Post community remembers 9/11

Members of the Fort A.P. Hill community gathered near the installation flagpole Sept. 11 to mark the six-year anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks on America.

On that morning, 19 terrorists hijacked four airplanes and carried out coordinated suicide attacks upon the United States. Two planes crashed into the World Trade Center in New York City, A third aircraft crashed into the Pentagon, and the final plane crashed into a field near Shanksville, Pa. More than 2,900 innocent people were murdered that day.

"Where were you on Sept. 11," asked John Hall, Directorate of Logistics. "Unfortunately, for most of us, that is a question we can all answer. It was a day that changed our country forever, and it changed Fort A.P. Hill forever."

After Hall spoke, Lt. Col. Michael S. Graese, Fort A.P. Hill commander, thanked attendees and asked them to remember individuals who gave their lives that September morning, as well as the warriors serving around the world.

"Today reminds us of our mission to train our Warriors, and why it is important that they are successful," Graese said. "Our mission is an important one and will remain so in the foreseeable future. Thank you for all the hard work you do."

"Days like today put everything into perspective," said Inez Jeter, Directorate of Morale, Welfare and Recreation. "It makes you think about what can happen and how you should never take anything for granted.

"Today is a sad day for our country, but it is also a day our country came together and united," she added.

Best of the best: Fort A.P. Hill selects Employee of the Year

Three individuals were named as the post's 2006 Employee of the Year during a small ceremony Sept. 6.

During the past year, Judith C. Collins, Ronald A. Johnson and Terry L. Banks stood out among their peers as the top Fort A.P. Hill team members.

"The list of accomplishments by these employees is truly amazing," said Lt. Col. Michael S. Graese, post commander. "It was hard to whittle the overall list down to just three folks, but I think we got it right."

Nominations for Employee of the Year were collected and reviewed during the Spring for the following available categories: Category 1-appropriated fund employees in grades GS-8 and below and non-appropriated fund employees in grades NF-3 and below; Category 2 – federal wage system and NAF employees (NS, NL and NA); Category 3 – appropriated fund employees in grades GS-9 to GS/ GM-13 and NAF employees NF-4 and five.

Category 1 Employee of the Year

Collins, a recreation assistant with the Directorate of Morale, Welfare and Recreation, has been with Fort A.P. Hill MWR for 25 years and was nominated for "demonstrating top quality customer service through her daily interaction with the post community and warriors in training," according to her nomination letter.

During the past year, she has coordinated with on-post and off-post directors, local community leaders and recruited 45 volunteers to host several events with minimal fiscal resources. These events include several fun runs, intramural leagues, recreational tournaments, a haunted hayride and Summer Safety Day.

Collins took the lead in several events which have led to morale building

efforts for the warriors training on Fort A.P. Hill. She was instrumental in renovating two Cold War era barracks into fitness center and recreational lounges in the Wilcox Camp area.

She was also personally responsible for undertaking the MWR requirements in the programs directly supporting the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit and 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit training deployments.

These programs were highlighted with a Marine Corps Birthday Dining-In and ensuring 1,500 marines could enjoy the Super Bowl in three geographically separated facilities.

Category 2 Employee of the Year

Johnson, a maintenance mechanic with Directorate of Plans, Training, Mobilization and Security, has been with Fort A.P. Hill since 1984 and was nominated for "consistently excelling in accomplishing time sensitive, dayto-day range support operations to include fabrication of various target requirements for aviation, special and standard gunnery support and performing maintenance on frames, limit markers and target pits. A mission of this magnitude is normally supported by two or three carpenters," according to his nomination letter.

Johnson worked as leadsman on three major projects in 2007. He designed foundations and constructed 10 60-foot rail tracks for moving targets on Range 3.

The design was done in a manner to reduce the overall cost, ensure quality and improve training for warriors.

He constructed six 40 by 90 feet concrete forms to support the warrior aviation training. He also constructed and co-designed the Convoy Live Fire 2 complex which saved the government thousands of dollars and cut down on construction time that would delay unit training.

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Employees –

He has created a template for each item that is required in order to maintain and control live fire ranges, lane markers, limit markers, safety markers, fighting position covers, targets and many more.

The creation of these templates have significantly reduced the time needed to complete the project construction.

During unit exercises, Johnson schedules time prior to their morning training, during their lunch time and any other time he can get on the range to accomplish his duties without interrupting unit training.

Category 3 Employee of the Year

Banks arrived at Fort A.P. Hill in 1987 and has been the environmental chief with the Directorate of Public Works for approximately 15 years. According to her nomination letter, because of her leadership and novel environmental approach, Fort A.P. Hill was recognized with the Exemplary Environmental Excellence Award designation. The post was the first Virginia Army installation

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to receive this award.

This program has resulted in monetary savings on several environmental permits and has also resulted in less federal and state inspections and oversight.

She has developed crucial working relationships and partnerships with; Virginia Ducks Unlimited, Trust for Public Land, The Nature Conservancy, Conservation Fund, Virginia Game and Inland Fisheries, US Fish and Wildlife Service and the Virginia Outdoors Foundation.

Under her leadership, Banks was able to acquire more than a million dollars of Army funds, along with matching funds from organizations to establish a permanent conservation easement on approximately 1,200 acres of undeveloped land adjacent to Fort A.P. Hill.

Banks has also coordinated with the Virginia Department of Historic Resources, Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, Army Environmental Command and Office of Director of Environmental Programs to help preserve archaeological sites while simultaneously protecting the post's mission and preserving cultural resources.
