WASHINGTON, D.C. -- The Office of the Comptroller of the Currency has been recognized as one of the best places in America for a lawyer to work.

In a new book, America's Greatest Places to Work with a Law Degree, published by Harcourt Brace Legal & Professional Publications Inc., author Kimm Alayne Walton wrote that "people who work at the OCC rave about the supportive, cooperative, and productive atmosphere there." She noted that new attorneys deal directly with agency policy makers, national banks and their lawyers, other bank regulatory agencies and the public on a daily basis.
