Who Should Attend

This training is being offered to sworn law enforcement officers. *This is a specialized curriculum for tribal law enforcement officers who encounter gangs on the street and for state and local officers who work with them. Tribal law enforcement officers will be given priority for attendance.* This class will provide basic, entry-level training to:

- Officers newly assigned to work with street gangs.
- Officers with limited experience, but little formal training in street gang investigations.
- Officers from small agencies for whom street gang investigation is an assigned, but additional duty.
- Officers who routinely work with tribal authorities.

Registration

There is no registration fee. This class is made possible through funding from the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice. The deadline for registration is Monday, March 4, 2013. Once your registration is received and accepted, a staff member from the Institute for Intergovernmental Research[®] (IIR) will e-mail or fax a confirmation memo. For security reasons, only those individuals having a confirmed advance registration will be admitted to the class, and registrations will not be accepted at the door. Law enforcement credentials will be required at check-in. Class check-in will begin at 7:30 a.m. on March 19. The class schedule is 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on March 19–21.

Experts, many with national recognition in the subject area, will provide instruction. A regional overview of Native American gangs will be provided by local gang authorities.

Course Topics

- **Gangs 101**—basic information necessary to understand street gangs
- **National Native American Gangs: Trends and Dynamics**—national overview of Native American gangs and the influence of gang activity in tribal communities
- **Regional Gang Overview**—specific information about active regional and local gangs
- **Legal Considerations**—use of gang-specific legislation in the investigation and prosecution of gang crime
- **Gang Intelligence**—the intelligence process and the role of gang investigators in the process
- **Interviewing Gang Members**—intelligence gathering through everyday contact with gang members on the street
- **Responding to Tribal Gang Crime Scenes**—techniques for identifying potential gang involvement at common crime scenes
- **Gang Investigations**—unique nature of gang investigations and gang crime scenes
- **Gang Suppression**—strategies and tactics that have been effective in suppressing gang activity
