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"EUROTRIP" CAMP - ACT SUMMER PROJECT

Preparing for the camp was hard work for me and Kristina Puzarina, FLEX'05. We both had to spend a great deal of time reading books, searching the Internet and creating lectures and presentations. We wanted to make the camp not only informative, but also fun. In this way, we combined lecture time with lively games and creative activities.

Even harder was conducting interviews in order to select only 16 participants – since more than 25 students applied! We tried to choose different participants, focusing on their willingness to learn about Europe,

time availability (we wanted responsible campers), English fluency level, age and previous experience in participation in similar projects; we combined experienced participants with inexperienced players. Our parameters sought to find individuals who would open up and enjoy our camp, and also interact with those helping them to assimilate into the American Corner community.

From 10 AM till 1 PM our camp was devoted to one European country. At the beginning of the day we played games with campers, so they had a chance to get to know each other better, become friends; in short, to start their day with a smile. Then dividing the lecture time between the two of us, Kristina or I presented a short video clip about the country we were planning to explore that day. Additionally, we entered the room in T-shirts, specially decorated with the country's main symbols. This helped our participants to easily guess the country in question. After that, we showed the country on the map of Europe and drew the route, pointing out trip highlights. Then, after reviewing with the students what they already knew about the country, the lecturer gave a PowerPoint presentation. We studied main facts, geographical location, and cultural peculiarities, focused on national traditions, holidays and lifestyles. By doing this, we were trying to show the campers that all countries are unique. We wanted to send the

ALUMNI REUNION 2009



The U.S. Embassy in Turkmenistan held its annual Exchange Alumni Reunion in Ashgabat on August 8-9, 2009.

Over 60 alumni from various U.S. Government exchange programs gathered together to discuss education development in rural parts of Turkmenistan. The reunion, entitled "Remember Who You Are – Make a Change in Your Community", explored ways to use alumni knowledge, skills, and attributes to improve education in rural communities. The goals of the project were to help alumni to discover opportunities for making a change in Turkmen community in two spheres which are: community and education development.

In her opening remarks, Deputy Chief of Mission Sylvia Curran emphasized how the unique skills and cross-cultural experiences gained during their exchange programs should help alumni become community leaders. She also emphasized that leaders should use their knowledge to work to strengthen their communities and the rural communities of Turkmenistan. According to the program of alumni reunion, the most active and experienced

alumni were invited to present a speech on the specific topics. After that, all participants were divided into two groups and circulated for the sessions.

First sessions were dedicated to the education development in rural areas. Humphrey alumna Bibi Hudaykuliyeva presented topic on "Alumni input in the development of education in rural areas" in order to share her knowledge in this sphere gained during her program in the United States as well as to prove the possibilities to make a change by taking even small steps.

To continue her thoughts, Sergey Atliyev, alumnus of FLEX'01/ TASP'07 programs together with Kristina Razahova, alumna of FLEX'04/UGRAD'09 and current TASP fellow, prepared a motivational speech for guest alumni. Presenters demonstrated on examples of previous successful projects and their knowledge of the role of alumni in community development. In addition, during the second part of the presentation, participants were proposed to work in groups of five to brainstorm on ideas for the actual projects in each region of Turkmenistan focusing on community and

education development in rural areas. As the result, each group shared potential project plans which could be realized in future by those alumni in each region of Turkmenistan involving more local people and local agencies.

As the resource for alumni work, Guncha Komekova has presented grant opportunities for alumni to implement their ideas and realize projects. She explained the main structure of grant writing process and she provided instructions for putting together grant proposal and procedures. The reunion was attended by new alumni; they were introduced to grant writing skills so they can use this information in the future. The next session community development in rural areas was lead by Muskie alumnus Oleg Gunchreach the level of development that is seen in urban areas.

