The United States Military Academy is unique. Since 1802 it has enjoyed a reputation for academic excellence, physical challenge, and preparation for Army leadership.

During four years of preparation for a career of service as an Army officer, you are challenged by an academic curriculum that offers a balanced education in the arts and sciences while also permitting you to pursue academic specialization.

A West Point education includes a core of 26 to 30 courses and 37 majors to provide depth in the area of special interest you choose.

As a junior you may compete for a Truman Foundation scholarship; you may seek graduate study opportunities from Rhodes, National Science Foundation, Olmsted, Hertz, Marshall,

East-West, and Rotary scholarships as a senior.

Upon graduation, you will be awarded a Bachelor of Science degree and a commission as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army. Most graduates who remain in the Army after the initial five-year obligation obtain advanced degrees at a civilian university.

Preparation for West Point requires a sound secondary school education. You should complete as a minimum: four years of mathematics (including trigonometry); four years of English; two years of a foreign language; two years of laboratory science and one year of history.

If you complete college-level courses before entering West Point, you may be able to validate your course work to obtain advanced placement, but you must complete four full years at West Point in order to graduate. Participating in school, church, scouting and community activities will help you build a strong foundation in leader-

> ship. Active participation in sports is, by far, the best preparation for West Point's rigorous physicaldevelopment program.
