

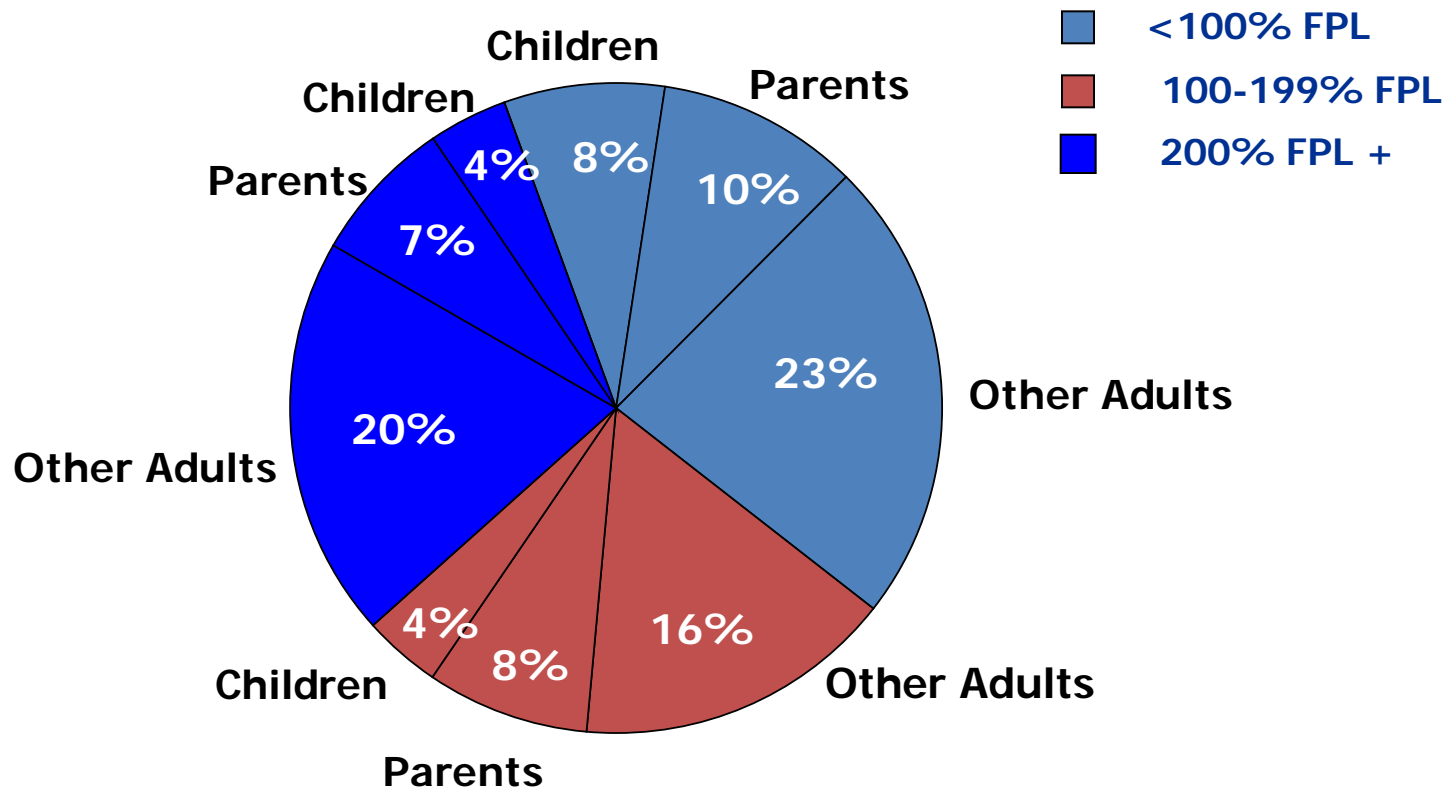


Medicaid and CHIP in 2014: A Seamless Path to Affordable Coverage



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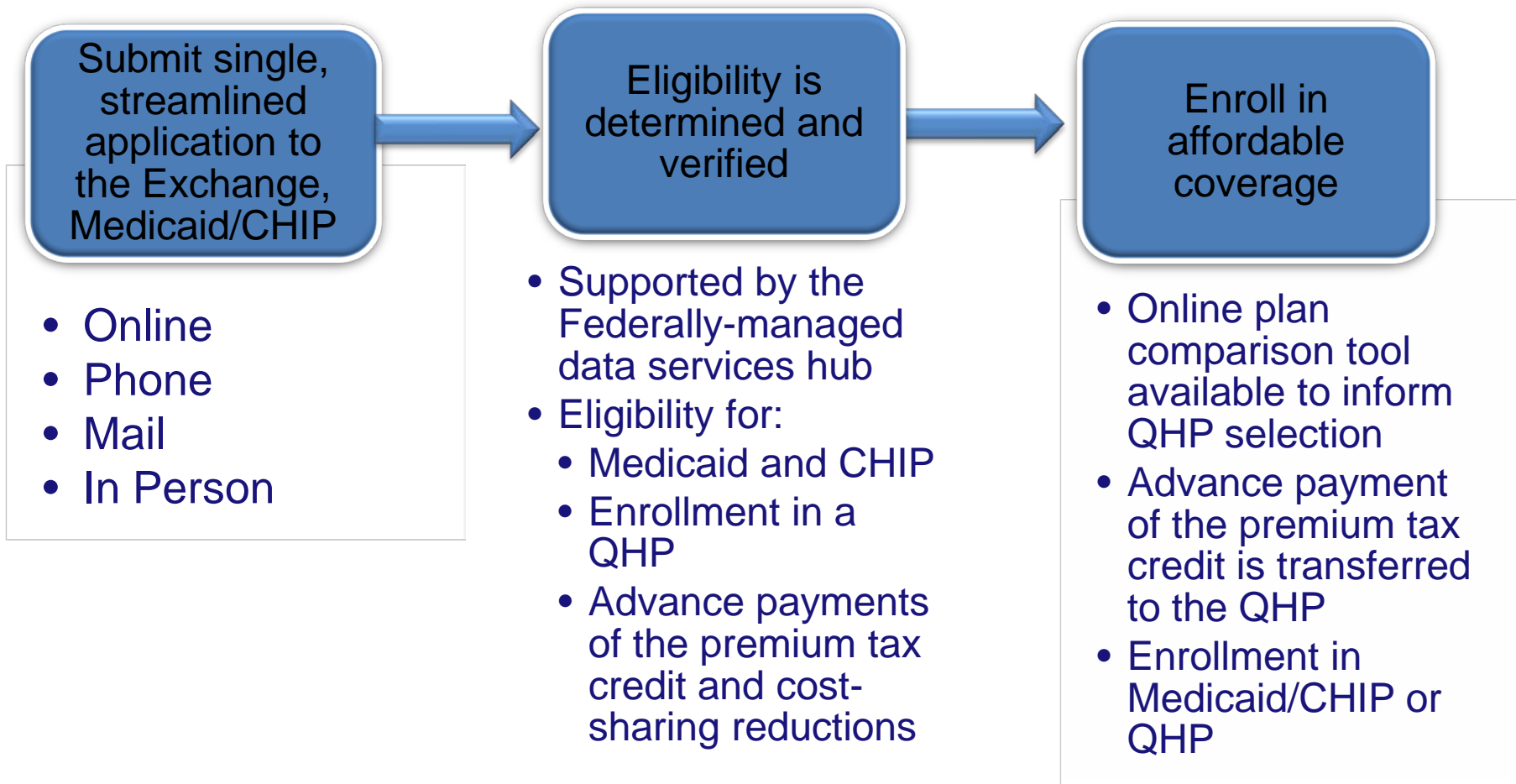
Two-Thirds of the Nonelderly Uninsured are Low-Income



Total = 49.1 million uninsured

Seamless, Streamlined System of Eligibility and Enrollment



Final Rule: Seamless and Affordable Coverage

- Expands access to affordable coverage
- Simplifies Medicaid & CHIP
- Ensures a seamless system of coverage

Expanding Access to Coverage with Significant Federal Support

- Eliminates gaps in eligibility by expanding to 133% FPL for individuals under age 65
- Enables States to consolidate a large number of eligibility categories into 4 main groups
- Enrollment in the new income-based category without having to first screen for other eligibility groups
- Enables people with disabilities and those needing long-term care services & supports to enroll in the group that best meets their needs

