Course Organized Under Department of State's Anti-Terrorism Assistance Program

mbassador Anne W. Patterson complimented "dedication and determination" of the women participants of the six-week Crisis Response Team Course (CRTC), organized by the Department of State Anti Terrorism Assistance Program which concluded in Islamabad on August 21. Prime Minister Yousaf Raza Gilani presented certificates to the participants.

The CRTC was designed for a 12-member team and taught the participants the principles of organization, commanding and conducting hostage rescue operation. It also focused on intervention tactics in stronghold assault situations. The course provided the participants with basic skills to resolve high-risk terrorist confrontations using a variety of options while employing the minimum force necessary to protect human life and to limit collateral damage.

"You brave women will encounter a greater threat here than your counterparts in most countries. Police and security forces of Pakistan sacrifice their lives every day to prevent suicide bombings and other attacks," Ambassador Patterson remarked while speaking at the graduation ceremony. "I commend your courage and your dedication. I also salute your families who understandably are apprehensive but surely also very proud of the work you have undertaken."

The course also represented a successful partnership between Pakistan and the United States. Around the world, the Diplomatic Security Anti-Terrorism Assistance

Program brings together counterterrorism experts from the United States and partner nations to work and learn together, fostering cooperation and coordination of counter-terrorism efforts.

Since its inception, Pakistan ATA has successfully conducted over 90 intensive antiterrorist courses of instructions and trained over 1500 Pakistani officials and law enforcement officers. This program, sponsored by the U.S. Department of State, provided training, equipment, and technology targeted to respond most effectively to the security situation in Pakistan.

"We share the Government of Pakistan's goal to detect, deny, defeat, capture, and prosecute terrorists and their organizations," the American Ambassador said.

Speaking on the occasion, Prime Minister Yousuf Raza Gilani said that Pakistan is a fore-runner state in the war against terrorism, adding that it was high time to confront the worst threats before they emerge.

"The war on terror cannot be won on defensive. We have to take the battle to the doorsteps of the extremists," the Prime Minister emphasized.

Referring to the CRTC, the Prime Minister hoped that training and orientation of the program involving latest trends, knowledge and equipment would add impetus to the talent of the participants.

Chief Security Officer of Prime Minister Secretariat Syed Kaleem Imam highlighted the importance of training courses for the law enforcing personnel to help them get better understanding about the complex issue of terrorism.

The Acting Director of Anti-Terrorism Assistance Program, Lynnda Tibbetts, declared the course a "tremendous success."

## Senior U.S. Officials Visit Earthquake-Hit Areas in Muzaffarabad

Also Visit Lahore School of Economics

he United States Assistant
Secretary of State for
Economic, Energy and
Business Affairs, Daniel S.
Sullivan, and the Acting
Assistant U.S. Trade Representative
for South Asia, Claudio Lillienfeld,
visited earthquake affected areas in
Muzaffarabad region on August 10
to assess the progress of the U.S.supported reconstruction work
and discuss strategies to bolster
economic development.

Assistant Secretary Sullivan, who last visited Muzaffarabad in 2006, met with Chief Secretary of AJK, Javed Majeed, and Muzaffarabad Development Authority Chairman Zahid Amin.

Secretary Sullivan also visited the Makri Park, which was constructed with support from the United States Agency for International Development (USAID). In April 2006, USAID funded a \$1.7 million project to remove debris from the city of Muzaffarabad; the project cleared 8.5 million cubic feet of rubble from the town center and deposited it at the government-designated landfill of Makri, a ravine on the bank of the Neelum river.

Assistant Secretary Daniel S. Sullivan emphasized "the strong and vibrant US-Pakistan bilateral trade relationship" during his visit to the Lahore School of Economics on August 12.

Speaking with students and faculty of the Lahore School of Economics, Assistant Secretary Sullivan stated that "the health of U.S. economy is also vitally dependent on the growth and development of those countries with which we trade and invest."

Assistant Secretary Sullivan was received at the Lahore School of Economics by Rector Dr. Shahid Amjad Chaudhry. Following his remarks, Assistant Secretary Sullivan responded to student and faculty's queries on the United States-Pakistan bilateral economic relationship.

During his visit to Lahore, Assistant Secretary Sullivan also met with Punjab Finance Minister Tanveer Ashraf Kaira and held separate meetings with representatives of the business community.

## slamabad - Following is the text of the Joint Communiqué issued at the conclusion of the U.S.-Pakistan Economic Dialogue on August 11, 2008.