In addition to these main sessions, there were several related presentations. One included a presentation on all USG exchange programs. Jahan Allaberdiyeva, Alumni Coordinator in the Public Affairs Section, gave a short description of all USG exchange programs in Turkmenistan. She urged alumni not to stop achieving, but rather to move forward and strive for more educational training. Another presentation was led by Muhommet Hommayev (UNICEF), TASP'07 alumnus on "Education development in Turkmenistan - the concept of friendly school to children" - he explained how new system of school integrated into existing schools across Turkmenistan and



geldyyev, who currently works for ecological project under the UN in Turkmenistan. From his point of view, there is a lot to do in rural areas of Turkmenistan, starting from re-introduction of traditional structures of governance to the implementation of social empowerment projects, and also from community mobilization to social and environmental improvement of livelihood. Consequently, Oleg Gunchgeldyyev opened discussion for alumni who also shared their thoughts to these specific issues in rural areas being the actual residents of those places. He gave an effective and productive talk which made other people who do not directly see and experience the life in rural areas to think and unite together with the rest in order to make a change and help each other to

how are they friendly to children and how this system helps to development of children.

Our alumni belonging to TEA, JFDP, and Fulbright realized the importance of extracurricular activities in bringing up young potential leaders after class or school sessions. On this note, one of the international visitors and Fulbright alumna, Shasenem Jorayeva, presented her report from her studies on this topic. As the result, many education professionals gained new ideas and methodology for improving their learning environment for students at schools and higher education.

Also, in today's world technology grow really fast and a lot of work depends on Internet as the research source for people.

That is why we have invited another representative from PAS, Azat Myradov. He provided all participants with the general information about Internet research programs that can help them to conduct projects, and contribute into community and education development in Turkmenistan, especially in rural areas since they are not technologically well developed yet.

The final session of the program was roundtable for all alumni to take part in order to learn about the most successful projects that were organized within the country by alumni. Alumni assistants from regional American Corners and the most active alumni presented a short re-

port as the result of which others gained new ideas and thoughts about the projects that could be realized in their own regions.

As the outcome of conference, we believe that it was important for alumni to meet together and share already gained experiences being back in Turkmenistan and at the same time to share their thoughts and concerns about community and education development in Turkmenistan especially in rural areas. At the end of Alumni Reunion, the organizers held an informal evening a la Hawaiian style for all participants. Pool, music, and performances took place, helping them to become closer to each other and feel rewarded for all their



work that they have been doing during this year. The participants built friendships with each other in order to cooperate in the future. They hope to create more projects together in all five regions of Turkmenistan. The long term plans include reaching as many people as possible throughout each re-

gion through active alumni. These people, after participating in alumni reunions, received additional training and guidelines to assist them in implementing their experiences for the sake of development of the effective community in Turkmenistan.

plays and she already has her own group of students who take part in the club. At present they are working on a play for Halloween.

Other alumni, such as Gozel Ilmuradova '09, Sabina Saburova '09, Kachara Beshimova '09, Bahar Altiyeva '09, have also organized clubs in order to be helpful to the American Corner. Besides all the activities and clubs at ACT, alumni note all American holidays and memorial days. On September 6 a clean-up event was held at the Amudarya River; it was devoted to US Labor Day. Everybody enjoyed it a lot, and at the same time ACT

members learnt about the American holiday and how to volunteer.

Over five camp days, we learned about 5 European countries – Great Britain, France, Holland, Germany and Greece. Not only had the young people learned a lot of new things, but also they gained practical knowledge and information, thanks to this project.

On the last day of the actual camp we organized a Scavenger Hunt game – where 5 teams (with the names of 5 countries we studied) had to collect 6 letters and make up a word: E_U_R_O_P_E.

Finally, Kristina and I organized an awards ceremony on a boat that floated on the Amudarya River. We created special certificates for everyone, including the logos of TYCVF and TASP, and containing the ACCELS stamp. Also, we bought prizes for the winning Scavenger Hunt, and for outstanding and the active participants. All the remaining campers received decorated T-shirts as well. After the awards ceremony, everyone - including the volunteers who helped during the camp and Scavenger Hunt game - ate pizzas and took pictures.

Afterwards I distributed short evaluation sheets, so campers could anonymously give their opinions. These evaluations allowed the stu-



dents to choose from 1-5 regarding the instructors. We found that everyone enjoyed their camp experience; they wrote that they would love to

participate in similar projects in the future, and, of course, they thanked the sponsors.