Minimum Medicaid Eligibility Levels in 2014

Population	2014 Minimum Eligibility Levels
Children	Varies by State Average 241% FPL
Pregnant Women	≥133% (Varies by State)
Parents	133%
Disabled Adults	133% (Based on income, not disability)
Other Adults	133%

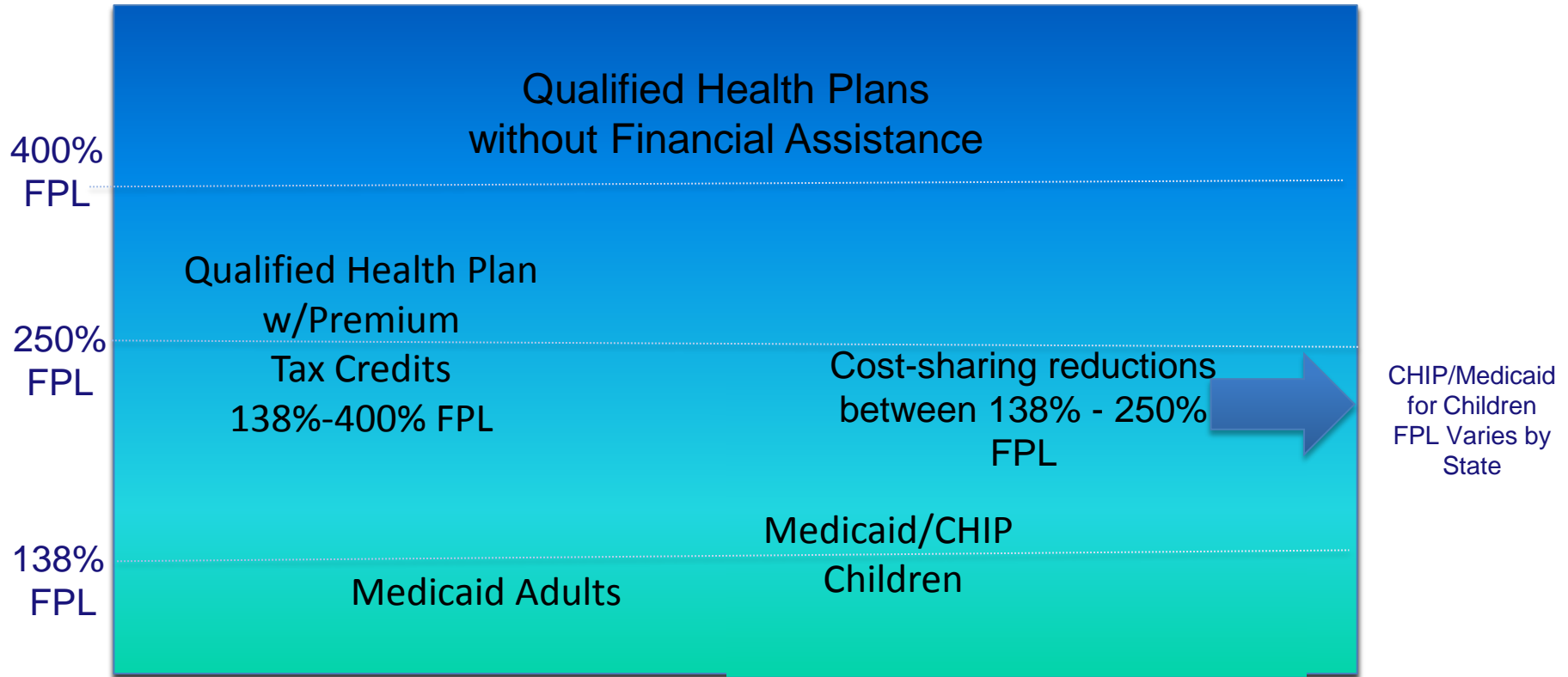
Expanding Access to Coverage with Significant Federal Support

- 100% FMAP from 2014 – 2016; gradually moves to 90% in 2020 and beyond
- Final rule does not include FMAP-related provisions that were in the NPRM
 - Working with 10 States through contract with RAND to test simple, reliable methods of assigning FMAP

