Kinder: Worked with basic number sense

 $1^{st} - 4^{th}$ grades experienced a live video call with a curator from the **Smithsonian American Museum of Art** in Washington, D.C. who shared with them artworks by a few Africa American artists from their collection that we had been working with last month. Our students enjoyed seeing the paintings, hearing about the artists, and being able to ask a bunch of questions!

7/8th: Have begun learning about linear perspective and how this adds the illusion of depth in an artwork. They are practicing with 1 and 2 pt perspective as they design their own cityscape views in pencil.

All 1st – 8th grades: Are working on a powerful program called Books of Hope (now called E-Luminate). We have participated in this program here since 2006 – and each year it turns out to be a truly meaningful and powerful experience for our students. We thank our PTSO for supporting our participation with Books of Hope! This year our books will be sent to the Kapala Library in Sierra Leone. And since the program has gone digital this year, we are able to create more interactive books, recordings, and examples. I will be sending more information home to parents soon. This program engenders some meaningful conversations and I encourage you to share with your children.

- To enhance literacy and learning abroad by creating educational infrastructure and materials for vulnerable children in countries where English proficiency is desirable and/or necessary for success.
- To support literacy in U.S. schools by motivating students to read and write for an audience of their peers who will value their work.
- To foster empathy and social responsibility in American students by providing an effective way for them to learn about and make a difference in the lives of children facing war, poverty, disease, and slavery around the world.

The Nurse's Corner

Family.... It's the most important part of every child's life, and often the major factor in helping them make the healthiest choices. Research shows that children are often more willing to eat nutritious foods and be active if they see their parents and other family members doing these things first. That is why EVERYONE needs to be involved!!!

We started out the month with a visit from Dr. Hussey and the Livorno Dental Clinic Team. That was a perfect introduction to Nutrition, and how important it is, not only for our smiles, but our hearts and brains as well. This week the Third through Eighth Graders will be taking the standardized Terra Nova Test, and I hope, getting a clear message about how the high protein /low sugary foods dramatically impact performance. A study by the Harvard University and Mass General Hospital showed that children who regularly ate breakfast had better test scores and were better behaved in school.

So what makes a good breakfast? Anything that provides protein and low starch, such as eggs and whole grain toast, will keep stomachs full until lunchtime. Sugary foods give us a "high", and leave us tired and hungry half way through the morning. All of our students get a copy of the AAFES menu, but the hot meals are a terrible waste if children's likes and dislikes are not considered. It makes more sense to send a peanut butter sandwich on whole wheat bread for twenty days in a row ...than to pay for a lunch that gets tossed after one "thank you "bite.

SO:

Find out what healthy food your child really likes.

Take them with you when you go shopping and read labels.

Choose "fresh" over packaged!

Keep a food guide pyramid on your refrigerator.

And most importantly......Serve as a role model.

If you don't eat fruits and vegetables, chances are your children won't either.



5th grade Biography in a Box Project

5th grade social studies students worked hard to complete a recent project that addressed social studies standard 5ss5.c to describe and compare the views, lives, and impact of key individuals during the time of the American Revolution and beyond. This project also addressed our school Goal #2-Students will get better at communication in all their classes by summarizing and retelling.

5th graders became familiar with people that were important to American History by using primary resources, both online and printed materials to create a graphic organizer about their assigned person. They then used the graphic organizer to summarize the information in a paragraph form. 5th graders used this information to create a box that of information and artifacts about their famous American. Finally each student gave an oral presentation and using props from the artifact box.

All students did a great job and their projects are on display in the school library. The base library has also asked to display the projects during Library Week in April. The class would like to give a special thanks to Bruce Brown, community volunteer who worked with the students to make their presentations such an great success.

S.T.E.M Garden

This year the community has come and joined us with our S.T.E.M Garden. This would be the Command, DPW, Army, Air Force, Students, Teachers, and the Italian classes coming to visit. They will be building the school raised beds so we can plant our garden. We will all be working together to make a school-community garden.

Our science teacher, Mr. Loyd, says "It's hands-on, more fun, and sure beats reading it out of a book." Our new principal, Mr. Brown, says it's part of a project from S.T.E.M. "S.T.E.M. stands for science, technology, engineering, and mathematics", he said. S.T.E.M makes projects to teach these subjects.

The garden began with Ms. Boyanowski's science class; last year we learned what happens in a plant's life cycle. We started this garden because 6th grade standards focus on plant life cycles, so Ms.Boyanowski decided to take it outside to give us a hands-on experience. In plant life cycles we learned there are two main types - perennials and annuals. Austin, a student in last year's garden, recalls that, "Perennials are when the plant lives for more than one growing season. An example is a strawberry. An annual is when a plant lives for about a year. An example of this is lettuce."

The community S.T.E.M garden is a great way for students, parents, teachers, and volunteers to work together. "It's very important for us all to get together, because a small community like ours, without volunteers, we wouldn't be able to get anything accomplished", said Mr. Meeks. Mr. Meeks is a volunteer in the Military helping us with building our raised beds. He also said, "It's great for students to learn to grow their own garden, and learn about bugs, and plant life."

Our school will be inviting the Italian students from Riglione on March 26th. They are coming to visit out star lab and our garden. We have also invited a Naturalist from DPW to talk about the insects and bats which help our garden.