CAMP ON WHEELS II: Expanding knowledge and skills



Summer 2009. One might wonder, what was so different about this summer?

For most people in the Mary region, and not only there, this summer did not differ from previous summers in the sense that it was accepted as another period to relax and rest from 10 months of intensive work and studies. However, for 11 motivated high school students from the Mary region, summer started with a great experience that brought unforgettable and valuable memories and knowledge. All of them united at the Camp on Wheels II.

Camp on Wheels II (COWII) is a 14-day project that was organized by Diana Gurbanmyradova, FLEX'08, and Sheker Myradova, BFTF'06 from June 26 –July 10, 2009. COW II was unique by its ultimate goals: to find 11 motivated high school students; assist them in developing professional and personal skills, including public speaking, leadership, teamworking, and organizing skills; encourage them to make a difference in the community.

This project cheered them toward holding professional development workshops in educational centers; mak-

ing presentations on US life, Turkmen life, Community service, Health, US and Turkmen cultures and history, American sports in local secondary schools; organizing clean ups. It enhanced their awareness of their own homeland by visiting different cities of Turkmenistan: Turkmenabad (Lebap), Ashgabat (Ahal), and Yoloten, Bairamaly, Gres, Mary (Mary). People spent time sharing their experiences and ideas with peers. Using different types of transportation (minibuses, cars, and trains), COWs had a chance to interact with each other, discuss pluses and minuses of done work, and develop critical thinking skills through games and discussions prepared by alumni.

To help students to succeed in holding events, alumni, before departing to various cities, held a two-day Training of Trainees (TOT), participants where taught to public speaking, team-working, leadership, and management skills. Afterwards, they were divided into teams, and had a chance to enhance their Internet research skills by making online search on the issues and topics, planned to teach. As a

result, all upcoming presentations, workshops, and activities in local schools, educational and health centers were conducted by COWs.

However, except the serious schedule, COWs also took part in extracurricular activities, such as Frisbee, soccer, visits to amusement parks and museums, and picnics; all of these maintained their enthusiasm, health and energy.

When the camp ended the young talented leaders weren't exhausted: They were inspired. They gave performances to their parents during a Recognition Day, organized by camp leaders. Parents had the chance to observe their children's work via movies, poems, and speeches.

STATISTICS OF COW II:

1500 km. were crossed; 6 cities were visited; hosted by 3 schools, 2 educational centers, and 1 medical unit; around 16 presentations and 5 workshops were held; approximately 100 people took a part in presentations and workshops; 50 hours and 6 evaluation sessions on wheels.

tors came to the concert, which was called "Once upon a Halloween night." The event included 2 dances: Surprise Dance at the very beginning and "Vampire Dance" during the play. The play was called "Twilight Mix," which was based on the movie "Twilight" but in a funny version with lots of musical accompany of different popular songs. After each dance and performance, there were little breaks with raffle and some games with the audience. The best prize for the raffles was a mug with FLEX logo on it. At the very end FLEX alumni showed a movie about Halloween, which was made by them. The main goal of this event was to introduce and explain Halloween to the general public: to promote understanding of how Halloween is celebrated in the USA and how FLEX alumni brought this celebration to Turkmenistan. Before this event, the alumni held a pumpkin carv-



ing contest where they chose the best jack-o-lanterns and the winners were shown at the performance. The Public Affairs Section of the US Embassy assisted in printing brochures about Halloween, which were handed out at the entrance; moreover, candies were given as one of the symbols of Halloween for "trick or treat». During the event, a donation box was passed around where money was collected

from the general public to go to the blind children school in the city of Ashgabat and by the end of the event, a total of \$ 100 USD was raised. This activity was significant as general public received information on Halloween; FLEX alumni had a chance to express themselves by performing; money was collected to go to the blind school demonstrating the spirit of charity.

