Section 106 Training is a two-day course designed to provide an overview of the federal preservation program and introduce the purposes and principles of historic preservation reviews conducted under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, which requires federal agencies to assess the effects of their projects on historic properties. For those who would like to know more about what Section 106 requires, when it applies, who participates, and how a review is conducted, the first day of this workshop will provide a basic orientation. The continuation of the course will examine the four-step compliance process in greater depth with an emphasis on issues relevant to the Pacific environment.

Taught by Advisory Council on Historic Preservation staff engaged on a daily basis with Section 106 issues. Dr. Tom McCulloch and Ms. Blythe Semmer will be teaching the Yap course. Both Tom and Blythe have extensive, hands-on experience working with a variety of federal agencies on all aspects of Section 106. Tom is an archaeologist, and Blythe is a historian and preservation planner.
