

Other Founders Day activities included the presentation of the Distinguished Graduate Award to two renowned graduates, and a Founders Day Dinner.

Cadets conduct tribal engagement

Exercise prepares for the cultural and social relationships of war

Rolling into a simulated Afghan vilfrom Behavioral Sciences 460, Sociology of Violence and War, arrived by Humvee ready to accomplish their mission of engaging the local popula-

Cadets spent the first part of the semester learning about the culture of the people they would encounter, reading texts that prepared them for the stressful situations with which they would be faced, and hearing from an Army Special Forces guest lecturer who relayed expertise from his nine overseas tours.

"People tend to think about war in a more traditional sense where that's not always the case, especially with what we're doing in Afghanistan and Iraq right now," said Cadet 1st Class Ricky Rodriguez, a behavioral sciences major who will go on to pilot training following graduation.

Cultural considerations were one of the most important preparations for entering the village, Cadet Rodriguez

said. "One thing that is completely different from our culture is the physical distance—they sat less than a couple inches away from me when lage at Fort Carson Saturday, cadets I was invited in for a cup of tea, but that's how they show they trust you."

> Four teams of cadets entered the village four different times to accomplish predetermined objectives, mostly focused on information and data gathering. Cadets interacted with village members to determine the current living conditions in the village, economic and educational development, law enforcement activity, and health care needs, among other items of interest.

> "I believe the most challenging part was trying to talk to the people because it's not just talking to them, it's trying to get the information you want from them," said Cadet 1st Class Jeremiah Baxter, a behavioral sciences major who will go into security forces after graduation. "In that culture, a lot of times you may want to talk about one thing, but they want to talk about something else. Of course we went in with objectives, but at the same time I also had to establish a re-

lationship with them."

Course director and associate professor of behavioral sciences, Dr. Wilbur Scott, said the exercise was intended to impress up the cadets that the social and cultural skills necessary to augment military skills are crucial to success in the counterinsurgency warfare they were facing.

Participants noted the female cadets played an important role in accomplishing the mission by their unique ability to communicate with the female villagers.

"The second we were welcomed into the women's group, they began to pet and touch our hair, cheeks and nails.

The mentoring challenge

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — Our U.S. Air Force has changed dramatically over time. Consider that 30 years ago the Air Force had more than 565,000 officer and enlisted members. By the end of fiscal year 2010, we had fewer than 330,000.

Couple this nearly 42% reduction in manpower with military budget cuts and the need to prepare for more complex, varied operations in the future and you have an environment we are all very used to: change. Imagine what our Airmen entering the Air Force today will see over the next 20 to 30 years.

To be effective, formal mentoring programs should adapt to this ever-changing environment. In times of stability, traditional coaching, counseling and facilitating skills are sufficient, but the dynamic environment we live in today requires mentors to become more than experts; they also need to be co-learners.

Senior mentors should take the opportunity to learn about the younger more diverse generation instead of following the more conventional role as the authority and the protégé as the learner.

Adapting to the changing environment, Air Force officials have implemented fresh changes. Improvements to My Development Plan -- MyDP -- on the Air Force Portal are a great start but meaningful mentoring comes from the interaction between individuals. Mentors ought to be willing to listen, ask questions and be candid about what they don't know.

Successful mentoring of our Airmen is a strategic imperative. Ensuring the Air Force remains adept at solving the increasingly complicated problems in a complex world, we must continue efforts to be leading competitors in the search for talent.

Once these talented individuals join our all-volunteer

force, developing them becomes a top priority. Mentors provide the tools to allow individuals to achieve their professional and personal goals. After all, it takes 10 years to replace an Airman who separates after serving for 10 years.

The challenge: your rank determines the number of mentoring relationships you have. For example, a Master Sergeant, E-7, should mentor seven Airmen. A major, O-4, should mentor four Airmen. General Schedule civilians should follow the officer structure.