Fright Festival and Halloween Celebration at Mary American Corner:

On October 30, 2009 five FLEX alumni: Bahar Nokerova'07, Rozalina Akopyan'09, Aleksey Koval'09, Kerim Berdimuradov'09, Mamed Habibov'09, in addition Maya Kelova, TASP student and Irina Gera, OSI- organized and developed the idea of Fright Festival and Halloween Celebration in Mary American Corner. Three teams were created that had to accomplish the show with various skits, games, dances and presentations. A week before the holiday a ticket lottery was drawn for the lucky ones, who would be able to celebrate Halloween at American Corner, thus, 35 attendants were invited. Coming in to the Hell-way door a witchphotographer was welcoming students dressed up in interesting outfits. Through the sections of black curtains teenagers could feel the white snow pouring on their heads, arms grabbing parts of the body from nowhere and meet old male gypsy, who could retell past and future.

On the front door of American Corner everybody had to come



along with angel and devil, taste Halloween treats, put hands into bloody material hole of human "finger pile", "intestines", and "eyes".

Next step was the main room, decorated with spider web, pumpkins and various skit props. As the show started, one of the alumni prepared a presentation on Halloween origins, answering the questions of how did the holiday start, how is it celebrated in different countries, what do people wear on this day and the purpose of passing this daunting holiday in the course of many generations. Students were watching two plays written by volunteers and alumni: "Finger Death" and "Co-operate with Killer"; two dancing scenes "Thriller" and "Zombie Stack"; and tried themselves in four interactive games: "Detective Search", "Donkey Hole", "Apple Bite" and dance battle. By the end of the performances, winners of pumpkin carve and best frightening outfit were announced as well as those who won in games.

In conclusion, ten pumpkins were cut out and six participants received presents. Visitors had a chance to experience celebration of Halloween and participants to improve teamwork, creative writing, decorating, and organizing skills.

Halloween Celebration – Turkmenabat American Corner.

Halloween is a strangely excited and magic festival which is celebrated in many countries every year. Thus, on October 31 at Turkmenabat American Corner FLEX alumni'09 Ali Hamravev, Gozel Ilmuradova, Lachin Italmazova, Kachara Beshimova and American Corner volunteers continued the Halloween tradition organizing a big celebration which included different "ghosts" and "witches." Alumni of U.S. Exchange Programs Discuss Turkmen-American relations with the Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Central Asia.

On November 17th, 2009 – Deputy Assistant Secretary for South and Central Asian Affairs, Ambassador George A. Krol met with alumni of various exchange programs at the Public Affairs Section of the U.S. Embassy to discuss the role of alumni in the community development in Turkmenistan. Alumni shared their experiences in the United States, spoke on US-Turkmenistan foreign relations, and educational opportunities in Turkmenistan. In return, alumni asked Mr. Krol on his views and impressions on Turkmen-American relations and cooperation. After my studies in US, where I've received my Master's Degree in Public Policy (Edmund Muskie Program 02/04), I decided to study more and got enrolled at OSCE Academy in Bishkek, where I've received my second Master's Degree, this time in Political Science. It was great environment of 30 students from Central Asian countries, and professors, scholars and international experts. After graduating from this institution I stayed in Kyrgyzstan for

another three years, gained good experience working for Elections Project of UNDP, and later, for World Bank country office. Last year OSCE Academy published its first Annual Magazine, and my success story on achievements was placed on the first page. I was so happy to know that all my efforts I've put into books and studies has shown results.

For the last two years I was working in a government agency - Afghanistan Investment Support Agency, as a Manager of Policy and Research Unit. I always wanted to visit Afghanistan, knowing that enormous funding is granted to the country from other countries, and wanted to see how money is spent to improve lives of Afghans. I've learned so much on politics and governance, private sector development, women in business, donor coordination, traveled to many regions of the country, visited villages, schools, talked to locals about their life and traditions - overall it was a great experience. The peculiarity of this project is that it is regional and covers four Central Asian countries. Central Asia borders with Afghanistan, which is main supplier of opium in the world. The key factors of HIV transmission in Central Asia is injecting

drug using non-sterile syringes, labor migrants and sex workers. Just to note, at present, Central Asia is considered to be a region with the highest rate of HIV spread in the world. As I belong to this part of the world, such fact sounds devastating. Therefore, the project focuses on regional activities as it believes that only with joint cooperation of governments, NGOs and private companies it will be possible to slow down spread of HIV in Central Asia.

