Message from AF Dental Corps Director

Greetings from the Defense Health Headquarters Building and the National Capital Region. Having arrived 3 weeks ago, I am glad to be here to represent you as your new Dental Corps Director. Col Roosevelt Allen has moved over to AETC and let me say what a great job he has done in looking out for your interests. Keeping focused on the future by ensuring the continued development of the Air Force Dental Corps is critical during these lean economic times. We need to continue to be smart in how we take care of our most important assets, each of you. My goal is to continue to improve on our force development opportunities.

In keeping with the theme of this SGDetails, there have been numerous accomplishments over the past several years which have affected many of you. As was mentioned in the last newsletter, our new AEGD Residents participated in the first Resident Leadership Course, getting them ready for their first assignment after their initial year of training. Over the last several years, our AEGD programs grew to absorb the increase in HPSP sponsored dental accessions. With their residency graduations this summer, a fresh, energetic crop of dental professionals are headed to your bases.

The other opportunity for our dental CGOs concerns military education. The first in-residence developmental education (DE) training slots for SOS/BDE were made available to our CGOs this year. This is a great opportunity that has not been afforded to our new dental officers. For our more senior dental officers, additional opportunities to attend SDE in residence and fellowship

equivalency have been approved. It is important to plan early to complete your rank appropriate DE as you meet education, promotion and command boards.

The spring Dental Developmental Team met in May and reviewed Airman Developmental Plans (ADP), SURFs and OPRs to vector officers for clinical, academic and leadership paths. Make sure your ADP is up-to-date and discuss it with your commanders! I also hope you took advantage of the post DT Telecon that took place. Both NCO and Officer developmental programs help make our Corps strong and prepare our future leaders. Speaking of that, command opportunities were also discussed at the DT. Squadron and Group command positions need our best leaders. Prepare now and review your records so they reflect your qualifications. Information should be provided soon on group command opportunities.

Clinical education and training continues to be available to those interested in furthering their development. The Air Force has world class training programs. Make sure you are aware of application deadlines and prepare your packages well in advance. The Graduate Dental Education Board will be meeting in October in conjunction with the Fall DT.

Pays are almost a daily subject here in the office and we will continue to work on your behalf. FY13 pay plans are on track and contracts are on schedule to be posted at the KX site in September. The Consolidated Pay Plans (CSP) program continues to mature so please let us know if you have any questions. The Active Duty Health Professions Loan Repayment Program (ADHPLRP) continues to be popular. This plan is generally for two years and has a \$40,000 dollars per year maximum. Those officers with less than a 4-yr HPSP may be eligible.

Look for opportunities to broaden your horizons. Professional military education, clinical specialty training, Dental Leadership Course (DLC), IES, JMESI Healthcare Management Course, Interagency Institute for Healthcare Executives, and fellowships are all available for your career development. SG3D Update: Dental Programs and Resources

Welcome from the NCR and our new location, the Defense Health Headquarters, affectionately known as the DHHQ (yes, another acronym to remember). This campus offers many advantages in that the



Air Force, Army, Navy and TMA Health Care leaders are now co-located, facilitating communication and face to face interaction. It's hard to believe I've been in the seat almost 2 months, but in keeping with this SGDetails theme of "accomplishments," I've managed to: 1-get through the FY14 POM cycle without losing all of our people and money with less than a week to prepare for the AFMS wide panel presentations (thanks to wonderful partners both here and at AFMOA); 2-find my way out of the DHHQ at the end of the day (something you will understand when you stop by to visit); and 3-reacquaint with comfortable shoes as I explore the many

amazing sites that DC has to offer.

I must admit I've been drinking from a fire hose to take over the responsibilities for a \$68.8M budget and 3408 manpower authorizations. As alluded to above, part of my job is to work the dental PPB portion of the AFMS PPBE (planning, programming, budgeting, and execution). In other words, planning future needs with help from AFMOA and the field, programming/prioritizing needs and deciding where to accept future risk, and budgeting for what we are able to put resources against now. Because the process takes a significant amount of time, we have to be strategic by anticipating our needs several years in advance. As chance would have it, my arrival to the NCR was "perfect"...Col Tom Grace had retired and departed several weeks prior and we were 5 duty days away from the most important part of the POM (Program Objective Memorandum). In short, the POM is a budget exercise in which we change the contents of the FYDP (Future Years Defense Plan) through disconnects, initiatives, and offsets. That means, I needed to brief the AMFS Senior Leadership on Dental Corps requirements while convincing them they were important enough to resource.

