WELCOME

Welcome to Fort George G. Meade, Maryland, an installation dedicated to providing quality support to service members, Department of Defense civilian employees, family members, and military retirees. Every day, more than 100,000 people seek the services Fort Meade offers. Its primary mission is to provide a wide range of services to more than 95 partner organizations from the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard, as well as to several federal agencies including the National Security Agency, Defense Media Activity, Defense Informations Systems Agency, the Defense Courier Service and the U.S. Cyber Command.

Fort Meade is conveniently located between Washington, D.C. and Baltimore. The installation lies approximately five miles east of Interstate 95 and one-half mile east of the Baltimore-Washington Parkway, between Maryland State routes 175 and 198. Fort Meade is located near the communities of Odenton, Laurel, Columbia and Jessup, and is home to approximately 11,000 military personnel along with about 29,000 civilian employees. Nearly 6,000 family members reside on post. With more than 56,000 employees, Fort Meade is Maryland's largest employer and is the third-largest workforce of any Army installation in the U.S. In response to the military's Base Realignment and Closure

plan, construction of new facilities has now been completed for Defense Adjudication Activities, the Defense Information Systems Agency and the Defense Media Activity.

Temperatures range from a mean daily maximum of 85 degrees Fahrenheit in the summer to 30 degrees Fahrenheit in the winter. In the winter, the average monthly snowfall is four to 10 inches. In the early stages of the season, springtime is accompanied by high winds and moderate thunderstorms and summers are moderately hot and humid. Autumn is pleasant with temperatures ranging as high as the mid-60s.

In addition to the many recreational activities available on Fort Meade, the region itself is full of interesting places to visit. You can tour the historical sites of Annapolis; visit the White House in Washington, D.C.; or attend a football, basketball or baseball game with one of the many professional and college teams in the Maryland, D.C., and Northern Virginia areas.

This guide was prepared to help those new to Fort Meade, but can also be valuable to long-time residents and employees. Use it often to find information, including telephone numbers, addresses and websites of the offices and facilities on Fort Meade. We hope your stay here will be enjoyable and your tour of duty professionally rewarding.



GETTING STARTED ON FORT MEADE

Fort Meade is virtually a city in itself. It consists of 5,067 acres with 65.5 miles of paved roads, 3.3 miles of secondary roads, and about 1,300 buildings. There is a modern post exchange mall, bank, credit union, post office, chapels, seven schools and many other facilities on the installation. Whatever your interests — crafts, sports, movies — all are available on Fort Meade.

Directions to Fort Meade

From Washington D.C.: Take Interstate 95 or I-295 N toward Baltimore to MD State Route 175 E. Follow 175 E until it turns into Annapolis Road. Follow the signs to the Reece Road main gate. Be prepared to present identification, vehicle registration and proof of insurance at the gate.

From Baltimore: Take Interstate 95 or I-295 S toward Washington, D.C. to MD State Route 175 E. Follow 175 E until it turns into Annapolis Road. Follow the signs to the Reece Road main gate. Be prepared to present identification, vehicle registration and proof of insurance at the gate.

From Annapolis: Take US 50/301 W to Interstate 97 N toward Baltimore. Take MD State Route 32 W toward Odenton/Fort Meade. Take MD State Route 175 W,



Annapolis Road. Follow the signs to the Reece Road main gate. Be prepared to present identification, vehicle registration and proof of insurance at the gate.

How Do I Get Around?

Over the past few years, Fort Meade and partner units have worked with federal, state and local officials to establish partnerships and work together to develop transportation options for workers and residents at Fort Meade.

Today Fort Meade commuters from Maryland and Virginia can take advantage of peak-hour MARC rail service, car and van pools, post and METRO shuttle bus services and subscription bus services. These services, combined with other programs such as Maryland's Guaranteed Ride Home program and the National Capital Region Mass Transportation Benefit Program are designed to help commuters better access mass transportation options and decrease traffic congestion by finding ways to help take cars off roadways.

Train Stations and Airports

MARC Train (Mass Transit): Visitors can travel to and from Baltimore or Washington D.C. by using the MARC train, a local commuter system available Monday through Friday from 5 a.m. to midnight. Airport: Baltimore/Washington International Thurgood Marshall Airport (BWI) is located in Anne Arundel County approximately 10 miles from post, and is the closest airport to Fort Meade. Other airports in the area include Dulles International Airport (Northern Virginia) and Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport (Washington, D.C.).

FORT MEADE HISTORY

Named for Civil War hero

Authorized by an Act of Congress in May 1917, Fort Meade was one of 16 cantonments built for troops



drafted for the war with the Central Powers in Europe. The present Maryland site was selected June 23, 1917 because of its close proximity to the railroad, Baltimore port and Washington D.C. The cost for construction was \$18 million and the land sold for \$37 per acre in 1917. The post was originally named Camp Meade for Maj. Gen. George Gordon Meade, whose victory at the Battle of Gettysburg in 1863 proved a major factor in turning the tide of the Civil War in favor of the North. The 5,400 acres of land on which Fort Meade sits was originally owned by Maj. Samuel Snowden, a Revolutionary War hero.

World War I

During World War I, more than 400,000 soldiers passed through Fort Meade, a training site for three infantry divisions, three training battalions and one depot brigade. The post remount station collected over 22,000 horses and mules during this time. Maj. Peter F. Meade, a nephew of Gen. Meade, was the officer in charge of the remount station. The "Hello Girls" — women who served as bilingual telephone-switchboard operators in the U.S. Army Signal Corps during World War I — were also an important part of Fort Meade history.

In 1928, the post was designated Fort Leonard Wood, but Pennsylvania congressmen, angry at having the name of native son, George Meade removed, held up Army appropriations until the Army agreed to name the new permanent installation Fort George G. Meade, which it did on March 5, 1929.

Tank Corps Joe

Around 1923, the famed tank riding dog Old Joe befriended soldiers who manned the 66th Infantry's light tanks. Joe became the 66th Infantry's official pet by order of the commanding officer of Fort Meade and acquired fame by becoming the Army's only tank-riding dog. Joe died in 1937 at the post hospital. The entire



66th Infantry honored Joe with a military formation and a procession of tanks. Military trucks escorted Joe to a grave near one of the tank parks.

World War II

Fort Meade became a training center during World War II and its ranges and other facilities were used by more than 200 units and approximately 3,500,000 Soldiers between 1942 and 1946. The wartime peak of military personnel at Fort Meade was 70,000, in March 1945.

Fort Meade was home to many services. The Cooks and Bakers School supplied bread for the entire post (approximately 20,000 people, including families). In 1942, the Third Service Command opened the Special Services Unit Training Center, where Soldiers were trained in all phases of the entertainment field. Entertainment, musicians, and others involved in the entertainment industry, including swing-band leader Glenn Miller served in Special Services.

Fort Meade was also home to a number of German and Italian prisoners of war. In Sept. 1943, a group of 1,632 Italian and 58 German prisoners arrived at Fort Meade. Some of those prisoners died during captivity and were buried on the installation.

The Cold War

With the conclusion of World War II, Fort Meade reverted to peacetime activities. One key post-World War II event at Fort Meade was the transfer from Baltimore, on June 15, 1947, of the Second U.S. Army Headquarters. This transfer brought an acceleration of post activity, because Second Army Headquarters exercised command over Army units throughout a seven-state area. A second important development occurred Jan. 1, 1966, when the Second U.S. Army merged with First U.S. Army. The consolidated headquarters moved from Fort Jay, N.Y. to Fort Meade to administer activities of Army installations in a 15-state area.

Modern Era

In August 1990, Fort Meade began processing Army Reserve and National Guard units from several states for the presidential call-up in support of Operation Desert Shield. In addition to processing reserve and guard units, Fort Meade sent two of its own active-duty units — the 85th Medical Battalion and the 519th Military Police Battalion — to Saudi Arabia. In



all, approximately 2,700 personnel from 42 units deployed from Fort Meade during Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm.

Change, Growth, Transformation

Fort Meade and the surrounding areas are in the midst of significant change, growth and transformation.

Fort Meade is home to more than 95 tenant units, many of which are expanding their presence on Fort Meade. The National Security Agency, Defense Information School and the 902nd Military Intelligence Group are three such organizations that are slated to grow both in personnel and occupancy on post. DINFOS alone will increase the size of its building by one-third and expand its annual student capacity to 4,000. In addition, the newly established Cyber Command, headquartered on post, may add up to an additional five thousand personnel.

With the addition of thousands of new employees, residents, and family members, Fort Meade has been busy keeping pace with necessary upgrades to its infrastructure. Miles of fiber optic cable have already been laid to improve communications and new water, sewer and utility lines have been installed or upgraded to handle personnel and resident growth.

Future construction includes a new 24-hour shoppette, Post Exchange, Child Development Centers, golf course, youth sports complex, and a Veterans Administration Center — the first ever to be constructed on a military post.

Transportation infrastructure upgrades on post is also of primary importance. Already, upgrades to the Mapes/32 and Mapes/175 gates have been completed and will ease the traffic flow into and off of post, and additional construction is slated not only to other access gates but to major roads on post as well.

Despite the rapid growth and transformation on the installation, Fort Meade will continue to provide world class service to a host of tenant organizations, partner units, personnel and families.

Fort Meade's structure is provided by the U.S. Army Installation Management Command which oversees all facets of installation operations to include construction, family care, food management, environmental programs, morale and well-being programs, public works, and installation funding. The Military District of Washington provides the installations within its region real time guidance, direction, and resources, and responds to installation management requirements.

Fort Meade mirrors the visions of both IMCOM and MDW in order to ensure quality of life for those who live, work and play on the installation. Improving everyday life for the community and customers of Fort Meade is critical to providing a safe and secure environment. The installation is constantly improving its installation infrastructure and facilities, technology and environment to meet expanding mission requirements.

Installation Management Command

The Installation Management Command, a single organization headquartered in San Antonio, with six regional offices worldwide, was implemented to reduce bureaucracy and apply a uniform business structure to manage U.S. Army installations.



IMCOM was launched to meet a number of objectives: implement a standardization process so that Soldiers and families can count on quality, consistent and uniform services at all installations; streamline how installations receive money and ensure installation funds are used for installation services (as opposed to combat training or other missions); relieve warfighters and mission commanders of installation-related tasks so that they can focus on combat training and tactical-related issues; and support mission-readiness and execution. Military District of Washington

The Military District of Washington is a leadership extension of the Installation Management Command and provides real-time guidance, direction and assistance to Army garrisons located in the region.

The mission of the regional office is to guide, direct, enable and oversee assigned garrisons, assess and convey resource requirements to IMCOM, and respond to installation management requirements. MDW also acts as a command and control headquarters relative to all base



operations, functions, contingency operations and crisis management operations. MDW reviews and oversees resource allocations, interfaces with major commands and other services and implements IMCOM policies and programs. MDW also interact with Congressional delegations when necessary.

Army Emergency Relief www.aerhq.org

Army Emergency Relief plays a unique and important role in helping the Army "Take care of its own." AER is a private, nonprofit organization that provides emergency financial assistance to active duty and retired Soldiers and their family members and the spouses and orphans of de-



ceased Soldiers. Approval of AER funds is based on the need created by an emergency beyond the control of the Soldier. Assistance may be in the form of a loan, grant or combination thereof. Educational scholarships are also available.

Financial Readiness Program

This program supports financial readiness by offering education and counseling. Emphasis is placed on skills such as money management techniques, proper use of credit, financial planning and budgeting. The goal of the Financial Readiness Program is to help families prevent financial difficulties before they begin. Budgetcounseling may be either self-referred or command directed.

This program is designed to help participants pay off debts by working with their creditors. Records are considered to be confidential and protected for those who are self-referred. Program members also advocate for clients who have consumer complaints by attempting to negotiate workable solutions between the consumer and the vendor. Individual counseling sessions may be scheduled for advice on consumer issues.

Information, Referral and Follow-up

This program provides comprehensive information regarding military and civilian community resources. Follow-up services are provided for those who have long-term needs.

Mobilization and Deployment Readiness

Army life often means separation. Whether the first experience, or one of many, separation is never easy. Having some sort of support system is essential, whether it's a family readiness group, a social group or a friend. Talking to someone and staying busy may help pass the time more quickly. The Soldier Readiness Program assists units and family members prepare for a deployment.

Abrams Hall (family quarters) provides temporary housing for active duty and retired military personnel, their families, and official guests for up to 30 days. Other eligible personnel are authorized for up to seven days, and may request an extension on a space-available basis. The facility consists of 54 rental units with a common-use kitchen, laundry and vending machine room. Reservations are accepted and confirmed up to 90 days prior to arrival. Pets are not authorized.

There are 190 single-occupancy quarters for temporary duty assignments, visiting officer and visiting enlisted personnel. Forty-four of the units are suites, which contain a bedroom, living room and private bath. Fifty-five units are single occupancy with a private bath and 91 units are single rooms with shared baths.

