Construction continues on \$146 million international school campus

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is managing a major push into upgrading decades-old buildings on the NATO base here as part of an endeavor that will have a lasting impact on the culture and mission of Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe, military and education leaders say.

The centerpiece is a multinationalfunded, \$146 million construction project at SHAPE International School, the largest under way within USACE Europe District. It'll result in a sprawling international campus by the summer of 2018, represented by 22 NATO nations and featuring state-of-the-art facilities, educational programs and models for the entire community.


"USACE is spearheading this effort for the entire group – how often does the Corps get to do that?" said Steve Keen, the SHAPE International School project manager for Europe District. "SHAPE is looking to foster the relationship among children of international nations. This was specifically designed for that. As most parents know, if the kids are OK, they're OK. This will be a treasure of a campus."

The phased project includes the building of new American elementary, middle and high schools at the SHAPE site. Those facilities are slated for completion in 2014.

The United Kingdom/Canada and Germany buildings should be finished by the summer of 2016. Two years later, work is expected to wrap up on the new school for students from Norway, Italy, Turkey and Poland.

U.S. officials said the campus overhaul is the first domino in an enhanced qualityof-life package being forged at SHAPE, aimed at making Belgium a destination of choice for American troops and their families.

"It's more of a university-style campus, and the kids will mix and interact. It truly becomes an international institution," said Bob Sommer, Europe District's Benelux regional program manager. "We want

to make SHAPE the first post of choice. We want to show that Belgium isn't like other countries. It has everything. It's a great place for kids to learn, great place to live."

Once finished, SHAPE International School facilities will go from 83 percent substandard to 100 percent "cutting edge," said Air Force Maj. Curt Fryman, the lead SHAPE engineer, citing environmental surveys and assessments.

"We want to show prospective SHAPE members that their families will be well supported here with an outstanding environment in which to learn," he added. "You don't want them to fall behind and hurt their future. This is something that's going to enhance their future and education, not hinder it."

Europe District Benelux Resident Engineer Jonathan Carr said school facilities in use now were designed to be temporary when first built in the 1960s. Planning for the new campus began several years ago, and ground was broken in January 2012.

In recent years, the biggest problem facing school administrators has been a

lack of space, said Benoit Davin, SHAPE International School's director general. This provides a solution while raising academic possibilities for students and teachers alike.

"It'll be like going from an old car to a Mercedes," he said. "Our space situation will improve dramatically. The quality of infrastructure has an impact on the quality of education. The quality of infrastructure will be much better.

"There's been a clear evolution in terms of technology implementation at SHAPE. We've gone from blackboards to computers in the classroom. This will benefit us with better tools for teachers and students."

Davin said SHAPE International School is a unique model and confederation of various curriculums, languages and elements. It's a complex operation, but part of his job is to promote integration and collaboration among all the national elements, including faculty and students.

"Our school is a small microcosm of NATO," he added.

-- for the campus construction project has been just as complicated, Sommer said. At a minimum, they must meet the Belgian benchmark since it's being built in the host nation. U.S. standards are being used for a large portion of the design -- Department of Defense Dependents Schools-Europe is funding the three American schools, while international money goes toward the four additional buildings on campus. Planners made tweaks in the blueprint to satisfy individual country requirements in the other nation-funded buildings.

Europe District's support of mission readiness, quality of life and infrastructure improvements at SHAPE extends beyond the classroom.

In December, the new NATO Special Operations Headquarters was unveiled at a ribbon-cutting ceremony attended by top U.S. and international military officials. The facility will allow those forces to plan, coordinate and conduct vital missions around the globe.

"I expect this headquarters to be a venue for ideas about equipment, technology and how we can share that and learn from each other," Adm. James Stavridis, NATO's Supreme Allied Commander Europe and the head of U.S. European Command, said during the Dec. 12 event. "Every nation brings an idea. This must be a venue for ideas about what we use to accomplish our missions as well.

"Special forces (and) special operations... are trained to go behind enemy lines, to destroy aircraft, to destroy ordnance, but above all, to force the enemy to watch for them, to devote forces so that they can be diverted from the front lines. This kind of warfare is very effective, and part of the kind of ideas that we look to see from this venue moving forward."

Lt. Col. Michelle Garcia, the district's deputy commander, said all the construction projects at SHAPE are being engineered with the latest technological advances, modernization and environmental cost-saving features. As the military enters an era of shrinking budgets, USACE is placing even greater emphasis on planning, coordination and teamwork.

