Sounds of a crashing car startled three Soldiers as they ran up the steep Kirchberg hillside just west of Landstuhl Oct. 1.

Tires screeched and metal crunched in the valley below, where Saarbrücker Straße heads toward Haupstuhl under Autobahn 62's massive highway overpass. Sgt. Roger Adame turned to fellow combat medic

Sgt. Joe Campbell and helicopter crew chief Spc. Ŵill Taylor.

"Let's get down there, right away," Adame told Campbell. "Maybe's there's something we can do to pitch in and help out.

They sprinted down the hillside to find people gathering at the scene, although no one seemed to know what to do, Campbell said. The Soldiers, however, got to work.

The driver, a Ger-

man woman in her early twenties, felt neck pain and had cuts on her hands. Taylor, a former firefighter, set up warning triangles and waved off traffic.

From the rear seat, Campbell reached forward and stabilized the woman's spine. The driver's door was impeding crushed, his ability to check further. Adame, who served downrange with Campbell during their see **MEDICS** page 9

COMPUTER SAFETY MESSAGE

Take precautions when using public networks

Most Wi-Fi hotspots do not encrypt information sent, are not secure

If you use a public, unsecured network to log into an unencrypted website – or a site that uses encryption only on the signin page – other users on the network can see what you see and what you send.

These users could then hijack your browsing session and

even log in as you.

New hacking tools (available free online) make this easy, even for users with limited technical knowhow.

Your personal information, private documents, contacts, family photos and even your login credentials could be up for grabs.

An imposter could use your account to impersonate you and scam people you care about. Your personal information, private documents, contacts, family photos and even your login credentials could be up for grabs. An imposter could use your account to impersonate you and scam people you care about.

In addition, a hacker could test your user name and password to try to gain access to other websites – including sites that store your financial information.

If the network at a location like a hotel requires a password to be used, is it safer?

Wi-Fi hotspots in coffee shops, libraries, airports, hotels, universities and other public places are convenient, but they're often not secure.

When using a hotspot, it's best to send information only to websites that are fully encrypted.

You can be confident a hotspot is secure only if it asks you to provide a Wi-Fi Protected Access password. If you're not sure, treat the network as if it is unsecured.

When using a Wi-Fi hotspot, only log in or send personal information to websites that you know are fully encrypted (HTTPS.)

To be secure, your entire visit to each site should be encrypted, from the time you log in to the site until you log out. If you think you're logged in to an encrypted site, but find yourself on an unencrypted page, log out right away.

Don't stay signed in to accounts. When you've finished using an account, log out.

Don't use the same password on different sites. It could give someone who gains access to one of your

accounts access to many of your accounts. Many web browsers alert users who try to visit fraudulent websites or download malicious programs. Pay attention to these warnings, and keep your browser and security software up to date.

If you regularly access online accounts through Wi-Fi hotspots, use a virtual private network. VPNs encrypt traffic between your computer and the Internet, even on unsecured networks.

You can obtain a personal VPN account from a VPN service provider. In addition, some organizations create VPNs to provide secure, remote access for their employees.

Some Wi-Fi networks use encryption. Wired Equivalent Privacy and WPA are the most common; WPA2 is the strongest.

WPA encryption protects your information against common hacking programs. WEP may not.

If you aren't certain that you are on a WPA network, use the same precautions as on an unsecured network.

Installing browser add-ons or plug-ins can help. There are add-ons available – some for free – that force a browser to use encryption on popular sites that usually aren't encrypted.

Look for "https" in the URL to know a site is secure.

Women's Care Center offers U.S. no-referral appointments first '

LANDSTUHL REGIONAL MEDICAL CENTER

The Women's Care Center at Landstuhl Regional Medical Center provides health services and screenings to all eligible women: active duty, civilian, family members, retirees and contractors without a referral.

WCC providers are specifically trained to address routine well woman care as well as female gynecological concerns.

The WCC is an open clinic; therefore, no referral is necessary to receive an appointment. All women who are Department of Defense ID cardholders are eligible for care.

