A Cup of Life and the Pursuit of Happiness: Experience from Alumni Association Leadership

I love travelling, and one thing I usually do is to collect mugs from all over the places I visit, especially from many fancy tourist places. I naively felt that it could make me feel good when drinking coffee and thinking of the famous places I was able to visit. For this trip to San Francisco, I had also planned to get a nice mug as I usually do whenever I travel. The **Glide Foundation** was

one of the places we were able to do a volunteer work. The task assigned to me was absolutely basic by just putting one mug

on a tray. But this so easy

task almost made me cry later when I saw several hundreds homeless people standing in lines for receiving free food at 7 am

in the morning. This place was the biggest place in town providing three nutritious meals to the city's poor, hungry and homeless every single day of the year for every race, color, ethnicity, religious belief and economic or social standing. The cup they're having was totally simple made of plastic and plain color, no names of fancy places like what I usually have in the morning. *It* was really remarkable that a simple act of voluntary work could stir so much insight in me.

It was actually the place filmed in **the Pursuit of Happyness** when Chris Gardner (Will Smith) was standing in line to get a small space to sleep in with his kid. People from



different ethnicities, including many Chinese immigrants were picking up food from the tray and walking to the small dining rooms and I almost cried when I saw people at my grandparents' age were among them. To me, this was indeed a part of lifetime experience from International Visitor Leadership Program entitled ''Alumni Association Leadership Development" during September-October, 2010 sponsored by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA), the Department of State in which 32 young leaders from 32 different countries from around the world were invited to attend.



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These 32 young leaders working in many diverse fields, ranging from TV producer and presenter, expert in conflict negotiation, psychiatrist, book editor, expert in human rights, and university lecturer. But they all shared one important thing in common which was helping their communities. The major objectives of the three-week program we spent time together were intended to maximize networking within the organization and among similar organizations, nationally, regionally, and internationally, and to identify strategies to design, fund, and implement alumni activities and projects that benefit the community and the nation in which the organization exists. In addition to several workshops on non-profit management we did together, we visited *several* international and national organizations from different cities, Washington, DC; San Francisco, California; Bozeman, Montana; Corpus Christi, Texas; Pensacola, Florida; and Salt Lake City, Utah. There we had wonderful experience learning about organizational structure of non-profits, differing models of alumni associations, elements of leadership in starting an association, board recruitment,

membership development and sustainability, program development, and building partnerships to maximize results.

I was totally inspired by all of the organizations/ institutions, but in addition to Glide Foundation, Utah Food Bank and the United States Peace Corps were indeed remarkable ones. Utah Food Bank as the Salt Lake Charity Association has been the central hub for food collection and distribution in Utah committed to serving Utah's citizens in need. There, the Utah Food Bank's staff, volunteers, and agencies help working together to gather and distribute emergency food to individuals and families experiencing the pain of hunger. At the United States Peace Corps in Washington, DC found by the Senator John F. Kennedy, I was truly inspired by its mission of promoting world peace and friendship, to help other countries meet their needs for trained manpower, and to promote understanding between Americans and many countries around the world. As this year, the Peace Corps will celebrated its 50 years of promoting peace and friendship around the world which nearly 200,000 Peace Corps Volunteers serving in over than 140 countries, ranging from AIDS education to in-



formation technology and environmental preservation.

There I was lucky to be a representative of our 32 people from 32 countries in wholeheartedly thanked them for the wonderful services they have done for the world. I not only thanked them on behalf of myself, and our group, but also on behalf of over than 140 countries.

The core of the program was the Youth Environmental Project Workshop presented by Ms. Phon-



chan Kraiwatnutsorn, Director of "Youth Venture Thailand," and "ASHOKA Innovators for the Public." Ms. Phonchan inspired the alumni with innovative ideas on conducting community service projects, using examples from her own experience. The alumni then worked with her on improving their own action plans for environmental community service projects and initiatives.



BANGKOK, Thailand -On Thursday, October 28, 2010, Ten<u>Youth</u> Leadership Program with Southeast Asia (YLP) and <u>Study of the</u> U.S. Institutes (SUSI) alumni led a group of

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thirty English Access Microscholarship Program students to discover the underwater world in an educational field trip to raise environmental awareness among Thai youth at Siam Ocean World, the largest



aquarium in Southeast Asia. As part of the two-day "Youth Leadership Program with Southeast Asia Alumni Reunion & Workshop 2010," alumni and students alike learned about the world's marine life, rivers, oceans, and their ecosystems through a dedicated education and conservation tour of the aquarium. It was the first time that many of the participants had seen some of the exotic aquatic animals like hammerhead sharks, lion fish, sturgeon, sea eels, otters, penguins, and jellyfish. At the end of the program, the YLP and SUSI alumni--whose programs in the U.S. were on environmental themes--took the stage and shared with Access students their experience of traveling to the U.S. and learning about American environmental studies.

SAMUT PRAKARN. Thailand –To conclude the Youth Leadership Pro-<u>gram with</u> Southeast Asia (YLP) Alumni Reunion & Workshop" on October 29,YLP alumni joined forces with Youth Exchange

and Study (YES) alumni to help a Thai community combat erosion by planting mangroves. A group of approximately 25 alumni and U.S. Embassy staff traveled by boat to Baan Khun Samut Jeen, a coastal village in Samut Prakarn province, to meet with local leaders and to discuss some challenging environmental issues the community is facing. For the past several decades, the community has lost a substantial amount of land because of flooding and erosion. Several residents even lost their homes and were forced to move to other areas. The head of the village met with the

alums and listed the measures the community has taken to avoid further crisis, including planting mangrove trees. The alumni came to realize the importance of this activity and, together with U.S. Embassy staff, they enthusiastically pitched in. A mangrove forest ecosystem provides necessary nesting and nursery habitats for juvenile marine animals. More importantly for Baan Khun Samut Jeen Community, mangrove swamps act as a buffer zone to reduce storm impact and land erosion along coastlines.

This vision led the <u>International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP)</u> alumna and Central American Peace Scholarship (CAPS) recipient to establish seven women's associations that produce cassava (yucca) bread for local and international consumption. She also created her own business, Wabagari Distribution, which processes the cassava produced by one of the associations, the Honduran Association of Women Cassava Producers (AHPROCASABE).

Surgeon and health safety advocate Dr. Hua Jiang has made combating HIV/AIDS in southwest China a priority since participating in the Department of State's <u>International Visitor Leadership Program</u> <u>(IVLP)</u>. Selected RELO Programs and Services:


• *The English Language Fellow Program*: provides American professional expertise in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) by sending experts on ten-month fellowships to oversea academic institutions.

• *The English Language Specialist Program*: recruits American academics for short-term projects in the field of TESOL. • *E-Teacher*: These scholarships provide access to American graduate courses in specific disciplines within TESOL to selected individuals worldwide, via distance education.

• *English Access Microscholarships*: The scholarships provide underprivileged and underserved youth (14-18 years old) with the opportunity to study English in high-quality after-school programs for two years.

• *Publications*: RELO is responsible for assisting those who would like to obtain books and other publications of the U.S. Government which focus on English teaching and learning. These


include the widelycirculated English Teaching FORUM journal, one of the world's leading publications devoted to the TESOL field.