Simplifying Medicaid & CHIP

- Move to MAGI; replaces complex rules in place today
 - TA to States on converting current standards to MAGI
- Following State lead, modernizes eligibility verification rules to rely primarily on electronic data
- The federal government will perform some of the data matches for States, relieving administrative burden
- Renewals every 12 months
 - If eligibility can be renewed based on available data, no return form is needed

A Seamless System of Coverage



Coordination: A Seamless System of Coverage

- Single, streamlined application for all insurance affordability programs
- Website that provides program information and facilitates enrollment in all insurance affordability programs
- Coordinated verification policies across Medicaid, CHIP and the Exchanges (e.g. income, State residency, requesting SSNs)
- Shared eligibility service
- Standards and guidelines for ensuring a coordinated , accurate and timely process for performing eligibility determinations and transferring information to other insurance affordability programs (Interim Final with Comment)

Facilitating Enrollment in Insurance Affordability Programs

Exchange makes Medicaid/CHIP MAGI eligibility determinations using State Medicaid/CHIP rules/standards

- Exchanges may be run by non-governmental entities

OR

Exchange makes initial assessment of eligibility; State Medicaid & CHIP agencies make the final eligibility determination

- Accept the electronic account, no duplication for applicants or agencies and determine eligibility according to timeliness standards

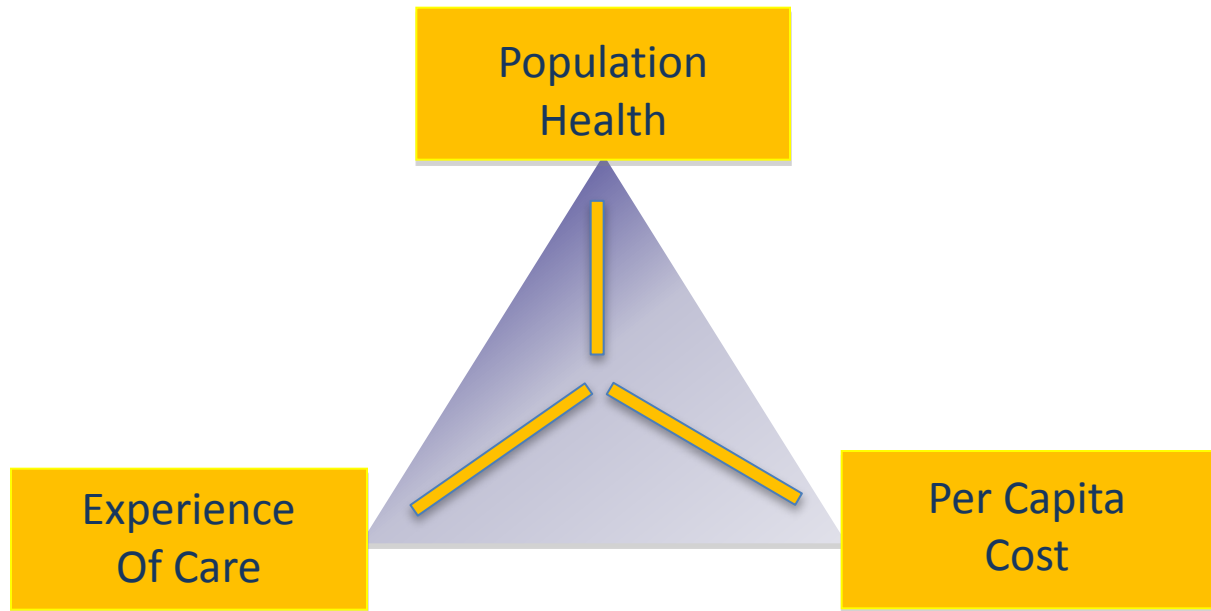
Next Steps

- Published in Federal Register on March 23, 2012
- 45-day comment period on Interim Final Rule provisions until May 8, 2012
 - Safeguarding information (§§431.300 & 431.305)
 - Timeliness standards (§435.912)
 - Coordination (§435.1200)

Next Steps

- Working on operational guidance, streamlined application, data and performance standards in collaboration with States and other stakeholders
- Working with other federal agencies to ensure coordination across programs (e.g. SNAP)
- State Operations and Technical Assistance (SOTA) Teams