The WCC is staffed with one civilian board-certified gynecologist, two active duty Air Force certified women's health nurse practitioners, one civilian certified nurse midwife, three civilian nurses, one civilian administrative assistant and one active duty Air Force Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge. Common medical issues that can be addressed, managed and followed by WCC providers include:

• annual well woman examinations (to include cervical cancer and breast cancer screening)

- birth control counseling
 - menopause therapy
- menstrual disorders
- postpartum care

 Pap smear follow-up The WCC is located in the main LRMC building adjacent

to Family Practice in Wing 1F. The WCC also has a separate outside entrance, a private check-in desk, an independent

waiting area and an individual appointment line phone number. For patient convenience, a

parking lot is located right outside the WCC entrance. The WCC is open 7:30 a.m. -

noon and 1-4:30 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

U.S. Army Europe officials host first 'Women's Forum' in Heidelberg

Members of U.S. Army Europe hosted the command's first-ever Women's Forum, entitled "Sitting at the Table," at the Village Pavilion Community Center on Patrick Henry Village in Heidelberg, Oct. 11.

"This conference is about the transition to the future and the addressing of issues that have to do with a large percentage of our force," said USAREUR Commanding General, Lt. Gen. Mark Hertling. "Women sometimes don't feel their voice is being heard, so this conference was an opportunity for them to speak and for us, as a command, to listen."

"This is a first for USAREUR," said Installation Management Command-Europe Director, Kathleen Marin. "It's a forum where women, who are military, civilian and family members, have come together and talked out issues that are particular concerns to women.

"What I have found very interesting about this is the universality of a lot of the issues between civilians, family members and military, but also generationally," Marin said.

The women who attended the forum discussed issues that have caused them problems in their work places, in the hopes of making changes and bringing attention to the problems that still persist.

"Frankly, I thought a lot of these issues had been dealt with and I am finding that some of the younger women are still dealing with some of the same issues [and] things that I dealt with 20 years ago," Marin said.

During the forum, the participants discussed women in the military, career planning, single and divorced parenting, violence directed against women, leadership and effective communication.

"I think the best thing I will take out of this is some self-reflection," said 18th Military Police Brigade Senior Enlisted Advisor, Command Sgt. Maj. Brenda Curfman. "I want to take the things that I've learned and do some self-reflection, to ensure that I am passing on things that will help my Soldiers, enlisted, officers and civilians, to avoid some of the obstacles that I went through and give them good advice and guidance," Curfman said.

NEW – "I heard that civilian employees can sign up early for the Priority Placement Program. What type of program is this, and how do I sign up for it?"

The Priority Placement Program is an automated mandatory placement program that is used when Reduction in Force Notices are issued. It matches eligible well-qualified employees, most of whom are subject to displacement, with vacant Department of Defense positions. It also enables the department to maintain a relatively stable work force during RIF and other displacement actions, and minimizes the adverse effect of these actions on employees. The commander may authorize registration for PPP up to one year prior to the effective date of the RIF. The garrison is scheduled to close **Sept. 30**, **2013**, and early PPP registration was authorized **Oct. 1**, **2012**. RIF letters are scheduled to be issued **April 1**, **2013**. Once this occurs, registration in PPP will be mandatory. Anyone interested in signing up for early PPP registration can call the Heidelberg Givilian Personnel Action Center at DSN 370-8514 or civ. 06221-57-8514 to make an appointment.

"I am a Department of Defense civilian currently living in Mannheim, and I was wondering now that all the Family, Morale, Welfare and Recreation facilities are closed on Sullivan Barracks, what will happen to all the equipment?"

All excess equipment is first evaluated for re-use by other Family and MWR facilities within U.S. Army Garrison Baden-Württemberg. Any equipment that is not needed is reported to Installation Management Command-Europe Family and MWR for redistribution to other garrisons in Europe.

"I am a retiree, and I maintain a mailbox on post. How long will the new consolidated postal center on Patrick Henry Village remain open, and what will I need to do for postal service once it closes?"