"Partnership is key to everything we do as the Army Corps of Engineers," she said. "We work with our partners to help them develop their scope, understand the cost of their requirements and help that fit into their budget. And then we work with our partners as we oversee the construction of the projects, like here.

"As engineers, we solve problems. One of the problems we can solve for our partners and customers is to provide them options for how they can best utilize the dollars they have. Sometimes, it's savings upfront, with cost-saving measures during construction. Sometimes, it's a cost savings on the back end, on the operations and maintenance end, where we can help them use some sustainable technologies to reduce operations and maintenance costs at these facilities."

The NSHQ is the first purpose-built facility designed for use by a NATO operational commander since SHAPE moved from France to Belgium in 1967.

"The investment being put into our schools, all our member nations and the SHAPE international community here is phenomenal," Air Force Lt. Gen. Frank Kisner, the NSHQ commander, said at the ribbon-cutting ceremony. "The Army Corps of Engineers resident office did some great work for us."

Paying local bills saves money, time

The Legal Assistance Office has helped clients from our community that are being required to pay €250 to €300 for an initial bill of €50. Why? After several reminders, collection agencies will recover unpaid bills. Those agencies charge at least €100 for each act of recovery.

Utilities

If you rent a house, you will have bills for utilities but you might also have bills for the water company, waste removal, waste recycle, and sewer maintenance.

If you are in government housing all you need to do is hand these bills over to your housing office and they will inform you how to process those bills. If you rent a house on the economy, you must pay those bills. It states in the Shape-Belgium Agreement that these bills will be paid by the tenant if you live on the economy.

Also, when you move, you must notify the town hall of your new place of residence within seven days if you move within the same city or 15 days if you move to a different city. If you move to a different city you are also required to report your change of residence to your previous town hall. You will show them your Belgian ID and update your resident information with them. Most of the time it is free. The bills will then be forwarded to your new address. If you don't comply with these requirements you will be liable for bills that go to your previous address even if you are not aware of them.

Hospital Bills

We also have clients that have unpaid hospital bills. Tricare will pay the hospital bills but you will be required to pay the collection agency fees; Tricare will not pay these. You should check the status of your Tricare/Hospital bills regularly. If the payments are late, you will face additional costs that will not be refunded by Tricare.

Also note if you get a receipt in the mail from the post office indicating you have mail, this is likely a registered mail. You must pick this mail up at the Belgian Post Office indicated on the form. Many times, it is a reminder for an unpaid bill, so do not ignore it. Either pay the bill or give it to your housing office.

Stay safe during local Carnaval and crossage festivities

In order to fully enjoy the local festivities, take into account some basic safety tips. It may be the first time you are participating in these events, so take particular attention to safety, both for you and your family members.

- Parents should be aware that those who are riding on the parade vehicles throw candy treats along the route. Extra caution needs to be taken to insure children don't run into the street to retrieve candy and risk being hit by a parade vehicle. In some cities, like in Binche, oranges are being tossed into the crowd. Pay close attention and make sure you or your kids don't get hurt.
- Alcohol consumption is quite common during the festivities. Be prepared and have a plan. If you are consuming alcohol, don't drive. Prior to consume alcohol, make sure you have a designated driver.
- Guard your wallet, purses and personal items as these crowded areas are ideal opportunities for pick pockets.
- During the traditional Crossage in Chièvres, participants are playing on the street with a wooden "rabot" and "chôlette" (mallet and ball). The game can be compared to croquet or golf but since several players can be tossing wooden balls the size of a grapefruit at the same time in different directions, make sure you don't get hit. Players shout "Chôlette" when they strike the ball to warn others nearby that the ball is in play.
- For safety reasons, the city of Chièvres is closed off to all traffic during Crossage on Feb. 13.

Every year, heart attacks claim thousands of lives during harsh winter weather. Heart disease is the number one killer of both men and women in the United States. Winter weather and winter weather activities, particularly shoveling snow, increase a person's risk of a heart attack due to overexertion. Cold weather, combined with a sudden change in physical activity, increases the heart's workload.

February is American Heart Month and a good time to learn how to prevent or react to a heart attack, particularly during the winter months.

It's important to know your risk factors for a heart attack. The elderly and those with heart disease are at highest risk. Being male or having a family history of heart disease also

This winter, before heading out to shovel snow, consider your risk factors and take appropriate precautions. Taking certain precautions can be the difference between life and death. Winter Weather Tips for the Heart:

- Take frequent breaks when shoveling snow.
- Use a small shovel or consider a snow blower.

· Don't eat a heavy meal prior to shoveling to avoid the extra load on your heart.