So what does this mean to you? We just finished the FY14 POM which will now be passed to OSD and incorporated into the FY14 President's Budget. So far, we appear to have successfully been able to push our initiatives and manning shifts forward to the next level. Unfortunately, though, this is a never ending cycle. We will get our Surgeon General guidance for next year's POM in the July/August timeframe and start the whole process over again. The key to a successful POM is communication...communication from flight commanders to squadron commanders, squadron commanders to group commanders, group commanders to MAJCOMs and our team at AFMOA, and obviously communication to your SG3D team of one (me!). It is my job to make sure that our requirement requests are valid and then work to incorporate our dental priorities into those of the rest of the AFMS. This communication starts with all of you. All leaders at the operational level must know their programs and how to balance resources to maximize capabilities. If you don't understand the current manpower standard, ask! Be sure you know what authorizations (spaces) are in your Unit Manpower Document (UMD). Understand that your UMD is different than your Unit Personnel Management Roster (UPMR) which reflects the "faces." When you help build your budget, know what you cost and be sure to track it. Remember to track EVERYTHING including equipment, supplies, utilities, automatic data processing equipment, personnel, facility costs, and TDYs.

Bottom line, prioritize resources...they are limited, maximize capabilities, know what's "most dear", and eliminate inefficiencies. Even as a graduated Residency Training Officer, Squadron Commander, and Group Commander (both stateside and deployed), I can honestly say there are parts of this process I didn't understand. Please remember that we never stop learning! Whether it is through PME, OJT, or DoD sponsored courses (I just went through a week of PPBE), all knowledge helps us to do our jobs better. In return, this helps the Airmen who work with us and ultimately the patients we strive to serve. I am here to help, and welcome the opportunity to work ane on one with anyone who would like to know more!

June is traditionally a festive month for those assigned to the 59th Dental Group. Along with the anticipation of summer leave and spending quality family time, there is a small group of dentists and their families that have an additional reason to celebrate.

The 20th through 22nd of June was graduation week for 26 Air Force Comprehensive Dentistry, Endodontics, Maxillofacial Prosthetics, Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery, Orthodontics, Periodontics, and Prosthodontics residents and fellows. Major General Caron arrived on Tuesday in order to speak at the Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for the recently opened Air Force Postgraduate Dental School and Clinic. That ceremony was conducted on 20 June and is described in a separate article in this edition of SGDetails.

The resident graduation ceremony was preceded by continuing education lectures given by multiple residents, which showcased some of the best presentations given over the past academic year as part of the 59th Dental Group Senior Resident Lecture Series. The session began with Major General Caron coining Major James Piper (2012 Joseph A. Barron Award nominee), Capt Sara Cushen (Academy of Prosthodontics Research Competition winner), Capt Andrew Baker (2012 John F. Prichard Graduate Research Award winner), and Capt Peter Pedalino (2011 John F. Prichard Graduate Research Award winner). Following a poster presentation session given by the residents, Dr. Robert Langlais, former Air Force Civilian Consultant for Oral and Maxillofacial Radiology for over 20 years, delivered the first lecture. At the conclusion of his lecture, Maj General Caron presented Dr. Langlais with the Exemplary Civilian Service Medal.

The Graduation Ceremony celebrating residents and their families was held on Thursday evening, as 26 happy graduates walked the stage and received certificates of completion for their specialty training. This year's class put together an impressive record of accomplishments. Included in their long list of successes were: 21 Masters of Science degrees earned, 100% pass-rate on board exams challenged, 5 Humanitarian Deployments supported, 64 lecture presentations delivered, 31 manuscripts and abstracts submitted for publication, and 5 research competitions won. Dental Corps Chiefs or their representatives from the Army, Navy, and Canadian Forces Dental Services were in attendance to help award diplomas to graduates from their respective service. In addition, Major General, USA (retired), Patrick Sculley, Executive Dean of the Postgraduate Dental College for the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences (USUHS) awarded Masters of Science Degrees in Oral Biology to graduates of the Comprehensive Dentistry and Tri-service Orthodontics Residency Programs. This group of 15 graduates was the first to be awarded Masters Degrees under the 2010 collaboration between the 59th Medical Wing and USUHS.

