Recommended Websites for Independent Student Learning

1. Randall's ESL Cyber Listening Lab: <http://www.esl-lab.com/>

Listening activities for self-study are organized by situational topics and level. Easy, medium, and difficult audio conversations between native speakers lasting between 30 seconds and 3 minutes in length are available complete with pre, during, and post-listening exercises that can be answered and self-checked online.

2. English Trailers: <http://www.english-trailers.com/index.php>

Students can enjoy movie trailers, read the scripts as they watch, and complete listening comprehension and vocabulary exercises based on the previews. Class discussion questions are also provided as warm-up and post-viewing activities.

3. How Stuff Works: <http://www.howstuffworks.com>

Students can research the technical side of how stuff works. This site provides a wide variety of descriptions that can help students understand concepts related to science, health, automotives, economics, human behavior and more. *(This makes a great resource for students preparing process writing or oral process presentations!)*

1. Create a yahoo email account.
2. Go to the Yahoo Groups homepage.
3. Browse the Directory of groups.
4. Choose a group to join.
5. Click on "Join this group" on its front page.
6. Enter your Yahoo id.
7. Set your preferences.
8. Check your yahoo email account for emails from the group.