Kuhn Hall – Distinguished Visitor Quarters 4415 Llewellyn Road

Kuhn Hall contains seven distinguished visitor quarters, each with one or two bedrooms, a living room, private bath, and kitchen or kitchenette. Priority of room assignment is based primarily on category of personnel and date of application.

The Fort Meade Start Right Program is a two-day process for newly-assigned service members coming to Fort Meade. Day One is designated as an Army day, held Mondays or Tuesdays, when Soldiers receive a dental screening and in-process the military personnel office, finance and other Army-related activities. Army days begin at 8:45 a.m. in Bldg. 2234, Room 4 in the basement. Soldiers should bring a 201 File, any receipts for finance and a dental record.

Start Right - Joint Service Building 2481, Ernie Pyle Road

Start Right Day Two of in-processing is the joint service day and is held on Wednesdays. Day Two is designated for service members and their families. The morning sessions begin at 7:45 a.m. in Bldg. 2481, Ernie Pyle Road. Soldiers should bring medical records. During this session, service members receive a welcome from the installation commander and briefings about the Kimbrough Ambulatory Care Center, Tricare, and United

Concordia. During a working lunch, service members and their family members who are enrolled in Tricare Prime and have Kimbrough listed as their primary care provider, receive a briefing about healthy lifestyles. The afternoon session consists of briefings about programs available to service members and their families, such as Child and Youth Services; Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation; Army Community Service; and the Residential Community Initiative Program.

RELOCATION READINESS PROGRAM

The Relocation Readiness Program supports military personnel and their families as they relocate. The program includes education and training opportunities, such as pre- and post-move briefings, orientations and workshops, overseas orientations, pre-deployment briefings, cross-cultural training and destination services.

ACS also has a lending closet which maintains limited household items for newly assigned families to borrow while household goods are in transit. Other relocation services include support for waiting families, preparation and planning assistance before and during the transfer, and cultural adaptation classes upon request.

Sponsor training is offered to train unit representatives to be effective sponsors for incoming personnel. POST ACCESS

A Department of Defense decal on privately owned vehicles is no longer a requirement to access Fort Meade.

All privately-owned vehicles driven onto Fort Meade are required to be licensed, registered, inspected and insured according to state and local laws. Vehicles entering the post are subject to a 100 percent identification check and all vehicles are subject to inspection by Fort Meade Force Protection personnel.

Department of Defense ID card holders are only required to show a Common Access Card (CAC), military identification card, or other approved access credential issued by the Fort Meade Visitor Center to enter the installation. Visitors who do not have a CAC, military ID or approved access credential must access the installation using the main gate at Reece Road and Maryland State Route 175. Reece Road is the only visitor access gate to Fort Meade. All other gates are designated for Department of Defense identification card holders or other approved access credentials.

Those who are not DoD affiliated personnel must have a valid purpose for entering the installation. At a mini-



mum, visitors should be prepared to present a valid driver's license and vehicle registration documents when entering the installation.

There is also no requirement for one-day visitors to enter the Visitor Control Center on Reece Road; visitors should proceed directly to the Vehicle Inspection Station when entering the installation for a special event or meeting. To get to the Vehicle Inspection Station, take the first right after entering at Reece Road, follow the road through the parking lot and to the adjoining perimeter road to the Vehicle Inspection Station. Visitors (non-DoD ID card holders) that attempt to enter any other gate will be redirected to Reece Road.

Contractors, Personal Service Providers, volunteers, and other individuals conducting legitimate business on the installation may receive an extended access credential and Vehicle Pass when properly sponsored by an authorized individual, organization or resident. Individu-



als requiring access in excess of 30 days, to include contractors or other service providers, must submit appropriate documents to the Visitor Center through their sponsoring organization or activity.

Temporary vehicle passes, up to 45 days, are issued for those who are unable to register a vehicle permanently (i.e. temporary registration, vehicle registration not in driver's name, rental car).

section of the Directorate of Emergency Services within 72 hours after establishing residency on Fort Meade. Proof of ownership is required for registration. Individuals living in family housing, bachelor enlisted quarters, or bachelor officer quarters may store firearms and ammunition in their quarters. Firearms and other projectile firing weapons stored in quarters are required to be unloaded and secured in a locked container (such as a gun cabinet, lockable closet, or gun case) or have a triggerlocking or action-blocking device on the weapon. Firearms and projectile firing weapons that cannot be stored in this manner should be stored in a designated arms room. Ammunition will be stored separately from the container in which the firearm or weapon is stored. Lost or stolen weapons should be reported to the Directorate of Emergency Services immediately.

Documents needed to get ID card

Family

Family members must be accompanied by the sponsor in order to receive an identification card. The only exception is if the family member has



a general power of attorney to act on the sponsor's behalf or if the family member has a verified DD Form 1172 less than 90 days old signed by a verifying identification card agent and the sponsor. Identification cards may be renewed 90 days prior to the expiration date.

Family members older than 18 must provide two forms of valid and unexpired identification, such as a driver's license, passport, Social Security card, voter's registration card, birth certificate or citizenship card. The primary identification must be a photo identification.

Contractors

Contractors must be in the Contractor Verification System in order to be issued an identification card.





Active Duty

Expired cards: Soldiers will need their previously-issued active duty identification card and extension or reenlistment documents.

Grade change: promotion order.

MP confiscation: DA Form 4137 (Evidence of property custody document).

Lost ID card: E-4 and below must have a counseling statement.

Retiree

Retirement order or DD Form 214.

Documents needed to add the following family members to DEERS

Spouse

Original, court-certified copy or photocopy of marriage certificate that reflects the file number, Social Security card, and government-issued photo identification.

Children

Under age 21: Children must be at least 10 years of age to be issued an identification card with the exception of dual military and single military service members' children. Original, court-certified copy or photocopy of the birth certificate with a file number and Social Security card are required.

Illegitimate Children: Male service member must provide the court order establishing paternity, or an approved dependency determination packet, the child's birth certificate and the Social Security card.

Incapacitated child 21 years of age or older: DD Form 137-5, which can be obtained from the ID Card Section, birth certificate, medical statement

verifying whether the dependent's medical incapacitation is permanent or temporary, retirement order (if applicable), letter from the Social Security office verifying whether the child is receiving Social Security benefits, and if so, the Social Security number the benefits are received under.

Child, age 21 to 23: must be enrolled in college as a full-time student. A letter on school letter-head from the school registrar's office certifying full-time enrollment and anticipated date of graduation is required.

Reserve/National Guardsman

A DD Form 214 can be used if it reflects the reserve obligation date. Enlistment contract, extension or oath of office is also required.

100-Percent disabled veteran

A letter from the Veterans Administration stating the applicant is 100-percent disabled is required. The letter must state whether the DAV is scheduled for future exams. A DD 214 and Social Security card are required.

Individual Ready Reserve

Enlistment contract and assignment commissioning oath.

Department of Defense civilian employee

Requires two forms of identification and an AKO account e-mail address or government e-mail address.

Civilian Contractor

Requires two forms of identification and an AKO account e-mail address or government e-mail address.

Parent/Parent-in-Law Dependency

Dependency determination can be made for a child 21 years of age or older who is incapacitated, or for parents or parent-in-laws, provided the sponsor supports at least 50 percent of the family member's living expenses.

Parent/Parent-in-Law: DD Form 137-3, which can be obtained from the ID card section, sponsor's birth certificate if it is the sponsor's parent. If it is a parent-in-law, the spouse's birth certificate and marriage certificate is required. If the parent has medical problems, a medical state-

ment is required. If the sponsor is retired, retirement orders or DD Form 214 is required in addition to the other documents.

Newborns


All newborns must be added to DEERS. A copy of the birth certificate or report of birth and a Social Security card is required.

The Fort Meade Inspector General office inquires into matters that concern the community at the direction of the installation commander. Soldiers, family members and Department of Defense civilians may also request to meet confidentially with the Inspector General.

Installation Safety Office (301) 677-2396

The Installation Safety office manages 26 safety programs including the command's safety and occupational health programs. The office supports the commander by identifying safety problems that affect post readiness. When safety problems are identified, safety professionals work with the commander, directors and the work-



force to reach resolution. The goal is to help protect the community by integrating risk management into all aspects of mission and leader development.

Installation Safety Office driver's training courses and programs

Accident Avoidance Course for service members, DoD civilians, and contractors: This is a standardized course that addresses driving behavior for all those who drive Army-owned or leased vehicles and includes risk mitigation. It is available on the Army Knowledge Online Learning Management server.

- Intermediate Driver's Training: This course builds on the themes introduced during the Introductory Course that some attend during Basic Training or AIT and provides expanded opportunity for class interaction and discussion. All Soldiers younger than 26 may attend.
- Local Traffic Hazards Course II: This course is designed for personnel who are new to Fort Meade and unaware of local driving hazards. Students will learn relevant information about conditions to help reduce crashes and fatalities.



Soldiers, DoD civilians, and family members, and anyone who is TDY to Fort Meade for 30 days or more may attend.

- Motorcycle Safety Training: Training is for active-duty personnel, their dependents, military reservists and National Guard, retired military, DoD civilian employees, and DoD contractors. Active-duty military personnel have priority. Dependents of civilian employees are not eligible.
- Motorcycle Mentorship Program: This program enables leaders to mentor Soldier motorcycle drivers. Using this concept, the Air Force reduced motorcycle fatalities by 50 percent on installations on which this program was implemented.
- Basic Rider Course: This is a motorcycle rider course designed for novice riders who hold a learner's permit and have a motorcycle. Any service member or DoD civilian who wants to operate a motorcycle on post must attend.
- Experienced Rider Course: This is a motorcycle riding course designed for the licensed motorcyclist who wants to sharpen skills. Any Soldier or DoD civilian who does not have a valid MSF card and wants to operate his or her motorcycle on post must attend.
- Military Sport Bike Rider Course: This is a motorcycle rider course designed for military sport bike riders with a motorcycle license, sport bike and who have previously completed a basic or experienced rider course.





some tenant activities. During the past few years, civilian and military personnel have been required to attend face-to-face ethics training by a designated ethics counselor. The PAL Branch administers the program and provides the required training.

Retirement Services Office (301) 677-9600/9602/9603





1st Medical Recruiting Battalion 4550 Parade Field Lane, Suite 5502 (301) 677-7447

The U.S. Army 1st Medical Recruiting Battalion, Medical Recruiting Brigade, United States Army Recruiting Command, recruits the best-qualified health care professionals available to work in the largest health care delivery system in the world. We recruit for the U.S. Army and Army Reserve in 15 states, the District of Columbia and all of Europe. Referred as the "Patriots," and headquartered at Fort Meade, this battalion consists of four medical recruiting companies located in Elkridge, Md., Boston, Pittsburgh and New York City, and more than 120 medical recruiters and civilian personnel located at 21 recruiting stations throughout the region.

3rd Training Support Battalion (CS/CSS) 312th Regiment 2118 Annapolis Road (301) 677-3181

The 3rd Training Support Battalion (CS/CSS), 312th Regiment is a tri-component organization with Active, Reserve and Active-Guard Reserve component Soldiers within one command under the 72nd Field Artillery Brigade. The regiment's mission is to assist in synchronization and coordination for pre-mobilization training assistance and lanes training for priority and traditional units throughout Maryland, Delaware and the District of Columbia.





Upon declaration of mobilization, the regiment forms a Mobilization Assistance Team. All MAT members attached to selected mobilization stations assist in training and validating mobilized Reserve and National Guard units for deployment. A peacetime mission of the battalion is to serve as deployable Department of Defense military support to civil authorities for disaster relief coordination.

32nd Civil Support Team (Weapons of Mass Destruction) 2253 Huber Road (301) 677-7149

The Maryland Army National Guard's 32nd Civil Support Team (Weapons of Mass Destruction) consists of a fulltime, 22-man joint Army and Air National Guard rapid deployment team tasked with responding to chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and explosive incidents and accidents; suspected and confirmed terrorist incidents; clandestine drug/chemical/biological laboratory incidents; and all other suspected events, incidents and accidents involving the use of weapons of mass destruction or toxic industrial chemicals/materials.

This specialized unit is broken down into six sections: command, operations, communications, administration and logistics, medical and survey, with each member receiving approximately 1,200 hours of training to





provide a technical capability to civilian emergency responders. This assistance may include identifying chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and explosive agents and substances; assessing current and projected consequences; advising on specific response measures; and assisting with requests for additional state or federal support.

48th Combat Support Hospital Annapolis Road, Bldg. 2118 (301) 833-6611/6581

The 48th Combat Support Hospital's core mission is to provide hospitalization and outpatient services for patients within the corps.

On order, the 48th CSH deploys by air and sea, executes reception, staging, onward movement, and integration (RSO&I), establishes a hospital area of operations, provides care and outpatient services and is prepared to serve as the Medical Task Force Command and Control element and conduct split-based operations.