I really enjoy working for this project as I am faced with completely different sphere than in my past experiences. Overall, it is a donor funded development project, and that's one of the main areas where I see myself working.

To finish my story, I would like to thank the US Department of State for giving me such a great opportunity in life and, I can definitely say, literally change my life. For all other young FLEX alumni I want to wish never stop achieving your dreams: FLEX program just gives you a start, the rest depends on your efforts and ambitions! "Against drug addiction" seminar

TAG 2009 Finalist's Extra Curricular Activities

On July 30-31, 2009 medical specialists from local hospital and 20 drug addicted people from Turkmenabat city had an opportunity to discuss a pressing problem of nowadays with the representatives of UN Office for Drugs and Crime Annatach Mammedova, Viktoria Nobatova and Tech Age Girls Contest's 2009 finalist Jahan Balyshova on two-day seminar called "Against drug addiction", "Be aware of HIV/AIDS".

This event aimed at encouraging drug abused people to live healthy life-style and refuse to use drugs. During seminars participants were separated into two groups, so medical specialists could have been informed about new methods of treatment, how to prevent a drug addiction, while drug substance abusers could have a talk with the TAG finalist Jahan and Annatach from UNODC on such questions like reasons of using drugs and when did they start using it; do

they know about consequences; etc. Seminar diversified by using games, presentations on HIV/AIDS held by Jahan Balyshova where all participants together could communicate and share ideas on seminar topic. INTERVIEW WITH PUBLIC AFFAIRS OFFICER OF THE U.S. EMBASSY IN TURKMENISTAN, WILLIAM STEVENS.

Mr. Stevens was born in one of the most famous and beautiful cities of the United States, Washington DC – the capital named after the first American President George Washington.

He was the youngest child in his family. His first ancestors were originally from England.

Mr. Stevens speaks Russian – he began to study Russian when he was a 14 year old student. He also is an alumnus of 2 weeks exchange program to Russia. His wife, and one of his sons, also speaks Russian well. His family has come with him to Turkmenistan; children are learning Russian and Turkmen.

Before the interview, I would like comment as an exchange student for the "Alumni Boom" newsletter. I am glad that I had a chance to hold interview with Mr. Stevens. He seems to be a very nice and open person; it was a pleasure talking to him and receiving his opinion on several issues that are interesting for alumni. "Alumni Boom" is a very important part of alumni work. And I am very happy that our coordinators have given us a chance to print this newsletter. Everyone does a great job releasing each "Alumni Boom".

- Mr. Stevens, how did you begin to work in this sphere?

- I studied Finance and International Relations. Then worked in the House of Representatives in the State Department, later I studied Russian in Saint Petersburg, Russia.

- When you were young who did you want to become? Was it close to your current job?
- -(smiling) I wanted to be James Bond.
- Actually, it is pretty close to your current job because you also have to travel a lot. In how many countries did you work and how many did you visit as a tourist?
- Oh, I used to work in Israel, Belorussia, Russia and the United States. And I visited nearly 25 countries as a tourist. Now I can speak Russian, and Belarusian, plus a little bit Arabic and Turk-
- What are going to do after your term finishes in Turkmenistan, do you have any plans?
- Yes, I would like to go back to Washington D.C. to live, and work for the State Department. I am interested working with the media and I want my children to live in the USA too. Later, I can think about working overseas again.
- Have you been in Turkmenistan before?
- No, but I've heard a lot about Turkmenistan. Two years before I came here I learned a lot about this country; its history, culture and traditions. I was really excited to come here and learn about this country.
- What can you say about Turkmenistan as young developing country?
- It was really changed. It has great history, Imperial Russia and Soviet Union took great part in its history, but Turkmenistan managed to create its own govern-

- ment and became neutral and independent country. It has great history, culture and people are nice.
- Now I would like to ask you a little bit about alumni and their work. First of all about "Alumni Boom". Did you have a chance to read it?
- No, but I am waiting with great interest for the one that is going to have my interview.

- Do you think it is a good idea to have alumni newsletter?

