At their urging, Fumiko embarks on a journey of discovery that takes her to Europe and North America. The book weaves together the stories of Fumiko's adventure and Hanna's short life.

Listening to the facts about Hanna sparked discussions on many topics including the Holocaust, tolerance and separation from

family. The students are now writing an essay on what they would pack if they had only one suitcase to take with them on a


