








Forward Based throughout the World





• Theater Armies are Operationally controlled by their COCOMs and receive administrative control from the Department of the Army:

 ✓ Exercise administrative control over all Army forces in theater

✓ Can be designated as an operational headquarters

✓ Each contains a JTF-capable Contingency Command Post (CCP) capable of responding to crisis and contingency

 ✓ Have significant role in supporting Phase 0 theater shaping operations through engagements and exercises with regional allies and partners

 ✓ Capable of supporting full spectrum operations through each geographical theater

• Re-energizing America's Alliances is a major U.S. foreign policy goal

- Latin American landmass south of Mexico
- The waters adjacent to Central and South America
- The Caribbean Sea and island nations
- A portion of the Atlantic Ocean

 Includes Cuba, Haiti, Dominican Republic; excludes Puerto Rico

- 31 countries
- 10 territories



Mission

US Army South, as the Army Service Component Command for US Southern Command, conducts Theater Security Cooperation in order to enhance hemispheric security and stability.

On order conducts contingency operations as directed by US Southern Command.

Vision

A flexible, proficient Army Service Component Command capable of simultaneously conducting Theater Security Cooperation, Contingency Operations, Title X support and Executive Agency for US Southern Command and Department of the Army.



Army South Staff Talks



- Purpose of Staff Talks:

Improve relationships between the U.S. Army and the Armies of its key regional allies.
Improve coordination of U.S. Army activities and programs in the region.

- Conducted Annually with four key regional partner armies.

•Brazil / Chile / Colombia / El Salvador

- Hosting of the Staff Talks alternates each calendar year.

•ARSOUTH hosts 2 cycles at FSH and deploys as visitors for 2 cycles each year.



- Only two ASCCs conduct Staff Talks on behalf of the CSA.

•ARNORTH - Mexico •Some ASCCs conduct bilateral meetings at Partner Nation "FORSCOM" level.

- ARSOUTH LATAM Coop Funds used to cover the costs of U.S. participation.

•Partner Nations cover their own costs.



FUERZAS ALIADAS HUMANITARIAS (FA-HUM)

Joint Staff approved, regionally oriented disaster response exercise that involves Partner Nation military and regional disaster management agencies.

BEYOND THE HORIZON (BTH)

A 3-4 month Humanitarian Civic Assistance and infrastructure construction / repair conducted by Active / Reserve forces on a rotational deployment.

PEACE KEEPING OPERATIONS (PKO)

Command Post Exercise focused on a Multi-national Task Force staff and subordinate elements to exercise multi-echelon Command / Control functions and challenges inherent to peacekeeping missions.

MEDRETE

Small teams of military medical, dental and veterinary professionals deployed for a short duration to underdeveloped areas in order to provide medical and veterinary services while gaining valuable experience.

PANAMAX


Joint / combined operational exercise focused on the defense of the Panama Canal and Central America by a multi-national joint task force.



- Critical mission, anticipated growth will be enabled by Regionally Aligned Brigade.









Phase 0: Shaping




Phase 5: Enabling Civil Authority

VICENZA, Italy - At the request of the Burundian military, U.S. Army Africa's Africa Deployment Assistance Partnership Team (ADAPT) conducted a deployment capability training event with uniformed members of the Burundian Defense Forces June 6 - 10 at the Bujumbura Military Airfield in Bujumbura, Burundi.

Traffic Management Specialists Sgt. First Class Joseph Shaw and Sgt. First Class Christopher Labugen of the 21st Theatre Support Command in Kaiserslautern, Germany, along with Ammunition Specialist Sgt. First Class Luis Febles and Theater Security Cooperation Program Manager Alexander Menzies from USARAF Logistics Directorate in Vicenza, Italy, taught and monitored the training event.

ADAPT is a USAFRICOM program managed and executed by USARAF. The team was in Bujumbura to share best practices on deploying personnel and equipment via aircraft, and to enhance force projection capabilities of African militaries to better support peace keeping operations, humanitarian relief operations and UN missions.


