Watervliet Arsenal Museum is located in Watervliet, NY, alongside the Hudson River, across from Troy, and six miles north of Albany, New York's capital.

- Take I-787 (north or south) to Exit 8.
- Follow Route 32 south (Broadway).
- There are directional signs on poles.
- · You will go right past the Main Gate.
- One more right turn and you are at the South Gate.
- Stop and register with the guards.



Reservations are recommended for group tours and archival research.

The nation's oldest continuously operating arsenal, the Watervliet Arsenal, was founded on July 14, 1813. The Arsenal provided powder horns, cartridge boxes, and other equipment needed during the War of 1812. Throughout the Civil War, it manufactured gun carriages, saddles, knapsacks, shot, and shells.

In 1887, the Arsenal was designated as America's "cannon factory". Since then, it has produced the artillery needed for America's Armed Forces.

Housed in the old iron building, the Museum continues to collect and preserve the weapons used both during Operation Iraqi Freedom and Afghanistan War.





In addition to the core mission of manufacturing large caliber tubes for tank and artillery systems, the Arsenal's growth industry for several years has been in mortar production.
