A storm low in the southern hemisphere east of New Zealand caused surf of 4 to 8 feet along the south-facing shores of all the Hawaiian Islands. No significant injuries or property damage were reported

Brush fires scorched 80 acres near Waimea and 200 acres in the vicinity of Anahola on the Garden Isle of Kauai. No serious injuries occurred at either location, and there was no serious property damage in Waimea. Only two small sheds on private property were damaged near Anahola, though damage estimates were unavailable. Fire fighting assets were stretched thin by these two, almost simultaneous, blazes at opposite ends of Kauai. County officials believed the fires were accidentally set

A fire blackened 50 acres of brush in Panakauahi Gulch near Waipio on Oahu. The blaze was close to both the H-2 Freeway and Kamehameha Highway, which adversely affected traffic for several hours. However, no serious property damage or injuries were reported. The origin of the fire was unknown.