The 48th Mobile Army Surgical Hospital, which was active in World War II and the Korean War, was inactivated in 1953. The 48th resurfaced as a CSH in 2000, the Army's first multi-component hospital, staffed by both active and reserve component personnel.

The 48th CSH has the medical capability of a 248-bed hospital, providing operating rooms, emergency medical triage and treatment facilities, intensive care units, minimal care wards and neuropsychiatry services.

55th Signal Company (Combat Camera) 845 Chisholm Ave. (301) 677-5342/5343

With a history dating back to 1943, the 55th Signal Company has provided support in every major military offensive since WWII, earning the Army Superior Unit and Joint Meritorious Unit awards. Originally designated the 55th Signal Repair Company in 1943, the unit was ultimately re-designated the 55th Signal Company (Combat Camera), in 1993 as it assumed the role of the Army combat pictorial detachment, originally stationed with the Department of the Army's special photographic department at Fort Bragg, N.C. In 1994, Soldiers from the 55th Signal Company (COMCAM) were allowed to wear the maroon beret with a distinctive flash, as the unit gained the coveted "Airborne" status.

As the Army's only active duty Combat Camera unit, the 55th Signal Company (COMCAM) rapidly deploys worldwide into the full spectrum of military operations to capture, edit and transmit high definition still and video imagery in support of commanders' tactical, operational, and strategic objectives. At any given time, 55th COMCAM has more than one-third of its forces deployed in support of missions that include: Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom, Homeland Defense/Homeland Security initiatives.

70th Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Wing 9801 Love Road (301) 677-0070

The 70th Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Wing is a global organization employing approximately 4,500 Airmen, reservists, DoD civilians and contractors. The wing conducts and enables cryptologic operations for the Air Force and the National Security Agency/ Central Security Service. The 70th ISRW is subordinate to the Air Force Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Agency at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas, and serves as the air component to the national cryptologic enterprise.

Six intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance groups, four of which are located in the continental U.S., are subordinate to the 70th ISRW: the 659th Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Group and the 707th Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Group; the 373rd Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Group at Misawa Air Base, Japan; the 543rd Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Group at Medina Annex, Lackland Air Force Base, Texas; the 691st Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Group at RAF Menwith Hill, UK; and the 544th Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Group at Peterson Air Force Base, Colo.

The 70th ISRW's history dates back to when it was first activated as the 70th Observation Group in 1941. During the 1950s and 1960s, the 70th ISRW served under Strategic Air Command as both a strategic reconnaissance wing and a bombardment wing before inactivating in 1969. On Aug. 16, 2000, the 70th ISRW activated at Fort Meade as part of the Air Intelligence Agency. The 70th ISRW was part of Eighth Air Force from Feb. 1, 2001 until July 5, 2006, when it realigned under the Air Intelligence Agency. In June 2007, the Air Intelligence Agency became the Air Force Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Agency, and on Jan. 1, 2009 the 70th Intelligence Wing became the 70th Intelligence, Surveillance, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance Wing.

308th Military Intelligence Battalion Field Office 4553-C Cooper Ave. (301) 677-2246/2199

The 308th Military Intelligence Battalion is headquartered at Fort Meade and provides strategic counterintelligence support to U.S. Army installations across the continental United States by conducting counterintelligence investigations, operations, and collection to detect, exploit, or neutralize the foreign intelligence services and international terrorism threats to U.S. Army forces, technologies, information and infrastructure. The battalion has subordinate company headquarters at Fort Meade, Aberdeen Proving Grounds, Redstone Arsenal, Al., Fort Leavenworth, Ks., and Fort Sam Houston, Tx.

The 308th Military Intelligence Battalion was activated on April 1, 1952 as the 308th Communication Reconnaissance Battalion and on Sept. 1, 1956 was redesignated as the 308th Army Security Agency Battalion. In 1991, the battalion was redesignated as the



308th Military Intelligence Battalion until its inactivation in Panama in 1995. That same year the U.S. Army Counterintelligence Security Battalion was inactivated and redesignated the 308th Military Intelligence Battalion where it remains at Fort Meade.

352nd Civil Affairs Command 2118 Annapolis Road (301) 833-6719

The 352nd Civil Affairs Command is a U.S. Army Reserve unit with full-time Active-Guard Reserve staffing under a one-star commanding general. The subordinate units include two civil affairs brigades and seven civil affairs battalions that are spread over eight states. The Civil Affairs Command's mission is to organize, train, equip, validate, and prepare civil affairs forces for deployment to U.S. Central Command areas of responsibility to support U.S. Army Central, U.S. ambassadors, country teams, and other agencies as directed. Civil Affairs Command units shape the operational environment that enables rapid and decisive maneuvers and enhance the transition to peace. Their unit crest motto is "NON ENSE SOLUM," which is translated "Not by the Sword Alone." Civil Affairs Soldiers have supported and continue to support civil-military efforts in Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom, Horn of Africa and other overseas theaters of operations.



The Civil Affairs Command is headquartered in the environmentally-green, \$40 million, 1,800-member Army Reserve Center at Fort Meade. Built in 2005, the center includes training facilities, an organizational maintenance shop and office space.

704th Military Intelligence Brigade 9805 Emory Road (301) 677-0249

The 704th Military Intelligence Brigade conducts signals intelligence, geospatial intelligence, computer network and information assurance operations in support of Army, joint, combined, and national decision makers that shape future Army Intelligence capabilities.

Staying true to the motto "Here and Everywhere," the 704th Military Intelligence Brigade has subordinate battalions at Fort Meade, and at Buckley Air Force Base, Colo., with additional elements assigned in support of Army and joint commands that include U.S. Central Command, Army Special Operations Command and Army Forces Command. Additionally, the 704th Military Intelligence Brigade deploys teams and individuals in support of operations around the world.

Subordinate units include:

The 741st Military Intelligence Battalion, which provides personnel for information superiority operations within the National Security Agency and Central Security Service. The battalion provides linguist support to the National Security Agency, the intelligence community and other U.S. government agencies.

The 742nd Military Intelligence Battalion conducts contributory analysis and reporting through the Army Technical Control and Analysis Element, it carries out information operations, supports the Trojan satellite communications system and has taken the lead in SIGINT training to deploying units with Foundry sites at installations which include the Joint Readiness Training Center and National Training Center.

The 743rd Military Intelligence Battalion, Buckley Air Force Base, Colo. deploys technically qualified Soldiers in support of tactical command missions and provides advanced geospatial intelligence to the warfighter.

The Army Network Warfare Battalion, activated on July 2, 2008 supports the U.S. Army and the Department of Defense in providing tactical support to Army Brigade Combat Teams in Iraq through strategic support to other services, joint commanders and interagency partners.

902nd Military Intelligence Group 4553-C Cooper Ave. (301) 677-6991

The mission of the 902nd Military Intelligence Group is to conduct full spectrum counterintelligence activities in support of Army commanders and joint warfighters to protect forces, secrets and technologies by detecting, identifying, neutralizing and exploiting foreign intelligence services, international terrorist and insider threats.

The 902nd Military Intelligence Group provides direct and general counterintelligence support to Army activities and major commands. It also provides general support to other military department counterintelligence and intelligence elements, unified commands, defense agencies and national agency counterintelligence and security activities.



The 902nd Military Intelligence Group headquarters and subordinate battalion activity headquarters are located on Fort Meade. The 902nd MI Group has company headquarters detachments and field offices in more than 50 locations worldwide.

The Group began as the 902nd Counterintelligence Corps Detachment on Oct. 14, 1944, and activated Nov. 23, 1944, at Hollandia, New Guinea. The 902nd relocated to Fort Meade on July 1, 1974.

Army Audit Agency Field Office 393 Llewellyn Ave. (301) 677-7741

The U.S. Army Audit Agency provides objective and independent auditing services. Established in 1946, the agency helps the Army make informed decisions, resolve issues, use resources effectively and efficiently and satisfy statutory and fiduciary responsibilities.

The auditor general of the Army leads the agency and receives support from the principal deputy auditor general and three deputy auditor generals, each of whom is in charge of specific aspects of agency operations. This includes acquisition and logistics audits, forces and financial audits, and policy and operations management. The Fort Meade field office was established in 1998.

Army Public Affairs Center 8607 6th Armored Cavalry Regiment Road (301) 677-7272 www.army.mil/institution/armypublicaffairs

Army Public Affairs keeps the public and the Army informed, and helps to establish the conditions that lead to confidence in America's Army and its readiness to conduct operations in peacetime, conflict and war.

As the proponency executive agent for the chief of public affairs, the center develops, provides guidance for, and prepares Army public affairs doctrine, organizations, training, materiel, leader development, personnel, facilities and policy.



Central Clearance Facility 4552-A Pike Road (301) 677-6712

The U.S. Army Central Clearance Facility was established in October 1977 as the sole Army agency authorized to grant, revoke or deny personnel security clearances for the Army – including active component, Army Reserve, Army National Guard, and Department of the Army civilian employees. Central Clearance Facility is a subordinate command of the United States Army Intelligence and Security Command.

Central Clearance Facility determines sensitive compartmented information eligibility for Army personnel as well as Department of the Army-affiliated contractors. The Central Clearance Facility staff renders approximately 200,000 final security clearance determinations annually.

Criminal Investigation Division 855 Chisholm Ave. (301) 677-1682

As the Army's primary criminal investigative organization and the Department of Defense's premier investigative organization, the Criminal Investigation Division is responsible for the conduct of criminal investigations in which the Army is, or may be, a party of interest.



CID supports the Army through the deployment of highly trained Soldier and government service special agents and support personnel, the operation of a certified forensic laboratory, a protective services unit, computer crimes specialists, polygraph services, criminal intelligence collection and analysis and a variety of other services normally associated with law enforcement activities.

The CID mission is the same for the installation and battlefield environments; however, additional requirements are often assumed during battlefield support.

Primary missions of the CID include: investigating serious crime; conducting sensitive investigations; collecting, analyzing and disseminating criminal intelligence; conducting protective service operations; providing forensic laboratory support and maintaining Army criminal records.

Additional CID missions include logistical security, from the manufacturer to the Soldier on the battlefield; criminal intelligence (developing countermeasures to combat subversive activities on the battlefield); criminal investigations (expanded to include war crimes and in some cases crimes against coalition forces and hostnation personnel); and protective service operations (protects key personnel on and off the battlefield).

Defense Adjudication Activities 600 10th St. (301) 833-3921

The Defense Adjudication Activities is a collocation of all ten Military Departments and Department of Defense security clearance adjudication and appeals activities, resulting from the 2005 Base Realignment and Closure. Comprised of over 760 personnel from 10 collocated agencies, the mission is to provide adjudication, personnel security, and hearing and appeals support across DoD for military, civilian, contractor and other personnel as directed.

Defense Courier Service 830 Chisholm Ave. (301) 677-3786

The Defense Courier Service provides worldwide movement of highly classified, extremely sensitive national security material requiring courier escort. The 6,000-plus customers are served by more than 200 military and civilian personnel and a global network of courier



stations. Major customers include the White House, Defense and State Departments, federal agencies, government contractors and U.S. allies.

The headquarters, located on Fort Meade, provides command and control for 20 assigned and provisional stations located in 12 states and 10 foreign nations. The Defense Courier Service Station Baltimore, located off Rock Avenue, is the largest station in the system and provides connectivity with Washington-area customers, the greatest concentration of accounts. Defense Courier Service Baltimore serves a customer base located in Delaware, southern Pennsylvania, Maryland, northern Virginia and the District of Columbia. The Baltimore station also provides a pipeline to customers in Canada, Europe and Southwest Asia.

Defense Media Activity 6700 Taylor Ave. (301) 222-6700 www.dma.mil

The Defense Media Activity has settled into its new, 176,000 square foot facility at Fort Meade. DMA provides a broad range of high quality multimedia products and services to inform, educate, and entertain Department of Defense audiences around the world.

DMA is the direct line of communication for news and information to U.S. forces. The activity presents news, information and entertainment on a variety of media platforms, including radio, television, internet, print media and emerging media technologies. DMA informs millions of active, Guard and Reserve service members, civilian employees, contractors, military retirees and their families in the U.S. and abroad, including ships at sea.

DMA's vision is to be a world-class multimedia organization that skillfully uses and teaches state-of-the-art communication tools and methods and is attuned to the needs of clients and audiences.

DMA is designed to modernize and streamline media operations by consolidating military service and DoD media components into a single, joint, integrated multimedia communications organization. It was established in October 2008 as a result of the Defense Base Realignment and Closure Act. The agency consolidates the Soldiers Media Center, Naval Media Center, Marine Corps News, Air Force News Service and American Forces Information Service into a single field activity. DMA also includes Stars and Stripes news organization and the Defense Information School, a long-time tenant at Fort Meade.

