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583 SCHOOLS IN CHICAGO PUBLIC SCHOOLS SYSTEM RECEIVE NEH'S PICTURING AMERICA AWARDS

Free Education Initiative Brings Great American Art Directly to Chicago Classrooms and Libraries

Chicago, IL (May 29, 2008) – Today at the Chicago History Museum, the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) will announce that **583 schools in the Chicago Public Schools system** will receive Picturing America. Picturing America is a free initiative that helps teach American history and culture by bringing some of the country's great art directly to classrooms and libraries.

"The Endowment believes that Picturing America should be in every school and public library in the United States," said NEH Chairman Bruce Cole. "As a result of the strong support of the Chicago community during our first application period, I'm pleased to announce that **583 schools in the Chicago Public Schools system** will receive Picturing America, as part of **26,320 successful school and public library recipients across the country** that will have a chance to learn from this wonderful education resource."

"Picturing America is an incredible learning resource for students and teachers in the Chicago Public Schools system," said Arne Duncan, Chief Executive Officer for Chicago Public Schools. "By bringing American art into hundreds of Chicago classrooms and school libraries, this initiative will educate our students about the great people, places, and moments in our history using the masterpieces that depict them."

Of the over **1,500 pilot schools** currently participating in the nationwide Picturing America pilot program, **nineteen Chicago schools** have begun implementing the materials in libraries and classrooms. Feedback from local educators has been tremendous.

"The detail on the prints is really amazing," said Patti Foerster, Librarian for Vaughn Occupational High School in Chicago. "All of our students have special needs and really struggle with reading. It absolutely helps them to have clear images they can view up close. We've been able to use the prints to spark some fun and interesting lessons!"

Today's Award Announcement

In the state of Illinois, 1,527 schools and public libraries have been awarded Picturing America including 617 institutions in city of Chicago (see http://picturingamerica.neh.gov/public_awards.php for a full listing of recipient schools and libraries). These local recipients are part of the 26,320 schools and public libraries across the country that will participate in the program. Successful applicants will receive forty large, high-quality reproductions of great American art and a comprehensive teachers resource book to assist educators using the works of art in core subjects. Delivery of these materials is scheduled for August 2008. Additional education resources are also available through the Picturing America Web site (PicturingAmerica.neh.gov).

The NEH will offer Picturing America to more schools and libraries through a future enrollment opportunity beginning in August 2008. All eligible schools and public libraries in the U.S. and its territories who have not previously received Picturing America may apply for the program **from August 4 through October 31, 2008** at <u>PicturingAmerica.neh.gov</u>.

Partnership with Head Start

In addition to schools and libraries, through an interagency agreement, NEH and the Administration for Children and Families within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Office of Head Start will work together to make Picturing America available to the **20,000 Head Start centers** around the nation. This partnership will provide for the development of materials to supplement Picturing America and ensure that the program will enhance early childhood development and family literacy.

"We are thrilled to be collaborating with the National Endowment for the Humanities on Picturing America. These images will be a valuable tool for the Head Start community," said Daniel Schneider HHS' Acting Assistant Secretary for Children and Families. "Children and low-income families will soon have access to great arts and humanities – and the lives of those enrolled in Head Start will be enriched as a result of this program."

Interested schools and public libraries will be able to apply through the NEH for the second round of Picturing America awards, beginning August 4 through October 31, 2008 for receipt of the materials in spring 2009.