The third Pakistan-U.S. Economic Dialogue was held today under the cochairmanship of Pakistan's Minister of Finance, Revenue, Economic Affairs, and Statistics, Syed Naveed Qamar, and U.S. Assistant Secretary of State for Economic, Energy and Business Affairs Daniel S. Sullivan. The Dialogue sought to deepen the U.S.-Pakistan economic partnership and further develop a long-term, broad-based economic relationship that mutually benefits the citizens of our two countries. The two sides discussed a wide-ranging agenda, including macroeconomic policy, labor, intellectual property rights, agricultural cooperation, eliminating terrorism finance networks, Reconstruction Opportunity Zones, a GOP scholarship proposal, foreign assistance and FATA development, regional cooperation and transit trade, private sector cooperation, and a Bilateral Investment Treaty (BIT). Representatives from Pakistan's Ministries of Finance, Commerce,

Foreign Affairs, Agriculture, Interior, Labor, Law and Justice, Water and Power, Education, the Board of Investment, and the State Bank of Pakistan, as well as Pakistan's Economic Minister to the United States. participated. They were joined by officials

from the U.S. Departments of State, Commerce, Treasury, the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative, the U.S. Agency for International Development, and the U.S. Embassy.

two delegations discussed Pakistan's macroeconomic policies, including fiscal and monetary reforms and social safety net measures the GOP has taken and plans to take to promote economic growth, provide protection to vulnerable groups, and increase prosperity of all Pakistanis. The United States and Pakistan agreed on the importance of GOP measures to stabilize the economy, to adhere to the announced macroeconomic policy and targets, and to continue Pakistan's structural reforms, including monetary and fiscal policy adjustments. A fruitful discussion was held on establishing Reconstruction Opportunity Zones, which will facilitate job creation and economic development in the Federally Administered Tribal Areas. North West Frontier Province, the earthquake-affected areas of Azad Jammu and Kashmir, and Balochistan within 100 miles of the Afghan border. Reconstruction Opportunity Zones will provide greater market access to exports from businesses in these areas and create employment opportunities for the border regions.

Trade liberalization, protection of intellectual property rights, and labor issues, all aimed at fostering increased economic opportunities, were also discussed. Useful discussions about the issues that remain in concluding a BIT, which would promote a more open, transparent, and predictable business climate, were discussed as well. We agreed that the United States and Pakistan have a strong interest in resuming BIT negotiations and that our investment experts should meet as soon as possible to do so. Ways to increase the opportunity for Pakistani students to study at U.S. universities, including through expanding scholarship opportunities, were considered, and we agreed to pursue the matter further.

Recognizing rising world fuel and food prices, policy measures already taken by the GOP to cope with rising prices and ways in which bilateral cooperation in energy and agriculture could be strengthened, in particular increasing capacity and attracting greater U.S. investment in the these areas. The two parties spoke of positive steps to better address matters relating to eliminating terrorism financing networks and strengthening Pakistan's Money Laundering Ordinance. There was also discussion about ways to strengthen GOP efforts for sustainable socio-economic development of the border areas.

The two delegations agreed to meet again in 2009 in the United States.






ashto-speaking American officers of Peshawar Consulate participated in a Pashto television program on Pakistan Television (PTV) to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Peshawar Consulate. During the program, Assistant Public Affairs Officer Roya Miller and Political Officer Darrin MacKinnon discussed the cultural bridges that have been built between the community and the Consulate over the last 50 years, including the initiative to train American officers deputed at Peshawar Consulate to speak Pashto.

"The themes of music are universal" said MacKinnon. The officers chose three Pashto music videos to play and discussed how music overcomes national boundaries. Miller noted that by exploring the music of another culture, people can get a better understanding of each others traditions and values.

PTV is the only broadcast channel in Pakistan's Federally Administrated Tribal Areas (FATA). The program, conducted entirely in Pashto, was viewed all over Pakistan including the NWFP, the Frontier Regions, and FATA.

## U.S. Provides Emergency Assistance to Flood Victims

he United States Government, through the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), provided \$50,000 in emergency relief to people in flood-affected areas of the North West Frontier Province (NWFP) and an equivalent amount to the Punjab Police force which assisted with flood relief operations in Rajanpur.