Understanding that the Air Force model is to have supervisors as primary mentors, I encourage Airmen to seek other mentorship opportunities outside the chain of command. Additionally, mentors should expand their opportunities as co-learners by seeking out those who are different than themselves.

The second part of the challenge is to have supervisors ask subordinates to name those they are mentoring and share their experiences during feedback sessions. This will facilitate discussion, enhance mentoring at all levels, and ensure accountability.

Of course, this challenge is voluntary and not Air Force policy, but if done correctly, will ensure the U.S. Air Force remains the number one air force in the world.

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Academy physics experiment bound for international space station

Test investigates interactions of space vehicles with station

The Academy's next space-bound experiment completed another round of preflight testing March 31, in preparation for a mid-April trip to space.

The experiment is called Canary, and is one of the latest creations of the Academy's Space Physics and Atmospheric Research Center.

"The idea of the experiment is to investigate interactions of visiting space vehicles with the space station," said Dr. Richard Balthazor of the Department of Physics.

Canary is slated to go into space aboard the Space Shuttle Endeavour, for installation on the International Space Station. Canary is one of four scientific experiments in the payload of Space Test Program Houston 3, which is managed by the Department of Defense Space Test Program offices at Johnson Space Center in Houston. The DOD Space Test Program is providing the launch, integration and operations services to get Canary into space, and integration was the whole reason behind the latest test-

"The purpose of this test is to deconflict multiple operations in the same environment," said Doctor Balthazor. "We've got other astronauts who've got experiments running, as well as ourselves, so everybody is working together to deconflict the simultaneous operations."

Cadets and faculty had to run through innumerable checklists, balance with the other organizations involved and available satellite time to test their experiment.

shuttle launch to the International Space Station," said Cadet 2nd Class Samantha Latch, a physics major who commanded the simulations. "All of the payloads that are going up with the shuttle were running what would be a standard day while our payloads are up on the ISS. So we were given a standard day window of functional testing and data downloading."

Canary is a 10 centimeter cube in size, and will be bolted to the exterior of the International Space Station. It will replace a current Acad-"It's our last simulation before we go live on the emy experiment on the station, which is an In-

tegrated Miniaturized Electrostatic Analyzer, or iMESA for short.

Canary is derived from the WISPERS instrument flying on FalconSAT-5, which is an electrostatic analyzer capable of detecting ions over the range zero to 1,500 electronvolts. An onboard processor and data storage can record up to one gigabyte of data for later retrieval by the Department of Physics.

The Space Shuttle Endeavor is scheduled for an April 29 launch, and will be piloted by retired Col. Gregory Johnson, a class of 1984 Air Force Academy graduate.




The Commandant of Cadets' "Way of Life" committee hosted four documented Tuskegee Airmen at the Academy April 1-2.

They even examined our teeth," said Cadet 1st Class Antonia Concepcion, also a behavioral sciences major. "Because of the unique and strong bond women often have with each other, regardless of how familiar they are, the abundant information we gained contributed vastly to our mission."

Cadet Baxter said he was struck by the leadership lesson in decision-making the exercise provided, and how one of the classroom models of visualizing scenarios before being faced with them helped tremendously. For example, a vehicle driver needing to know in advance how he will negotiate a road block should he encounter one.

"I know you're not going to be prepared for everything, but at the same time, as a lieutenant, you're going to be forced to make decisions," he said. "And, what we saw from the followership side is that when other people were in charge, we just wanted them to make a decision in a timely manner, whether it was wrong or right."

Overall, the cadets expressed that the mock village exercise was an eye-opening experience and one they would remember throughout their Air Force careers.

Maj. Damian McCabe, assistant professor of behavioral sciences, said the hands-on experience these cadets had at Fort Carson was a progression of four courses they have taken throughout their cadet careers.

The courses include BS 110, an introduction to human behavior on the individual level; BS 310, which focuses on leadership and decision-making; BS 358, military and society, and finally the capstone course, BS 460, which integrates all of those principles.

