Federal Tax Information for U.S. Taxpayers Living Abroad

All U.S. citizens or resident aliens must report and pay tax on their worldwide income, even if they live abroad.

International Tax Tips

Filing Requirements: - If you are a U.S. citizen or resident alien, the rules for filing income, estate, and gift tax returns including paying estimated tax are generally the same whether you reside in the United States or abroad.

Filing Deadlines: - U.S. income tax returns are due on April 15th. If you reside overseas, however, you are given an automatic two month extension to file. Any tax due though, must be paid by April 15th to avoid paying interest and, possibly, penalties. This also applies if you are in military service on duty outside the United States and Puerto Rico, *except if you are serving in a combat zone*.

Note: Payments are not considered *received* until the date of actual receipt by the IRS, not the postmark date.

Social Security Number: - You must list the Social Security Number (SSN) of any person for whom you claim an exemption on your individual income tax return. If your dependent or spouse is not eligible to have a SSN, you must list an individual Taxpayer Identification number (ITIN) instead. You can apply for an SSN for a dependent at a Social Security office or a U.S. consulate. To apply, you must provide original or certified copies of documents to verify the dependent's age, identity, and citizenship.

Individual Taxpayer Identification Number:- To apply for an ITIN, file Form W-7 and supporting documentation with the IRS.

Exchange Rates: - You must report all income in U.S. Dollar equivalents. Taxpayers generally use the yearly average exchange rate; however the daily rate may be used for specific transactions. Exchange rates can be found on the "Foreign Currency and Currency Exchange Rates" page at www.irs.gov; keyword search term, "exchange rates".