The PHV Postal Service Center will close at the same time as all other services in the Heidelberg community, which is on or about Aug. 30, 2013, and no later than Sept. 30, 2013. Retirees who wish to keep a retiree mailbox will have the option to establish one in another military community that provides retiree mail service. The garrison's Directorate of Human Resources will publish more details at a later date.

Bending not breaking *Course teaches civilians resilience*

The first civilians to attend master resiliency training in the Kaiserslautern Military Community recently graduated from a 12-week Army Community Service course designed to help them cope with difficulties at home and in the workplace.

The coursework was geared toward helping civilians thrive in a high-tempo era of persistent conflict and taught them how to lower rates of depression, anxiety, stress and other difficult emotions. It emphasized the importance of self-actualization (each participant must know themselves before they can know and understand others.)

The motto of resilience training was "Bending, Not Breaking."

Participant Amanda Gransbury said she now feels betterprepared to face challenges that come with being part of the military. "Not just that," Gransbury added. "I can better face myself now, too."

U.S. Army Garrison Kaiserslautern ACS employees Cheryl Carter and Alberto Soto Rivera led the group through coursework, which wrapped up in late September.

It began with students learning what resiliency is and what it means to an individual.

Then, the class moved on to building mental toughness, working on individual character strengths and building strong relationships.

The group learned to maximize their potential and face challenges head on, which are important lessons, Carter said.

"This is a new era for the military, and that includes the families. The military has adapted to look at the entire force, not just the Soldiers and service members," Carter said.

"It's very important what you have done, what you have learned and now what you can teach."

With thumping music in the background, two students raced each other up the rock wall.

Children on the ground below cheered them on as the climbers challenged themselves to conquer a rocky precipice. For Savannah Wrye, 11, rock climbing is a lot of fun.

"I don't like other sports," she said. "This is something I like doing. It is fun and keeps me more active than other sports I have tried."

Savannah and several other children took part in a rock climbing class held at the Outdoor Recreation section at the Kaiserslautern Military Community Center. The class is just one of many offered through "EDGEI," a U.S. Army Garrison Kaiserslautern Child, Youth and School Services program, said Janice Broccoli, a Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation partnership specialist.

EDGE stands for Experience, Develop, Grow and Excel. The program offers activities in partnership with Family and MWR organizations throughout the garrison to students in grades one through 12, Broccoli said. The idea is to offer a short-term learning experience in four different categories including fitness, art, adventure and life, she said. Each activity generally lasts between four and six weeks.

"This introduces them to activities or sports that maybe they weren't sure of or hadn't done before," Broccoli said.

The program is just a few years old and was de-

veloped to feed into garrison youth sports activities and the School for Knowledge, Inspiration, Exploration and Skills, or "SKIESUnlimited," Broccoli said.

"Kids might like the activity after trying out the EDGE! program and then go into one of the longer programs like a SKIES[Unlimited] program or a youth sports program," she said. "Or we have kids who are in youth sports programs and decide that they want to try a different activity because they weren't really into this activity or sport."

EDGE! also offers Aikido, T-shirt art, basketball, wrestling, indoor soccer, archery and fishing. In addition, they hold "home alone" and "street smarts" workshops on posts throughout the garrison.

Activities are free for students in grades six through 12, while a small fee is charged for younger children. The price difference is designed to encourage the teens to get involved, Broccoli said.

"Kids typically tend to get into more trouble at that age," she added. "If it is free, hopefully it will be an attention grabber for them."

Susanne Fisher, whose two children attend rock climbing, said it's a great opportunity for teens.

"This is really nice for teenagers, because it encourages them to do something, which they all need," she said. "Then for the little ones, it doesn't cost very much. It's affordable and twice a week, versus sports that are once a week. And this builds their strength and confidence."

Consider safety when planning Halloween parties

Fall brings with it not only beautiful colors and a crisp chill to the air, but also one of our most popular holidays, Halloween.

Not only popular with younger children, Halloween parties are also popular with adults. As you prepare for your ghoulish activities, don't forget to think about safety.

Here are some Halloween safety tips for the party host:

•If you are hosting a party at your house, make sure you move any breakable pieces of furniture or breakable items to a safe place.