The highlight of the ceremony was Major General Caron's delivery of the keynote graduation address, sharing his congratulations and best wishes to graduates and family members. He also gave his thoughts on service and leadership opportunities that will undoubtedly be available to our graduates during their careers. He ended his remarks with an invitation to the grads and families to join him the following day at the Basic Military Trainee (BMT) Graduation Parade. The following day, over 80 graduates, family members and 59th Dental Group teaching staff attended the BMT

Air Force Post Graduate Dental School and Clinic

LACKLAND AIR FORCE BASE, Texas — On 20 June 2012, Airman First Class Chelsea Huff, the youngest airman in the 59th Dental Group, marked a new era in Air Force Dental Service education, training, and operational dentistry as she cut the ribbon spanning the main entrance of the Air Force Post Graduate Dental School and Clinic. The new 32,000-square foot state of the art facility replaces the venerable MacKown Dental Clinic built in 1965. The new building houses the USAF's Graduate Dental Education Programs for Endodontics, Maxillofacial Prosthetics, Periodontics, Prosthodontics, and the Tri-Service Orthodontic Residency Program. Additionally, the general dentistry clinic is located in the south wing of the building. Dunn Dental Clinic on the west side of base will continue to house the Advanced Education in General Dentistry Two Year Program, base dental services, and will welcome the Advanced Oral Hygiene Program relocating from Kelly Dental Clinic.

Some of the Air Force Post Graduate Dental School and Clinic's highlights include sixty-nine treatment rooms, 5400 square feet of

laboratory space which includes the Brig Gen Theodore Almquist Medical Modeling center, and the MacKown Conference Room. The new conference room will allow the 59th Dental Group to accommodate in-house residency lectures, the weekly Senior Resident Lecture Series, and thirteen centrally funded continuing education courses that graduate over 250 DOD dentists per year.

While patient care started in mid-April of this year, the June ceremony commemorated the official opening. Major General Byron Hepburn, Commander, 59th Medical Wing, officiated the ceremony and hailed the day as one of celebration and thanked everyone involved in the development of the new 38 million dollar facility including the Army Corp of Engineers, J.E. Dunn Construction, DOD colleagues in Washington DC, and congressional leaders in San Antonio for their contributions. Expeditionary Dental Operations

Greeting dental warriors! For this issue, I wanted to review some of the great steps forward the Air Force Dental Corps has made over the last few years in the field of expeditionary dentistry. Everything from the equipment we take to the field, the procedures we do, the places we go and the training we provide has changed dramatically in our recent history. These technological advances have brought cutting edge dental treatment to some of the most remote areas of the world and could not have been accomplished without the continuing work efforts from everyone in the AFDC.

Less than 5 years ago, the primary dental equipment we were using for expeditionary operations consisted of a large bulky compressor, foldable chairs and flashlights with instruments that were primarily extraction kits. Today we deploy to the field with compact dental units comparable to our in-garrison equipment. This has opened up our procedural capabilities and in many missions this

year, the restorative and preventative procedures were almost as many as the extractions provided. In addition, sterilizers, infection control procedures and radiology instruments have improved. In some of the most remote areas, we are now using sterilization measures that no longer require cold sterile soaks. Instrument sterility, full PPE, and supply packaging for

transportation have all lead to improvements for our patients and deployed providers. This summer, DDRS was completed at all deployed locations and all humanitarian missions had digital radiology. This huge capability has allowed us better diagnostics and safer treatment of any condition in an expeditionary environment. With the data collected from the EMEDS HRT deployment to Peru this summer, we will have proven field tested equipment that rivals equipment in any clinic across the Air Force resulting in true "trusted dental care anywhere"

Not only are our treatment capabilities increasing but thanks to the efforts of our International Health Specialist, we have better information about diseases in the areas where we deploy. For the last 2 years, the AFDC has had dentists working closely

with over 26 nations to improve our understanding and cooperative efforts in improving global health. This year we established an International Masters in Public Health Program at USUHS that will train all future dental IHS folks prior to assignment in an operational billet. This program also counts towards in residence PME and promises to offer great potential in global dental health. I am currently working on trying to establish an enlisted dental position within the AF IHS program. As a first for the AFDS this month, through the coordinated efforts of LtCol Brett Chung, 13th AF, and East Meets West, I presented a lecture using video teleconferencing to Vihn Medical University in Vietnam as part of PACANGEL-Vietnam.

This will hopefully open up the possibilities for future subject matter expert exchanges using current technologies for future humanitarian and operational missions.