- Yes, of course it is a really good. Because it gives an opportunity to share information about alumni work from all over the country. Here you can see alumni's work of different exchange programs. And sure it is a great opportunity for new alumni. They can see that they can do the same. As you know "Two minds are better than one".
- How many alumni are you already meet here in Turkmenistan?
- Nearly 50. I was in alumni reunion 2009 and in some other events and talked to them.
- What can you say about alumni work?
- I like it, it is great. I am very proud that the exchange programs help to gain the goals. That it helps to understand their responsibility in their community, democracy in future. People in each country and especially in the developing country need responsible people. When I was in Russia in early 1990's, I visited a lot of houses; outside they were just terrible, dirty. But inside was just wonderful. People thought just about their own, they didn't



have responsibility. It somewhat people say in Belorussia "Моя хата с краю, я ничего не знаю". But in Turkmenistan people live in community and in responsibility. They built their government together.

- What can you say about exchange programs in common and will be there any new exchange programs that will be conducted/ opened in Turkmenistan?
- The programs are great. They are helping students to prepare for the universities. Each participant plays a role of an ambassador of their country and culture in another country. Because people abroad do not know a lot about Central Asian countries. And about new exchange programs. They are thinking about some kind of summer camps for the students.
- Your wishing to the present and future alumni? (exactly as he said).
- Recognize the power you have. Use the talents and skills that you have to help people around you. Stay active and support of one another.

Easy and Affordable Web-Design


At the last Alumni Reunion 2009 event, some alumni expressed interest in creating web-sites. Certainly, many people have a desire to express themselves and share their thoughts about opening their own web-sites. At the same time there is a widespread perception that the process of creating a web-site (or simply doing web-design) is very difficult and requires much technical knowledge.

I used to agree, until I went to an IT training course, called "Dreamweaver Web-Design" during my JFDP Fellowship at the North Carolina State University. I am interested in this subject. Geek guys from the Department of Instruction Technology taught me - in just in 2 hours -how to create a basic web-site and how to upload it to the University server. I created my own local web-site in the following 2 weeks. This site (http://www4.ncsu. edu/~bovezmu) is about Textile Technology – the area of my instruction and research. Let me try to explain, without giving too many technical details, how to implement very simple web-design for beginners, affordable for all.

Easy and affordable web-design? Sounds dubious! When searching the Internet one can find brassy ads announcing something like "Make a web-site in 15 minutes!" or "Free web-hosting." They resemble the promise of "English language proficiency in one month" - an attractive but false statement. Professional webdesigners will tell you that mastering an advanced program for web-design such as Dreamweaver can take many days, not to mention mastering tools for web-programming like HTML, JAVA, PHP, MySQL, takes many months. On the other hand, finding truly free web-hosting (the place for placing personal a web-site) which offers unlimited high-quality service seems almost impossible. Plenty of web-sites will advertise so-called "free web-hosting". But when you start using them it quickly turns out that they are temporary, they impose too many restrictions, and may easily close down or actually charge for services somehow. Though webhosting has become very cheap in recent years, the majority of local users cannot afford to benefit from them. Because paying just a few dollars a month for a long time is too much. Also, transferring the money abroad to hosting service providers may prove to be problematic.

The fact is that basic skills in web-design can be acquired not in 15 minutes or 15 days, but in one day, provided that someone experienced guides you.

Most popular and probably the best

program for web-design in the world is Dreamweaver. Another popular application is Microsoft Front Page. It is not as powerful as Dreamweaver, but the principles are the same. The software can be found in any local specialized store, or for hire. Most of us can boast that we know MS OFFICE programs while actually knowing no more than 10% of their functions. That doesn't prevent us from using them quite effectively in everyday work. Dreamweaver is the same. You don't have to know how to code HTML or how to apply dynamic web-content to create a nice looking web-site. As many professionals say, it is not technical knowledge that is most important in design, but rather creativity and imagination.

