86 ATLANTA PUBLIC SCHOOLS RECEIVE NEH'S PICTURING AMERICA AWARDS

Free Education Initiative Brings Great American Art Directly to Atlanta Classrooms and Libraries

Atlanta, GA (Sept. 23, 2008) – Today at the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Site, the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) will announce that **86 schools in the Atlanta Public Schools system** have been awarded Picturing America. Picturing America is an education initiative that helps teach American history and culture by bringing some of our nation's greatest works of art directly to classrooms and libraries.

"The Endowment believes that Picturing America should be in every school and public library in the United States," said NEH Chairman Bruce Cole. "As a result of the strong support of the Atlanta community during our first application period, I'm pleased to announce that **86 schools in the Atlanta Public Schools system** have received Picturing America, as part of over **26,000 successful school and public library recipients across the country** that will have a chance to learn from this wonderful education resource this fall."

"Picturing America provides a unique way for students to learn about the important people, places, and moments in our history," said Dr. Martha Reichrath, Deputy Superintendent for Standards, Instruction and Assessment at the Georgia Department of Education. "I know the students in Georgia will find Picturing America interesting, informative, and entertaining. This is the type of collaboration we need to provide a rigorous and relevant education to all our students and emphasize the importance of using the visual arts across all areas of the curriculum."

Of the over **1,500 pilot schools** that participated in the nationwide Picturing America pilot program, **27 are Georgia schools**. Feedback from local educators using the materials in library and classroom learning has been tremendous.

"Historically, aesthetically, and emotionally each of these pictures touches us in a special way," said Janet Brown, Curriculum Coordinator at Christ the King School in Atlanta. "The impact that these pictures has had and will continue to have in our school community is far greater than I could have imagined."

Today's Award Announcement

In the state of Georgia, 807 schools and public libraries have been awarded Picturing America, including 121 institutions in the city of Atlanta (see http://picturingamerica.neh.gov/public_awards.php for a full listing of recipient schools and libraries). These local recipients are part of the 26,320 schools and public libraries across the country that will participate in the program this fall. Awardees receive forty large, high-quality reproductions of great American art and a comprehensive teachers resource book to assist educators using the works of art in core subjects. Materials were shipped earlier this month. Additional education resources are also available through the Picturing America Web site (http://PicturingAmerica.neh.gov/).

For schools and public libraries that did not apply during the initial application period, NEH is currently accepting a second round of applications **through October 31, 2008** at <u>PicturingAmerica.neh.gov</u>.

Partnership with the National Park Service

Through a joint partnership with NEH, the National Park Service is making select images from the Picturing America collection available to patrons at several National Park sites around the country, including Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Site. Picturing America will provide visitors at each site with an innovative way to explore the history and character of America through some of the nation's greatest works of art.

"National parks are home to many of our nation's cultural and historical treasures, making the National Park Service a natural partner of the Picturing America Initiative," said Lindi L. Harvey, Deputy Director of the National Park Service. "We are pleased to exhibit American masterpieces at several historic locations around the country this year, including Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Site in Atlanta."

Educators and students from participating pilot and first-round schools in Atlanta will attend today's event at the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Site, where several of the Picturing America images will also be on display.