As DMA's education arm DINFOS trains photo-journalists, graphic artists and public affairs practitioners for DoD. DINFOS is starting a three-year expansion process to increase the size of their building by one third and increase their annual student capacity from 3,200 to more than 4,000.

At the end of the relocation and growth period, DMA will have approximately one thousand military and civilian employees at Fort Meade and more than fourteen hundred other employees at sites around the globe.

Defense Information School 6500 Mapes Road (301) 677-2173/4076 www.dinfos.osd.mil

Recognized as "a national asset for organizational communication success," the Defense Information School is a joint-service institution established to train military and civilian Department of Defense personnel in the public affairs and visual information career fields.

DINFOS was formed at Fort Meade in 1994 as a consolidation of military schools from Fort Benjamin Harrison, Ind.; Naval Station Pensacola, Fla.; and Lowry Air Force Base, Colo. Disciplines include photography, videography, lithography, broadcasting, graphic arts, print journalism and public affairs. More than 3,500



resident students cycle through the school annually, trained by a 300-member faculty and staff comprised of military, Department of Defense civilians and contracted instructors representing all five armed services, including Guard and Reserve components.

DINFOS is accredited by the Council on Occupational Education, and the American Council on Education has recommended college credit for the majority of classes.

The school's mission statement reflects its commitment to "grow and sustain a corps of professional communicators who fulfill needs of the military and government leaders and audiences." DINFOS graduates are posted to serve worldwide, including sustained support of the Overseas Contingency Operations.

DINFOS' goals include delivering professional development support to organizational communicators throughout their careers; sustaining DINFOS as a premier accredited military/government training center; and being the DoD and interagency center of excellence for organizational communication.





In addition to entry-level training for both enlisted and commissioned officers, the school conducts a number of senior-level seminars and workshops and annually hosts the prestigious Thomas Jefferson and Military Visual Information Awards programs, whose keynote speakers have included Dan Rather, Clarence Page, Sam Donaldson and Andy Rooney.

Defense Information Systems Agency 6910 Cooper Ave. (301) 225-5550 www.disa.mil

Defense Information Systems Agency is an operationally focused combat support agency that provides real-time information technology and communications support to joint warfighters, national level leaders, and other mission and coalition partners across the full spectrum of operations. The agency's priority is to provide a core enterprise infrastructure of networks, computing centers, and enterprise services (Internet-like information services) that connect 4,300 locations reaching 90 nations to support the Department of Defense and national interests.

DISA is a global organization of 7,500 employees (about 1,400 military and 6,100 civilians) and a similar number of direct-support contractors. In addition to its head-quarters at Fort Meade, the agency has 29 field offices, including a field office with every combatant command and elements in 22 states and six countries.

The capabilities and services that DISA provides allow military forces to connect to the information resources they need from any device and from anywhere in the world. DISA enables users to connect, identify themselves, access services, find and share information, and collaborate as needed for their missions. The agency assists users to leverage the enterprise infrastructure to increase operational effectiveness through better command and control and information sharing and faster decision making. DISA operates and assures this reliable, available, secure, and protected enterprise infrastructure in support of the full range of military operations from warfighting to disaster relief and humanitarian assistance. The agency also performs engineering, acquisition, testing, and contracting functions to develop and improve this infrastructure, as well as for day-to-day operations, maintenance, and sustainment.

Environmental Protection Agency's Environmental Science Center 701 Mapes Road (410) 305-2600 www.epa.gov/region3/esc

The Environmental Protection Agency's Environmental Science Center opened on Fort Meade in April 1999. The building incorporates many environmental and green building features as part of the EPA's overall commitment to protect human health and the environment.

The facility was established on Fort Meade as a result of the Base Realignment and Closure process, in which several leased EPA facilities were consolidated into one government-owned site. The Environmental Science Center is unique to the EPA as it represents a partnership between the Region III Regional Office and the EPA headquarters' program Office of Pesticide programs.

The facility provides office and laboratory space for 150 people. Approximately two-thirds of the 70 laboratories at the facility support Region III personnel including the Office of Analytical Services and Quality Assurance and the Field Inspection Program. The remaining laboratories support the Office of Pesticides Programs including the Analytical Chemistry Branch, Microbiological Branch and Microarray Research Laboratory. In addition, the facility houses an office of the EPA's Criminal Investigation Division.

At the Environmental Science Center, EPA scientists conduct tests on soil, air and water samples to determine the presence of pollutants and other contaminants. EPA program scientists test methodology for pesticideregistrations and conduct method development studies for pesticide residue analysis.

The EPA National Pesticides Standard Repository is also located at the Environmental Science Center. EPA microbiologists test drinking water to ensure its safety.

Hospital disinfectants are tested to ensure the validity of their claims, and chemists carry out projects to provide information about pesticide residues in food. Environmental Science Center staff also inspects and investigates manufacturing facilities, hazardous waste sites and public and private labs.

First Army Division East 4550 Parade Field Lane (301) 833-8454 1aeast.army.mil

First Army Division East provides training and readiness oversight and mobilization operations for an area of responsibility spanning 27 states and territories east of the Mississippi River. The division is organized into eight brigades with 52 battalions.

Activated March 7, 2007 at Fort Meade, this multicomponent division is a team of nearly 6,000 Active Duty, Reserve and National Guard Soldiers, and civilians – all working to man, equip, train and deploy U.S. Army and sister service forces. As a subordinate element of First Army headquartered at Rock Island, Ill., the division's mission is to provide trained and ready forces to combatant commanders for worldwide military operations.

The division conducts training at three mobilization training centers located at Camp Atterbury, Ind.; Camp Shelby, Miss.; and Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, N.J. Working closely with the states and territories it supports, First Army Division East holds Soldiers to the highest standard and provides collective-level training for deploying units.





Forensic Toxicology Drug Testing Laboratory 2490 Wilson St. (301) 677-7085

The Forensic Toxicology Drug Testing Laboratory on Fort Meade is one of six Department of Defense drug testing laboratories supporting military readiness through a scientifically rigorous drug detection and deterrence program. The Forensic Toxicology Drug Testing Laboratory primarily supports the European theater, Army Reserves, and installations east of the Mississippi River. The Forensic Toxicology Drug Testing Laboratory is the only DoD military laboratory certified by the Department of Health and Human Services to test DoD civilian specimens for drugs of abuse.

Headquarters Command Battalion Building 4215 C, Roberts Ave. (301) 677-7967/7966/667

Headquarters Command Battalion and Headquarters Company was established Feb. 9, 1971. Today, multiple military occupational specialties make up the Headquarters Company. However, the mission of this company makes Headquarters Company one of the most multi-faceted companies in the Army.

Its personnel, Headquarters Command Battalion and the installation headquarters provide a broad spectrum of administrative and logistical support to the post community. Headquarters Company also provides administrative and logistical support to several partner units. The Soldiers of Headquarters Company are committed to sustaining the highest state of readiness and providing the highest quality of service. The 241st Military Police Detachment is attached to the battalion for administrative and training purposes. Their purpose is to provide law enforcement, military working dog teams, and force protection to the garrison of more than 12,000 service members, 35,000 civilians, and 60,000 family members and retirees at Fort Meade.

Joint Regional Medical Plans & Operations Branch, Northeast 4550 Llewellyn Ave. (301) 677-4662

Joint Regional Medical Plans & Operations Branch, Northeast, is a part of the U.S. Northern Command's Surgeon General's Directorate, located at Peterson Air Force Base, Colo.

The Joint Regional Medical Plans & Operations Branch, Northeast office integrates joint-medical services in support of defense support to civil authorities and homeland defense missions within assigned regions. The regions include Federal Emergency Management Agency Regions I, II, III, V and the National Capital Region.

In support of the president's National Response Plan, Joint Regional Medical Plans & Operations Branch, Northeast deploys as a northern command surgeon general representative to the defense coordinating officer and defense coordinating element, or to the lead federal agency for health and medical.

Library of Congress Book Storage Facility 100 Meigs Road (202) 707-9909

The Library of Congress Book Storage Facility was dedicated on Nov. 18, 2002. The facility is the first of 13 storage modules planned for high-density storage of Library of Congress collections. The two modules already occupied have a combined storage capacity of approximately 4 million items and will support the Library's mission to sustain and preserve a universal collection of knowledge and creativity for future generations.

The Fort Meade storage facility is designed to house paper-based materials such as books and bound periodicals, which are stored in specially designed boxes at 50 degrees Fahrenheit and 30-percent relative humidity on 30-foot-high industrial shelving. The facility accommodates approximately 1.2 million items.

Library of Congress materials may be requested from the main Library of Congress campus on Capitol Hill.




Marine Cryptologic Support Battalion, Headquarters Company 9800 Savage Road, Suite 6585 (240) 373-3756

Headquarters Company, Marine Cryptologic Support Battalion consists of the battalion staff and the Marine Liaison Office of the National Security Agency. Its mission is to provide trained, deployable Marines to conduct intelligence and information assurance activities in support of operational deployments.

The command deploys Marines for intelligence operations as directed, conducts military, technical, and unit sustainment training to ensure personnel maintain proficiency in their military occupational specialties and maintains personnel readiness to augment radio battalions or perform other operational deployments.

Military Entrance Processing Station, Baltimore 850 Chisholm Ave. (301) 677-0422 www.mepcom.army.mil/meps/balt

The mission of U.S. Military Entrance Processing Command and the Military Entrance Processing Station, Baltimore is to process individuals for enlistment or induction into the armed services based on Department of Defense-approved peacetime and mobilization standards. Three primary areas are considered when determining an applicant's qualifications for enlistment: aptitude for military service, physical qualification and background evaluation screening.



The Baltimore MEPS has enlistment responsibility for 23 counties in Maryland, two counties in Delaware, 10 counties in Virginia, three counties in West Virginia and the District of Columbia. The Baltimore MEPS is one of a network of 65 MEP stations located nationwide and in Puerto Rico. Aside from the MEPS located in Baltimore, 10 mobile examining test sites in the Baltimore MEPS area offer aptitude testing to applicants near their homes.

The MEPS was originally established in 1965 at Fort Holabird. When Fort Holabird closed in 1973, the station relocated to Linthicum Heights near the Baltimore-Washington International Airport. In March 1991, the MEPS relocated to a facility in the Dorsey Business Center in Howard County. The Baltimore MEPS moved to its present location on Fort Meade in September 2003.

National Security Agency and Central Security Service (301) 688-6524 www.nsa.gov

The National Security Agency was created in 1952 by President Harry S. Truman and the Central Security Service was officially established by the NSA in 1972 to promote full partnership between the NSA and the cryptologic elements of the military forces.



Combining NSA and CSS provided a more unified DoD cryptologic effort. The CSS comprises all U.S. military services. To further ensure joint operations, the director of the NSA is also the chief of the CSS.

NSA/CSS conducts its own recruiting and employment programs, hiring college graduates and seasoned professionals from all sections of the country to augment its growing staff.

NSA/CSS has developed special educational programs in conjunction with local high schools to help prepare local students for employment with the agency. The NSA/CSS also works with U.S. employment offices and civic groups to promote career opportunities to diverse and disabled job seekers.

Graduates coming from high schools and college campuses may move into one of three broadly defined professional occupational areas. Some specialize in cryptology (making and testing U.S. codes and ciphers), others become specialists in the data processing fields, and the remainder (especially mathematicians, scientists and engineers) will work in research and development.

The agency has a number of undergraduate and graduate educational programs established with Johns Hopkins University, American University, George Washington University, University of Maryland and Catholic University as well as its own courses.

The NSA/CSS staff is marked by a myriad interests, activities, and accomplishments outside of their careers. In addition, many employees are active in civic, religious and fraternal organizations.

Navy Information Operations Command Maryland Bldg. 9805 (301) 677-0860 www.niocmd.navy.mil

The history of Navy Information Operations Command Maryland (formerly known as Naval Security Group Activity, Fort Meade) includes several timely realignments that have positioned the command to maximize its potential, delivering quality intelligence and operational support to both the warfighter and decision maker.

The last realignment occurred Sept. 30, 2005, when the Naval Security Group merged with the Naval Network Warfare Command and was re-designated as NIOC Maryland. At that time, it was assigned parent command responsibilities for Navy Information Operations Detachment Alice Springs, Australia.

Established by the secretary of the Navy on July 17, 1957, the command has become the largest NIOC, with more than 1,400 officers, enlisted and civilian personnel who perform their duties within elements of the National Security Agency/Central Security Service.

With technological advances and the Navy's changing environment, the command has evolved, but has always delivered a strong, capable operational force. There is also a highly trained staff to assist personnel in human resources, education, training, career enhancement, medical, family assistance, emergency relief and recreational activities.

NIOC Maryland also provides casualty assistance calls and funeral honors support for four counties within the State of Maryland. The command has enjoyed five-star status for its bachelor quarters, earned the Foreign Language Excellence Award, and was selected as the Chamber of Commerce Military Unit of the Year.

