EDIS provides vital resource to community families

Virginia Bannerman was worried about her son. At almost two-and-a-half years old, Kenny wasn't progressing the way her older child had and he was exhibiting some of the symptoms associated with possible developmental delays.

He had not started talking yet. He never made eye contact with others, including his family. He didn't socially interact with anybody, and when taken to playgroup would either move away from the other children to a corner, or worse, scream uncontrollably through the entire hour.

Friends and family were supportive, telling her things like "different children learn at different ages," "give it time, he'll grow out of it," and "don't worry, it'll get better."

As well-intentioned as her friends were in trying to calm her fears and provide encouragement, it took a stranger to point Virginia in the right direction for help.

"After Kenny screamed through playgroup one morning, I was approached by a lady as we were leaving and she said very respectfully, 'I don't mean to offend you or upset you, but my daughter used to do the same thing. Have you had your son tested for autism?'"

From that encounter, Virginia (whose husband is assigned to the NATO base in Brunssum, the Netherlands) found the nearest servicing Educational and Developmental Intervention Services

(EDIS) program at the SHAPE Army Health Clinic in Belgium.

"It's just amazing how much progress he's made in the

"It's just amazing how much progress he's made in the three months he's been in the program," Virginia said with an audible mixture of joy and relief. "Two weeks ago he finally said 'Mama' and now he says it every five seconds. I don't get tired of hearing it."

Virginia credits the staff at EDIS SHAPE's early intervention services for the turn around. The SHAPE program is unique in that its services cover a large and diverse area – working with families in Belgium, the Netherlands and Germany. Home visits and early intervention services are available to children up to 36 months old.

"Since many of our communities are NATO bases, the EDIS program is able to also work with families from other countries if space is available," said Melissa Wiedel, the SHAPE program manager and early childhood special educator. It's a big task for a three-person staff, which includes Wiedel, a speech and language pathologist, and an occupational therapist.

"Our small team has been working to re-educate the communities we serve about the services we provide," said Wiedel. "The biggest obstacle for the EDIS program is get-

ting parents to self-refer their child. No parent wants to hear that their child is not perfect, but we are here to help parents promote their child's development.

"I think," she continued, "that parents are afraid that we will come into their home and tell them they are bad parents or give their child a label. Parent education is the key – knowing the milestones their child should be meeting and seeking out help early. Most of the children we see have developmental delays that with intervention and parent education they are able to 'catch up' with their peers."

In addition to parents self-referring their children, Wiedel said the program also receives referrals from doctors if there is a suspicion of delay when a child goes in for a visit.

In both cases, EDIS staff will conduct a screening that examines all five areas of development: social-emotional, language, cognitive, self-help, and motor skills. The screening takes about an hour, in which time the staff will ask the parents questions about their child and interact with the child to try and elicit skills.

"Melissa drove a long way to come to our house and screen Kenny," his mom recalled, "as well as making the weekly follow-on visits. When she comes in, she immediately gets

on the floor on his level and does some repetitive melodies and singing to get him to focus on her. He even makes eye contact now. It seems like they are just sitting there playing and having fun, but she gets him to vocalize and repeat things and before long he started saying actual words."

Virginia echoed Wiedel's concern about community awareness of the program in that "unfortunately a lot of people don't even realize that this free resource exists. It's without a doubt one of the best things the military has ever done for us. I wish I would have looked for help sooner, but everyone kept telling me it was a phase and he'd grow out of it."

"The best thing to do, if a parent has any concern about their child's development is to get a second opinion," she added. "Remember, you're not doing this for you, but for your child. Parents should be willing to accept all options that could help. I'm so grateful a stranger took the time to approach me about it."

Virginia recently took Kenny back to playgroup and

the reaction from other parents was shock, she said. "They were just amazed and asked if that was the same child because the difference in his behavior was so big."

Kenny's successful development, in fact, has put his mom at the point he was just three short months ago: speechless. "I'm at a loss," she said. "I can't even put it into words how great this has been for our whole family."

If parents feel that their child might have a delay, they can call the SHAPE EDIS at civilian (0)65-44-5931 and ask for a screening.

SHAPE EDIS is promoting public awareness and parent education with several upcoming community events.

Emergency Management Team visits the Belgian EOD Group

Members of the USAG Benelux Emergency Management Team, Bart Howard and Jean Luc Peltier, visited the headquarters and school campus of the Belgian Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) Group in Meerdaal, Wednesday, October 24, 2012. Also known as SEDEE (French acronym) or DOVO (Dutch acronym), the group is the Belgian Ministry of Defense unit that has responsibility for all bomb disposal in Belgium.

The main purpose of the visit was to learn about the capabilities of SEDEE and to build strong partnerships. The Commander, Lt. Col Luc Moerman, gave an information briefing followed by a discussion and a field demonstration of different explosive devices. The visit concluded with a demonstration of SEDEE's remote robot that is used in dangerous situations to destroy suspicious or known explosive devices.

"It was a very informative day," said Howard, the USAG Benelux Emergency Manager. "I was impressed by the Sergent Major Ballestero (right) shows Bart Howard an explosive device professionalism and training of the SEDEE team. EOD, we know that we have a superb team only a short distance away."