For future operations we are working on surgical lasers, portable oxygen generation, reconstitutable IV fluids, realistic mannequin training and improved sheltering for expeditionary operations. It is an exciting time to be part of all this and the AFDC. trom Residency to Retirement Developing the Next Af Leader

I clearly remember my first day at Yokota Air Base, Japan when I met my new commander. Dressed in my nicely ironed service uniform with my one ribbon, I knocked on the door twice, entered his office, and then delivered a sharp salute while stating "reporting to duty." I recently graduated from my AEGD-1 program so I was ready to use my newly acquired dental skills and be the best dentist possible. Unfortunately, my commander had other plans for me. Most of our discussion involved additional duties, career development, PME, mentorship opportunities, and my role as an officer. I proudly stated to my new commander "I just want to be a dentist."

The reality is that every dentist- from our most junior dentist to our General- has had the "I just want to be a dentist" moment. We hear the words "**you are a leader**" and "**you are an officer**" but only fully appreciate the attached responsibilities as we progress through our careers. The post-critique survey from the course was overwhelming positive with 98% of participants agreeing that the course will help them in their AF career.

From Airman to Chief and Captain to Colonel, our focused developmental courses are crucial in developing our next leaders. For our enlisted, the process of becoming a leader starts in Airman Leadership School and continues to Senior NCO Academy. For our officers and enlisted, we have the dental leadership and intermediate executive skills course to provide that additional leadership training. For our clinic commanders and other leaders, we offer CDS workshops, Squadron/Group Commander courses, and other advance senior leadership courses. These courses coupled with professional military education (PME) provide the foundation

DECS_the Year in Review

After a year of transition, moving from Great Lakes, IL to Brooks AFB, TX, and then again up the road to Ft.

Sam Houston, DECS has found its home at the Institute for Surgical Research (ISR) on the San Antonio Military Medical Center (SAMMC) campus. Major changes have taken place: a large increase in providing assistance to dental graduate research to both the Air Force and the Army, an increased level of participation in animal research with the Army's Dental and Trauma Research Detachment (DTRD), increased participation in the American Dental Association's Standards Committee on Dental Products, and new official collaborations with the American Dental Association's Professional Product Review.

DECS is a \$5 million laboratory asset located on the grounds of the military's largest level I trauma center and DoD's only burn center and the largest medical training facility in the US. Much of our instrument inventory is the envy of most major universities and medical centers. This didn't happen overnight—through the efforts of Col Howard Roberts and Col Kraig Vandewalle, an impressive materials laboratory has grown since the early 2000's. Dental research and evaluations has taken on a new level of sophistication and DECS has kept pace with technology and evidence-based dentistry. One notable example includes an X-Ray Diffraction system used to perform qualitative phase analyses of various materials. This instrument is one of only a very few in the world with a 50 micron spot size for small scale materials characterization. For quantifying chemical composition and analyzing molecular structures, DECS uses both Mass Spectrometry and Fourier Transform Infrared Spectrometry (FTIR). With the recent addition of the state-of-the-art Spotlight Image Scope to the FTIR device, DECS is now able to perform two-dimensional surface mapping for molecular analysis. DECS Materials Laboratories also use Micro-Computed Tomography (Micro-CT) for generating high quality three-dimensional images and for determining specific characteristics of a wide variety of materials. In support of our global mission, we are also able to measure the effects that various environmental and storage conditions may have on product performance by using a custom-made environmental chamber. Performance studies of this type allow us to control parameters such as humidity, pressure and temperature to simulate the austere conditions that military and humanitarian operations may face. In total, there are over 30 technical instruments and devices in the DECS Materials Laboratory that provide unique and innovative capabilities which are fundamental to dental materials science.

The US Army collaborates with DECS on instrumental analysis issues related to animal research, specifically mandibular bone regeneration. This kind of joint collaboration with the Army and the 59th Medical Wing at Lackland is becoming commonplace. DECS has stepped up to chair three subcommittees on the ADA's Subcommittees on Dental Products. Currently, DECS scientists chair the subcommittees on dental units, chairs and stools, dental field units, and dental investments.