• If using dry ice in a punch bowl, make sure you

keep the ice separate. If ingested, dry ice can cause serious damage to internal organs.

•Use artificial lights in place of real candles.

•Make sure your yard and sidewalk are free of debris. Costume masks can make it much harder to see where you are going.

•Do not let impaired guests drive. If hosting a Halloween party, remind guests to plan ahead and designate a sober driver, and offer alcohol-free beverages. Prepare a list of local taxi companies in advance to have available if guests need to call one. **Tips for the party guests:**

•If intending to drink alcohol, plan ahead to get home safely by selecting a designated driver or ensuring cab service is available from the party location. Never ride with a driver who has been drinking. •If attending a party at a friend's home, consider

asking to stay overnight, or look into hotel accommodations within walking distance of your event.

•Avoid traveling through residential areas where trick-or-treaters are likely to be present.

•Be on the alert for excited youngsters, whose vision may be obscured by masks, darting out into traffic.

•When driving through residential areas, consider driving five miles per hour less than the posted speed limit.



the last to close said Charles St. John, Acting Director of Logistics for USAG Baden-Württemberg. It is located on the Army Depot Kaiserslautern and is open 7:30-11:15 a.m. and 12:30-3 p.m. Monday-Friday.

"The online orders are filled from stock at The Exchange distribution center in Giessen and then delivered to an Exchange retail outlet (a base or post exchange) near[est] the person that placed the online order," Cross said.

Because an Exchange or Shoppette exists at nearly every military installation, Cross said using the Exchange distribution operations was an easy solution. SSSC purchases "have little or nothing to do with Exchange stores themselves. We were able to take the orders online and piggyback off that distribution process, and because there is always room at the back of the truck, the order can be delivered right to the front door," he added.

If the order is delivered to the front door but the GPC holder is not in the office, he or she can later pick up their items at the closest Exchange store. And with a certain portion of Exchanges' fees going back into Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation, "it's

a pretty big win-win," Cross added.

The push to move to website-only ordering versus a brick and mortar store is not new. After a few rough starts, Cross said a streamlined process not unlike the one *Amazon.com* uses will be in place by summer 2013. There, customers will be able to log on, pay online and decide the best shipping method or carrier, he added.

"We've come a long way with technology, and it's more possible now than it was in the past. The military likes standardization," Cross said.

Cross said the ultimate goal is to have one catalog and one website for customers outside the continental United States, so when a GPC holder moves, he or she will know how to order.

"Please start using the web-based process now," St. John said. "Get familiar with it ... because now is the time to learn it, while folks are still here to help you use it." GPC holders can register for accounts at *https://partners.aafes.com/epol/login.aspx* and can then request access by completing a customer access form, found under the "SSSC training and access tab," at *https://extranet.g4.hqusareur.army.mil/pubs/listfiles.aspx?storefront=sands.*

Military leaders gather in Wiesbaden for annual conference

WIESBADEN – Senior land force commanders from more than 41 European nations, the U.S. and Canada came together here Oct. 16-18 to discuss military partnerships and security cooperation.

The 20th annual U.S. Army Europe-led Conference of European Armies met under the theme "Building Capabilities for an Uncertain Future," to address how military forces can adjust to new fiscal realities and incorporate lessons learned to confront future security threats.

Participants at CEA represented 83 percent of the nations contributing military forces to the International Security Assistance Force in Afghanistan.

USAREUR commanding gen-

eral Lt. Gen. Mark Hertling hosted the first CEA to be conducted in Wiesbaden, the new location for USAREUR's headquarters.

"This particular session, we're talking about the future, post-ISAF," Hertling said. "[and] the challenges of our various governments, emerging security threats and our requirement to develop a new capability to address those threats."

last tour in Afghanistan, fashioned a makeshift brace for the woman's neck.

"I was able to do so using trauma sheers, sterile bandaging and a car visor," Adame said in a written account afterward.