- · Don't drink alcohol before or immediately after shoveling.
- Be aware of the dangers of hypothermia.
- Consult your doctor prior to exercising in cold weather.
- · Learn CPR to increase a victim's chances of survival.
- · Learn heart attack warning signs.

Warning signs of a heart attack are often ignored or overlooked. Heart attacks often start slowly with mild symptoms. Many people do not know the warning signs and often wait too long before getting help. Minutes matter during a heart attack, and early treatment greatly increases the chances of survival. Learn the signs of a heart attack and you can help save a life.

Warning Signs of a Heart Attack:

· Chest pain or discomfort

 Discomfort in upper body, including arms, back, neck, jaw, or shoulder

· Shortness of breath

• Nausea, lightheadedness, cold sweats

If these signs are present, call the emergency services immediately.

This winter, make sure to take precautions to prevent a heart attack-know your risk factors, check on your elderly neighbors and learn the warning signs of a heart attack. Remember, prevention and early action save lives.

After a period of almost 30 years, the 598th Transportation Brigade (SDDC) has officially closed its headquarters in Capelle aan den IJssel, the Netherlands. The keys of the former SDDC building were symbolically transferred to the owner, Jan. 31.

All Military and DoD Civilian personnel have completed the relocation to Sembach, Germany. A remaining contingent of over 30 Dutch Ministry of Defense Civilians moved to the Van Ghentkazerne in Rotterdam, the Netherlands and will continue to handle northern port distribution for the

Military Surface Deployment & Distribution Command (SDDC).

Col. Matthew D. Redding, Commander, 598th Trans BDE (SDDC) officially opened the new office building for the Benelux Detachment, Feb. 1. He spoke of his gratitude to the workforce, comprised of Dutch local nationals. American, Belgian, and Dutch military and civilian personnel were there to witness the start of this new chapter for SDDC. Redding reiterated special thanks for the hospitality of the Royal Dutch Marines and the Dutch Ministry of Defense for their assistance in establishing the temporary facility.

Redding also thanked the Capelle aan den IJssel authorities for the continuous support and patience that SDDC received over the years and highlighted the partnership that the U.S. Army and the Dutch have enjoyed. After the terrorist attacks on the United States (Sept.11, 2001) the security posture of the building changed the area around the building in Capelle aan den IJssel. Redding said: "We are still grateful for the sympathy and support we received during our mission here from our neighbors and Capelle City Hall. Looking back it was great living and working in Capelle aan den Ijssel."

The move of the Brigade Headquarters is part of a larger U.S. Army consolidation plan that affects over 30,000 U.S. Forces this summer. These unit movements are designed to

and supplies. In Fiscal Year 2012, SDDC moved more than 126.4 million metric tons of cargo in support of U.S. forces worldwide. Current SDDC missions and operations tempo requires management and execution of over five billion dollars per year.

The roots of the 598th Transportation Brigade (SDDC) go back to 1945, when a tremendous influx of U.S. military cargo was transported to build up Europe after WWII. The port operations were initially orchestrated from Bremerhaven, Germany. In 1957 a sub-port was activated in Rotterdam. This became the Benelux Terminal. The command headquarters moved to Jobshaven, Rotterdam in 1970 and was transferred from the 4th Transportation Brigade (USAREUR) to the Military Traffic Management Command (MTMC) during that same year. The 598th Headquarters occupied the office building in Capelle aan den IJssels in 1983.

The 598th Transportation Brigade (SDDC) is a regional transportation command with manned sites in eight European countries. It operates in multiple European ports handling well over three million metric tons of cargo per year. The command executes SDDC's worldwide mission in the U.S. European Command, U.S. Africa Command, U.S. Central Command, and wherever else needed.

Keeping energy costs down

As you all know, money is tight for the Department of Defense. Utiliy expenses represent a significant "must pay" bill for the Army and on a per unit basis, energy costs are rising much faster than the standard rate of inflation. As a result, new guidance had to be set to continue our efforts in saving on energy costs:

- During the heating season, temperatures in occupied facilities will be maintained at 68 degrees Fahrenheit (20 degrees Celsius) during working hours and heating setback temperatures during unoccupied times shall be set at 55 degrees Fahrenheit (13 degrees Celsius).
- Wherever mechanical cooling is authorized, cooling season temperatures for occupied working and living spaces shall be maintained at 78 degrees Fahrenheit (25.5 degrees Celsius) and 85 degrees Fahrenheit (29.5 degrees Celsius) during unoccupied times.



