	Organizations ("ECOs") in scaling up their operation through construction of new
	hospitals and facilities, expansion of community outreach programs, creation of
	new research and teaching institutes, provisions of training programs and the
	purchase of specialized equipment.

<b>Developmental Effects:</b>	This project will have a strong developmental impact in the host countries. This
	socially-focused investment fund will provide a critical source of eye care
	services and help develop eye-care health industries across numerous emerging
	markets through an innovative cross-subsidization approach. The project will
	augment the financial sector in the host countries, and provides a strong
	leveraging impact through the involvement of numerous other philanthropic, and
	not-for-profit organizations. The project has a significant economic
	diversification impact, as it will target underserved communities across several
-	countries, and is anticipated to be financially sustainable.
Environment:	Projects involving the provision of direct patient care are screened as Category B projects under OPIC's environmental and social policies because impacts are site specific and readily mitigated. These types of projects must meet high standards for patient safety and treatment efficacy as evidenced by satisfactory accreditation based on a quality evaluation of the technical competence of an institution's resources and organization by an internationally recognized accreditation organization. In the case of a limited health service providers for which such accreditation standards are not available, such as the eye care providers in this project, OPIC requires certification or similar high quality rating by a third-party expert in the particular health field.
	The International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness will evaluate the quality of services and facilities based on a set of benchmarks and quality assessment criteria that include quality of surgeries performed at each hospital; qualifications of practitioners at each facility; conditions at each facility; and management at each hospital. In addition facility performance will be assesses against applicable provisions of the 2007 IFC Environmental Health and Safety Guidelines for Health Care Facilities.
	In addition to these performance benchmarks, the Eye Fund has established social benchmarks to insure that the program benefits those that have no or limited access to quality eye care in the targeted countries.

Workers Rights	OPIC's statutorily required standard worker rights language will be supplemented
	with provisions concerning the right of association, organization and collective
	bargaining, hours of work, minimum wages, timely payment of wages, minimum
	age and hazardous work situations. Standard and supplemental contract language
	will be applied to all workers of the Project.
<b>Human Rights</b>	In consultation with the Department of State, the project received a Human Rights
	Clearance on February 20, 2009 and an amended Human Rights Clearance on June
	26, 2009.