Finally, DECS and the American Dental Association signed a formal agreement to collaborate on dental product evaluations to be published in the Professional Product Review supplement to the Journal of the American Dental Association (JADA). Many thanks to all of the military installations who participated in this multi-site evaluation. We are currently evaluating Filtek Supreme, Scotchbond Universal, Onset anesthetic buffering system, SonicFill, Isolite systems, new Impregum impression material, Physics extraction forceps, Proximator oral surgical instruments, Planmeca's ProMax 3D Max cone beam CT, Kodak's 9300 3D cone beam CT, and non-electric field instrument sterilizers, plus a variety of equipment synopses and updates to our library of continuing education modules to ensure CERP compliance. Plus we have completed the first dental equipment survey since 2005 and the very first dental materials usage survey. These usage trends give the dental corps insight into what clinics are using.

Finally, we had an opportunity to promote Math and Science to middle school children as part of the Gains in Education in Math and Science (GEMS) program. DECS staff had the opportunity to educate 72 middle school children about dental research. This nationally recognized program will remain a part of the summer intern program at the ISR. We have been asked to reconstruct a crime scene for bite mark analysis at next year's program. We enjoy your emails and our aim is to personally answer every question you have. Let us know how we're doing!

It's hard to believe that it has been a year since we transitioned to full CDA utilization. I think that we would all admit that entering workload into CDA has turned out to be much easier than we had all first imagined it would be. The 1 May 2011 transition from our 29-year-old system called DDS-W to CDA went smoothly, and the visibility on patient scheduling, workload, population health and readiness metrics we now have integrated into our system is tremendous. Additional data mining capabilities, patient history access, and report functionality has given us a broader view over our overall dental readiness and patient needs. We have experienced a transition to under 24-hour readiness reporting time to PIMR which impacts our AF mission globally. What a great achievement!

During our first calendar year of use, we captured the following AF totals in CDA: 1.4 million appointments; 3.6 million clinical procedures; 380 million DWVs; 1.1 million laboratory procedures; 2.8 million CLV's.

Although we are all doing a great job using CDA, the support office at AFMOA/SGD will continue to focus on the existing platform to make process improvements as we can. Process improvement ideas may come from leadership and CDA staff, but most importantly from YOU the users - you are the experts that use the program day-in and day-out. No, you may not know all the bells and whistles CDA has to offer, but you know what it takes to get your job done and if there is anything that we can do to expedite the process so that you can focus on the important stuff - like patients. Please feel free to share your ideas with us at any time.

AF Dental Digital Imaging Archive: A Milestone Reached

We've come a long way since launching Air Force Digital Dental Radiology (DDR) in 2006. Since then, all 79 AF Active Duty dental clinics, all 43 AF Reserve clinics, and approximately 30 of the 89 Air National Guard clinics have deployed DDR. Since the very beginning, our ultimate goal has been to be able to take patient images at any DoD clinic (Army, Navy, or Air Force) to include deployed locations anywhere in the world, and make them available to the end user (you) in a timely manner, at any time, regardless of your location.

In February 2012, this vision took one step closer to becoming a reality when all Active Duty Air Force Dental Clinics were fully bi-directionally connected to the dental digital image archive server at Wright Patterson Air Force Base and began transmitting images from their local MiPACS servers to the archive as well as receiving images from the archive. Thirty-three AF Reserve clinics co-located with AD clinics are also automatically having their images transferred. The remaining AF Reserve clinics are non-collocated with AD clinics and have been connected to the backup archive at Robins AFB, however work is currently underway to connect these AF Reserve clinics to Wright Patterson. In addition we are connecting the ANG clinics as they come on line. Also, progress is being made in channeling images taken at deployed locations to the archive. Finally, the three services are actively working to get full access to each other's DDR systems so that no matter which military clinic sees a service member or beneficiary they have access to any existing digital radiograph - truly, worldwide access to images "Anytime and Anyplace."

According to Mr. Ed Gallacher, the Senior DDR Systems Administrator at Wright Patterson AFB who oversees the archive, the current server has a capacity of 16 Terabytes (one million million or 10¹² bytes of data) with about 7 Terabytes of space now being used up by images. The archive will soon be upgraded to allow for 50 terabytes of storage capacity plus an offsite backup of 50 terabytes, which should give us years of growth and we have capacity to add additional storage later if needed. Currently, approximately 7 million images representing over 750,000 patients are available on the archive and on a daily basis, almost all of the 100+ connected clinics query the archive as they retrieve images for use. You may also be interested to know that our DDR system has been listed as the largest (geographically) radiology PACS (Picture Archive and Communications System) in the DoD. While our DDR journey hasn't always been completely smooth, it is definitely satisfying when an overall plan comes together as well as it has with DDR.

Oral Pathology Update