The first step is to create LOCAL WEB-SITE - a folder in your computer which contains all the elements of your web-site: web-pages, images, sounds, videos etc. You should arrange all the same files in the separate folders, so they easy to access. For example: web-pages about your hobby in one folder, mp3 music in another etc. If you have a lot of your text in WORD or EXCEL is easier to save them first as Web-page, and then put them into your local folder, as I have done with my lectures. Then you open the first and the main HTML page of your site, which should be called INDEX or HOME. The names of other pages in your local folder should be typed in the main page. Referring links must be assigned to each of them (the address of the link can be entered in the special bar below or by dragging the target symbol on the right of the bar to the icon of the referring file). You can put link on any piece of text or image referring not only to local web-pages and files, but also to any page on the Internet. You can test how your web-site looks anytime by giving a special command in the menu or directly opening your INDEX (HOME) web-page from the local folder.

The second step is to upload files from your local folder to a SERVER (remote folder). Usually this is FTP-host server. FTP provider will give you all the information how to connect (name, password etc.). Then in the sites management menu choose FTP, enter the information from the provider, and start uploading chosen files to your remote FTP folder. The problem with local providers is that the con-

nection speed is so slow that it may take hours to upload a middle-sized web-site. I uploaded my web-site on textiles which "weighs" only 100 Mb gradually (file by file) for several days. I still couldn't upload some big files (such as video), so my web-site still has some non-functioning links to pages and files which I failed to upload. So you should try to keep your files (especially video and audio and graphics) as small as possible using compression utilities and lower resolutions.

It was not hard to fill the content of my first web-site because I took my own ready text and images from my textbooks I wrote from my home university. All I had to do was to put the information into separate pieces of text, distribute them among several web-pages, and link them all with hyperlinks. Finally I uploaded the files to a web-space that normal US universities provide for all faculty and students. Of course, if the raw content (my text and other files) was not already prepared long before, the process would have taken much longer.

Also I put in some personal details, pictures as well as some cultural and exchange program information. In the future I plan on starting my own blog in the web-site. A personal web-site can serve as a great tool of self-promotion and self-realization! That web-site was probably the first of its kind in the Turkmen language. I felt deeply satisfied when I finished the job, realizing that Turkmen students and researchers could now find online info on textiles in their native language. Really, plenty of educational materials can be found in English and Russian, in any field, but not in Turkmen. We all (alumni and others) should aspire to fill the gap by adding to the areas we are proficient in to the web. This will help our society advance in the Information

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Age. As alumni we have access to free web-spaces provided by our hosts in the US, or local organizations and projects (like the IREX project, which provided opportunities for dozens of young people to express themselves using web-design).

But what should others do who were not involved in any project of this kind? Here is my advice: After a year of fruitless search finally I found an absolutely free web-hosting site; it gives almost unlimited webspace. It is called narod.ru, and is provided by Yandex - the most famous Russian email provider. You can open your web-site directly under your email account. For example, my email account is bola-bola@yandex.ru, and my web-site is bola-bola.narod.ru. I uploaded my web-site on textiles there, since the first one I opened at NC State was not accessible from many local com-

puters. You can open a site with any name, as many as you want, just like with ordinary email accounts! Please don't consider the paragraph as an advertisement. Narod.ru really has many advantages: if anybody (including you) visit the web-site at least once in 3 month it won't close down; no annoying ads - only a little Yandex sign on the corner; Dreamweaver support (wow!);

impressive storage size – able to accommodate all your files. Yandex also offers incredibly easy web-site creation using ready templates – without any special software. You should just go to narod.ru and it will guide you through the series of simple steps of online web-design. Of course, the resulting web-sites, based on templates, would look much simpler than those creat-

ed with Dreamweaver. Detailed instructions on Dreamweaver FTP services can be taken from FAQ section of narod.ru.

Finally, some readers may say: "Hey! I understood nothing from your Dreamweaver instructions though you claim that it is easy."OK - I explained only the basic theory of the software. But if you are an experienced PCuser you will learn by doing, using the trial-error method since Dreamweaver has a nice, intuitive design. If you are just beginner you may take special courses (locally available, for example, in the OZEN training center). Even better is to find someone proficient in web-design. Because all you may need is little guidance and then you will continue on your own. Truly, one can learn web-design in just one day - the only prerequisite is desire and patience.
