





## Executing the Maritime Strategy

"The United States is a maritime nation; sea power is critical to American security and economic well-being. Third Fleet focuses on training and deployment of combat-ready Navy and Marine Corps forces capable of executing all facets of the Maritime Strategy at a moment's notice."

Around the world, the Navy is executing the core capabilities of the Maritime Strategy; examples from August include: **Forward Presence** 

- The <u>George H.W. Bush Carrier Strike Group (CSG)</u> flew 2,214 sorties for 6,400 hours in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and maritime security operations (MSO) in the U.S. 5th Fleet area of responsibility (AOR).
- The Navy announced that <u>USS Bonhomme Richard (LHD 6)</u> will <u>relieve USS Essex (LHD 2)</u> as the Navy's only forward-deployed amphibious assault ship.
- USNS Richard E. Byrd (T-AKE 4) was the first U.S. Navy ship to visit Cam Ranh Bay, Vietnam, in 38 years.
- <u>USS George Washington (CVN 73)</u> and <u>USS Blue Ridge (LCC 19)</u> returned to <u>Yokosuka</u>, Japan, after <u>completing patrols</u> in the Pacific Ocean.
- <u>The Ronald Reagan CSG</u> visited <u>Hong Kong</u> and <u>Guam</u> following deployments in the U.S. 5th and 7th Fleets' AOR.
- <u>USS Lassen (DDG 82)</u> provided tours to more than 6,000 people at the <u>35th Friendship Day</u> in Yokosuka, Japan.
- <u>High Speed Vessel Swift (HSV 2)</u> Sailors conducted training engagements in <u>Nigeria</u>, <u>Ghana</u> and Benin, and <u>USS Samuel B. Roberts (FFG 58)</u> <u>Sailors</u> hosted a damage control course in <u>Victoria</u>, <u>Seychelles</u>, in support of <u>Africa</u> <u>Partnership Station</u>.

#### Maritime Security

- The <u>Bataan Amphibious Readiness Group</u> and the embarked <u>22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit</u> conducted MSO in the U.S. 5th Fleet AOR.
- <u>USS Carney (DDG 64)</u> Sailors commemorated the 69th anniversary of Operation Pedestal in Valletta, Malta.
- <u>Maritime Civil Affairs Team 103 Sailors</u> aboard <u>USS Cleveland (LPD 7)</u> finished a five-month deployment to Tonga, Vanuatu, Papua New Guinea, Timor-Leste and Micronesia in support of Pacific Partnership 2011.
- <u>USS Anzio (CG 68)</u> assisted a <u>Somali skiff</u>, and <u>USS Mitscher (DDG 57)</u> assisted a <u>distressed vessel</u> in the Gulf of Aden. **Deterrence**
- <u>USS Pennsylvania (SSBN 735)</u> departed the dry dock at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard and Intermediate Maintenance Facility, completing a major step in its 27-month engineered refueling overhaul.
- USS John Paul Jones (DDG 53), USS Milius (DDG 69), USS Lake Erie (CG 70) and USS Paul Hamilton (DDG 60) participated in ballistic missile defense exercises.

#### **Power Projection**

- USS Ohio (SSGN 726) fired a Tomahawk Land Attack Missile near the Northern Mariana Islands during training.
- <u>USS Thach (FFG 43)</u> Sailors trained with 3,500 personnel from 17 countries, and <u>Mobile Dive and Salvage Unit 2 Company</u> <u>23</u> joined divers from various countries to exchange tactics during <u>PANAMAX 2011</u>.

### Humanitarian Assistance / Disaster Response

- Military Sealift Command hospital ship <u>USNS Comfort (T-AH 20)</u> departed Port-au-Prince, Haiti. Comfort's medical staff triaged 67,879 patients and performed 1,130 shipboard surgeries during <u>Continuing Promise 2011</u>.
- More than 150 <u>Navy Expeditionary Combat Command</u> Sailors deployed with Amphibious Task Force 26 to support humanitarian assistance operations in response to Hurricane Irene.