"The area where we thought we could contribute most to building these officers of character is to give them more capacity to make very crucial decisions in very complex social and cultural contexts," said Major McCabe. "We tried to create a course with some level of application, where they would be challenged to think about decision-making models, think about culture, think about social structures, think about the role of the military, and the interplay between the military, society and politics."

Major McCabe went on to explain that one of the common threads the course produced was the recognition and importance of respect for human dignity when faced with those types of decisions in foreign cultures.

This is the first semester BS 460 was offered by the Behavioral Sciences Department, as well as the first time cadets travelled to Fort Carson to participate in tribal engagement scenarios.




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Academy releases new app for iTunes, Android

The U.S. Air Force Academy released its new app Wednesday for iTunes and Android.

The app is a free download and is a one-stopshop for Academy news, photos and videos on Android and iTunes enabled devices. It is the first official Air Force-related app released on either network.

"We're thrilled to be working in conjunction with Academy Admissions to get this app out," said Lt. Col. John Bryan, director of Academy Public Affairs. "We worked really hard with Admissions and the developers to ensure we got something out that not only positively represents the Air Force and the Academy, but also something that's on par with apps from other big-name colleges."

Some highlights of the app include links to up-to-the-minute Academy news and sports stories. The app also includes photos which can be downloaded and set as the device's wallpaper. Other notables are Twitter and YouTube feeds, polls, admissions information and calendars. There is also a 'share' button allowing users to recommend the app to friends.

A key interactive feature on the app is the ability to stream the Academy's radio station, KAFA. With the tap of a screen, users can listen to KAFA anywhere in the world with access to Wi-Fi or cellular service.

"The ability to get KAFA to the masses

is huge for us," Colonel Bryan said. "There are a lot of Academy grads out there serving all over the world. This enables them to stay in touch with the Academy no matter where they are."

Users wanting to access the KAFA portion of the app should know that section requires a lot of data and it is suggested that they listen while using a Wi-Fi signal.

Another selling point for the app, and the reason it was created in the first place, is the ability to get Admissions information to potential candidates. Students interested in attending the Academy can get on the app and search for Academy liaison officers in their region. There are also Admissions' checklists for applicants, appointees and candidates.





Ft Carson takes home over-30 hoops title

Fort Carson defeated the Academy 92-81 in the Over 30 Rocky Mountain Basketball championship Saturday in the fitness center's east gym.

The competition pitted an allstar squad from Fort Carson against the Academy's top over-30 hoopsters.

The first half was a close contest, but with eight minutes left in the half, the Academy's Rod Smith scored on a fast break making the score 28-23. Smith followed that up with a quick three pointer, and a few minutes later, Mike Davis' fast break bucket made it 35-26.

And then Fort Carson started it's comeback - Ed Jackson's put back made it 35-31, and Kenneth McKinley's slam dunk off an ally oop, and a bucket from Robert Brown, gave Fort Carson a 38-37 lead. As the buzzer sounded to end the first half, the scoreboard read AFA 43, Ft Carson 42.

The Academy started out the second half with a bang, going on a 17-2 run. Brett Huyser, Rod Smith, Terrance Tyler and Mike Davis all had buckets to extend their lead to 16, making the score 60-44.

Fort Carson's coach Stephanie Timmons called timeout and instructed her team to start pressing. As soon as the press started, the Academy started to either throw the ball out of bounce or to the wrong team. It didn't take long for Carson to close the gap, and within four minutes Fort Carson went on a 14-2 run.

Ed Jackson's three pointer made the score 62-58 with the Academy holding a slight four point lead. With about eight minutes left in the game, Antonio Green's basket and free throw put Carson up one, 70-

The Academy team could not keep up with Carson's up-tempo defense, and another steal and fast break basket by Carson's Robert Brown gave the mountain post's team the momentum they needed to propel them to the win.

Leading scorers for Fort Carson were Ed Jackson with 21, Antonio Green with 20, and Kenneth McKinley added 17 points. Bret Huyser led the Academy in scoring with 25 points, Rod Smith chipped in 22 and Terrance Tyler followed with 16 points.


