Northeast Multispecies Recreational Fishery

Change to Regulations
New Possession Limit and Revised Size Limit for Gulf of Maine Haddock

Effective Date: January 6, 2012

We are implementing a 9-fish possession limit (reduced from unlimited) and increasing the minimum fish size to 19 inches total length (up from 18 inches) for all haddock caught within federal waters in the Gulf of Maine (GOM) by recreational anglers aboard private or charter/party vessels. These measures will remain in effect from January 6, 2012, through December 30, 2012, unless otherwise notified.

Can I comment on these measures?	 Yes. Public comments must be received by 5:00 PM Eastern Standard Time on January 17, 2012. Why is this action necessary?	Based on available information, we determined that the recreational fishery exceeded its 2010 allocation of the GOM haddock sub-annual catch limit by 22.3 percent. As required by the current regulations, these measures were developed to prevent a similar overage from occurring in the future.
How were these measures developed?	As required by the current regulations, we consulted with the New England Fishery Management Council and its Recreational Advisory Panel in developing these measures.