Network Enterprise Center 1978 20th St. (301) 677-1116

Network Enterprise Center is the installation commander's principal advisor for information technology, information management and information assurance matters. Network Enterprise Center also has day-to-day responsibility to Fort Meade garrison and tenant organizations.

Noncommissioned Officer Academy Detachment 8541 Zimborski Ave. (301) 677-3069/2421

The Signal Corps Regimental Noncommissioned Officer Academy Detachment provides resident Advanced Leadership Course and Senior Leadership Course training at Fort Meade. NCOs in ranks of sergeant (promotable), staff sergeant and sergeant first class from Career Management Fields 25 and 46 receive training at the academy under the NCO Education System.



The Advanced Leadership Course teaches common leader combat skills, as well as technical excellence in visual information operations. It emphasizes planning, leading, and directing the operations of Combat Documentation and Production Specialists (25V), Multimedia Illustrators (25M), Visual Information Equipment Operators and Maintainers (25R), and Public Affairs Specialists BNCOC (46R and 46Q).

The Signal Corps Regimental Noncommissioned Officer Academy also teaches the Visual Information Operations Chief Senior Leadership Course and the Advanced Public Affairs Supervisor Senior Leadership Course

Additionally, the Signal Corps Regimental Noncommissioned Officer Academy provides certification for Level I and Level II instructors as part of the Modern Army Combatives Program.

The Signal Corps Regimental NCO Academy challenges NCOs to improve their teamwork, intellectual depth, communications skills, analytical abilities and decision-making capabilities. The academy produces highly motivated leaders who are technically and tactically proficient, physically fit and ultimately able to fight, survive and win on the battlefield.

The SCR NCO Academy Detachment is a subordinate element of the Signal Corps Regimental NCO Academy at Fort Gordon, Ga.

The Office of Personnel Management is home to the federal government's human resources experts, consultants and advisors. The OPM director serves as the chief advisor to the president on federal human resources issues. OPM's mission is to recruit, retain and honor a world-class federal workforce.

Within OPM is Federal Investigative Services, whose special agents and contract investigators conduct background investigations on current Federal employees, newly hired federal employees, federal agency contract employees and members of the military to determine their fitness and suitability for employment or continued employment, and/or eligibility for a security clearance. Federal Investigative Services Personnel Investigations Center on Fort Meade supports OPM's mission by reviewing and evaluating personnel security background investigations to ensure that they conform to national



security and quality standards. OPM keeps in compliance with appropriate laws, regulations, executive orders, adjudicative guidelines, and policies. The Personnel Investigations Center houses a highly streamlined operation that efficiently conducts a variety of commercial, law enforcement, military, public and federal national agency record checks from a centralized location in order to facilitate product quality and timeliness. A counterintelligence unit, also located at the Personnel Investigations Center, offers the capability to provide real-time information from pending background investigations to other agencies for action or referral.

Federal Investigative Services actively serves more than 100 federal agencies, ranging from the Department of Homeland Security and Department of Defense, to the Department of Health and Human Services and Environmental Protection Agency. Agencies use the investigations to determine whether individuals meet the suitability requirements for employment, or are eligible for access to federal facilities, automated systems or classified information.

U.S. Army Asymmetric Warfare Group 2282 Morrison St., Suite 5355 (301) 833-5043 www.awg.army.mil

The U.S. Army Asymmetric Warfare Group provides observation, analysis, training and advisory support to Army and Joint Force units in order to enhance their capabilities to predict, mitigate, counter, and defeat asymmetric threats and methods. Asymmetric Warfare Group identifies asymmetric threats, enemy vulnerabilities, and friendly capability gaps through first-hand observations on the battlefield, and develops solutions to these problems with a robust reach back capability to a variety of problem solvers and solution development processes. These combined capabilities enable the rapid delivery of solutions globally for deployed Army and Joint Forces. Asymmetric Warfare Group was activated at Fort Meade on March 8, 2006. The unit is headquartered at Fort Meade, has an LNO cell at the pentagon and mains an Asymmetric Battle Lab at Fort A.P. Hill.

U.S. Army Claims Service Llewellyn Ave., Bldg. 4411 (301) 677-7009

The U.S. Army Claims Service supervises the payment of Army claims throughout the world. It oversees the payment of more than \$70 million to Soldiers, family members, and civilians. It is also responsible for recovering more than \$19 million in medical care recovery and property affirmative claims on behalf of the United States.

U.S. Army Claims Service was created as an independent agency in 1963 and has been on Fort Meade since July 1971. It has been at its current location since 1978.

U.S. Army Claims Service has a staff of about 85 attorneys, investigators, and other claims professionals including civil service employees, active-duty military personnel, and temporary employees. The staff is augmented by a number of Army Reservists, who spend their two-week annual tours of duty with U.S. Army Claims Service.

One of U.S. Army Claims Service's most important missions is to settle tort damage claims made against the Army. For example, if an Army driver is at fault in an accident with a civilian car, U.S. Army Claims Service employees settle the claim for damage to the car and/or injury to the civilian driver. If they can settle the claim through negotiation, it saves the Army, the claimant — and taxpayers — the time and expense of a lawsuit and trial. Settling such damage claims is the job of the Tort Claims Division, which supervises the settlement of more than \$30 million in tort claims each year. The Tort Claims Division also settles tort claims asserted on behalf of the Army to recover property damage as well as the cost of medical care and lost pay provided to Soldiers injured by the negligence of third parties.

Another critical mission of the USARCS is to settle claims from military personnel for loss or damage to their property. This is the job of the Personnel Claims and Recovery Division. In recent years, the Recover Branch of the PCR division has recovered about two-thirds of the \$15 million recovered by the Army from household goods moving and storage claims. The division's Personnel Claims Branch sets the policy for and oversees the operations of 80 installation claims offices throughout the world that pay about \$26 million annually.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Baltimore District 10 S. Howard St., Suite 11400, Baltimore (410) 962-2809

Through partnerships with military, federal, state and local agencies, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Baltimore District team provides support to 23 military installations and other Department of Defense agencies throughout the mid-Atlantic region and supports the Overseas Contingency Operations.

Headquartered adjacent to Baltimore's Inner Harbor, the Baltimore District's team of more than 1,000 employees manages a large and diverse workload. Through the execution of military, civil works and interagency and international support programs, Baltimore District provides planning, design, engineering, construction, environmental and real estate expertise to a variety of important projects and customers in five states, the District of Columbia, overseas, and the Susquehanna, Potomac and Chesapeake Bay watersheds.

Work includes dredging sand and silt from the Chesapeake Bay, flood damage reduction projects, stabilizing stream banks, creating wetlands, improving fish passages and restoring lost habitats. Army Corps of Engineers also responds to emergencies and natural disasters, such as floods and hurricanes, and other emergencies in support of the Federal Emergency Management Agency and state entities.

USAPHCR-North maintains a professional, technically competent staff of Soldiers and civilians who provide preventive medicine support in the areas of medical entomology, environmental health engineering, sanitation, industrial hygiene and occupational health, and preventive medicine readiness planning and training. They also deploy individuals to support world-wide deployment missions and medical response teams.

The U.S. Army Recruiting Battalion, Baltimore is responsible for recruiting activities in Maryland, the District of Columbia, northern and central Virginia and three counties in West Virginia. The Baltimore battalion has one of the largest missions in the U.S. Army Recruiting Command, and its Soldiers are proudly referred to as the "Capitol Conquerors."

Military and civilians work together in the headquarters on Fort Meade. In addition, field recruiters are located at recruiting stations throughout the seven companies of the recruiting battalion.

In addition to recruiting enlisted personnel for the Army and Army Reserves, the battalion's mission includes recruiting officer candidates and warrant officer flight candidates.

U.S. Army Recruiting Command 1st Recruiting Brigade 4550 Parade Field Lane, Suite 5380 (301) 677-2790

The 1st Recruiting Brigade, the "Victory Brigade," recruits young men and women for the Army, Army Reserves, Officer Candidate School and bands throughout the Army. It is a subordinate element of the U.S. Army Recruiting Command headquartered at Fort Knox, Ky.

The 1st Recruiting Brigade, with headquarters on Fort Meade, has an Army recruiting mission within 13 northeastern states from Maine to Virginia, including



Washington, D.C. The 1st Recruiting Brigade's geographical area spans more than 255,000 square miles within the continental United States.

The brigade consists of more than 2,200 military and civilian personnel, which make up nine recruiting battalions, 49 recruiting companies, one European recruiting detachment and 383 recruiting stations.

U.S. Army Reserve Center 2118 Annapolis Road

The U.S. Army Reserve Center, which opened in December 2006 at Fort Meade is home to numerous tenant units. The center was built to facilitate and centralize Reserve training in the Baltimore-Washington, D.C. area, and operations at the new center are run by a full-time staff of approximately 150 civilian and military personnel. The \$38-million complex provides ample room for training, educational classes and administrative operations.

U.S. Army Signal School Detachment Student Company 8609 6th Armored Cavalry Road (301) 677-2386

The U.S. Army Signal School Detachment, Student Company is the home to Soldiers (National Guard, Reserves and Regular Army) and Department of the Army civilians attending courses at the Defense Information School on Fort Meade.

Because DINFOS is a Department of Defense asset, it is the student company's task to ensure that Army standards are met during training. The student company

administers Army Physical Fitness tests, conducts random alcohol and drug dependency testing, performs warrior task and battle drill testing and responds to students' administrative needs.

The company maintains one barracks in bldg. 8609, which is designated for initial entry training soldiers. These are Soldiers who have recently completed basic combat training and are here to earn their first military occupation specialty.

The company's student load is around 250 Soldiers at any given time. The company has only a handful of drill sergeants, so it depends greatly upon student leadership.

U.S. Army Test Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment Support Center 2220 Pepper Road (301) 677-9740

The U.S. Army Test Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment Support Center is a secondary transfer laboratory that provides test, measurement and diagnostic equipment calibration and repair support to the U.S. Army, Department of Defense, and other government agencies.

U.S. Army Test Measurement and Diagnostic Equipment Support Center-Central Maryland maintains an unbroken chain of measurement traceability from national standards, maintained by the National Institute of Standards and Technology, through the U.S. Army Primary Standards Laboratory and from this laboratory to the weapons systems in the field. This traceable calibration system provides commanders at all levels with the confidence that measurements are valid in the development, testing, maintenance and operation process and that systems perform as designed and are compatible with other systems on the battlefield.

U.S. Fleet Cyber Command / U.S. Tenth Fleet 9800 Savage Road, Suite 6586 (240) 373-3633

U.S. Fleet Cyber Command, activated on Jan. 29, 2010, is the Navy's central operational authority for global Navy cyberspace operations afloat and ashore designed to deter and defeat aggression, ensure freedom of action and achieve military objectives in and through cyberspace. It is also the Navy's service component to U.S. Cyber Command.

U.S. Tenth Fleet maintains operational control of Navy cyber forces to execute the full spectrum of computer network operations, cyber warfare, electronic warfare, information operations and cryptology/signal intelligence capabilities and missions across the cyber, electromagnetic and space domains.

U.S. Cyber Command 9800 Savage Road (301) 688-6584

The U.S. Cyber Command is a sub-unified command under the U.S. Strategic Command. U.S. Cyber Command's focus is to integrate cyber defense operations across the military. It is responsible for synchronizing efforts to operate and defend the Department of Defense information networks and when directed, can conduct full-spectrum military cyberspace operations, ensuring U.S. and Allied freedom of action in cyberspace while denying the same to our adversaries. U.S. Cyber Command was authorized in June 2009 and reached full operational capability in October 2010.

U.S. Cyber Command is headquartered at Fort Meade. The commander is also the director of the National Security Agency. U.S. Cyber Command is a separate and distinct organization from NSA, with its own laws, regulations and executive orders that govern military planning and operations. U.S. Cyber Command leverages the capabilities, expertise and infrastructure of NSA.

U.S. Cyber Command also works closely with the Department of Homeland Security and other agencies to ensure the nation's cybersecurity efforts and resources are coordinated while ensuring the best support to joint military operations. The command does so in compliance with all laws respecting the civil liberties and privacy of U.S. persons.

Service Cyber Components affiliated with U.S. Cyber Command comprise: Army Cyber Command, the Navy's Fleet Cyber Command, the 24th Air Force/Air Forces Cyber, and the Marine Forces Cyber Command, each of which maintains a presence at Fort Meade. The U.S. Coast Guard Cyber Command, a DHS organization, also assists.