The setting sun often blinds drivers heading westward, likely a factor in the Oct. 1 accident, said Thomas Jung, 46, a mechanic who's served as a Landstuhl volunteer firefighter for 28 years. Landstuhl paramedics got the call at 6:04 p.m. and were at the scene six minutes later, Jung said. Meanwhile, Campbell was trying to keep the woman calm, to avoid shock, he said.

When German paramedics arrived, they didn't expect to see a Soldier in the car, supporting the woman's neck and talking calmly to her, Jung said.

"We were surprised to see he was sitting in the car," Jung said. "It was very good when he talked with her, so she felt like she was not alone. This is the best thing you can do."

Using the Jaws of Life, a hydraulic tool that tore into the car's roof, German rescuers got her out while Campbell continued to support her neck.

Beside the high autobahn overpass, there is a steep grassy patch amid the forested hillside. Soldiers call it a "fire break," but it's really an area where a pipeline runs through. It's also where Soldiers run their "gut check," a tough set of four uphill climbs that can take up to an hour and leaves them exhausted. Once the woman was safely on her way to receive further medical care, the Soldiers returned to training – finishing one more run up the steep hill.

"Being in an Army [physical training] uniform gave the German public and responding agencies a shining example of who we are as Soldiers, medics and Americans," Adame said, in his written account. "Sgt. Campbell truly demonstrated that we are proud of the corps of non-commissioned officers and do, at all times, conduct ourselves so as to bring credit upon the corps, the military service and our country."

The aerial medical evacuation company, known affectionately to combat troops as "Dustoff," has 15 specially-equipped Blackhawk helicopters. In Germany, they support U.S. training missions at posts in Bavaria, but they can respond worldwide. Last year, the Soldiers returned from a tour in Afghanistan. During the recent winter, they flew humanitarian missions in snowbound Montenegro.

Now, Adame, Campbell and Taylor have been recommended for an award for their efforts. The Soldiers' actions exemplify what's expected of them, said Capt. Damien McGuigan, Company C commander.

"Our medics are Soldiers first. They train to react to any situation which may need a calm head in difficult circumstances," McGuigan said.

While the event sounds heroic to some, Campbell shrugs off the idea that they did anything more than what the Army has trained them for – keep the patient safe, avoid further harm and provide initial care.

"We knew what to do, because this is our job. We don't mind helping out," Campbell said. "Everyone in this company is good at handling emergencies and staying calm when there's a lot of pressure, they routinely do that. So, it's not anything out of the ordinary."

Langer, from Düsseldorf, had to complete five stages to earn the title and a trip to see the Monaco Formula 1 Grand Prix. Tasks included squeezing a nearly 30-foot limousine into a parking space, blind parking, mastering a horizontal gear shift and parking a rickety old three-wheeler. Langer said she put it all down to practice. "As an industrial clerk, I drive a lot and often have to park in tiny bays, which I see as a challenge,"she said. The hardest part was parking an articulated truck, Langer said. For that round, "women had to wear platform shoes and men high heels." she added. The championship was sponsored by the insurance comparison website Transparo and was held at the ADAC training center in Landshut. Contestants were nominated via Facebook and car enthusiast blogs.

ATM Stolen From Berlin Train Station

Thieves reportedly made off with an ATM from the Bellevue S-Bahn station in the Tiergarten district of Berlin after ramming it with a stolen car and loading it into another vehicle 3:20 a.m. Monday. It was the eighth time this has happened in the capitol this year. Thieves figured out that most S-Bahn stations, with the exception of those with elevated platforms, do not have video surveillance, *Die Welt* newspaper reported. The thieves left the stolen car behind at the scene and police are not sure how they transported the cash machine. Investigators are checking for connections with the other thefts, the *Tagesspiegel* newspaper reported.

Dear Ms. Vicki,

I have been married 26 years to an Army lieutenant colonel who retired in June. With that came a 35-year-old girlfriend with a child (from a previous affair.)

Before he retired, he threatened me (he bought a gun and a concealed weapons permit.)

I contacted the Inspector General, who issued a protective order and retired him; he also lost his security clearance.

