	processing facility is located in an industrially-zoned lot in

Kempalpasa-Izmir, a major port area. The site is not located in a floodplain or near areas of cultural or ecological significance. The project will not result in adverse impacts on protected areas or critical habitats. The project will not result in physical or economic displacement. Electricity from the national power grid is used for operations. The company owns a 1600 kW power transformer that is utilized to make the most efficient use of power that it receives from the grid. A small central heating system is used that runs on fuel oil and which is expected to produce minor amounts of air emissions. The project is expected to directly generate minimal amounts of greenhouse gas emissions. Ambient air quality of the industrial complex in which the plant is located is monitored by the Turkish Statistics Administration. All wastewater generated by the project is treated by the company's own wastewater treatment system prior to discharge to the municipal wastewater treatment plant located in Izmir. The project will install two new cooling towers, decreasing internal use wastewater by as much as 80%. Water to the project is sourced from a well located on the project site. The project will be required to provide, and enforce the use of, adequate personal protective equipment to protect the hearing of employees working in noisy environments. This personal protective equipment will, at a minimum, prevent the exposure of any employee to a noise level greater than 85 decibels. Workers Rights: OPIC's statutorily required standard worker rights language will be supplemented with provisions concerning the right of association, organization and collective bargaining, minimum age requirements, timely payment of wages, hours of work, and hazardous working situations. Standard and supplemental contract language will be applied to all workers of the Project. In consultation with the Department of State, the project **Human Rights:** received a Human Rights Clearance on May 30, 2008.