SEDEE's mission is quite large as they also respond to discoveries of unexploded ordnance left over from the many conflicts that were fought on Belgian land. Considering the scale of WWI and WWII, this is an immense task. Nearly every day, there are discoveries of potentially dangerous shells that have sat unburied for close to 100 years.

"It is hard to comprehend the scale of the world wars and their legacy on Belgium," reflected Howard. "The SEDEE has to be ready to identify thousands of different kinds of bombs and shells. Although they look rusty and harmless, they can actually be quite dangerous as they still have the potential to explode. If there is one guideline that we can bring from today, it is that we see something that looks suspicious or appears to be an old shell or bomb, don't touch it. Alert our security forces and let the professionals make the determination of what to do."

Ford Genk closure

Ford has announced the closure of its plant in Genk. While 4,300 jobs will be lost at the plant itself, related job losses are likely to reach 10,000. Ford Genk used to manufacture the Ford Mondeo. Production will now move to Spain where the average labor cost is 20 Euros instead of 39 Euros here in Belgium.

Belgian Budget

The budget for 2013 will be a difficult exercise that will not be concluded by this week as initially expected. Currently, the federal government is adjusting the 2012 federal budget through technical manipulations and small measures. The 3.7 billion Euros that needs to be found or saved in order to reach a deficit of 2.15 percent compared to the gross domestic product next year will be a lot more challenging. There are already talks of new taxes. Nobody supports increased taxes on labor or economic activities and the government is divided over imposing a capital tax. Even if the government were to decide on a capital tax, the question is how quickly it can be executed.

Dow chemical to shut down factories

Dow Chemical announced that it is to close its factory in Tessenderlo, Belgium with the loss of 115 jobs as well as the plant in Delfzijl, the Netherlands with the loss of 43 jobs. These closures are part of a worldwide operational revamp which will see 2,400 jobs go and 20 factories shut down. Dow's large plant and Benelux headquarters in Terneuzen in southern Netherlands is not affected.

Dutch salary differences

The difference in salaries between men and women in the Netherlands shrinks. The Netherlands went from the 15th to the 11th place in the ranking with more than 76% of the pay gap closed. An improvement in the number of women in ministerial positions had also played a role. The list is topped by Iceland, followed by Finland, Norway and Sweden.

International passports

The Belgian Foreign Office announced that international passports issued to Belgian citizens will only expire after seven years, instead of five years now as new legislation will come into affect. For the fifth consecutive year, the number of people applying for an international passport has increased. The Belgian ID card only gives access to a certain number of countries, while the passport opens a lot of other doors, sometimes in combination with a visa. Some countries, like the Dominican Republic – a popular destination among Belgian tourists – made an international passport mandatory for tourists last year.

Dutch hamlet for sale

Almost all of the hamlet of Hamingen, close to Staphorst, is up for sale – with a price tag of €1.35m. The foundation which manages property for good causes, has put the complex – three farms, a modern building, several sheds

and a vegetable garden – up for sale. A further six hectares of farmland can also be included in the package. It was put for sale because its current tenant – an organization that takes care of addicts – is moving to a new property in 2014. The hamlet can trace its history back to 1468 and is located on a terp – a man-made grass mound to protect it from flooding. Although the housing sector is in crisis, the organization is sure the property will sell.

Dutch invention

Dutch doctors have successfully tested a pill that can be controlled electronically to deliver medicine directly to the stomach and intestines. The pill is 2.5 cm by 1 cm and is one-third filled with medicine. The rest of the capsule houses a transmitter that communicates with the outside world and a tiny motor. The capsule uses a pH sensor to determine where it is located. Once it is thought to be in position, the motor sprays out the medicine. The technology has been tested on ten healthy volunteers who took the capsule filled with radio isotopes which could be followed on a scan. In nine out of ten cases, there was successful communication between the capsule and doctors.

Heated cycle lanes to be tested

Tests are about to start with heated cycle lanes in two parts of the Netherlands in an effort to reduce winter accidents. By stopping snow settling and ice forming, cycle lanes will become safer and there will be thousands fewer accidents. The tests, an initiative led by civil engineering group Tauw, will start in the town of Zutphen and in parts of Utrecht. The system will work by using 'asphalt collectors' to collect the summer heat which will then be stored underground and used to warm cycle lanes in winter.

Oldest Dutch person

The Netherlands' oldest resident, Egbertje Leutscher-De Vries, celebrated her 110th birthday October 22, with a day of events at the nursing home where she lives in the Drenthe village of Havelte. Her daughter, Mina Smit, told news agency ANP her mother is delighted with all the attention and thinks it is great she is the oldest person in the country.

Belgian wine

Last year, wine production in Belgium was 15 percent up compared to the year before. The number of wine producers is also increasing. Belgium has gained worldwide renown for its beers, but it's not always common knowledge that it also producing wine. It's especially the Limburg regions of Haspengouw and Maasland (along the river Maas) that are seeing more vineyards. Two years ago, Belgium had 41 wine producers, 27 in Flanders and 14 in Wallonia. Last year, their number had climbed to 48. These figures apply to those applying for a protected label. Some 30 farmers produced wine without applying for an official local label. Last year, 78 percent of the wine produced was white wine, compared to 18 percent red wine and 4 percent rosé.