U.S. Army Cyber Command/2nd Army 8543 6th Armored Cavalry Road

U.S. Army Cyber Command/2nd Army was established on Oct. 1, 2010 as the Army force component head-quarters supporting U.S. Cyber Command. Army Cyber Command consolidates the operations of numerous elements that previously reported to U.S. Army Network Enterprise Technology Command, U.S. Army Intelligence and Security Command, and 1st Information Operations Command, creating a unified operations center responsible for all Army networks. Army Cyber Command is currently headquartered at Fort Belvoir, Va., with staff elements assigned to Fort Meade.

Army Cyber Command is the Army's lead for all missions, actions, and functions related to cyberspace. It's responsible for planning, coordinating, integrating, synchronizing, directing, and conducting network operations and the defense of all Army networks. When directed, Army Cyber Command also conducts cyberspace operations in support of full spectrum operations to ensure freedom of action in cyberspace, and to deny the same to our adversaries. We operate and defend all Army networks around the globe, and prepare for full-spectrum-cyber-operations to support our forces worldwide. Also, the command serves as the Army's single point of contact for reporting and assessing Army cyberspace incidents, events, and operations, and for synchronizing the Army's responses.

Additionally, Army Cyber Command is the Army's proponent for cyberspace operations. Army Cyber Command guides the Army's execution of cyber research for product and combat development, and works with the Army Training and Doctrine Command to improve all aspects of Army doctrine, organization, training, materiel, leadership, personnel, and facilities related to cyberspace operations.

Army Family Action Plan

The Army Family Action Plan is a grassroots-level process that gives those who work, live on, or use the installation an opportunity to impact quality of life on Fort Meade. Representatives from throughout the local community convene annually to identify, develop, and prioritize local, global military and installation-level quality of life issues. AFAP issues are accepted throughout the year.

Army Family Team Building

The Army Family Team Building program provides classes to educate Soldiers and their family members to help make them more self-reliant and better-prepared.

Army Family Team Building is about adapting to military life as a single Soldier, military spouse, unit commander, retiree or Department of Defense civilian. AFTB offers three types of courses:

- Level I Introduction: Targeted toward those new to the Army or interested in updating personal skills or basic knowledge.
- Level II Intermediate: Targeted toward emerging leaders within the Army community.
- Level III Advanced: Enhances the professional growth and leadership development opportunities of family members, especially those who might assume advisory and mentoring leadership roles within the unit and community.

Family Advocacy Program

The Family Advocacy Program provides education and advocacy services designed to enhance family relationships and prevent incidents of child and spouse abuse. The program offers a variety of parenting support programs, including home visitation services for families of young children, educational workshops, support groups and a play group for young children. FAP programs and classes include topics such as communication, conflict management, stress management, the dynamics of family violence and parenting. Short-term childcare is

available to eligible families who participate in mandated programs.

Relocation Readiness Program

The Relocation Readiness Program provides information for relocating inbound and outbound service members and their families to include installation information worldwide, a lending closet, sponsor partnership; immigration and visa assistance; moving overseas classes and newcomer's orientation to Fort Meade.

Mobilization and Deployment Program

The Mobilization and Deployment Program offers pre-deployment and reunion briefings, family readiness group training and support.

Financial Readiness

Financial Readiness provides a wide range of services to assist military members and their families with financial affairs. Group and individual education and training are available regarding proper use of credit, getting insurance, financial planning, debt liquidation, home buying and car buying. Skilled counselors help with budgeting, work with creditors, file consumer complaints and provide information on local consumer laws.


Employment Readiness Program

Employment Readiness provides employment and career-related services. Services include a computer lab with resources for job searching, information about employment, education and volunteer opportunities. A variety of workshops are geared toward enhancing job skills, skill building, and career planning. While the program is designed to assist military spouses, DoD civilians, service members and retirees are welcome.

Army Emergency Relief

Army Emergency Relief is a non-profit organization which provides emergency financial assistance to Soldiers in crisis. Its mission is solely to help active duty (including Guard and Reserves under Title 10), retirees, widows and their families. Financial assistance is for basic living necessities such as rent, utilities and food and

Volunteer Programs

Volunteer programs provides volunteer opportunities designed to teach new skills, maintain an active resume, and meet new friends, while working within various community programs. A wide range of volunteer positions to include virtual volunteering is available. Ask about free childcare for qualified volunteers. Exceptional Family Member Program

The Exceptional Family Member Program is a mandatory Department of the Army enrollment program that works with other military and civilian agencies to provide comprehensive and coordinated community support, housing, educational, medical, and personnel services to military families with special needs.

Soldiers on active duty enroll in the program when a family member has a physical, emotional, developmental, or intellectual condition that requires specialized services. The Army defines an exceptional family member as any family member, regardless of age, who has a disability that limits that individual's ability to function on a daily basis and requires ongoing counseling, training, education, therapy or treatment. The family member's needs are then taken into consideration in the military personnel assignment process. Soldiers are responsible for keeping their EFMP enrollment updated as the exceptional family member's condition changes or every three years, whichever



comes first. EFMP also assists eligible family members of retired Soldiers, Department of the Army civilians, Army National Guard and U.S. Army Reserve.

Information, Referral and Follow-up

The program provides commanders, service members, and families with comprehensive information regarding military and civilian community resources. Offers long-term follow-up when necessary.

Hearts Apart Deployment Support Group

The Hearts Apart Deployment Support Group provides support to families who have loved ones serving away from home. The group meets monthly and has members from all military branches as well as Department of Defense civilians. The group also runs a "Hand-in-Hand" program which is a deployment support group that travels to area schools to offer support to children whose parents are deployed. Community members are invited to connect with other families while learning about managing separation.

The Soldier & Family Assistance Center provides oneon-one assistance to Warriors in Transition and their families; coordinating military, local, state and federal services to meet individual and family needs. Survivor Outreach Services (301) 677-5590

Survivor Outreach Services demonstrates the Army's commitment to the families of fallen Soldiers by providing support services. Financial counselors provide assistance to surviving families through investment and estate planning education and counseling. The SOS support coordinator functions as the long term support personnel for survivors facilitating support groups, providing life skills education and connecting survivors with valuable resources.


Military and Family Life Consultant

FORT MEADE HOUSING

The Fort Meade Housing Office is responsible for oversight of privatized on-post family housing, off-post housing referral and on-post single service member housing.

On-post family housing is provided through a Residential Communities Initiative program.

Residential Communities Initiative is the Army's vehicle for improving the quality of life for military members and their families by working with their development partners to create quality, safe, attractive, and affordable housing and communities.

Fort Meade and Picerne Military Housing are the partners of Meade Communities, LLC. The RCI liaison team represents both the Army and the residents in privatized military family housing. The responsibilities of the RCI liaison office is to be a link between Picerne Military Housing and the Army, aid in the transition of privatized military family housing into the Army culture and act as an ombudsman for military service members and their families who have unresolved concerns.

The office also handles authorization of non-temporary storage, local moves, retirement or separation moves and provides off-post housing referrals.



Off-Post Housing/Housing Services Office 4463 Leonard Wood Ave. (301) 677-7748 Monday to Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Families looking for housing in the local area are encouraged – but not required – to visit the housing services office. The staff will assist personnel to locate local housing and provide guidance as needed for those leasing, buying or selling homes. The office has listings of apartments and private homes for rent as well as for sale. Information about temporary lodging, installation maps and other housing literature is also available at the office.

Fort Meade provides more than 1,500 single-Soldier living spaces for service members in the grades of E-1 thru E-5 in two sets of buildings.

Service members assigned to one of the Service Cryptologic Element units (70th Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance Wing, Navy Information Operations Command, Maryland, U.S. Marine Corps Detachment and the 704th Military Intelligence Brigade) are normally housed in unit-sponsored barracks within the National Security Agency compound.

Service members assigned to other units (regardless of service) on Fort Meade are housed in the recently built Freedom Center Barracks.

Noncommissioned officers in the grade of E-5 are assigned private suites with private baths. Service members in the grades of E-1 to E-4 are assigned private rooms with a shared bath and kitchenette. Medical hold personnel and Soldiers in a temporary change of station status will be assigned quarters comparable to their grade when available.

If barracks space is not available, certificates of non-availability will be issued by the Housing Office based on requests from unit commanders.

Fort Meade does not offer Army-provided permanent party unaccompanied officer or unaccompanied senior noncommissioned officer housing. Unaccompanied officers and senior noncommissioned officers (E-6 thru E-9) may be able to rent homes on-post from Picerne Military Housing by contacting the Picerne Military Housing Central Leasing Office. They may also contact the off-post housing referral office.

What is Privatization?

Privatization uses the authorities contained in the Defense Authorization Act (known as the Military Housing Privatization Initiative), which was signed into law in 1996. Through this legislation, the Army created a program called the Residential Communities Initiative to improve on-post family housing.

PICERNE MILITARY HOUSING

Fort Meade has created a long-term partnership with Picerne Military Housing to finance, design, construct, manage and maintain its family housing inventory over a 50-year period.

By relocating to Fort Meade, residents have the opportunity to reside in one of the country's first privatized military communities. In 2002, family housing at Fort Meade became privatized under the Army's Residential Communities Initiative program. This program is designed to provide military families with homes, amenities and services comparable to those found off post.

Quality living begins long before the families move in, as each home is inspected. Homes receive comprehensive inspections by maintenance teams and are fully ready for new residents. Homes are cleaned and painted, maintenance is completed and upgrades are



made. Upgrades vary by housing area and may include new mini-blinds, plumbing and lighting fixtures, counters, vinyl flooring and in some cases, carpeting and new appliances.

Major upgrades and extensive renovations have been completed in more than 1,882 homes and 720 newly-constructed homes.

Personalized service for family housing residents starts at the Leasing and Relocation Center. Picerne Military Housing recognizes the importance of keeping traditional military customs. Its neighborhoods keep the traditional rank band integrity residents have become accustomed to with previous on-post housing experiences. Although many traditional military customs are followed, Picerne has made changes to the housing assignments to make living on post more desirable. Housing assignments for home sizes are based on family size, and allow a bedroom for each child, regardless of age or gender.

Leasing your home is simple. Relocation specialists are available to help make your move on post as seamless as possible. An active-duty military family simply fills out an application and provides orders and supporting



documentation. A Picerne relocation specialist will then assist the family with the selection of homes and availability for the service member's rank band and time frame.

Did you know military retirees and federal employees can live on post, too? If homes remain available after all active-duty military and their families are housed, excess homes are then made available to military retirees and federal employees. Call the Leasing and Relocation Center to inquire about how to lease a home.

New homes throughout the installation offer larger living spaces, at least three bedrooms and two bathrooms, walk-in closets, and, in some floor plans, an oversized garage to accommodate large vehicles and additional storage needs. Homes are energy-efficient and Internet-ready and include many features such as modern cabinets, kitchen islands, specialty flooring and upgraded appliances. These homes have been designed with family needs in mind, and have open floor plans suited for family life.

Today, five neighborhood offices serve six neighborhoods, each with a historic theme based on a landmark military event. Each office provides full-service property management. The knowledgeable, dedicated neighborhood teams are available seven days a week to assist with matters such as home assignment and lease termination, placing of work orders, and any housing needs residents may have. Picerne maintenance services include interior repairs and landscaping. Picerne's surface clean policy for moving out has saved thousands of dollars for military families, because a cleaning team is not necessary to move out and clear the installation.

Service Requests

Family housing residents should place service requests with their respective neighborhood office by phone, fax, e-mail or a visit to their neighborhood center. Service requests are placed into one of three categories: emergency, urgent or routine. A work order number is issued for tracking. Residents should clearly state the nature of the problem when submitting a service request. Picerne also offers a 24-hour maintenance emergency service. Calls for emergency work orders occurring after duty hours, on weekends or holidays will be re-routed from the neighborhood office to an answering service that will direct the call to the appropriate response team.

Resident Events

Throughout the year, residents are invited to enjoy Picerne's community-building resident appreciation events such as the annual summer picnic, National Night Out, Family Movie Night, Back-to-School Ice Cream Social, Holiday Family Fun Fest and more.

Potomac Place 4998 Second Corps Blvd. (410) 672-2981

Picerne opened the first new neighborhood on Fort Meade in the summer of 2003. Named for the Army of the Potomac, which was commanded by Maj. Gen. George G. Meade, Potomac Place includes sub-neighborhoods of junior noncommissioned officer, senior noncommissioned officer, company-grade and field-grade homes that have been designed with input from Fort Meade families. Additionally, Potomac Place is home to the Army's first neighborhood center that houses amenities for all residents to enjoy. Neighborhood Centers feature swimming pools, fitness rooms, half-court basketball gyms, community rooms and meeting spaces for community activities, media rooms to include a Wii café, laundry facilities, a children's library and more.

Meuse Forest 8700 91st Division Blvd. (410) 672-2475

Meuse Forest, the second neighborhood under development, is named for one of the most remarkable campaigns in the history of World War I – the Meuse-



Argonne campaign. In January 2005, Picerne opened its second neighborhood center, which offers the same features as the Potomac Place Neighborhood Center. The style of homes being built in this neighborhood is craftsman, identifiable by a rustic look and interior features that include rich, dark wood tones, wrought iron fixtures and subdued colors for countertops and appliances. Construction continues to enhance the community and the last phase of demolition is progressing. In 2010, we continued new construction in Meuse Forest, delivering another 132 townhomes.