The assistance amount for NWFP flood victims provided jerry cans and tankered potable water, kerosene lamps, cooking stoves, fuel, and kitchen utensils to

approximately 5,400 individuals or some 900 households in Patwar Bala and Patwar Payen of Peshawar district. The assistance package for the Punjab police force will primarily be used to buy fuel and repair police vehicles that are being used in support of flood relief operations and that help provide security for those displaced by flooding in Rajanpur.

"The United States extends its condolences to the families affected by this terrible disaster," said U.S. Ambassador Anne W. Patterson in Islamabad on August 11. "This

assistance from the American people will provide essential items to help the flood victims. We stand by you in this trying time."

The relief assistance USAID provided was crucial in the early stages of a natural disaster to avert further injury or loss of life. USAID has provided similar assistance to Pakistan during flooding in 2003, 2005 and 2007. Immediately following the October 2005 earthquake, USAID provided relief that saved lives in the earthquake-affected areas. It has since helped rebuild some of the hardest-hit areas.





# 26 Pakistani Students Embark on Education Program to U.S.

he Mission Director of United States Agency for International Development (USAID), Anne Aarnes, underlined the need for buildings "cross-cultural understanding" and termed the exchange programs as the "first step of broadening world view" of the participating students.

"I know your parents and teachers are proud of your high academic achievements and your selection for this program," said Ms. Aarnes while speaking at a send-off ceremony organized in Islamabad on August 13 for the 26 Pakistani high school students who were selected for a two-week science and technology exchange program in Washington.

The exchange program is part the USAID's \$90 million Links to Learning (ED-LINKS) program which will teach the students web development, digital photography and video production. The first batch of students (14 boys and 12 girls) under this program represents both rural and urban areas of Islamabad Capital Territory.

"You are going to have once-in-alifetime opportunity to experience American life firsthand, while also learning more about the latest information technology," USAID's Aarnes said. "I know that you will be proud and effective representatives of Pakistan, and that you will form rewarding friendships with the American students and teachers you meet."

ED-LINKS will send up to 30 students each from Balochistan, Sindh and the Islamabad Capital Territory every year. Students are selected based on merit from underprivileged households in these areas. The ED-LINKS program works in collaboration with the Ministry of Education, Government of Pakistan.

Since 2002, the U.S. Government through USAID has provided more than \$2 billion to Pakistan to improve economic growth, education, health, and governance and to assist with earthquake reconstruction.

# **English ACCESS Micro-Scholarship Program New Batch Passes Out**

The English ACCESS Micro-scholarship Program is an initiative of the U.S. State Department that provides an American-style classroom experience to underprivileged youth around the world. The goal of this two-year program is to adequately prepare bright students in written and spoken English so that they can gain admission to Pakistan's universities, thus permitting them to compete more effectively with students who have studied in English-medium schools.

The first ACCESS program in Pakistan was launched in Lahore in 2004. Approximately 1,370 students are participating in the ACCESS Micro-scholarship program throughout Pakistan, which is currently being run in Peshawar, Lahore, Multan, Rawalpindi, and Gwadar.

During their visit to Multan, Principal Officer Hunt and Pubic Affairs Officer Mell also visited SOS village where they were briefed about the contribution of SOS towards the welfare of children.






corporate sector while we serve our common objective of helping the citizens of Pakistan live a better and a healthier life."

verybody here is so hospitable and warm. Wherever we go, we get respect and warmth, which is the most delightful part of this home stay program," remarked Hasit Mistry, an Indian participant of the Seeds of Peace program, about his weeklong visit to Lahore.

Organized by Pakistan Program Director Sajjad Ahmed and his Indian counterpart Feruzan Mehta, the program brought 18 Indian Seeds and 7 delegation leaders to Pakistan's cultural capital, Lahore, where they stayed with the Pakistani Seeds and got an introduction to their family life.

In 2001, Seeds of Peace – a New York-based non-governmental, non-

political organization -- launched a pilot program for Indian and Pakistani teenagers from Mumbai and Lahore. Since then, over 150 Indian and Pakistani students have participated in the program, with another 12 from each country attending the camp in June 2008.

A number of activities were planned for the students, including workshops to impart leadership skills and explore attitudes towards bilateral issues which the Seeds used during their presentations when visiting five schools in Lahore. Muhammad Saad, a Pakistan student and host, said he found the workshops "amazing, unconventional and constructive."

