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President Al-Bashir to visit Saudi Arabia

The Sudanese President Omer Al-Bashir is scheduled to hold talks with King Abdulla bin Abdulaziz in Saudi Arabia this week. During their meeting, the two counterparts will discuss bilateral relations between the two countries, the means for bolstering joint cooperation as well as regional and international issues of mutual concern. Deliberations on Forum recommendations

Kiir: Road map for the right to secede

President of the Government of Southern Sudan (GoSS) Salva Kiir Mayardit said that the Sudan People's Liberation Movement (SPLM) is planning to lay the groundwork for a road map to exercise the right of Southern Sudan to secede or unite with the north. (*Al-Rai-Al-Aam*)

Group kills 5 of the kidnapped Chinese workers

-According to an article in *Al-Watan*, five of the nine kidnapped Chinese oil workers being held hostage by a group of rebels from the Justice and Equality Movement (JEM) were slain by their abductors last night. The article said that two of the workers are still alive, while the fate of the other two remains unknown.

-A conflicting report from *Sudantribune.com* cited London *Al-Sharq Al-Awsat* in quoting the group's leader as saying that "none of the Chinese workers had been killed" and that the group wanted to end the ordeal peacefully and hand over the hostages to the Sudan People Liberation Movement (SPLM).

-The Sudanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs strongly condemned the action yesterday, describing it as a "cowardly and criminal act" and stating that the government was planning to set up a strategy for protecting foreigners in Sudan. (*Al-Sudani*)
