





Executing the Maritime Strategy

Around the world, the Navy is executing the core capabilities of the Maritime Strategy – some examples from throughout the fleet in February 2011 were:

Forward Presence

- The <u>Carl Vinson Carrier Strike Group</u> (CSG) <u>flew 1,436 sorties</u> for <u>3,416 hours</u> amounting to a 99 percent sortie completion rate supporting U.S. and coalition forces in Afghanistan.
- <u>USS Frank Cable (AS 40)</u> and <u>USS Houston (SSN 713)</u> conducted a port visit to Sepangar, Malaysia.

Power Projection

• The <u>Boxer Amphibious Ready Group (ARG)</u> and the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) <u>departed San</u> <u>Diego</u> for a seven-month deployment.

Maritime Security

- <u>USS Momsen (DDG 92</u>) and USS Bunker Hill (CG 52) <u>disrupted</u> a <u>pirate attack</u> of the Panamanian-flagged merchant vessel Duqm in the Gulf of Oman.
- The <u>Enterprise</u> CSG <u>transited into the U.S. 5th Fleet</u> area of responsibility, while <u>USS Kearsarge (LHD 3)</u> conducted 2,475 sorties in support of maritime security operations within the region.
- Marines from the 31st MEU's Force Reconnaissance Platoon <u>fast roped</u> from a CH-46E Sea Knight for a <u>visit</u>, <u>board</u>, <u>search and seizure</u> drill aboard USNS 1st Lt. Jack Lummus (T-AK 3011) as part of Cobra Gold 2011.
- The <u>Abraham Lincoln</u> CSG and embarked Carrier Air Wing 2 participated in a joint aerial combat training exercise with the Royal Malaysian air force.

Humanitarian Assistance / Disaster Response

- High Speed Vessel (HSV) 2 Swift's <u>medical team</u> visited Zacatillo Island, El Salvador, to assess public health needs and <u>assist medical experts</u> as part of Southern Partnership Station 2011.
- The <u>Essex ARG</u> and the 31st MEU participated in medical, dental and civic action projects in <u>Sihanoukville</u>, Cambodia, as a part of <u>Maritime Exercise 2011</u>.
- <u>USS Shoup</u> (DDG 86) Sailors, while in port Fremantle, Australia, helped clear roads following bushfires.
- Seabees assigned to <u>Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 74's</u> Horn of Africa detachment <u>drilled a well</u> in the village of Jedane, Ethiopia.

Building Maritime Partnerships

- <u>USS Robert G. Bradley</u> (FFG 49) and Naval Forces Africa trainers completed the first Africa Partnership Station <u>training event</u> of 2011 with more than 130 students from Benin, Ghana and Togo in <u>Lome, Togo</u>.
- <u>USS Memphis</u> (SSN 691) and maritime patrol aircraft from Commander, Task Force 67 participated in <u>Proud</u> <u>Manta</u>, NATO's largest anti-submarine warfare exercise, near Sicily, Italy.