Midway Common 7601 29th Divison Road (410) 672-2301

Midway Common is named for the Battle of Midway, fought over and near the U.S. mid-Pacific base at Midway Atoll during World War II. The choice of a naval battle for naming a neighborhood at an Army installation was made in recognition of the fact that today's families at Fort Meade include members of every military service. Located closest to the National Security Agency, Midway Common is the largest neighborhood, with more than 700 homes. Midway Common serves all ranks and is home to single family one-level ranchers, duplexes and townhomes. The style of this neighborhood is urban, reminiscent of a traditional family community. It is designed to enhance pedestrian circulation. The Midway Common Neighborhood Center was the fourth completed and opened in 2009, with amenities that meet the needs of today's active families.

Patriot Ridge 3533A McWhorter Court (410) 672-2183

Patriot Ridge is home to Fort Meade's newer junior and senior noncommissioned officer townhomes, which were built under a military construction contract in the mid-1990s before privatization began on Fort Meade. Patriot Ridge received its name to pay homage to the Revolutionary War and the establishment of the United States. The home style in Patriot Ridge is Colonial and the neighborhood is in close proximity to Manor View Elementary, Meade Middle and Meade High schools.



Normandy Bluffs 2699 Ninninger Ave. (410) 672-2000

Normandy Bluffs is home to Fort Meade's newer junior noncommissioned officer townhomes built with military construction funds. Representing the European Theater of World War II, Normandy Bluffs is named for one of the best-known battles of World War II. Normandy Bluffs is located directly across from Reece Road on Md. Rte. 175, just outside of the post gate.

Heritage Park 2699 Ninninger Ave. (410) 672-2000

Heritage Park is dedicated to the history of Fort Meade. Residents live in uniquely beautiful historic homes and cottages. Some of these homes were originally built in the early 1930s and are filled with character and distinctly beautiful architecture from the various artisans who helped construct them. Picerne works very closely with Maryland State Historical Preservation to maintain the integrity of the historic homes while renovating the interiors to provide residents with the updated necessities and touches found in newer housing. These charming homes and cottages are some of the most popular on post and serve junior noncommissioned officers, company-grade officers, senior-grade officers and general and flag officer residents.

In 2008, 139 newly-constructed junior noncommissioned officer townhomes were completed and Picerne's third Neighborhood Center opened in Heritage Park for residents to enjoy.





EDUCATION

Army Education Services 8601 Zimborski Ave. (301) 677-6421

The Army Education Services Division provides adult continuing education programs and services for active duty and reserve service members assigned to or living near Fort Meade.

Adult family members, retirees, and other government civilians are eligible to participate as space is available. Services include educational counseling and academic advising, Army Tuition Assistance to eligible personnel, the Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Services testing program, Army personnel tests program, and the multi-use learning facility.

Three college institutions – with branch offices located in the Army Education Services Division – offer post-secondary programs on Fort Meade:

- Anne Arundel Community College offers certificate and associate degree programs. Classes are held at Meade High School. For more information, call (410) 672-2117.
- University of Maryland, University College offers upper-level undergraduate courses.

School Support Services & School Liaison 1900 Reece Road (301) 677-1227 or 1177 Monday to Friday 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

School Support Services/School Liaison works under Child, Youth and School Services partnering with area school communities addressing educational issues involving children of military families.

By partnering with local, state and military communities, the school liaison is able to access a wide variety of resources to provide assistance with issues concerning student transition and educational needs.

The school liaison acts as a link between the installation and the surrounding school districts. School Support Services advocates for military families in a variety of areas within the school system to include home school and special-needs children.

Public Schools

Seven county public schools are located on Fort Meade. The schools are governed by the Anne Arundel County School administration and are not Department of Defense Dependent System schools.

School Buses

Passing a school bus when it is stopped or reducing speed for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers is prohibited. Vehicles must stop a full 10 feet to the front or rear of the school bus and remain stopped until the bus resumes motion or the flashing red lights are turned off.

Pre-Kindergarten & Kindergarten registration:

Children who live in Maryland and will be five years old on or before Sept. 1 are required to attend kindergarten and must register at their assigned school.

The pre-kindergarten program in Anne Arundel County public elementary schools selects four-year-olds based on economic and education need. If applying due to economic need, proof of family income will be required.

When registering a child for pre-kindergarten or kindergarten, parents must bring the following:

- child's original birth certificate or birth record
- copy of child's immunization record
- two proofs of residency (rental agreement, current phone bill, etc.)
- school records (hand-carried records are accepted)
- Social Security card is requested but not required

If applying for pre-kindergarten due to economic need, verification of total combined household income (W-2 and 1040 statements with one current pay stub) is required. If these documents are not available, bring three current paycheck stubs for each person employed as well as documentation relating to any additional source of income (including child support, Temporary Cash Assistance and rental income). Three center-based programs on post provide child care services for children ages 6 weeks through preschool. All of the CDCs at Fort Meade have earned accreditation from the National Association of Education of Young Children, a rigorous voluntary process by which early childhood programs demonstrate that they meet national standards of excellence. Programs seeking accreditation undergo an intensive self-study, collecting information from parents, teachers, and administrators and conducting classroom observations. Centers receive on-site visits conducted by early childhood professionals to validate the self-study results. A team of national experts who grant or defer accreditation independently reviews all information.

The best way to describe the curriculum is that it follows developmentally appropriate practices: a child-centered, child-initiated and teacher-supported program. The Creative Curriculum program allows for meaningful and long-lasting learning involving active thinking and experimenting to find out how things work. This is best accomplished through purposeful play facilitated by highly-intentional teaching practices. The Strong Beginnings Pre-K is an Army initiative designed to prepare children for kindergarten. The program has a greater academic focus covering science, math, language/literacy, social studies and physical fitness, preparing the child for school success.

Staff members follow a primary care-giving philosophy in which a child is assigned to one staff member who observes and documents the child's interests, strengths and weaknesses and enhances the curriculum around these observations. The goal is to develop an individualized program that will support school-ready children by enriching their learning experiences. The CDC strives to expose the children to the "Six Pillars of Character," (trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, care and citizenship) as well as promote the physical, social, emotional, cognitive and creative side of each child. CDC staff seeks to integrate these traits into everyday interactions between children and their parents.

The Family Child Care Office is a child care option offered to eligible families through CYSS. FCC is provided by military family members working as independent contractors in individual housing units located on the installation. FCC providers have their programs listed in the FCC-online system at the Parent Central Services office.

Homes provide flexible hours, a comfortable family-like setting and activities based on life experiences in the home and neighborhood. In FCC, siblings can stay together, younger and older children learn from each other in a small group setting, and school-age children can remain in a neighborhood setting. Most homes offer full-day, part-day and hourly care. Special services may include 24-hour and long-term care during mobilization and training exercises, evening and weekend care and care for special-needs. The flexibility of FCC providers is an asset in meeting the diverse work hours of military families.

Parents of children enrolled in an FCC home can expect to receive the same quality of care as in a CDC or school age program. FCC providers receive the same training and support as CYSS facility-based staff. Each group of 25 to 40 providers is designated an FCC network with its own director and trainer and managed like a 'child care center without walls.' The capacity of the FCC home is determined by the size of the home and the ages of the children enrolled in the home. Generally, the capacity in an FCC home at any one time is six children, including the provider's own children who may be enrolled in the program. Homes serving infants and toddlers exclusively (children ages 4 weeks to 2 years) can serve a maximum of three children. Homes serving school-age children exclusively (children ages 5 to 12 years) can serve a maximum of eight children. If you are interested in becoming a provider, call the FCC office.

The SAS program is nationally accredited by the Council on Accreditation and is affiliated with the Boys and Girls Club of America and 4-H, which is an enhancement to baseline programs.

The SAS program offers a wide range of activities to include the four baseline programs: life skills, citizenship (cooking programs, home-alone skills); arts, and recreation and leisure programs to enhance social skills, develop creativity, build cultural awareness; sports and nutrition fun; and educational opportunities with a computer lab and homework help.

and Girls Club Keystone council which plans and organizes teen programs such as field trips, dances, community services projects and youth sponsorship. The teen center also has state-of-the-art computers and technology opportunities.

The name SKIES Unlimited combines the acronym for "Schools of Knowledge, Inspiration, Exploration, and Skills" with the word Unlimited for the unlimited learning possibilities that this initiative offers military children and youth.

SKIES Unlimited provides the framework for instructional programming in the CYSS System worldwide. It encompasses instructional programs for children and youth from infancy to adolescence (four weeks through the end of the senior year in high school). Through SKIES Unlimited, youth in programs have access to opportunities that expand their knowledge, inspire them, allow them to explore, and acquire new skills.

Young people spend as much as 80 percent of their waking time outside the classroom. When involved in instructional programs during the critical hours of 3 to 8 p.m., studies show that they are less likely to engage in undesirable behavior.

Instructional programs foster the development of critical life, leadership, and social skills. The latest educational research confirms that student's involvement in afterschool instructional programs is beneficial on all levels. Instructional programs have been shown to promote the intellectual development of children and youth.

The appointment schedule for veterinary clinical services (which includes vaccinations, sick call and health certificates) varies due to food service inspection and military working dog commitments.

The Fort Meade Family Pet Care Center has 11 cat condos and 48 indoor/outdoor dog runs. The indoor runs are climate controlled, the outdoor runs are shaded with insulated roofing, and each has its own self-filling water bowl. There is a large tub basin for dog washing; professional grooming is also available. There is a retail shop with a variety of pet products. Short- and long-term boarding services are available as well as doggie daycare.

Leash Law

Dogs and cats on post must be chained, penned, or on a leash at all times when outside. Dogs tied outside must have access to adequate shelter and clean water at all times. Sponsors are liable for all damage to government or personal property and buildings, as well as any injury to other individuals caused by their pet's actions. Animals found unattended or roaming free on post will be impounded by the Directorate of Emergency Services and taken to Anne Arundel County Animal Control at (410) 222-8900.

There is currently a dog park under construction on post to provide pets the space to play within a dedicated, fenced area. For more information about the park's progress call Outdoor Recreation at (301) 677-3810.



Ownership

Dogs, cats, pet rodents (hamsters, guinea pigs, mice and rats), fish, small reptiles or caged birds may be kept in post housing. All dogs and cats in post housing must be registered at the Veterinary Treatment Facility within 10 days of occupancy in post housing. Wild and exotic animals are not permitted on the installation.

Pets must wear a Fort Meade rabies tag and have a current vaccination history on file. Every pet must also have a microchip implanted for identification purposes. This can be done at the Veterinary Treatment Facility on a walk-in basis. If your pet is more than 3 months old and has been vaccinated for rabies elsewhere, owners must provide the Veterinary Treatment Facility with a copy of the certificate during registration or the pet will need to be revaccinated.

No more than two dogs or cats in any combination are allowed in a single-housing unit. Please note that Picerne Military Housing has additional requirements which should be reviewed by any person with a pet to be housed on Fort Meade.

To receive routine dental care, including dental cleaning, all patients must have a current examination. Examinations are performed on a walk-in basis during sick call hours Monday to Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. Active duty personnel receive priority for care, and follow-up care will be provided until oral health is achieved. As directed in Army Regulation 40-3, Medical Services Medical, Dental and Veterinary Care, the Director of Dental Services will curtail space-available care to retirees and family members as required to ensure expedient care is provided to active duty personnel at all times.

Active duty family members and retirees

The TRICARE (United Concordia) Dental Plan is a voluntary program for spouses and eligible children of active duty members of the seven uniformed services. 
LIBRARIES

The Medal of Honor Memorial Library, also known as the Fort Meade Post Library, has been serving the recreational and research needs of the community since 1952. Borrowing privileges are granted to active-duty and retired service members, military family members, civilian employees, reservists, National Guard, and Picerne residents regardless of professional status and contractors.

All materials at the Fort Meade Library, except for reference and periodicals, circulate for a three-week period with one opportunity to renew for an additional three weeks. Under special circumstances, reference material may also be borrowed, but for a shorter period. Lost or damaged material should be reported. In accordance with Army Regulation 735-17, Accounting for library materials normally entails replacement with exact or similar item(s) at the discretion of the library staff. A curbside book drop-off is available for returning material.