Immediately after his retirement, and unbeknownst to me, my husband disenrolled me from TRI- CARE, telling them he was single with no dependents. (This was against regulations, as he did not have a divorce or death certificate.)

He canceled all credit cards and savings and checking accounts that were held jointly.

He wants the house for his new "family," but we are still married (we have been separated since April.)

He is dragging his feet on the divorce. He gives me very little money, and only when he feels like it (I do not work.)

His most recent tactics include breaking into the house and clearing any and all files, especially those having to do with finances.

He broke into my son's two vehicles, and when we went to court, he showed up in full dress uniform (which he is not allowed to do,) and even after my husband admitted to having broken into the cars, even showing the judge the owners' manual he took, he was let go.

The judge was impressed by the uniform and his military service.

Who can I turn to? My husband believes he is above the law, he wants me dead and no one is looking beyond the uniform.

Does anyone really enforce the unlawful use of the uniform?

I'm hanging on, barely surviving paying the house bills, and thanks to our church food bank, not going hungry.

We are talking about a 33-year Military Intelligence officer who is very clever and has kept me "in line." Can you help me?

SJ Dear SI.

This is terrible. This is serious, and your husband's behavior is appalling.

His uniform and his service to his country should not make a judge behave in such a biased manner.

You definitely need some legal help expeditiously. You should contact lawyers in the area who offer free consultations.

Also, you made reference to your husband wanting you dead. From your report, I think you should contact Ex-Pose Ex-Partners of Service Members for Equality.

They will have some great resources to share with you and further advice.

Secondly, I think it could help if you contact the domestic violence hotline at U.S. civ. 1-800-799-SAFE to discuss safety issues and concerns with someone.

They can help you establish a safety plan and provide other support.

This is important, because I don't trust what your husband is capable of doing.

In the meantime, I hope you have some support from family and friends. Keep in touch and let me know how you are doing.

Early intervention key to treating depression *Common condition affects more than 20 million American adults*

October is National Depression Education and Awareness Month.

When feelings of sadness, anxiety or depression linger for long periods of time, it's possible a person could be clinically depressed. Depression is a very common condition that affects more than 20 million adults in the United States each year. The Army's suicide rate has increased significantly over the past five years.

A diagnosis of depression is a risk factor that can contribute to suicidal thoughts, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Therefore, it is important to be attentive to signs of depression in others as well as oneself.

Depression is defined in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders as having five or more specified symptoms occur during the same two-week period and representing a change from the previous level

of functioning.

As part of the criteria, at least one of the symptoms has to be depressed mood or loss of interest or pleasure. The remaining symptoms are:

•Difficulty concentrating, remembering details and making decisions

•Energy levels are decreased or feelings of fatigue

•Persistent aches, pains, headaches, cramps, or digestive problems

•Feelings of hopelessness and or pessimism

•Experiencing feelings of guilt, worthlessness and or helplessness

Suicidal thoughts or attempts
 Sleeping excessively, early morning wakefulness or insomnia

Irritability, restlessness

•Overeating or loss of appetite

•No interest in activities or hobbies once pleasurable, including sex

Issues like loneliness, financial strain, lack of social support, relationship problems, unemployment, trauma, death of a loved one, alcohol or drug abuse, childhood abuse, family history of depression, health problems or a recent stressful life experience can place a person at risk for depression.

Even though everyone may experience one or more of these issues, not everyone will respond to them in the same way. The same is true for depression; not everyone experiences or exhibits depressive symptoms in the same manner. The following are common symptoms of depression:

•Men: fatigue, irritability, sleep problems, violence, reckless behavior and substance abuse

•Women: feelings of guilt, excessive sleeping, overeating and weight gain

•Youth: irritability, hostility, quick temperedness, unexplained aches and pain. If left untreated, these symptoms can lead to problems at home and school, or drug abuse.

Depression is treatable and beatable. Treatment should be sought as early as possible so the individual can return to a healthy lifestyle and minimize the risk of greater illness. Treatment for depression includes the use of antidepressant medications, psychotherapy or a combination of both. If you or someone you know is in a crisis, seek help immediately.