The Indian students' visit, however,

was not only educational; there were visits to tourist sites like the Badshahi Mosque, Lahore Fort, Gurdwara Dera Sahib and of course, the famed, pedestrian-only Anarkali Bazaar where they shopped to their heart's delight. The visit also gave an opportunity for the Indian guests to witness the Wagha Border flag-lowering ceremony from the Pakistani side.

Attending a dinner with the Pakistani and Indian Seeds, Public Affairs Officer Traci Mell encouraged them "to spread the message of peace and tolerance," and hoped that "this visit would be the beginning of many lifelong friendships."

The Seeds of Peace summer camp brings together children from various conflict regions around the world for six weeks of activities designed to promote peacemaking and conflict resolution skills between students from both sides of a conflict. Students are chosen through a competitive process involving recommendations, essays and interviews.

That the Lahore visit was a learning experience for all, was encapsulated by Mrs. Maliha Abrar when she remarked that the Indian students' "different outlook on life in Pakistan helped us to analyze things in a better way."

The visit concluded with a farewell dinner where the Indian guests and Pakistani hosts exchanged gifts and promised to continue spreading the message of peace. It was only befitting that the trees they chose to plant in Lahore were "sukh-chain" – symbolizing peace and tranquility.

# USAID Funds Update of Provincial Assemblies' Websites

re you interested in finding out more about the legislators from your constituency? Do you want to write to them about issues important to you? Do you want to know how the Assemblies operate? Or perhaps you just want to take a virtual tour of the Assembly building. All this information is now just a click away, thanks to the USAID-funded update of the Punjab, NWFP and Sindh Assembly websites.

"In recent years, the NWFP and Punjab Assemblies have been at the forefront of increasing public access to legislators and the work they do on behalf of their constituents," said Michael Hryshchyshyn, Director of the Office of Democracy and Governance for USAID/Pakistan at the launch of the Punjab Assembly website.

Inaugural events were held in the three provincial capitals to launch the websites. After expressing his appreciation for USAID's contribution, Speaker of the Punjab Assembly Rana Muhammad Iqbal pressed the button, formally inaugurating the website for the Punjab Assembly. A large number of male and female MPs from different parties were present on the occasion and expressed keen interest in the website.

U.S. Consulate Lahore's Principal Officer Bryan Hunt hoped that the website "would prove to be a useful resource for voters, students, researchers and the media."

Addressing guests at the launch of the Sindh Assembly website, U.S. Consul General in Karachi Kay L. Anske remarked that it provides the "public opportunity to be more involved in their government."

The websites, www.panwfp.gov. (NWFP), www.pap.gov.pk pk(Punjab)and www.pas.gov.pk (Sindh) provide a full display of information in English and Urdu on their Assemblies including history, members, bills, acts, Assembly proceedings, and resolutions. They also highlight the functions of the Standing Committees and their activities through reports,

news releases and clippings, and photographs. Additionally, there are e-mail portals allowing citizens to directly query the Assembly officials, encouraging more public input into its deliberations.

"We believe that these websites will help increase public understanding of and interest in the political process, promoting transparent and participatory governance and fostering democracy in Pakistan," Mr. Hryshchyshyn added.

The construction of these websites is part of USAID'S \$9.3 million Pakistan Legislative Strengthening Project (PLSP) that is partnering with Pakistan's national and provincial legislatures to strengthen parliamentary institutions and processes.


# USAID Launches Balochistan Component of \$90 Million National Education Program

he United States
Agency for International Development (USAID) and
the Government of
Balochistan's Education and
Literacy Department have
signed a Memorandum of
Understanding (MOU) in
Quetta on August 19 to expand USAID's nationwide
\$90 million ED-LINKS program to the province.

"This program promises great rewards in Balochistan," said Mr. Edward Birgells, USAID/Pakistan's Acting Mission Director. "It will improve the teaching skills of some 10,000 teachers, build the capacity of officials to improve school management and increase the learning of more than 83,000 students."

Focused on improving education throughout Pakistan by improving key educational components such as teachers' skills, ED-LINKS will work in 695 middle and secondary schools in Kech, Panjgoor, Awaran, Khuzdar, Kachhi, Sibi, Jaffarabad, Pishin, Killa Saifullah, Killa Abdullah and Loralai.

"Investing in education is synonymous to investing in the future," said Mr. Birgells. "The American people firmly believe this and they are funding this program to help Pakistanis invest in a better future for their children and their nation."

One of these innovators is Professor Maysam Ghovanloo. This immigrant from Iran has become justice and tolerance of all faiths.