The post Library is comprised of the following sections and offers these services:





- Fiction/non-fiction/reference: Contains about 25,000 volumes, and includes current releases, classic literature and other information. There are books and music on compact disc, career, travel, and foreign language materials, test preparation and study guides (including CLEP and DANTES), and DVDs on topics of general interest.
- Young adult area: Books for junior high school students through adult.
- Children's room: Books, CDs, DVDs, and videocassettes for pre-school through the sixth grade.
- Interlibrary loan: This service is available to customers desiring material not currently part of the library's collection. Such material may be obtained from other libraries through electronic request. Inquire at the circulation desk for details.
- Magazine (periodicals) room: There are nearly 150 magazines, as well as local and national newspapers available including the Baltimore Sun, the Washington Post, the Annapolis Capital and the Maryland Gazette.
- Computers: Wi-fi and Internet with no waiting and no time limit is available at the library free of cost. Printing, ten pages or less is available at no cost. One station is reserved for those with disabilities. Computers are equipt with Microsoft Access, Excel, Word, PowerPoint, and Adobe Acrobat Reader. Selected computers have Common Access Card readers and Electronic Personnel Security Questionnaire software. The Library's staff is available to assist.
- Electronic databases: Available on the Library's computers for research, school assignments, and general information. These databases are made available through the Army Library Program and vary annually. Selected programs may be accessed by computer through your personal Army Knowledge Online account from any location.
- "Story Time" geared to preschool-aged children, between 2 to 5, is held at the Post Library the second and fourth Thursday of each month from 10 to 11 a.m. from September through May.



 Annual Summer Reading Program is held each June/July/August and features five weekly sessions of entertainment from puppets to live animals combined with reading favorite books and stories in between.

The Fort Meade community may also utilize similar services and materials at the Anne Arundel County Public Library System. A current State of Maryland mailing address is required at the time of registration. The three closest branches are Provinces (Route 175, Severn); West County Area (Route 175, Odenton); and Maryland City at Russett (Route 198, Maryland City).

The Fort Meade Museum was established in 1963 as the First U.S. Army Museum. Its purpose was to honor the service and sacrifices of the American Soldier. In 1973, the museum became permanently established as the Fort George G. Meade Museum. Its purpose now is to collect, preserve, study and exhibit military artifacts — particularly those items related to Fort Meade — along with early American armor.

The museum also provides educational services such as the identification of military artifacts, lectures about military history and the history of Fort Meade, and battle staff rides to local battlefields. The Fort Meade Museum is free and open to the general public.

Topic examples at the museum include the Enigma Cipher Machine, the American Civil War, Vietnam, World Wars I and II, aerial reconnaissance, the Korean War and information assurance.

The museum is owned and operated by the National Security Agency and is open to the public. Admission is free. Guided and self-guided tours are available.

Active-duty, reserve, and retired military personnel and their family members and Department of Defense civilians working on Fort Meade or at NSA are also authorized to use this equipment. A FMWR Card, available at Gaffney Fitness Center, is required for eligible non-DoD patrons.

Burba Park Roberts and Llewellyn Avenues and Wilson Street Reservations: (301) 677-6196

Burba Park surrounds Kelly Pool. The shoreline and adjacent areas have been subdivided into five picnic sites with pavilions for barbecues and other special occasions. All areas are available for a fee on a first-come, first-served basis and require a reservation. The cottage can be rented year round, but the pavilions are only available between April 15 and Oct. 15.

Burba Park also has a newly-constructed Boundless Playground with swings and other recreational equipment, accessible to children with disabilities. The playground is open every day from dawn until dusk.

Patrons may fish in Burba Lake; those older than 16 must have a fishing license.

Capt. John Smith first explored Maryland in 1608. Since that time the state has furnished the nation with some of its most brilliant diplomats and patriots. Famous Marylanders include Benjamin Banneker, Francis Scott Key, Edgar Allen Poe, Upton Sinclair and Babe Ruth. The bravery of Maryland troops in the Revolution won the state its nickname, "The Old Line State." Named after Queen Henrietta Maria, wife of Charles I of England, Maryland is the eighth smallest state in the union with a total area of 10,460 square miles. Two hundred Europeans settled Maryland in 1634 and the state has flourished ever since. Maryland was the seventh of the original 13 states to ratify the Constitution on April 28, 1788. In the War of 1812, a British fleet attempted to seize Fort McHenry in Baltimore. During a 25-hour bombardment from Sept. 13 to 14, 1814, American troops successfully defended the fort, inspiring Marylander Frances Scott Key to write the Star Spangled Banner, which later became the national anthem. The historic sights of Maryland are a great attraction for tourists and residents alike.






Founded in the mid 17th century, Annapolis has been the capital of Maryland since 1695. It was the first peacetime capital of the U.S. Since 1845, it has been the home of the U.S. Naval Academy. Tours are available at the State House, where in 1794 Congress ratified the Treaty of Paris, officially ending the American Revolution. The State House, built in 1772, is located in the center of Annapolis and was the first capitol of the U.S. Today, it is the oldest state house still in legislative use in America.

Visit the U.S. Naval Academy and walk the grounds of the world-famous higher institution for U.S. Naval officers and home for approximately 4,500 midshipmen. Established in 1845, the academy displays parades, concerts and other various events every year during "Commissioning Week," finishing off with midshipmen graduation in late May.

The Naval Academy Museum features 300 years of American Naval history. There are four exhibition galleries totaling 12,000 square feet. In addition to the galleries, museum objects are also exhibited in the Chapel crypt, Memorial Hall, the Yard, and most of the





academic buildings. Open Monday to Saturday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Closed Thanksgiving, Dec. 25 and Jan. 1. There is no cost for admission.

Access to the academy grounds is limited. Visitors older than 16 must have a valid picture identification. The center is open daily. Guided walking tours of the grounds are offered through the visitor's center.

Robert E. Lee's first invasion of the North culminated with the Battle of Antietam, (or Sharpsburg, as the South called it), in Maryland. The battle took place Sept. 17, 1862, just 18 days after the Confederate victory at Second Manassas, 40 miles to the southeast in Virginia. Annual events include a Memorial Day Commemoration, held the Saturday before Memorial Day; Anniversary of the Battle of Antietam (Sharpsburg), Sept. 17; Independence Day Commemoration, held the Saturday closest to July 4; and the Memorial Illumination, held on the first Saturday in December.

The visitor's center houses a museum, observation room, 134-seat theater, book store and research library and is open daily from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. (Memorial Day to Labor Day) and 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. (Labor Day to Memorial Day). Closed Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years. There is an admission fee for anyone over the age of 16.

The original town of Baltimore was founded in 1729, but it wasn't incorporated until 1796. Baltimore was named to honor the title of Maryland's founding family, the six Lords Baltimore. It was a tiny village of 200 homes in 1768 when it became the Baltimore County seat. The city grew and became an important shipbuilding center where merchants prospered and the city's port flourished. The city was separated from Bal-

timore County and given status equal to that of the counties in 1851. Baltimore was the third largest city in the nation by 1860 and today is the 18th largest. With a world port, government offices, significant medical and educational institutions, and major tourist attractions, Baltimore is one of the most important cities on the East Coast.

Neighborhoods in Baltimore include Federal Hill, Fells Point, Little Italy and Mount Vernon Place. The popular neighborhood of Federal Hill was named for a huge celebration the residents held in honor of the ratification of the federal Constitution. The cannon on the hill overlooking the Inner Harbor is a reminder of the Civil War, when federal troops seized the railroads and occupied Baltimore and Annapolis to keep Maryland in the Union and to prevent Washington, D.C. from being surrounded by Confederate states. Among Baltimore's literary landmarks is a house lived in by Edgar Allan Poe, who died in Baltimore in 1849. He is buried in Westminster Cemetery, where Baltimore teachers and schoolchildren erected a monument in 1875.

The Maryland Zoo in Baltimore is the third oldest zoo in the country, and began in 1862 when the citizens donated animals, beginning with four swans, to Druid Hill Park for public display.

Currently the zoo's animal collection includes more than 1,500 birds, mammals, amphibians and reptiles, representing nearly 200 species. Animals are displayed in natural settings replicating their native habitats. The zoo features a three-acre African elephant park and a hippo and African flamingo exhibit. Take a safari through Africa. Discover hands-on adventures in the Children's Zoo, and explore the winding path through the Lyn P. Meyerhoff Maryland Wilderness. Open daily, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Closed Thanksgiving, Christmas and the months of January and February. There is a fee for admission.

This historic site, located in south Baltimore, features a replica flagpole on the 1814 site that inspired Francis Scott Key to write the words that later became our national anthem. The fort, named after James McHenry, secretary of war from 1796 to 1800, also features guard rooms, officers' quarters, barracks, and cannons from the War of 1812 and Civil War periods.

Come witness the flag change held daily (weather permitting) at 9:30 a.m. and 4:20 p.m. (7:20 p.m. during the summer months), interpretive programs and seasonal living history lessons. The star fort and grounds are available for self-guided tours. The grounds are open daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; the visitor's center is open daily from 8 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. Closed Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years. There is an admission fee for those older than 15.

It blends with the urban context of downtown Baltimore but takes its image from baseball parks built in the early 20th century. The ballpark seats 48,876. A light rail system brings fans directly to the park.

More than half the crowd can walk straight off of the street into their seats, without ever climbing elevators, escalators, ramps or stairs because the field is 24 feet below street level and the main concourse is at the same height as the sidewalk. M&T Bank Stadium is a multi-purpose football stadium located in Baltimore. It is the home of the Baltimore Ravens National Football League team. Served by the Hamburg Street station of the Baltimore Light Rail, the stadium originally featured a natural grass surface. However, an artificial surface was installed for the 2003 season. The stadium is used for college football, lacrosse and other events throughout the year.

The District of Columbia, named for George Washington and Christopher Columbus in 1791, is the seat of the federal government and the nation's capital. This 63-square-mile city boasts a population of more than a half million residents with hundreds of sights and points of interest that attract visitors from around the world. The

city's climate is described as humid subtropical with the temperature in winter averaging 34 degrees and 77 degrees during the summer, although these are subject to wide fluctuations.

Maj. Pierre L'Enfant designed Washington D.C. in 1791. It was the first American city planned for a specific purpose. L'Enfant laid out the city around numerous circles and squares connected by straight boulevards. The layout has often been described as reminiscent of a series of wagon wheels. This design, often described as brilliant, allowed for growth; however L'Enfant could not have foreseen the advent of automobiles in a nation of more than 230 million people. Four sections make up Washington: northeast, southeast, northwest and southwest. Any address is always followed by an abbreviation of the appropriate section of town: NE, SE, NW and SW. Washington has one of the most comprehensive and attractive public transportation systems on the east coast. The Metro not only connects the numerous sights in the city, but it also branches out to parts of Virginia and Maryland.

Our 32nd President, a man who embodied the meaning of the word courage despite being stricken with polio at age 39 and paralyzed from the waist down, emerged as a true leader, guiding our country through the Great Depression and World War II. The memorial honors this man, his story, and his era.




The National Air and Space Museum has hundreds of original, historic artifacts on display, including the Wright 1903 Flyer; the Spirit of St. Louis; the Apollo 11 command module Columbia and a Lunar Rock sample that visitors can touch. The museum offers 22 exhibition galleries, the Lockheed Martin IMAX® Theater, flight simulators, a three-level museum shop, and a food-court-style restaurant. Guided tours, daily free educational programs, and school group tours and activities are also available. The Udvar-Hazy Center near

Dulles International Airport displays hundreds of additional artifacts and offers events, educational programs, IMAX films and more.

Its mission is to provide leadership in animal care, science, education and sustainability. There are more than 2,000 animals representing nearly 400 species on display. The Fujifilm Giant Panda Habitat and Asia Trail opened in late 2006 as the first major step in a ten-year initiative to renovate and modernize the National Zoo. Other highlights include the Great Cats, Kids' Farm and Amazonia.

Open daily, except Christmas. From April 1 to Oct. 31, animal buildings are open 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and the grounds are open 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. From Nov. 1 to March 31, animal buildings are open 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and grounds open 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. There is no fee for admission. The closest Metro is Cleveland Park or Woodley Park-National Zoo.

The Newseum — a 250,000-square-foot museum of news — offers visitors an experience that blends five centuries of news history with up-to-the-second technology and hands-on exhibits.

Located on Pennsylvania Avenue, America's main street between the White House and the U.S. Capitol and adjacent to the Smithsonian museums, the exterior's unique architectural features include a 74-foot-high marble engraving of the First Amendment. The Newseum features seven levels of galleries, theaters, retail spaces and visitor services. It offers a unique environment that takes museum-goers behind the scenes to experience how and why news is made.

Construction on this hallowed residence began in 1792 and ended amongst much patriotic fanfare in 1800. Though never inhabited by George Washington himself, the White House was nevertheless conceived by the father of our nation as a holy fortress from which to guard against the tyranny of "big government" and "social programs."

Public tours of the White House are only available for groups of 10 or more people. Requests must be submitted through one's member of Congress and are accepted up to six months in advance. These self-guided tours are available from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday (excluding federal holidays), and are scheduled on a first come, first served basis approximately one month in advance of the requested date.