- To respect these changes, make sure that your thermostatic valve is not over '3' and that your thermostat and/ or Heating Ventilation Air Conditioning (HVAC) temperature set-points correspond to these new values.
- Turn off everything that is not necessary (lights, equipment, etc.) especially at the end of the day.

Together we can make the difference and as you adopt these measures at work, why not do the same at home. This will allow you to save on your personal energy costs.

General strike in Belgium

The socialist trade union FGTB announced that it withdrew from the social negotiations. The union is upset because the government wants to impose flexibility in working hours after having imposed a freeze of salaries and a modification of the way the cost of living index is computed. The union is opposed to allowing workers to work more overtime hours at a moment when there are so many people who don't have a job. They have announced a day of major protests on Feb. 21 and they will be joined by other unions.

Drugs trafficking

Employees of several Colruyt supermarkets in Belgium who were emptying boxes of bananas to put them in shelves discovered packages of cocaine. Some packages were of approximately 11 kilograms each and a total of 65 kilograms were found in four different shops, i.e. a total value of 3.2 million Euros. The bananas were coming from Colombia and had been imported via the port of Antwerp. The Belgian federal police are investigating.

Top Dutch city for expensive homes

The town of Blaricum near Hilversum, the Netherlands has the most expensive homes in the country, with an average house price of €761,000. Nevertheless, Blaricum has not escaped the malaise on the housing market, with the average price down 1.8% on a year ago. In addition, 21% fewer houses changed hands last year. The nearby city of Laren rose from fourth to second place with an average price of just over €600,000. Waasenaar is third. Bloemendaal, on the coast west of Amsterdam fell from second to fourth place as the average house price plummeted 21%. The cheapest homes in the country are in Kerkrade, Limburg, where house prices averaged €136,000 last year.

Shale gas

The energy company Shell has set aside 100,000 Euros to investigate where they could drill in the North East of Belgium (Kempen) to find shale gas. Sample drillings have already taken place in the Netherlands, Germany and the United Kingdom, and now it seems Belgium is next. According to geologists at the KU Leuven and VITO (Flemish Institute for Technological research), the Belgian gas supply is not like in the US, but is not to be neglected. It still has to be determined where the best gas supplies are, the Kempen around Liège or around Mons.

Pepsi

The soft drink giant PepsiCo wants to launch a drink in America this year, using the sweetener, Tagatose. This is great news for the Belgian company Damhert based in Heusden-Zolder. Although Damhert did not invent Tagatose, it is the only company that can currently produce the lowcalorie sugar substitute. It also needs equal quantities of Tagatose to replace sugar.

Tourists view of the Netherlands

People who come to the Netherlands on holiday are most likely to associate the country with tulips, windmills and cheese, according to a survey of over 11,000 holidaymakers for the Dutch tourist board. The most positive aspect of the Netherlands named by tourists is Amsterdam, which was highlighted by 51%. Cycling (41%) and the landscape (32%) came second and third. On the downside, drugs were regarded as a negative attraction by 55%, followed by prostitution (39%) and the language (32%). The survey was conducted in the 13 countries which are home to the majority of tourists. Of those, nearly all said the price quality ratio offered by the hospitality industry was the least positive aspect of their stay. Some 67% of those interviewed said they regarded the Dutch as tolerant, 64% said they were open and 63% said they were friendly. Despite the mainly positive image of the Netherlands, the country is less popular as a holiday destination than it was a year ago. German, British and Belgian nationals dominated the record of 11.7 million foreign tourists who visited the Netherlands last year

Putin to visit the Netherlands

Russian president Vladimir Putin is to visit the Netherlands April 8 at the invitation of queen Beatrix. The visit coincides with the start of celebrations to mark 400 years of ties between the Netherlands and Russia. The last time Putin visited the Netherlands was in 2005.

Commemoration of the Dutch floods of 1953

Special events have been organized in many places in the Netherlands last week to remember the great floods of 1953, in which over 1,800 people died. In the early hours of Feb. 1, 1953, dykes in the south of the country broke, and large parts of Zeeland, the Zuid-Holland islands and western Brabant were flooded. Over 100,000 people lost their homes in the disaster, which was caused by a combination of strong winds and high tides. Some 500 buildings were destroyed and many more were damaged. Almost 200,000 hectares of farmland land was devastated by the salt water. In the Zuid-Holland village of Oude Tonge, where 305 people lost their lives, a wreathlaying ceremony was held to remember the dead. Other events are taking place throughout the affected areas. The tragedy led to the development of the Delta Works flood prevention scheme, a massive complex of dykes and sluice gates along much of the southern coastline.
